## WITH A GOOD AVERAGE YIELD

### Record Yield is Not Looked For OUEBEC CONSERVATIVES as Result of Recent Hot Spell, Which Has Affected Fifty to Sixty Per Cent. of Spring Wheat

WINNIPEG, July 30.—(Special.)-The entire west is badly in need of rain Organization is Complete and Canand cool weather. Tho the thermome ter retreated from 80 into the 70s today, the intense heat of the past week or so has been seriously detrimental to the ripening crops, catching much of grain in the milk stage and parching it before the kernel is fully fattened out. Backward wheat has not been so much affected, as it was in bet-ter condition to withstand drought, but rain is badly needed if it is to regain

lost ground.

On the other hand, the heat has not on the other hand, the heat has not out, nor the harley ready to cut, nor the heat has not cut, n damaged the barley ready to cut, nor the fall wheat of southern Alberta, h will soon be in stook. But perhaps 50 to 60 per cent. of spring wheat has been affected to date to the extent that the promises of record average yield are seriously com-

In considering the general situation, it must be clearly borne in mind that the percentage of damage from parchthe percentage of damage from parching is applied to what otherwise promised to have been extraordinary heavy average yield, and this percentage may be considerable without risking bringing the threshing returns below the good average of 20 bushels.

The situation is very different than if this percentage applied to an already medium or average crop, and to date there is no possible reason for expecting that the general wheat yield will average below 20 bushels, while rain within the next day or two should have the effect of adding on another two or three bushels.

The outstanding feature of the situation is that no one acquainted with actual conditions talks now of a record average yield, which would mean over 28 bushels, but at the same time none but professional bulls estimate the bulk of the wheat production of the prairie west at anything under 110 to 115 million bushels. The crop will be bountiful enough even if it falls to tip the beam of June optimism.

Regarding hail losses, which have probably been more severe during the past week than for the whole of the balance of the season, it must be re-

past week than for the whole of the balance of the season, it must be remembered that patches of country thus devastated are comparatively insignificant as compared with the total acreage under cultivation. A dozen years back, when wheat growing was practically limited to strips along two or three lines of railway, a big hallstorm decimated the crop. To-day things are different. Last year saw probably more standing grain halled out than ever before in the history of wheat, but the total loss was insignificant as contributory causes to the general poor average yield, which was due to early general climatic conditions. eneral climatic conditions.



MOB, DESPITE BULLETS

Two Killed and Others May Die as Result of Storming Jail to Capture Criminal.

PENSACOLA, Fia., July 30.—Two men killed and nine wounded, several fetally, is the record of the clash last midnight between a mob bent upon lynching Leander Shaw, a negro, and the sheriff and his forces, in which the mob finally overpowered the authorities

The lynching was carried out in the most prominent park of this city. Shaw yesterday assaulted Mrs. Lilitan Davis, a highly respected lady near this city during the absence of her husband and after cutting her throat clubbed her over the head with

throat clubbed her over the head with a revolver.

During the afternoon crowds began forming upon the streets and early in the night they were reinforced by large numbers of men from the country. The mob then attacked the country. The mob then attacked the country jail, where the negro was confined, breaking down the jail gate. The sheriff and his deputies opened fire with Winchesters and shotguns. Three of the mob dropped. Volley after volley was then fired by the mob, but it was unable to enter the jail.

About midnight another attack was made, the mob having been increased to 1000 determined men. This was successful. It was made up on all sides of the jail. One party forced its way thru the rear, overpowered the officers and secured the trembling negro.

A noose was slipped about his neck, and after being dragged for two blocks he was strung up to an electric light pole in the centre of the park, where fully 2000 bullets completely riddled his body.







# HAVE FINE PLAYGROUNDS

Commissioner Wilson Thinks Toronto Must Do Something to Keep in the Race.

Park Commissioner Wilson and Ald. Vaurchan, chairman of the civic parks committee, have returned from their visit to United States cities more than ever impressed with the value of play grounds and boulevards.

The cities visited were Detroit, Chi-cago, Philadelphia, New York and Bos. ton, and the most progress in regard to play grounds was noted in Chicago and Boston, where the number and extent of play grounds and the buildings and equipment were a veritable revela-tion, according to Mr. Wilson.

In Boston, he said, there are 24 miles of level well-shaded boulevard, while altogether 80 miles are in contemplation. In Chicago play grounds are conducted under ideal conditions, and children as young as 3 years enjoy the pleasures of sand courts, swings and

doll houses, while the older boys revel in the large swimming pools, and in gymnastic exercises. In Boston beau-tiful buildings, used as gymnasiums and concert halls, are open to the pub-lic from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. Chicago has 23 play grounds, and last year \$50,000 was spent on equipment alone. New York is considerably behind Chicago in respect to play grounds, and Philadelphia showed less favorable conditions than the other cities, it being stated to be impossible to protect the apparatus from the "tough" element without high fences.

The commissioner is preparing a report, in which he suggests that every ward should have the color of the commissioner in the color of the col ward should have two play grounds, but he is content that progress should be gradual, with the acquisition of one play ground at a time.
