Why is the call so urgent now?
The answer is simple: it is because our existence as an Empire is at stake.
WE WENT INTO THE WAR TO KEEP OUR SOLEMN PLEDGES TO OUR ALLIES; AND THIS REASON STILL HOLDS GOOD.

New York, Sept. 6—Colonel A. Miclescu, of the artillery branch of the Roumanian army, arrived here today on the steamship Rochambeau from Bordeaux, with a commission to purchase, in the United States, supplies for the Roumanian army, part of which purchase will be boots and shoes. Col. Miclescu declined to comment on the possibility of Roumania entering the war, but he said that about 500,000 troops were mobilized and fully equipped for call.

Among other passengers were three survivors of the Arabic, J. Delorimer. of Montreal; C. H. Pringle, of Toronto. and Lieut. Walter Adams, of London.

Lieut, Adams and Mr. Delorimer said that they were in the last boat to leave the ship, and that they were thrown into the water when the Arabic went down. Mr. Delorimer added that he was on the forward deck when the ship was struck, and that he saw the torpedo coming, when it was fully 300 yards distant. The Rochambeau brought 342 passengers. The trip was uneventful.
