The World has directed the attention of the Canadian people to what The Evening Telegram very properly calls "Canada's Big Issue."

HUDSON BAY CO. MILLION DOLLAR GRAFT IN PRINTING BUREAU OFFICIALS FUGITIVE TO BUILD NEW DIG STORE?

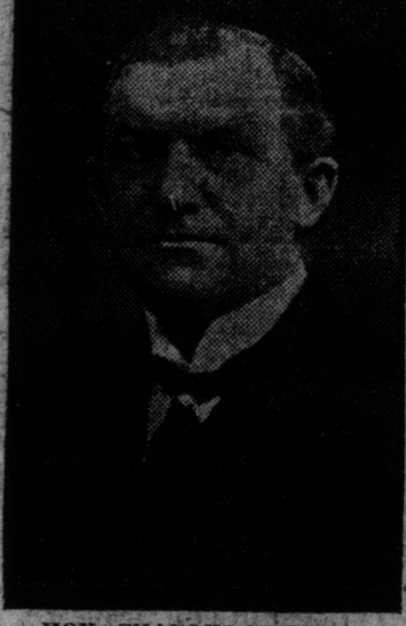

For manufacturers the rate will run from \$40 to \$60 a horse-power per annum, while for house lighting the rate will be 6-1-4 cents, less 20 per cent. discount, per kilowatt.

GOT BIG RAKE-OFF IN SUPPLIES PURCHASED

OTTAWA, June 24.—(Special.)—F. S. Gouldthrite, superintendent of stationery in the government printing bureau, is a fugitive from justice. He has been superintendent at the bureau for twenty years. The Dominion police have instituted a search for him, but he has not been in the city for several days, and it is understood that he has left the country.

There is a serious charge laid against him by Hon. Charles Murphy, secretary of state, who is in control of the bureau, namely, that Gouldthrite has been guilty of fraud and graft.

One of the frauds was connected with a stationery article that was introduced some years ago to prevent fraud in all the departments. As the result of the Martineau defalcation some years ago, an order was passed that all government cheques should be printed on a special safety paper.

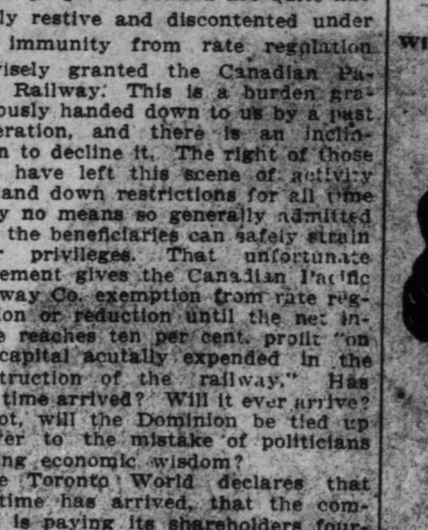

FARMER'S SAD MISTAKE

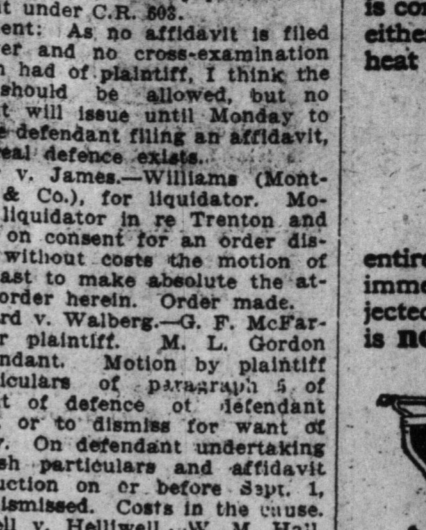
Arbitration Nets Him Much Less Than He Was Offered. WELLAND, June 24.—Another case of arbitration settled here to-day indicates clearly that the hydro-electric power commission have acted with all justice and fairness in dealing with the farmers along the transmission line right-of-way. William Patterson, Thorold Township, refused the \$450 offered him by the commission last January, alleging that the two towers located on his farm interfered with a bed of gravel; and asked for \$7500. The commission renewed the offer of \$450 for the two-tower location and patrol path. The board of arbitration having sat most of three days and hearing Mr. Patterson's side of the case, only settled the award at \$450, the amount originally offered by the commission. Mr. Patterson's part of the solicitor's costs was \$125 and his witness' fees \$50. The hydro commission paid for the arbitration. H. H. Collier, St. Catharines, appeared for Mr. Patterson, and A. F. Lobb for the commission.

COMMUNIST TO ASYLUM MAY BE HIS PUNISHMENT

Italy Not Likely to Demand Extradition of Young Charlton -- Family Will Confine Him.

NEW YORK, June 24--Porter Charlton cannot be tried for murder in the courts of New Jersey. Whether he beat his wife on the head into insensibility from blows with a wooden mallet at Lake Como, Italy, and then stuffed her, still living, into a trunk and sank the trunk in the waters of the lake, is a matter outside the jurisdiction of the Jersey courts.

But he will not be released until the question of his asyly is settled. He is being held by the Charlton family, who announced to-night that if the boy's mind proved dangerously unbalanced, they would commit him to some institution. The father, Judge Paul Charlton, had previously said that he believed Porter to be crazy.

The attitude of the Jersey courts, as defined to-night by Prosecutor Pierre Garven of Hudson County, is this: May Leave Free Man.

"The State of New Jersey now holds Charlton merely on the complaint of the Italian consul-general as a fugitive from Italian justice, pending a request for his extradition. If extradition is not demanded, there is absolutely no action that the courts of this state can take. There is a possibility that Charlton may walk from jail a free man, for the despatches from Rome seem to indicate that the Italian Government will accept the matter with reluctance, if at all, since to demand extradition to Italy of an American subject, who has committed a crime within Italian jurisdiction, would imperil a cherished Italian precedent."

Explaining the attitude of the family, R. Floyd Clarke, the lawyer, retained by Judge Charlton, said to-night: "The wish of the family is to see strict justice done as between the boy and the public. If there should be no request for extradition, Judge Charlton will make application for a commission in lunacy to determine his son's sanity. If the boy is found insane, he will be committed to an institution. If he is found sane, that is a matter so far distant as yet that I prefer not to take it upon myself."

Visited by Alienists. Alienists retained by the family who examined young Charlton today agreed to place on record their opinion in the Cornell Medical School; Edward B. Fisher, Allan McLane Hamilton, prominent in Hamilton, Ontario, and J. Arthur, city physician of Hoboken.

Charlton answered test questions of the alienists from shortly before 6 o'clock until nearly 10 o'clock. His attitude seemed to be one of indifference.

BOARD OF TRADE COUNCIL Resolution of Regret on Death of Goldwin Smith.

The following resolution was also passed with reference to the death of Goldwin Smith: "Resolved, that the council of the board of trade of the City of Toronto place on record its appreciation of the great loss sustained by Toronto in the death of Goldwin Smith, her greatest citizen."

"The outburst of sympathy prevalent throughout the city on the occasion of the lamentable accident which bereaved fellow citizens at the final result bears eloquent testimony to the nobility of his character and the greatness of his great talents."

C.P.R. Telegraphers Ask Arbitration. New York, June 24--The Commercial Telegraphers' Union has applied to the Canadian Government Department of Labor for a board of conciliation and investigation under the Lemieux Act to settle the dispute between the Canadian Pacific and the telegraphers.

The chief obstacle to an agreement was the company's refusal to schedule the offices in the eastern provinces, particularly Montreal and Toronto. The western part of the system has been working on a schedule since 1905.

ONTARIO OWES A DUTY TO HONOR CAPT. HUDSON

Three Hundred Years Since the Discovery of Hudson Bay—Will Aug. 4 Be Remembered?

Editor World: August the fourth next should be a memorable day in the history of Canada. On that day, in the year 1610, Henry Hudson, the explorer and discoverer of Hudson Bay, rounded the cape on the north-east corner of the bay and known from that day to this as Cape Wolstenholme. It was named after John Wolstenholme, a director of the Muscovy Company, and one of the chief promoters of the expedition captained by Henry Hudson to find a near passage to the Orient by the west.

Attacked by Indians. Just before reaching the cape is Digges Island named after Sir Dudley Digges, another of the chief promoters of the expedition. Here they were attacked and killed William Wilson, who had more than any of the others would bear of taking Hudson and the sick on board the ship again. Michael Perse and Henry Greene, the chief miners, tumbled into the boat together, but both were mortally wounded by arrows which the Indians poured into them while fleeing from shore.

Into the bay, his crew complained that he was manoeuvring to no purpose, and Pritchett, an apologetic for the murderers of Hudson, makes this significant note: "So we left the pearl and lost our way down to the southwest."

Hudson's records from this date were destroyed by his murderers and for the rest of the voyage we have only five of them were brought before the Trinity House authorities on Oct. 24, 1611, charged with murder, and the masters in a single day concluded that the ship was to be hanged for the same. A ship was sent in search of Hudson and the crew kept in prison till the captain returned. The matter of the trial was admiralty court and the trial was held in the Admiralty Court five years later.

killed or died. It is somewhat clever, but not more clever than that of a man trying to save his neck by article. In the absence of Hudson's log and his own evidence in respect to most of them, "that they deserved to be hanged" seems to be correct.

His Life for Ontario. Henry Hudson gave the best of his life in a search for the unknown. He was imbued with a spirit of patriotism and he was not a man to be deterred by a sense of duty to the world in which he had been born, coming of a family in which the progressive spirit abounded, and in which the high seas had been an attraction for discovery and knowledge.

Not a newspaper in Canada made a note of the fact that April 17 of this year was the tercentenary of Hudson's discovery of the Hudson River. Of much greater interest is his life to Canada, for it was the discovery of Hudson Bay which ended in his tragic fate.

Some talk of crop damage in the west, but so far this has not been of sufficient definiteness to cause much alarm. The outlook for fall ends in a note encouraging on account of the seasonable weather now prevailing. Orders for fall and winter drygoods have been heavy, and if the crops come thru well it would appear nothing can prevent a tremendous fall and winter business. Local industries continue busily engaged. All factories are working full time and there is now more talk of a scarcity of employees. A large amount of building is going on here and at all provincial points and the demand for materials is showing no sign of falling off. In groceries, canned goods are showing a slightly easier tone, fresh goods having relieved the demand. Country trade is good and receipts of produce continue large, but no remarkable price reductions are noted. Collections are generally satisfactory.

Winnipeg reports say the unprecedented hot weather has occasioned some fear for the grain, but some rain has fallen and, owing to the wet spring, the roots are deep and likely to reach lots of moisture. A heavy movement of setting lines of seasonable goods is noted. Wholesalers are extremely busy and the turnover of goods promises to be very heavy. The outlook for fall trade is good and collections are fair. The limited labor supply is already causing some uneasiness.

On the Hurricane Deck

THE Advertising Department of the Robert Simpson Company was entertained by the chief of the engineering staff to a trip on the "hurricane deck" yesterday, and the whole journey was accomplished without leaving the store.

The party first descended to the basement. A glass door was opened, and all passed through. Instantly they found themselves in the arms of a gale. It was as if they had stepped out of the pilot house on to the hurricane deck, or had found a place to stand away up at the bow.

A great revolving fan, something like the paddle wheel of a steamboat, whirled silently inside a metal drum, open at one side, but caged to prevent accidents. A hat tossed against this wire network was held there as to a magnet.

"This," said the guide, "is the pot that brews the storm." He pulled the electric switch out from the contact, and with the 15-horse power off, the big, whirling fan slowed down and stopped.

"Now, come this way," said the chief engineer. He opened a sliding metal door, and stooping low, crawled through. The noise and spray of falling water filled the little cave-like room. It splashed down one wall like a little Rideau Falls.

"Look closely at the wall," commanded the guide. The partition was of black japanned metal, and perforated with little holes.

"Now," said he, "when I turn the current on the fan will draw in the live air from the street outside, and blow it through this curtain of water, and through those little perforations. Thus it will be washed with cool Lake Ontario water, and breezed on upward into the store like a fresh wind after a thunderstorm."

The centrifugal pump which supplies the water fresh and cool to the air washer was the next point in the journey. Then the shaft where the storm rages so that one is obliged to hold one's hair on, and finally, the air valves, trimmed like sails to direct the air out over the store floors. And such sweet, cool air—water-washed, life-giving, pure.

This machine has a capacity of 55,000 cubic feet. It was installed last fall to supply fresh, moist, warm air to the store in the winter time. Since this warm spell we have set it to supplying cool air instead, which it does just as well.
