LONDON, Nov. 2.—Labor gains in the municipal elections held yesterday constitute a vote of censure on Premier Baldwin's mining policy by the fellow workers of the miners in the North and show the workers' sympathy with the miners, declared Robert Williams, former chairman of the Labor party, whose frankness in denouncing the general strike at the Margate conference led to his removal from the executive.

Chipp, wealthy lumberman, continued here today. The defense alleges that the pastor cannot get an impartial trial in this county.

DIVORCE COURT AT CAPITAL HAS FOURTEEN CASES

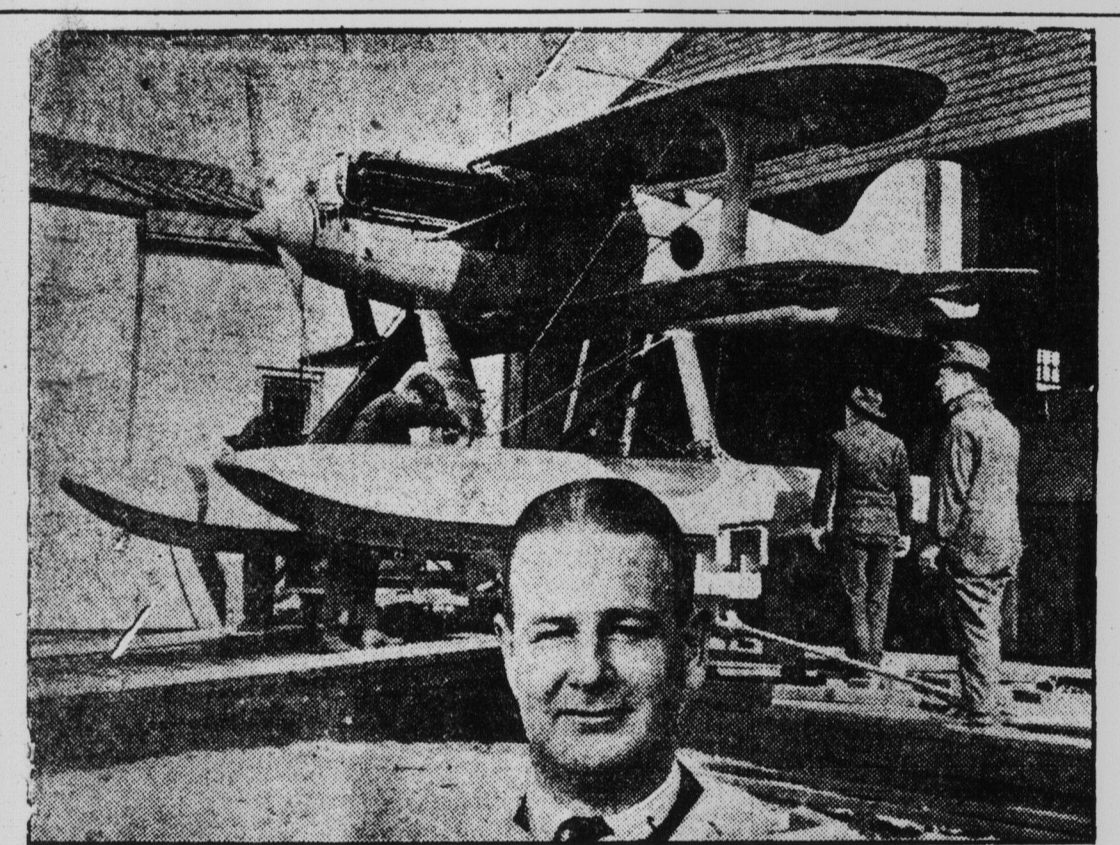
Ten Are New Hearings and Four Are Remanets. BIGAMY CHARGED. Docket Before Mr. Justice Crockett Is About as Large as Ordinary.

FREDERICTON, Nov. 2.—The New Brunswick Court of Divorce and Matrimonial cases opened its November term this morning. Mr. Justice Crockett presiding. A docket of 10 new cases and 4 remanets was ready for the court. Of the remanets, 3 are defended and one undefended. This makes a docket about as large as ordinarily is the case. In three of the cases entered, bigamous marriage is alleged, in the province of New Brunswick in two cases, and in the State of Washington in the other.

THE colors of the United States Navy will be carried in the International Schneider Cup air race by Lieut. F. H. Conant and his specially constructed Curtiss seaplane. The race is to be held at Norfolk, Va., on Armistice Day. Lieut. Conant's tiny Curtiss plane houses an engine weighing only 750 pounds. It is capable of developing 700 horsepower. It is claimed that Lieut. Conant has unofficially broken the world's speed record for seaplanes by driving his machine at 250 miles an hour in practice. The record, made last year by Lieut. ### DIVORCE COURT AT FREDERICTON

Continued from Page 1.

It is alleged that in 1909 the defendant deserted her husband and left for Seattle with W. C. R. Allen, of Saint John, who at the same time deserted his wife. The two lived together in Seattle, eventually going through a form of marriage.

Plaintiff instituted divorce proceedings but could not locate the defendant. In 1912, he was served with papers in a divorce action.

In Clarence Cecil Carpenter vs. Pearl Lillian Carpenter, the principals were married at St. John's, N. B., in 1909. Both parties now reside in Saint John. Divorce is sought on the grounds of wilful, steadfast and persistent refusal of the part of the defendant to consummate marriage.

In Emma Karmin vs. Solomon Karmin, the principals are Jewish, having been married at Montreal, Que., February 24, 1924, by Rev. Rabbi Sheer.

The plaintiff prior to marriage was named Ritzler. She is a resident of Bathurst and the defendant husband of Saint John. Divorce is sought on the grounds of frigidity and impotence on the part of the husband.

In Margaret E. Morton vs. James F. Daley, the plaintiff went through a form of marriage with the defendant at Devon, N. B., March 18, 1917. Her father, Michael Murphy, officiating; but subsequently learned that Daley had been previously married at Worcester, Mass., to Mae McManus, the ceremony being performed by a justice of the peace.

In David J. Camick vs. Gertrude A. Camick, the principals reside in Saint John. They were married June 20, 1920, at Saint John by Rev. G. F. Dawson, Methodist. Desertion and infidelity are alleged by the plaintiff. The defendant and Stanley Clifton, of Saint John, are named co-respondents.

In Edna May Claybourne vs. Archibald Claybourne, the plaintiff resides in Fredericton and the defendant in Bathurst, N. B. The principals were married at Bathurst, N. B., in 1918. They are colored people. The defendant, a short time ago was arrested for bigamy and was let go on suspended sentence on condition that he remain away from the woman with whom he went through the form of marriage.

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In Bernard L. Cook vs. Pearl Cook, the principals were married at Bathurst and the defendant husband of Saint John. Divorce is sought on the grounds of frigidity and impotence on the part of the husband.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 2.—The United States has admitted to citizenship its first native Hindu. He is Sahabram Ganesh Pandit, distinguished scholar, writer and attorney, whose admittance to full United States citizenship was upheld by the court of appeals yesterday.

Can Prosecute Twice For Liquor Violations

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—Deciding a case against the appellants, the United States Supreme Court ruled yesterday that a violation of the prohibition laws may be prosecuted both by state and federal governments. This ruling is what is called "double jeopardy" and is expected to have a far-reaching effect on liquor law violators.

GUN INVENTOR DEAD

PARIS, Nov. 2.—Colonel Depont, inventor of the famous French 75-millimetre gun and often referred to as "the man who won the war," died Monday at Houlgate. He had spent most of his life in the artillery service and his chief interest was in experiments with light flint pieces.

Destroyer Ordered To Honduras Town

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—A United States destroyer has been ordered to Ceiba, Honduras, to protect foreign lives and property in the event of revolutionary uprisings in the near future. The action is being taken on the advice of the United States consul at Ceiba, where trouble was reported yesterday. The trouble has since subsided.

PEER HAS HOME IN LIGHTHOUSE

Lord and Lady Onslow Convert Building Into House

LONDON, Nov. 2.—The strangest home on record is surely that of Lord and Lady Onslow, who have adapted the lighthouse on the lonely island near St. Agnes, nearly 30 miles west of Land's End, and made of it a comfortable home. A quarter of a century ago, Lord Onslow, fifth Earl of the line, entered the diplomatic service, serving at Madrid, Tangier, Petrograd and Berlin, after which he came home as assistant private secretary to Sir Edward Grey. When the Great War began, he began as second lieutenant, and was colonel by the time peace was declared. By that time he had married a daughter of the late Lord Balfour, a most charming and talented woman.

SEEK SECLUSION

With a town house in St. George's square, and Clendon Park, near Guildford, as country residence, the Onslows found seclusion almost unattainable. As a member of the diplomatic corps, a popular army officer, and later as Civil Lord of the Admiralty, the Earl of Onslow found his visiting list a very extensive one. The idea of utilizing a lighthouse as a home is credited to Lady Onslow.

ON ST. AGNES ISLAND

St. Agnes, the island on which the lighthouse stands, is a fertile little island among the Scillies, where the lonely cliffs abound with sea-fowl. In all there are about 140 islands and rocks comprising the Scilly group, and navigation among them is dangerous. Ships as a rule—excepting those doing business with the islands, give them a wide berth.

Railroad Accidents Show Big Increase

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—Despite the installation of train control equipment by many roads, railroad accidents are on the increase, Interstate Commerce Commission figures show. During the first six months of this year there were 10,008 accidents, 286 more than the corresponding period last year. One hundred and fifty persons have been killed and 1,687 injured this year compared with 298 killed and 1,698 injured the first six months of last year.

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TURKISH GOVT IN ISLAND SUIT

Strange Story Unfolded by Young British Attache

LONDON, Nov. 2.—A story full of romantic adventure and Eastern intrigue lies behind a legal case which will shortly come before the Anglo-Turkish Mixed Arbitral Tribunal in Constantinople. It centres round the adventures of a young Englishman and his forefathers on a small island 3 1/2 miles long by about 2 miles wide, which lies basking in the warm sunshine about 18 miles from the mainland of Karaburun in the Gulf of Smyrna. The island rejoices in the picturesque name of Drymus, which means a sweet-smelling herb. Over a century ago, when the island was uninhabited, a retired British army officer, named Charles Edwards, settled in Smyrna, where a son, Anthony, was born. Anthony became a journalist, and, in search of "local color" cruised for many years around the islands in the Aegean Sea. In 1848 he discovered the island and, falling in love with the romantic splendor, bought it from the Turkish Government.

Two Killed By Gas Storage Explosion

ST. CATHARINES, Ont., Nov. 1.—Two men are dead and three are suffering from injuries as the result of an explosion of an acetylene gas storage tube at the Inter-Lake Paper Mills in Merriton, Sunday. The dead are: James Boyle, 48, and Thos. Goshif, 44. Both were married men with families. Frank Owens and George Dennis, who were suffering from minor injuries were able to leave the hospital, after treatment. George Chivers, the fifth man, was more seriously hurt. His face and eyes are scorched and he has numerous cuts on his head and hands, but is expected to recover unless the eye trouble becomes more aggravated. An inquest will be held.

Advice to the Domestic Girl Who Has Never Been Proposed To—Why "Peace at Any Price" is the Successful Wife's Motto—The Mistreated Wife.

MY DEAR MISS DIX—As far back as I can remember, my one aim in life has been to marry and spend my entire life in making my family happy. I learned to sew, cook, keep house, and stayed at home waiting for my mate to come along and find me. Now I am 26 and still waiting. All my old friends are married and have homes and babies of their own. I am the only old maid in the crowd, yet I am the one who was best fitted for matrimony. Everywhere I go, people say: "We cannot understand why you have never married. You would make a man a wonderful wife." No man asks me to be one, yet I am good-looking, intelligent and fond of all outdoor sports. Why is this?



DOROTHY DIX

ANSWER: It seems to me, my dear young lady, that you are taking an unduly pessimistic view of the situation, and certainly your ideas save of the Early Victorian period in most of this day of grace 1926.

To begin with, no woman is an old maid nowadays at 26. She is still a girl and has really just come to the time of life when she should begin thinking about marriage instead of having lost hope of getting married. In these rollicking and youthful times a woman doesn't begin to think of herself as a spinster under 40, and not even her worst enemies accuse her of being one under 35. So cheer up. There's virtually no age limit on women now.

You mean the fact that you are still single while all of your girl friends are married and have homes and babies. I ask you to look into each one of these homes, and in all candor see which one of these women are happier and better placed than you are. Would you exchange your freedom for a husband who is a grouchy or a tightwad, or a petticoat-chaser? Does struggling along on an insufficient income seem to you a gay and joyous adventure? Does walking the catwalk with sickly babies appeal to you as a delightful way to spend your nights?

How many of your friends' husbands are still lovers? How many of them have realized their dreams of married happiness? How many of them look as young or are as healthy as you? You see, my dear, that matrimony has its drawbacks as well as its advantages. It isn't all beer and skittles. When a woman marries she doesn't pass into an earthly paradise. Instead, she generally gets into the workhouse.

Of course, that is a phase of the subject that you don't consider. It never occurs to you that you might get a brutal husband, or a shiftless one, or one with a mean disposition, and that you might be a thousand times worse off married than you are single.

DEAR DOROTHY DIX—A young married woman with a husband I love, and who loves me dearly, but he simply won't do a hand's turn around the house. We have very little money, but we have some old furniture that we could use very nicely if he would only touch it up, but he won't do it. All he wants to do is to read when he is at home. Can you tell me what I can do with him? VERY ANXIOUS.

ANSWER: Yes, that's an easy question to answer. Let him alone. Let him read in peace, instead of nagging him about painting up the furniture and putting up a new shelf in the kitchen.

Of course, you are right in thinking that he should help you to do the best you can with your old stuff, and make your home attractive, but abstract right cuts no ice in matrimony. It is tact that does it.

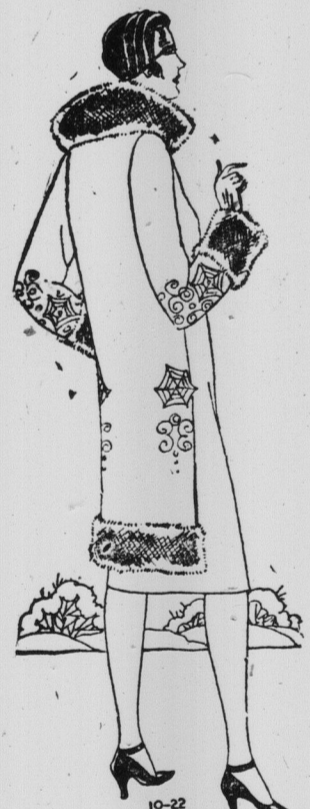

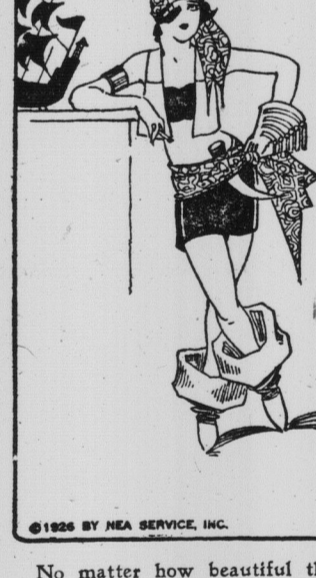

HEALTH SERVICE. Strained Expression Is Sign of Nasal Flaw

By DR. MORRIS FISHBEIN. A NORMAL child breathes through his nose. When such breathing is obstructed by growths within the nose, or by abnormal conformation, by adenoids, or by large tonsils, the child develops a pinched and harassed expression.

If the obstruction is severe enough to produce distress, the child will have insufficient oxidation of its blood; and it is self-evident that its health must suffer. These conditions within the nose or throat should be corrected at the earliest possible opportunity.

Peach Cup—Beat two eggs, add one-half cup milk. Sift together one and one-half cups flour, one-half teaspoon salt and three teaspoons baking powder. Add to milk and eggs, then beat one tablespoonful melted butter. Put a layer of butter into custard cup, add one-half peach, cover with butter and sprinkle top with sugar. Bake twenty minutes in moderate oven.

Hard Sauce—Three-fourths cup brown sugar, creamed thoroughly with one-third cup butter. Add, gradually, two tablespoons milk and one teaspoon vanilla.

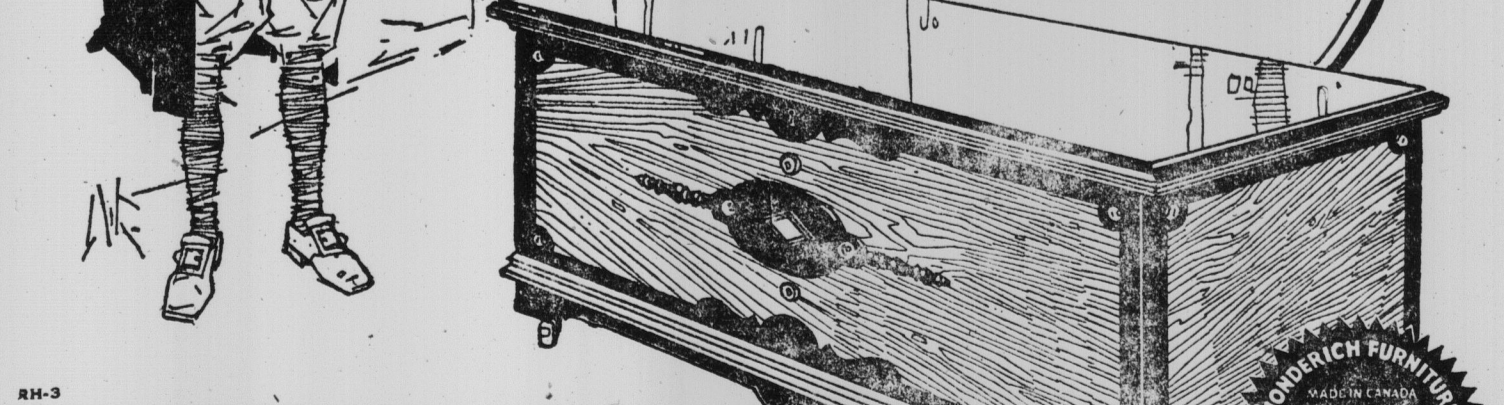

## PRE-HISTORIC FACES IN FLINT

British Scientists Puzzled by Findings in Sussex

LONDON, Nov. 2.—Scientists are completely puzzled by human faces and animal figures which peer out of a series of flint on exhibition at the Physic Museum, Victoria street, London. There are forty or fifty of them, none larger than an egg.

They were found by W. H. Clarke, an amateur geologist, embedded in chalk near Brandon, in Suffolk. All of them were at least forty feet beneath the surface, and they represent the laborious search of years.

These faces, which Mr. Clarke declares to be tens of thousands of years old, stir the imagination. Some have an evil leer, some are crafty, some are sullen, and all except one with a freakish resemblance to a modern woman in evening dress, have an elemental and primordial coarseness. Yet they are alive with character and personality.

A suspicious mouth curls beneath an elongated nose, of which the bridge almost meets the forehead. The features appear in replica in each half of the flint which has been split open.

Another face is that of a woman who might have been a neolithic society matron. Plaits of hair, of some vaguely defined head-dress, form a background for features similar to the man's, long, perpendicular and almost Grecian in their straightness.

A surprising likeness to the shingle is shown in a third. This head is small, flat on top and tilted in the air. Thick nostrils and distended ears suggest a negroid origin.

LONDON, Nov. 2.—Jack, a little seven-year-old terrier, belonged to T. Lippy, a hairdresser, of Bagshot street, Waltham, has sacrificed his life by helping to relieve the sufferings of mankind.

He was a staunch supporter of the Trafalgar Hospital Aid Society from his puppyhood, and collected over \$250 chiefly in pennies, half-pennies, and farthings, for the London hospitals before he was stricken down at the work.

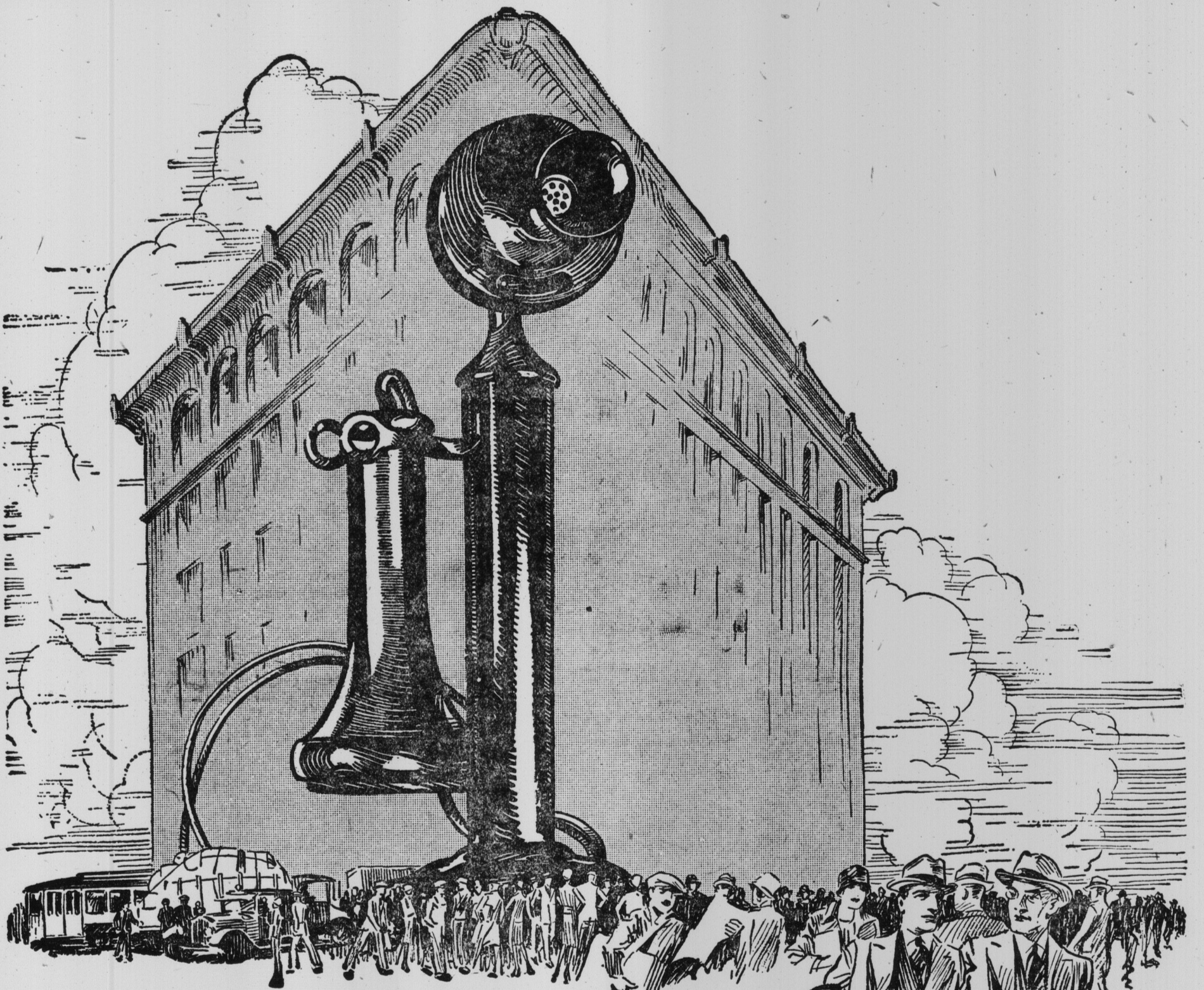

**DIVORCE USED AS A WEAPON**

**Brazilian Authoress Claims It Is Man's Resource Against Women**

RIO DE JANEIRO Nov. 2.—Correio Da Manhã, a Rio De Janeiro morning newspaper, has set out to discover the Brazilian attitude toward the divorce question, and is publishing a series of interviews obtained from people in all walks of life, seeking the opinions of the most representative figures in Brazilian science, art, letters, industry, commerce, finance, government, religion, and the working classes.

According to Senor Graça Aranha, futurist, diplomat, minister plenipotentiary and romanticist, the question of divorce does not exist for the true modern spirit.

"The marriage contract, like all other associations, is based on the desire of the associated parties," he futurist declared. "Marriage is in accord with two wills. When the desire to persist in the marriage union ceases to exist, the union should be considered extinct. To prevent those in one society from forming another society is an attempt against human liberty; inconceivable to the modern spirit."

Taking exception to the allegations of divorce critics who declare that the institution is an incentive to immorality in Brazil, Sr. Aranha asked whether the peoples of nations where divorce is banned could claim to be morally better than the peoples among whom divorce is practiced.

Professor Miguel Couto, President of the National Academy of Medicine, declared that it is an injustice to prevent two unhappy creatures, parties to a marriage contract, from finding happiness in another union. He defended his view not only from a moral standpoint but from a scientific one, pointing out the serious error of trying to prevent by law, natural selection and multiplication.

**WAS NEARLY LOST IN DISUSED MINE**

**Harrowing Experience is Related by Sheffield Man Recently**

LONDON, Nov. 2.—Frank H. Brindley, of Sheffield, whose queer hobby is that of rediscovering old worked-out mines and collecting abandoned picks and shovels of underground workers, has had a thrilling experience. An old man at a village in Peak district told him of a "lost" mine down the dale. It took Mr. Brindley eighteen months to find the mine, and then it was only by accident, while he sheltered from a storm. He pulled aside thick masses of overgrowth and nearly fell in it. He descended fifty feet of the shaft by means of a rope, and found a cross-tunnel. At the end of it a rough ledge of wooden strips led to still lower depths.

His supply of candles was nearly exhausted. To save them he was forced to proceed by the light of matches. By this time he was quite lost.

Then a sudden draught of air blew out a match, and lighting his last candle he made his way across swamps of water, and finally reached another tunnel in which were an old mine

wagon and some tools. "I took possession of one, a miner's pick, with a head about twelve inches long," said Mr. Brindley, "and at the moment I felt more settled and safer." His experience told him that miners generally left their tools near an entrance.

"The floor seemed to rise. I followed the wagon-way and came finally higher and higher, until suddenly I saw in front of me daylight peeping through a thickly matted mass of ivy and bushes. It was the Dale Woods; and by scrambling and struggling I managed to make my way through it, and to my joy reached safety. I cannot express the feeling of relief at my discovery, but in my dreams I still wake with a start. I am sure no miner is so great as being lost in the tunnels of a deserted mine."

**Disarmament Studies Proceed At Geneva**

GENEVA, Nov. 1.—Disarmament studies in the military and naval commissions are said to be proceeding with less difficulty after the program was changed to permit submission of the feelings of all delegates to the preparatory commission which will make final decisions on technical matters. The plan had previously called for submission of the feelings of delegates to the preparatory commission of the bare vote of the committees. Discussion in committees has lately been confined to a strictly technical basis, with excellent results.

The large difficulty of the committees arose in the discussions of naval strength. French and Italian delegates are opposed to the limitation of navies by putting vessels into categories. Great Britain, Japan and the United States are more or less in agreement in the category matter, and opposed as a body to the Franco-Italian attitude.

**Gambling Den Found In Old Motor Truck**

HAVANA, Cuba, Nov. 1.—What is believed to be one of the strangest subterfuges ever used by gamblers to evade police interference, was uncovered here when police raided an old enclosed motor bus and surprised ten men busy gambling.

For several weeks suburban police had noticed the dilapidated bus wandering through outlying streets apparently without any particular destination. HON. R. ROGERS SAYS C. N. STATE GETTING WORSE

WINNIPEG, Nov. 2.—Taking issue with the statement that the Canadian National Railways were close to the point of paying their way, Hon. Robert Rogers, former Minister of Public Works in the Borden cabinet, declared at a meeting here last night that, notwithstanding operating surpluses, the financial situation of the road was worse than it was four years ago. When the Minister of Railways and Canada dealt with capital liability and fixed charges in the course of his recent presentation of the C. N. R. annual statement, said Mr. Rogers, he gave to the House only those figures which attached to the Canadian National, the Grand Trunk and the Great Western. The fact was, continued the speaker, that all the liability incurred, either to the Dominion or through public borrowings, stood today as an interest-bearing liability against the whole system. In 1917, he pointed out, the funded debt of the Canadian National, Grand Trunk and Grand Trunk Pacific totaled \$206,670,829, creating fixed charges of \$30,923,410.

FAMED INDIA SHRINE LOOTED

Krishna Temple at Dwarka Broken Into by Robbers

LONDON, Nov. 2.—The famous Krishna temple at Dwarka has been broken into, the burglars evading the military guard which surrounds the shrine and climbing an 18 foot wall which surrounded the most famous shrine in India. Valuable ancient ornaments of the image of Shri Krishna, the most popular Hindu deity, were stolen. Bejeweled bracelets, diamonds and emerald earrings, gold sandals, encrusted with nine different jewels, gold armlets, and diamond neckties, valued at over \$230,000 were stolen. The priest of the temple discovered the daring burglary when he went to perform morning worship.

CRITICIZES BOARD

Hon. Mr. Rogers said he was offering no complaint as to the operating management of Sir Henry Thornton, but he did complain that the government was handicapping that operating by loading the system with a "no-cash" compound interest, he figured that the total deficit in the last four years would amount to \$106,867,613. In addition to this he claimed that fresh capital liability to the extent of \$186,035,544 had been incurred through C.N.R. advances and guarantees since 1917, bringing the total of fresh capital liability up to \$316,253,258, with annual interest charges of some \$43,233,000. "So that when the book is made that the Canadian National is close to the point of paying its way," he declared, "the indisputable truth is that the situation as to liability is worse by many millions than it was four years ago, notwithstanding the operating surpluses which have been earned during that period."

INCOMES OF MILLION ARE CREDITED TO 75

U. S. Internal Revenue Bureau Statistics For 1924 Are Issued

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—Seventy-five persons, twenty-one of them credited to the state of New York, reported net incomes of \$1,000,000 or over for the calendar year 1924, and paid their taxes on that basis to the federal government, according to statistics given out by the Internal Revenue Bureau. Three of those had net incomes of \$2,000,000 and more, while three others reported net incomes ranging between \$1,000,000 and \$2,000,000, and fifteen had net incomes of between \$200,000 and \$1,000,000. No official identification of those in this exclusive "blue ribbon" list of wealthy Americans is very revealed by the Treasury Department, but it is possible to speculate fairly accurately as to who some of them are. The trio reporting net incomes in excess of \$2,000,000 each are credited to two states, two to Michigan and one to New York. The Michigan men are assumed to be Henry Ford and his son Edsel. The one from New York probably is John D. Rockefeller, Jr. The three who reported incomes of between \$1,000,000 and \$2,000,000 are assumed to be J. P. Morgan, Jr., John D. Rockefeller, Jr., and Charles D. Walcott.

PROHIBITION REFERENDA In many of the contests for Senate and House seats, prohibition has run through the whole fabric of the campaigns and in eight states the voters are expressing their views on this question in referendum. These states are New York, Nevada, Wisconsin, Illinois, Montana, Missouri, Colorado and California. The proposals put forward range all the way from repeal of all state prohibition enforcement codes to expressions of sentiment for guidance of representatives in the halls of congress. Both wets and dry have been active in practically all of these contests as well as in the fights for offices in a number of states in which the issue is not brought to a direct vote. In Maryland, which has refused to adopt a state enforcement code, a last minute twist was given the campaign by the association against the prohibition amendment which repudiates its endorsement of Senator Weller, Republican, and came out for Representative Millard Tydings, his Democrat opponent. Out of the ordinary developments served to focus widespread attention on a number of the other senatorial fights. In Massachusetts, President Coolidge came to the aid of his personal friend, Senator Wm. H. Butler, in the contest against former Senator David I. Walsh, making a special trip.

Spain Signs Treaty With Latin-America

Among the provisions is the establishment of an office to handle all correspondence relating to the development of aerial communication. It was decided to hold a further meeting at Barcelona to discuss aerial regulations.

BERLIN, Nov. 2.—The board of directors of the North German Lloyd Steamship Company yesterday voted to recommend to the general meeting of stockholders on December 2, an increase in capitalization from \$18,000,000 to \$30,000,000, which was the company's pre-war capitalization. The action follows closely on the heels of the fusion of the German-Australian and Kosmos Shipping Companies with the Hamburg-American Line into a \$31,000,000 shipping combine, with a total tonnage of 875,000.

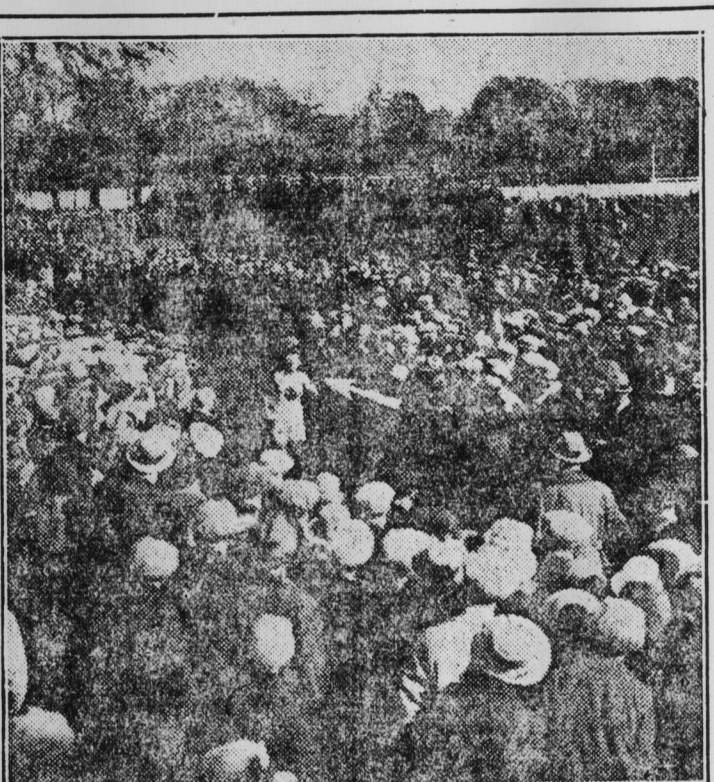
