MINES AND MINING STOCKS.

Encouraging Review of the Situation in Rossland Camp From the Rossland Miner

RE CENTRAL CANADA MINING.

Address Delivered in Winnipeg—Sales on Three Canadian Mining Exchanges.

In its regular weekly review of developments in the camp The Rossland Miner of May 13 says:

"The most interesting event of the past week in mining circles is the way the surface and on the Veveit is improving. This discovery was made some days since while excavating for a stable, and is 100 feet to the southeast of the shaft house. The ledge is a wide one, with well defined veins and is of a rich copper content...

"The fact that the Le Roi smashed all previous records by sending over 2441 tons to the smelter last week shows the possibilities of this mine when it is equipped with machinery up to the limit of its capacity. The Le Roi never looked better, and under the very capable management that is now guiding its affairs it is certain to make a record for itself much larger than that of last week."

"The Evening Star is developing in a most satisfactory manner. The management has required the owners to install a compressor, but to all this order it has been added to the seven-drill compressor, and development may be proceeded with in the interim. The seven-drill compressor, which iron horse has been broken, and before the end of the present week power drills will be at work in the Veveit shaft. More will be added to the emergency areas for them."

"Engineers of the Red Mountain shaft are now locating the spurs of the main track which will run to the foot of the Jodie and No. 1 tramway. It has been undertaken from both of the West Le Roi properties. It is, however, probable that some shipments will be made from the Jodie before the compressor is installed, also, as stated, the regular output cannot be begun until all the proper machinery is at hand. The Nickel Plate, however, should ship in any case within two months from date, allowing ample time for the spur, which is of no great length, to be completed."

"The showing on the Annie, which it will be remembered is also a test of the values on the north vein of the Le Roi property itself, is still exceptionally good. Assays taken yesterday showed 3 ozs. gold and 8 per cent. copper, or a total value of something over \$80 per ton. The ledge itself is maintaining its width as depth is gained, being some 100 feet wide."

"On the Iron Mack the country between the main and north veins on the 400 foot level is proving exceptionally well mineralized. A new vein was located the week before last north of the main ledge, which was some ten feet from the main ledge. The foot wall of yet another shoot was come upon, and during the past week this has been driven three and four feet, proving 20 feet across. The north vein will be located within the next few feet, and thus the barren country which was expected has proved to be a very high mineralized stretch."

"Central Canada v. Transvaal. Following is an address given at the Winnipeg City Hall by Mr. E. H. Macdonald, president of the Transvaal Mining Association, and a member of the Central Canada Chamber of Mines."

"From published statistics it will be noted that the Transvaal ores are low grade, averaging only 1/2 oz. to the ton, and the plates, in value slightly under \$9 per ton. The mines of the Transvaal, however, are rich, some exceeding 400 oz. to the ton. The cost of constructing these immense dams averages about \$50,000, and sinking and equipping a shaft to that depth about \$200,000, or \$150,000 in all. It has to be spent before they are on the same basis as a Canadian outcrop mine, when the first pick is put into the ground."

"The Transvaal reefs average 10 feet in thickness. In Canada a fair average reef is four feet, but many run in Ontario up to 15 feet. Average returns from Lake of the Woods mines now working would give about \$11 to the ton, some much higher rates. Large outcrop dikes returning 80 per ton upwards are common in Ontario, which might be worked as quartz. The cost of mining and milling the latter with modern appliances (as on the Hand) would not exceed \$1.50 per ton."

"Labor is considerably higher in Africa, averaging for white labor \$6 per day. Kaffir labor being \$11 per month and found. All necessities of life are much more expensive in Africa and a workman's three-roomed cottage cannot be obtained in Johannesburg under \$35 per month. Transvaal mines are highly capitalized."

CAPTAIN AND MATE KILLED.

Boatswain of a Brigantine in Pacific Waters Led a Mutiny and Murdered Three Persons.

Tacoma, May 21.—News has been received here of a terrible mutiny that took place last March on the brigantine Navarra, bound from Sorogon, in the Philippines, to Manila, with a cargo of hemp. For a month she was not heard from, and she was given up for lost. It was then learned that only two days out from Sorogon, the boatswain led the crew in a mutiny, which resulted in the killing of Captain Acosta, Mrs. Acosta, and the vessel's mate. The three were killed with knives, without warning. The boatswain started to mutiny to enable him to pay a grudge against the mate, who had abused him. The crew finally ran the vessel into the mouth of Lucio River, in Mindoro. Several days later, two native women, who had acted as servants for Mrs. Acosta, told the native authorities of the tragedy. Then the entire crew was arrested. The boatswain and his chief accomplices were beheaded. The rest of the crew, seven persons were imprisoned for from ten to twenty years each.

TWO SAILORS KILLED.

They Went Up to Reef the Topmasts, When a Gust of Wind Blew Them From the Rigging.

Philadelphia, May 21.—Behrens and John Chyne, sailors on board the British bark Alert, lost their lives during a squall in Delaware Bay, late on Sunday. Captain Price, who commanded the Alert, reports that the storm struck the vessel off Fenwick Island. Behrens and Chyne were sent aloft to reef the topmasts when a sudden gust of wind struck the sails and hurled both men from the rigging. Behrens fell on the deck and was instantly killed. Chyne, in his fall, struck the deck rail, and bounded into the bay, and was drowned. The Alert was bound from Rosario for this city.
