RUSSIANS BREAK LINES—TAKE BRODY

Czar's Troops Win Two Important Victories by Severely Defeating Austro-German Armies Defending Brody, Later Capturing Town and Breaking Thru First Line of Teuton Defences in Centre of Big Salient West of Lutsk, Taking Forty Guns, Two Generals and Thousands of Prisoners---Turks Sent To Defend Hungary.

BRITISH ARE NOW UNDISPUTED MASTERS OF LONGUEVAL

RUSSIANS BEAT ENEMY AGAIN CAPTURING BRODY JUNCTION

Czar's Armies Take Important Town on Road to Lemberg, and Defeat Austro-Germans West of Lutsk, Making Nine Thousand Prisoners.

LONDON, Saturday, July 29, 1 a.m.—The Russians have occupied the important railway junction of Brody, 58 miles northeast of Lemberg, in Galicia, broken thru the entire first line of the Teutonic allies west of Lutsk and driven the Austro-German forces from the line of the Rivers Slovevka and Boldurovka, southern Volhynia, according to the official communication, issued last night by the Russian War Office.

While the battle of the Somme is continuing with methodical success for the British forces, the Russians are able to announce another important victory in the capture of Brody. This Galician town, 58 miles northeast of Lemberg, is a great railway junction and it had been expected the Austrians would retain it at all costs.

The second Russian success, resulting in the capture of Brody, began with the defeat of the Austro-Germans along the whole line of the Rivers Slovevka and Boldurovka, in southern Volhynia, and the effective pursuit of the demoralized fugitives in the direction of Brody. Explosions were heard in that town and fires were observed. Dense columns of freight trains were seen moving out and the Rus-

Capt. Fryatt's Execution Was Deliberate Murder

BRAVE SEA CAPTAIN MURDERED BY HUNS

Execution of Capt. Fryatt Was Without Shadow of Excuse. INDIGNATION IS HIGH PUBLISH DOCUMENTS Germans Set All Law Aside as in the Cavell Case.

LONDON, July 28, 5.35 p.m.—News of the execution of Capt. Fryatt of the British steamer Brussels caused a painful impression at the British foreign office. Under the instructions of Viscount Grey, the foreign secretary, a note was despatched immediately to the American embassy requesting that James W. Gerard, the American ambassador at Berlin, procure complete details of the affair.

THE most important war news of the day is the news of the Russian successes against two sections of the Austro-German front in Volhynia and the capture of the important railway junction of Brody, 58 miles northeast of Lemberg. Not one, but two important successes have, therefore, been won by the latest Russian achievements. The first of these successes was gained west of Lutsk by the breaking thru of the whole first line of the Austro-Germans and the inflicting of severe losses on them.

BRITISH HAVE CAPTURED LONGUEVAL STRONGHOLDS

Gaining of Full Mastery of Important Village Follows Complete Success in Expelling Brandenburgers From Delville Wood—Hard Fighting Around Pozieres.

LONDON, July 28, 11.40 p.m.—The last German strongholds in Longueval have been captured by the British troops, according to the official statement given out tonight by the war office. Hand-to-hand fighting continued throughout the day in the vicinity of Pozieres, the statement adds. The afternoon statement recorded the capture of Delville Wood in its entirety, a Brandenburg division having been driven out.

WILL THE NICKEL ISSUE HURRY ON AN ELECTION?

Three notable contributions to nickel trust literature appeared in last evening's papers. They recall the 'nickel novels' of bygone days. One is a denial from James L. Ashley, treasurer of the International Nickel Co., of an interview published a couple of weeks ago.

In that interview given to the United Press and published in all the leading American newspapers, including The Christian Science Monitor of Boston, Mr. Ashley quite clearly stated that the nickel company could not refuse to sell its product to whoever wanted to buy.

The second contribution to the nickel novel series comes from The Toronto News, which pleads for sanity on the nickel question. Those who object to Canadian nickel going to Germany during the war for the manufacture of guns and munitions to be used for the destruction of Canadian troops are considered by The News to be insane.

But let us put the acid test to the claims of the government and the assertions of The Toronto News. Let us put the question this way: 'Suppose that Germany has a monopoly of some material without which the allies would be helpless to carry on the war, how much of that material would Germany allow to be exported to the United States?'

It is said that we are helpless in the matter because we have no refinery in Canada and Canadian ore must be refined for the allies. Let us examine this statement and see what it amounts to. The war broke out two years ago and yet not a step has been taken toward building a refinery in Canada.

HAMILTON NEWS

DUKE OF CONNAUGHT MAY VISIT HAMILTON

In Reply to Invitation, He Expresses Willingness if He Can Make Arrangements.

WON D. C. MEDAL

Private Morgan Distinguished Himself on Field of Battle.

HAMILTON, Saturday, July 29.—His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught has written to Acting-Mayor Morris, thru his secretary, Arthur P. Sladth, that he will be pleased to visit Hamilton before returning to England, if the necessary arrangements can be made on his part.

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RUSSIANS AGAIN DEFEAT ENEMY

Teuton Front Line is Smashed Near Lutsk and Brody Taken.

TWO BIG VICTORIES

Russ Steam Roller is Going Ahead at Tremendous Speed.

Lemberg, which is defended by the forces of Gen. Eichen, Brody, Petrograd correspondents attribute the successes over the Austro-Germans almost entirely to the overwhelming superiority of the Russian artillery and Russia's apparently endless supplies of ammunition.

The Russian official communication says: "West of Lutsk (Volhynia) we took the offensive and broke thru the whole first line of the enemy, inflicting severe losses. Our troops are now advancing and the cavalry is pursuing the fleeing enemy."

In this district we captured 40 guns, including six mortars and six machine guns, and 80 officers, including two generals and two commanders of regiments, and over 8000 men.

In the valley of the Rivers Slonevka and Boldurovka (southern Volhynia), the enemy has been defeated along the whole line and is now being pursued in the direction of Brody. Explosions were heard in Brody and fires were observed. Dense columns of goods trains were seen moving from there.

The communication adds: "At 6 o'clock Friday morning Brody was captured by our troops. The number of prisoners and the amount of booty taken remain unknown."

The Austrian war office announced the defeat of the Austro-German armies defending Brody, northeastern Galicia, in an official statement which reads as if they had almost gained an important success.

slans captured the place at 6.30 o'clock on Friday morning. Sufficient time has not yet elapsed to total up the number of prisoners made and the booty taken. The importance of this action is that it advances the Russians on an important stage to victory over the Austrians by threatening their left wing with envelopment.

In the south the Russians had previously secured Kolomea and Delatyn, cutting the communications of the enemy with Hungary, so they are in shape for the launching of a double enveloping advance. The enemy, in short, is visibly weakening under each ponderous blow.

British troops captured the last German strongholds in Longueval and took a number of prisoners yesterday in the battle of the Somme. They also drove the Germans from all of Delville Wood in the morning. The action in the bush involved severe fighting and the routing of the stubborn Brandenburgers, who had fought before Verdun in the first shock of that historic fight and were overthrown. Further progress has also been made by our troops near Pozieres and hand-to-hand fighting in this neighborhood was continued throughout yesterday. Considerable activity by the artillery on both sides marked the operations on the rest of the front.

The lapse of 28 days of offensive action by the British army has in no way diminished the severity of its pressure against the enemy, and if fighting are taken into account, it will be found that our troops are advancing as steadily as ever. It has generally been remarked in previous battles in this trench war that in the course of a few days after the fighting began, sometimes of a few hours, the enemy, by bringing up reinforcements, was able to halt the advance. But in the battle of the Somme, after the enemy has had four weeks to strengthen his battle line, and it is certain that he has done all in his power to do so, it is found that the British army is slowly but surely wresting "impregnable" positions after "impregnable" positions from him.

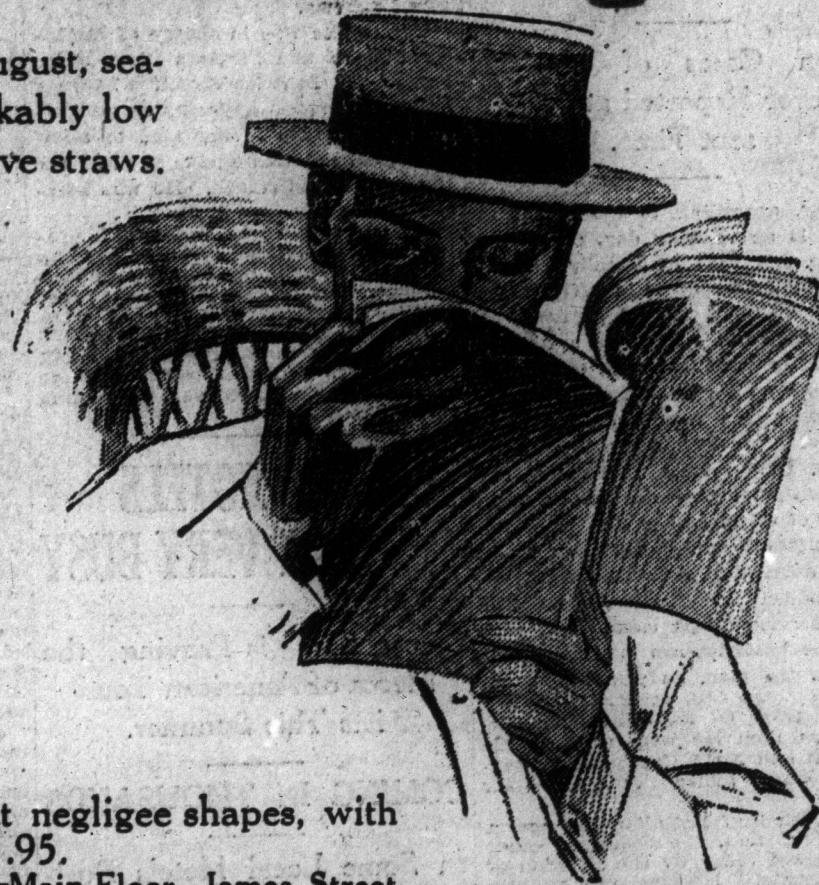

### TWO TORONTONIANS REPORTED KILLED

Yesterday's Casualty List Contained Names of Fourteen City Men.

#### EIGHT WOUNDED

Four Others are Reported as Prisoners of War.

The names of fourteen men from Toronto are included in yesterday's casualty list, two being reported killed, eight wounded, and four prisoners of war.

Pte. Ernest Hogg, Mimico, has been killed in action on July 16. He enlisted with the 81st Battalion last September and had been in the trenches only a few days. He was employed prior to enlisting by the G.T.R. as an apprentice in the shops and was only eighteen years of age.

Pte. Benjamin Selby, 487 Delaware avenue, who enlisted with the 58th Battalion a year ago, has been killed in action. While in the city he was employed by the Elias Rogers Co.

Pte. A. E. Brookman, 165 Bathurst street, has received a serious gunshot wound in the head, chest and spine. He is married and prior to enlisting he was employed by the Canada Machine Telephone Company.

Lieut. C. K. Hoag, 15 O'Hara avenue, has been wounded, according to word

received by his father, J. P. Hoag, inspector of continuation schools. The report states that Lieut. Hoag is suffering from severe grenade wounds in the back of the head. He was in the second year in the School of Practical Science, when he enlisted in November, 1914. He went overseas as a private, but after the battle of Zillebeke he was promoted to sergeant and obtained his commission on June 29.

Sergt. J. McNulty, 34 Columbus street, has been wounded in the hip. He enlisted along with his son in the 109th Battalion, but was later drafted into the 81st. He was employed by the Parisian Laundry and was a member of St. Helen's Roman Catholic Church.

Sapper L. E. Shaw, 803 Shaw street, is reported missing since June 12. He enlisted with the 36th Battalion, but later was drafted to another unit. He was born in Glasgow 21 years ago.

Pte. E. Schofield, 100 Cambridge avenue, has been wounded in action. He enlisted with the 74th Battalion. He has four brothers in the army.

Pte. E. A. Frost, 84 McGill street, who was wounded on July 8, has returned to duty at the front. He is a native of Kent, England, and has been in this country about ten years.

In Fontry's case, Plainclothesmen Scott and Neil found a quantity of the drug, scales for weighing it, hypodermic syringes, a box of cartridges and a loaded revolver under his pillow. When accused Fontry stated that the "dope" outfit had belonged to his mother, who died two weeks ago.

Drake was caught in the Normal School grounds together with Tilly Evans, who on a similar charge, was remanded till August 4. He admitted that he had sold morphine at a dollar a package, and that he had also peddled cocaine.

#### WOUNDED THIRD TIME.

**BROCKVILLE, Ont., July 27.**—For the third time since he took his place with the Canadian forces on the firing line in France, Pte. George W. Erayman, at Brockville boy, has been wounded. Last fall he was wounded in the leg and head, and after four months was able to join his battalion. On June 12th he suffered gunshot wounds and was back on the battle-front only a few days when he was shot in the foot. It is possible that he may be invalided home from a convalescent hospital in England.

### VIADUCT CONSTRUCTION DAMAGED PROPERTY

Allegation of W. H. Hutchison, Castle Frank Road, Before Arbitrator.

The investigation in the case of W. H. Hutchison, who is claiming \$10,000 for depreciation to his property at 83 Castle Frank road by reason of the construction of the Bloor street viaduct, was adjourned sine die yesterday after considerable evidence had been taken before the official arbitrator.

W. S. Bailey of 77 Castle Frank road declared that the blasting which had been going on had done considerable damage to his property in the way of cracking plaster and cement walks.

Answering I. S. Fairly, who appeared for the city, he explained that the blasting had been stopped when it was found to cause damage to the property.

Mr. Hutchison corroborated the evidence given by Mr. Bailey.

### VAIN PLEA FOR AID MADE BY AUSTRIA

**LONDON, July 25.**—The Geneva (Switzerland) correspondent of The Daily Express writes: "It is learned from Innsbruck that the Austro-Hungarian staff appealed several times during July to the German headquarters for assistance against the Russians in Galicia. Small numbers of reinforcements were sent, with the statement that it was impossible to send more troops during the strong Anglo-French offensive on the Somme.

"Throughout the Austrian plea appealed directly to the kaiser, who replied: "When we have beaten the English, I shall reconsider the matter. I cannot spare troops at present, as the situation is serious."

### BEACH SHORE DAMAGED BY WATER OF THE LAKE

Harbor Board May Make Repairs and Collect From the Government.

More damage is being done to the shore at the Beaches by the water of the lake, and in many places the sidewalk is undermined. According to Works Commissioner Harris, the harbor board has charge of the section at the beach where damage is being done. The mayor is in favor of requesting the commission to make temporary repairs at the expense of the city, with the idea of collecting the money from the government afterwards. His worship will take the matter up with Engineer Cousins of the harbor board at the first opportunity.

Controller Cameron and R. Home Smith of the harbor board visited the scene yesterday afternoon and found that at the foot of Kippendavie avenue the water had swept up several hundred feet.

Lieut. Heron was born at Newcastle upon Tyne, and before coming to Toronto, has been in London, England. He is a nephew of Sergt. A. Anderson of the 220th Battalion. Before enlisting he was assistant secretary of the firm of W. J. Gage & Co.

### RENFREW WANTS HYDRO.

A deputation from Renfrew waited on F. A. Gaby, chief hydro engineer, yesterday, and asked that the municipality be allowed to develop power on its own account on the Bonneschere River, or that assent be given to the N. S. O'Brien scheme for development of power on the Madawaska. Mr. Gaby replied that the question of power for Renfrew was under consideration by the commission.

### YOUNG LAD DROWNED.

Special to The Toronto World. **NORWOOD, July 28.**—Arthur, the 16-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Murphy, Dummer, was drowned in Koschalogmow Lake while bathing. The funeral took place to the cemetery here, and was largely attended. Rev. Mr. Waddell conducted impressive services.

### NOT BIG ENOUGH PLANT TO FILL CATFISH POND

Mayor Says Officials Trying to Get Canadian Stewart to Do Work.

According to Mayor Church the city has not a big enough plant to do the work of filling in Catfish Pond, and the harbor board is in the same position. "Our officials reported that they are endeavoring to have the Canadian Stewart Company do the work," he said. "The harbor board have been trying to get a figure for the work from others, but so far have been unable to do so."

He pointed out that the large dredge belonging to the Canadian Stewart Company was the only thing capable of accomplishing the undertaking and that would have to be released by the government and the harbor commission.

Difficulty in getting material from the lake had been experienced, according to Parks Commissioner Chambers. He hoped to have more information shortly.

Privy Council Requested by Toronto Counsel to Find for City.

LIKE OTHERS REFUSED Railway's Application Resembles Two That Previously Failed.

Canadian Associated Press Cable. LONDON, July 28.—The privy council is continuing the hearing today of the Toronto and York radial appeal.

Lord Haldane asked what was the real objection the respondents had to the order. Clause replied that the one ground was obscurity of the surrounding motives of the company in again making an application. Then there was the objection to the far-reaching nature of the order itself and practical inconvenience from the standpoint of pedestrians crossing the sidewalk by cars.

Lord Haldane said they would consider their decision. The learned counsel, who was frequently interrupted by Lord Shaw, Atkinson and Farnor, who seemed greatly interested, went on to show that the grounds leading the supreme court to come to their decision were grounds which had met with the approval of this very board in recently decided cases where a similar point was raised for consideration. This present application was similar in all essential features to two former applications made by the company which had been refused.

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FRENZIED APPEAL IS MADE BY KAISER

"Everything is at Stake," He Says in Message to Masses.

BITTER TOWARD BRITISH "Ice-Cold Haberdashers on the Thames," is Description Given.

LONDON, July 28.—A letter from Kaiser William passionately appealing to the German people to stand firm and unwavering, no matter how the tide of battle flows, has been printed in all the German papers. The letter was circulated by the semi-official Wolff News Agency. Dated from the front in the west, the letter says in part:

"I would be victorious there is threatening a war after the war, when the best energies and power of the nation, now expressed by its joy in arms, shall be taxed to the utmost to meet raw force, hatred and calumny. 'Everything is at stake. The ice-cold haberdashers on the Thames yearn for our holiest things. The health and life of our women and our children are menaced. Even neutrals must bear hunger.'

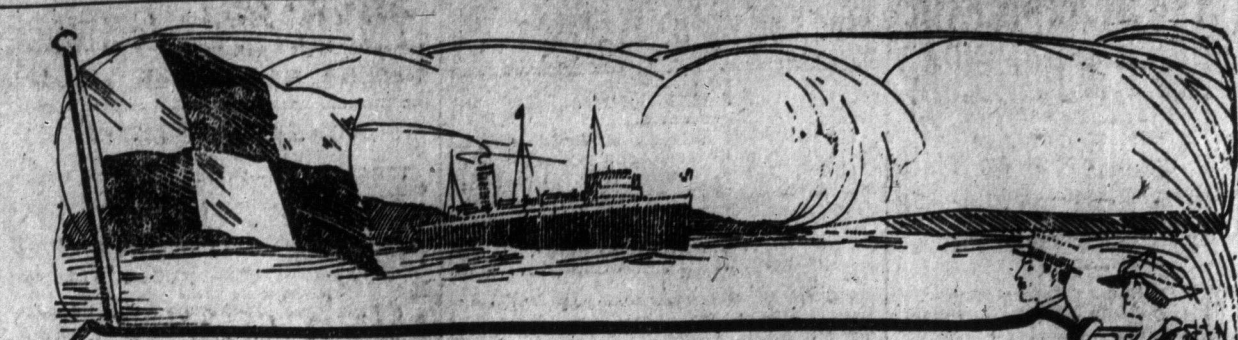

CANADIAN FRUITS

Shipments Were Light and Demands Were Plentiful.

The Canadian shipments were again light, with an active demand, at firm prices.

Raspberries came in fairly well in the morning and sold at 11c to 12c per box, but there was only a very small quantity shipped in the afternoon, which sold at 12c to 13c per box.

Cherries remained about stationary, to sour variety selling at 7c to 8c per 11-quart, and at 11c to 12c per six-quart, the few sweet varieties being slightly easier, the bulk selling at \$1 to \$1.40, an odd one bringing \$1.50.

Red currants remained about stationary at 7c to 8c per box, and 6c to 8c per 11-quart.

Gooseberries remain scarce at 6c to 8c per 11-quart, and 7c per box.

Some of the best Georgia peaches offered came in yesterday, and sold rapidly at \$3.25 to \$3.50 per six-basket carrier.

Canadian peaches are of very poor quality, the best selling at 20c to 25c, and the 11's at 60c.

Canadian apples are also poor quality, selling at 20c to 25c per six-quart, and 50c to 60c per 11-quart.

New potatoes are quite firm, at \$3.65 to \$3.75.

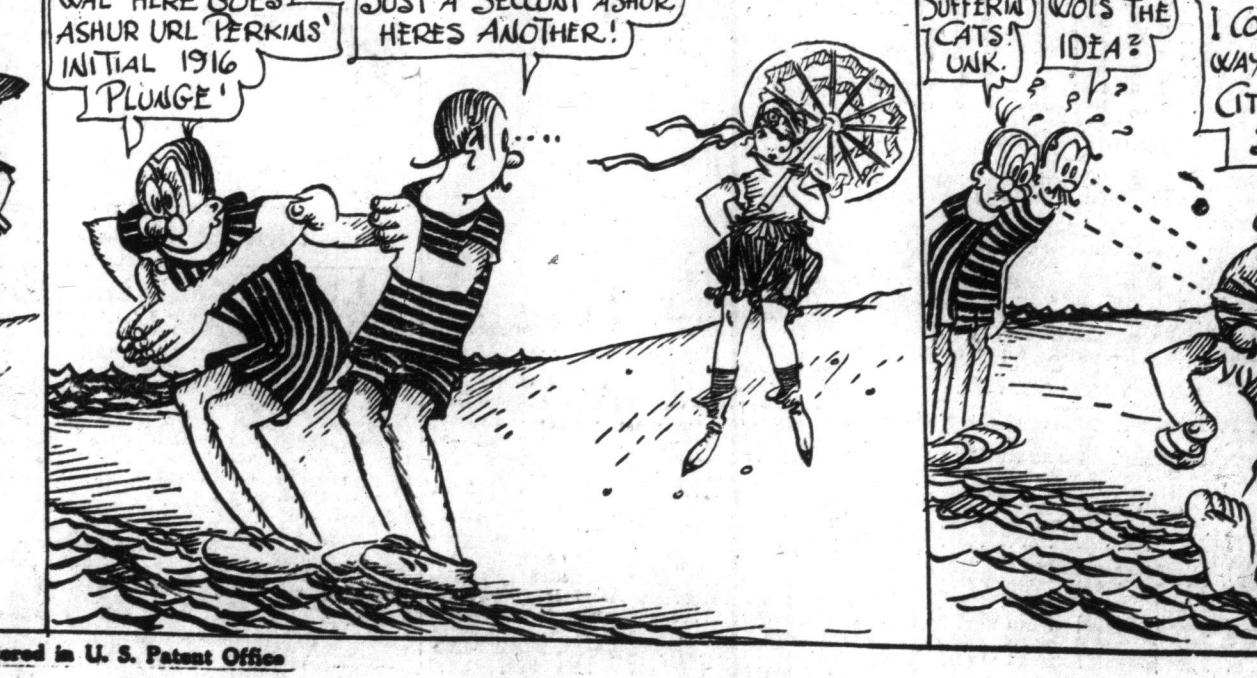

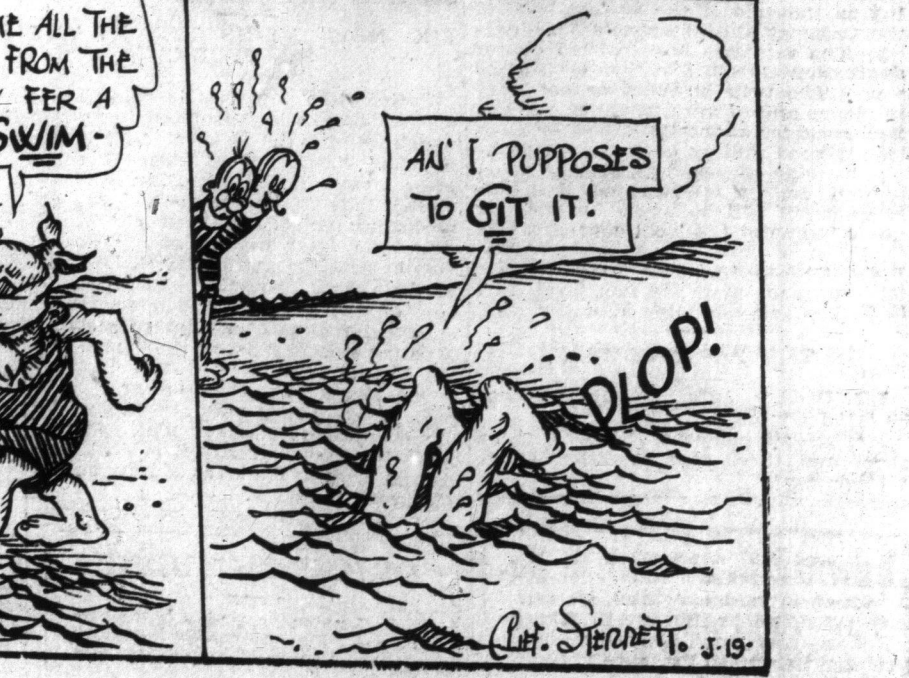
