CLAUDE CLARKE CALLED BY DEATH

Assistant Treasurer of the World Succumbs After Operation.

WAS PROMINENT MASON

Entered World Office as a Boy and Earned Advancement to Late Position.

Richard Claude Clarke, who was an employe of The Toronto World for the past twenty-one years, died at his late residence at 85 Grenadier road from blood poisoning at 7 o'clock last night, after an operation for appendicitis. On June 14 Mr. Clarke underwent the operation at the General Hospital and it was thought at the time that he would recover. He returned to his home on the 24th and seemed to be gaining in health steadily until July 1,

Since then his health appeared to be good. He was a prominent member of the Doric Lodge, A. F. & A. M., and leaves a wife and one son aged ten. The funeral will take place on Monday at 2:30 from his late residence to Mount Pleasant.

New York Stock Talk

NEW YORK, July 9.—The favorable influence of the government's remarkable crop report was off-set to some extent in the stock market today by the ominous weakness in Missouri Pacific and the other Gould-issues and by the decline in New York, New Haven and Hartford stock to 61 7-8,

the lowest price in the history of that corporation.

The selling in New Haven was liquidation of the genuine sort. It came from New England and was doubtless impelled by the fear that the prospects of a return of the property to a dividend basis would become even more remote than they are at present if the department of justice persists in filing its threatened dissolution suit.

Missouri Pacific broke thru the low price established on Wednesday, shortly after the opening today and on heavy transactions plunged down to 11, whence it rallied only feebly at the close.

Denver and Rio Grande and Western Pacific 5 per cent. bonds were equally

weak and a slight recovery in the former have was due wholly to retirement of short contracts. There was no evidence of any sort that the financial sponsors for these companies are giving any support to their securities in the market. The speculators took whatever liberties they pleased with them and are wholly responsible for their fluctuations.

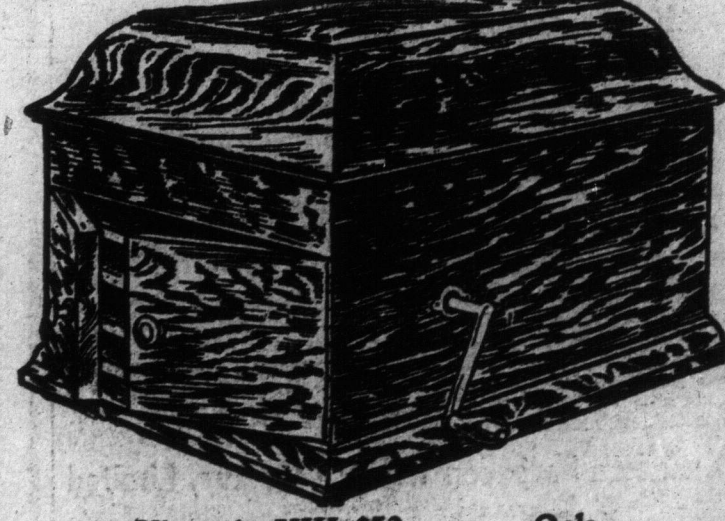

THE NEW HOUSEKEEPING

The Mechanical Servant in the House

SOME of us are fortunate enough to have maids or butlers, and thus have our daily meals served to us smoothly and silently by their human hands.

First of these in importance is the tray or trays on wheels. Several styles of this device come—one with two trays about thirty inches oval, fitted in a well-made steel stand, which has three legs fitted to rubber tired wheels.

Another silent servant is what is often called the "lazy Susan." This device is a revolving stand made in either wood to match the dining table or of glass on a similar base or pedestal.

Then in the matter of individual dishes we are finding it is more efficient to have one dish with three or four partitions than to have four separate dishes on the table.

When a woman must serve her own meals it would pay her to look into this question of wheeled serving trays, revolving servette or "Susan," the new apparatus of the muffin stand, the compartment dishes and try to use casseroles more extensively in her cooking.

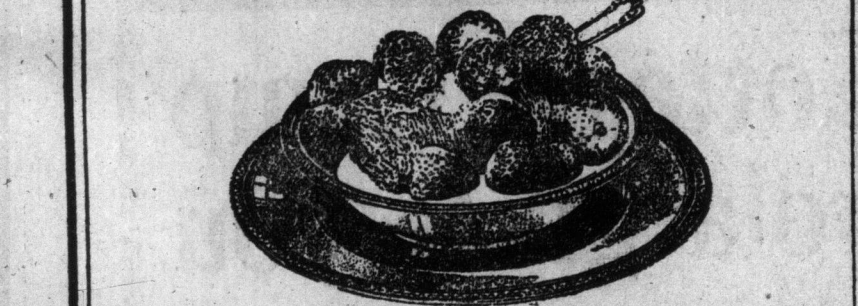

PENTSTEMON.

Beard Tongue.

Early July, August and most of the month of September is the flowering time of the pentstemons, often commonly called the beard tongues.

These splendid rock perennials are not so well known among young amateurs as are the Columbine, Sweet Williams, pinks and phlox; and yet, they are quite as easy to manage as these latter perennials, and give quite as great a return in blossom and range of coloring, if indeed, not more.

Some of the dwarf species are splendid rock plants, while the taller varieties make grand backgrounds for herbaceous borders, ranking in importance with such tall perennials as even the English lupines.

When I tell my amateurs that altogether there are about one hundred different varieties of this tribe they will easily understand that infinite satisfaction may be obtained from but a few of the varieties.

The plants send up stems, erect and branching from the base from three to five feet high, the leaves being of a rich glossy green lanceolate to ovate, and singularly free from vermin of all kinds, a worthy fact to remember.

A healthy thick clump of these fine perennials make a spot of permanent color, varying in tints and shades for quite ten weeks through the summer. And like the perennial phlox, the colors range thro' whites, yellows, pinks, purples, mauves, and all the richest and royalist of the blues that blossoms claim peculiarly for their own.

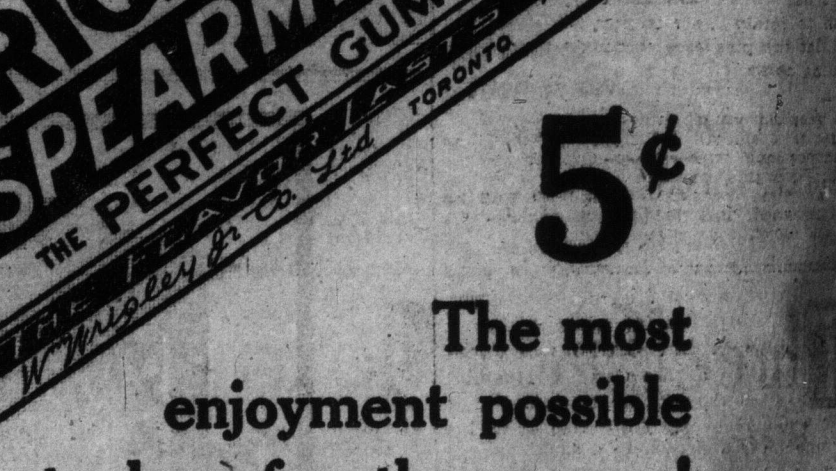
Another valuable lesson to be learned from the English woman is that she does not go in much for cosmetics, the continual use of which must ruin any complexion.

BRAZILIAN IS THE LOCAL FEATURE

With Barcelona New Low is Recorded—Weakness Abroad.

RAIDING IN BRUSSELS

General Electric is Down—Market Develops Weak Tendencies.

Brazilian featured yesterday's stock market; 2533 shares were sold. The price dropped from 73 7/8 to 73 3/4. This is a new record. Most of the selling was done at slightly over 73. The weakness is said to be due to rumors which were current abroad. These have been denied.

Barcelona was in the same class. Bear raiding in Brussels is said to be the reason. The stock opened at 18. This was the lowest point of the day. Later one-quarter was added to the figure; 110 shares were sold. Twin City was also down. Two sales were made at 102 3/4. Rights were active at 1-1/2. The loss for the day was three-eighths.

A lowering of prices took place in most of the active issues with the exception of Barcelona.

Prices hardened in the early afternoon, but sagged again in the late trading, and the market closed uncertain.

Officials of the commission declined to make any statement as to date.

NEXT STEP WILL BE A BIG MERGER

So Declares Well-Known Oil Promoter—Weak Ones Weeded.

CALGARY, July 10.—"The next development in the local oil situation will be the amalgamation of the companies," declared Julian Langner, well known oil promoter of this city. "I understand that there are now some twenty or 250 companies whose authorized capitalization exceed \$400,000. It is impossible to raise any such sum, and I am convinced that from \$1000 to \$10,000 in their treasuries—not enough to drill a single well. On the other hand, I believe, been conservatively estimated by recognized geologists that a large number of the leases purchased by these companies are practically worthless. It is, that out of every 100 acres owned by these companies, only about 10 are even worth testing. "What is to be done? The thing that must occur is obvious. The weaker companies must weed out all their land that is not pronounced worthy of developing only first-class property. Even then, it is doubtful if enough capital can be obtained for the purpose immediately. "Thus, for example, if 10 companies which now have \$10,000 each in their coffers were to combine they could offer at once to develop the choicest property. Once this was done and the strength resulting from the combination became known, money would come in easier and, no doubt, two or more wells could be drilled promptly. As it is, all six are prevented from doing anything, and at the same time a large amount of valueless land is included in each company's capitalization. "If an idea of the work being developed this idea, and several companies are now considering proposals I have made them. I believe that if the negotiations result satisfactorily a large number of similar mergers will be put thru shortly."

MINING STOCKS STRONG YESTERDAY

Ignored Weakness of Other Markets—Prices Held Firm.

Mining stocks were strong yesterday in face of the weakness of other markets. The changes in prices from the previous day's business were few. Dome Extension was stronger. It sold up to 3 1/4. There is continued good buying of the stock. Dome Lake was higher. It sold up to 39. Hollinger was strong at 190. Crown Reserve sold up to 117. Peterson Lake was fairly strong at 34 1/4 to 34 1/2. Bailey was steady around 3-4. Porcupine Pet was around the previous day's price, 25 1/2 to 26. Fortin Vepod was neglected. McIntyre was slightly higher at 25 1/2.

WESTINGHOUSE STRIKERS WILL RETURN TO WORK

PITTSBURGH, July 10.—Despatches state that striking employees of Westinghouse companies will return to work Monday practically on whatever terms are offered by the management. The strike has lasted five weeks.

This Looks Better

PHILADELPHIA, July 10.—The Pennsylvania Railway has awarded a contract for 100,000 tons of steel rails to cover 1914 requirements.

HEAVY SELLING HAS ITS EFFECT

Declines in New Haven and Chesapeake Are Noteworthy.

MANY MINOR SALES

London Markets Weak—Steel Tonnage Higher—Bank Clearings Decrease.

NEW YORK, July 10.—Investment issues began today to show the cumulative effect of the continued heavy selling of Gould issues. New Haven and Chesapeake are Ohio, as well as various other low-priced securities. These and other stocks on bonds established new low records. The declines in New Haven and Chesapeake were especially noteworthy because they savored strongly of liquidation.

Another unusual feature was the recording of many sales of minor international railway stocks for future delivery. The fact that these sales were made "flat" or without interest pending actual delivery, indicated that foreign holders were pressing the sale of American securities. Much of this class of trading was traced to Amsterdam, but London, Berlin and Paris also sold altogether to the extent of about 25,000 shares.

London is Heavy. London's own market was heavy, on recrudescence of the Ulster troubles, with money and discounts higher. The Paris bourse was weak, and Berlin reflected uneasy industrial conditions.

The local market was weakest in the final hour, when selling of the market leaders at concessions overwhelmed previous advances in the unimportant stocks. The speculative favorites fell 1 to 3 points on fairly large trading, with little or no recovery. The clearing of the general market may be gauged from a 20 point decline in the 5 per cent. bonds of the Chicago and Eastern Illinois Railway, whose shares are involved in the St. Louis and San Francisco receivership.

Some Comfort. A few crumbs of comfort were offered in the course of the day, the United States Steel Corporation reporting a slight increase of tonnage for June, and the decrease generally looked for. Copper metal was down a fraction, however, and the state of that industry, especially as to demand was unsatisfactory.

Bank clearings for the week, even allowing last week's holidays showed a marked tendency downward. A fall of nearly four points in C.P.R. and of 2 3/4 in Brazilian was accompanied by a decline of only 1 in Power, the most prominent stock in the recent advance, while losses elsewhere were confined largely to small fractions.

MONTREAL STOCKS TEND DOWNWARD

Brazilian a Big Trading Stock—Undertone is Not Satisfactory.

MONTREAL, July 10.—Sharp declines in London and a weak market in New York checked any bullish enthusiasm in local stocks today and the general tendency downward. A fall of nearly four points in C.P.R. and of 2 3/4 in Brazilian was accompanied by a decline of only 1 in Power, the most prominent stock in the recent advance, while losses elsewhere were confined largely to small fractions.

The good change displayed to weakening influences indicated very clearly a considerable change in sentiment in the last few weeks. There was no nervousness in the market, and with allowance for the changed character of the London and New York markets the undertone was far from unsatisfactory.

Brazilian was the big trading stock of the day, and in the early dealings gave a poor account of itself. After opening 1 lower at 74, there was a further break to 72 1/4 on selling of about 600 shares. The afternoon tone was steadier, slightly lower than the noon close and last sale at 73 5/8 showed a loss of 2 3/4. About 2350 shares changed hands. C.P.R. Quiet. C.P.R. was comparatively quiet, less than 500 shares changing hands on the four point break, which carried the price to 189 7/8 in the afternoon against a low of 190 5/8 in the morning. There was a slight rally later, and the close was 190 bid, 3/4 down from Thursday.

Power fell off a point to 232, but closed better at 232 1/4. Shawinigan declined 3/4 to 24, but rallied 3-8. Steamships pfd. and Iron declined 1/4. Textile 1-4. Ames-Holden reversed the general trend, going 1/2 higher to 1 1/2.

LOWER VALUES IN CHICAGO MARKET

Chance of Damage by Black Rust Was the Cause.

CHICAGO, July 10.—Skepticism in regard to the chances of widespread damage by black rust brought about a lowering of values today in wheat.

The market, although steady at the close, was 1-2 to 3-4 under last night. Corn finished 1-8 to 1-4 off to 3-8 up, oats 1-8 to 5-8 higher and provisions unchanged to a rise of 20c.

Notwithstanding that hot weather northwest and bullish cables gave wheat prices some strength at the start, selling pressure enlarged to an unusual extent, and there was decided heaviness in consequence.

Exporters generally agreed that the European demand for wheat was much less urgent than heretofore, and that foreign requirements were fairly well filled up for the present.

It was said that export sales, totaling 500,000 bushels, were doubtless included in the 800,000 bushels noted at the seaboard as the day's export aggregate.

Corn was a typical weather market. Drought and heat reports made prices average higher, but considerable weakness was finally shown as a result of despatches telling of rains in Texas and Oklahoma.
