

## IMMIGRATION

TAKING into consideration that Lord Clarendon and Sir James Craig have just returned to London from Canada, and that the Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King also has recently arrived there, it is only natural that the London publication, "Canada," should devote considerable space to the opinions of these three outstanding men in regard to the opportunities offered by the Dominion to British immigrants. "Canada" also comments on the Hon. Robert Forke's appointment as Minister | in excellent condition as far west as Fort William, of Immigration, and notes his reference to the Maritime Provinces as a suitable field. Attention is also devoted to Mr. Forke's remarks on the question of attracting to Canada people with means; and it is pointed out that, with the example of Kenya and South Africa before us, it would be most unwise to neglect bringing to the notice of people of means and enterprise "attractions and opportunities which in the balance will compare most favorably with those of the other countries referred to." In this the Maritimes have perhaps the advantage over any other part of Canada, if only the facts can be brought home to the right

people in the right manner. Mr. Mackenzie King is quoted as saying: "Although passage assistance is restricted to British agriculturalists, house workers and juveniles, others from Britain of good health and character who pay their own way are admitted without restriction of passport, money, or occupation test." It would be well to stress this fact. With a huge scheme of assisted settlement in operation, other immigrants ineligible under its provisions are apt to think that they might have difficulty in entering Canada. This

Sir James Craig's remarks are impersonal. Ulster has no exportable surplus of manpower, but the Premier says: "I return from the Dominion deeply impressed with everything I have seen and learned. It is a wonderful country, a natural outlet for Great Britain's surplus population." And again: "The keynote-indeed the only note-to success is hard work. ## A MAN OF IRON

MUSSOLINI is a man with nerves of iron. For the sixth time in four years an attempt to sixth occasion he was the same imperturbable gentleman whose only apparent anxiety was to learn if the would-be assassin's bullet had injured any member of his party. An Oriental could manifest no greater disregard for danger and death than does the Italian Premier. It requires magnificent courage to go about one's task; from day to day with the possibility of death lurking on every hand. I Mussolini may not always escape, but it is clear that if he falls it will be without a tremor of fear, or of regret regarding the course he has pursued since he became the dictator of Italy. It is that a greater peril than the peril which comes apparent, however, that Italy still goes armed. There were knives a-plenty to let out the life of the Premier's last assailant. The swift vengeance wreaked upon him may prove a deterrent to others, in which case there will be many to assert that it was justified. Mussolini deserves to live. Can much be said of the assassin?

Additional hundreds of thousands, naturally, were finding other forms of recreation possible because of daylight saving.







One week of good weather should be sufficient to enable completing of threshing throughout the west, and if this materializes there is no doubt that most of the grain which still remains to be threshed will prove to be in much better shape than seemed possible earlier in the season. While losses from spoiled and tough grain could very largely have been minimized had farmers allowed crops to dry, it is not difficult to understand the natural anxiety to get threshed after the extended period of wet weather experienced during the past two months.

Advice to the Domestic Girl Who Has Never Been Proposed To-Why "Peace at Any Price" is the Successful Wife's Motto-The Mistreated Wife.

MY DEAR MISS DIX-As far back as I can remember, my one aim in MY DEAR MISS DIX—As far back as I can remember, my one aim in life has been to marry and spend my entire life in making my family happy. I learned to sew, cook, keep house, and stayed at home waiting for my mate to come along and find me. Now I am 20 and still waiting. All my old friends are married and have homes and babies of their own. I am the only old maid in the crowd, yet I am the one who was best fitted for matrimony.

Everywhere I go, people say: "We cannot

Everywhere I go, people say: "We cannot understand why you have never married. You would make a man a wonderful wife." No man asks me to be one, yet I am good-looking, intelligent and fond of all outdoor sports. Why is this?

Why do men pass me up for flappers? Why do they prefer the girl who necks and kisses to the one who is a dignified lady? Why do men steer shy of a real woman who only asks the privilege of tending them, and helping them and making them happy homes, to a half-dressed doll who cannot sew on a button or boil an egg; who would not care for them if they were sick, and will divorce them for the first man who comes along with more money?

OLD MAID "26," ANSWER: It seems to me, my dear young lady, that you are taking an unduly pessimistic view of the situation, and certainly your ideas savor of the Early Victorian period in-

stead of this day of grace 1926. To begin with, no woman is an old maid nowadays at 26. Yes. That's an easy question to answer. Let him alone. Let him read in peace, instead of nagging him about painting up the furniture and putting up a new shelf in the kitchen.

Of course, you are right in thinking that he should help you to do the best you can with your old stuff, and make your home attractive, but abstract right cuts no ice in matrimony. It is tact that does it.

No man loves his wife because it is his duty to love her, or stays at home because it is the proper thing for him to do. He loves his wife because she is sweet and amiable and agreeable to be with, and he stays at home because it is the pleasantest and most peace-
