British Steamer Is Fined \$111,000 For Breaking U. S. Law THROUGH HERE TO CELEBRATE 12TH

CARRIED ELKS FROM PHILADELPHIA TO BOSTON MEETING

Steamer Voltaire, Bound for Halifax, Gets In Trouble in Boston.

MAY MAKE APPEAL

Law Does Not Permit Foreign Vessels to Trade Between U. S. Ports.

Boston, Mass., July 12.—For alleged violation of the shipping laws forbidding vessels under foreign flags engaging in commerce between United States ports a fine of \$111,000 has been placed by customs authorities here against the British steamer Voltaire, which last Monday brought 500 members of the Philadelphia Lodge to the national convention of the benevolent and protective order of Elks.

The Voltaire, owned by the Lamport and Holt Steamship Company, stopped here en route to St. John's, Nfld., and Halifax. The allegation charges that the Voltaire, by coming here from Philadelphia, at least violated the spirit of the law. Appeal from the fine may be made to the Department of Commerce at Washington.

EMPRESS OF FRANCE CLIPS RECORD

Cuts Time For The St. Lawrence Route 12 Hours—Brings Olympic Pictures.

Quebec, July 12.—Crossing the Atlantic ocean in five days, eight hours and ten minutes, the Canadian Pacific liner Empress of France, has established a new record for the St. Lawrence route, clipping 12 hours off her former record. The average speed was 20.16 knots, although there were spots when she made 21 knots.

SEVEN ARE KILLED DURING DELHI RIOT

Entire City in Ferment Over Clash Between Hindus and Moslems.



ITALIANS PLANNING FLIGHT TO CANADA

Will Come Here Via Great Britain, Iceland and Greenland.

Rome, July 12.—Lieut. Locatelli, Italian aviator, whose projected flight to the North Pole recently was postponed until next year, expects to leave Sunday from Pisa for Great Britain, Iceland, Greenland, Canada and the U. S. He will use the same plane he expected to pilot toward the Pole and will gather data for a future polar flight.

RUM PIRATES SAID TO HAVE DRIVEN 3 OFFICERS INSANE

New Sensational Developments Promised at Halifax.

MURDER ALLEGED

Slaying and Seizure on Another Vessel in Retaliation for Cutting of Prices.

(Canadian Press.) Halifax, N. S., July 12.—Conflicting reports continue to surround the alleged piratical attack on the French steamer Mulhouse, which put into port on last Tuesday, reporting the loss of from half a million to a million dollars worth of liquor and cash in Rum Row, late last month. An investigation was opened yesterday under the direction of Emile Gaboury, French consul general, but was adjourned and no statement was given out, although it was intimated by those in authority that the facts would be much more astounding than the reports already circulated.

PEEVED AT HIGH COST OF LIQUOR

New York, July 12.—A distinguished society matron, peeved because she charged her for the liquid refreshments served at the wedding of her daughter, was the cause of Louis Boels' arrest at his catering place, 47 West 97th street, by agents Hasi and Bruchelien of the Prohibition Enforcement Bureau. The society woman wrote a letter of complaint to the bureau about the high cost of good liquor.

WOMAN REFUSES TO QUIT N. Y. JAIL

Tells Sheriff She is Willing to Remain Until She Dies.

New York, July 12.—Praising the Bronx County Jail as "better than Atlantic City," Mrs. Margaret Callaghan, 60 years old, who has been confined there since June 24 for contempt of court, told William Keating, counsel for Sheriff Edward Flynn of the Bronx, that she was willing to remain there until she died. Mrs. Callaghan was remanded to the jail for failure to produce \$200,000 worth of bonds and mortgages belonging to her sister's estate.

LEAVES \$8,000,000 BUT MADE NO WILL

Only Two Heirs-at-Law to Share Fortune of Frederick F. Ayer.

New York, July 12.—The fact that Frederick Fanning Ayer, manager of the Ayer estate, lawyer and author of a frequently quoted book of verse, "Bell and Wing," left no will was disclosed when his sister, Mrs. Lesley J. IMMIGRATION OF JAPANESE IS UP IN COMMONS

Premier King Believes Canada Should Profit by Situation in U. S.

ONE SPREADS GLOOM

(By Canadian Press.) Ottawa, Ont., July 12.—Premier King informed the House of Commons last night that the admission of Japanese "wives" to Canada was being taken up with the Japanese Government. The Canadian Government was not admitting Japanese contract laborers, and did not intend to, but he pointed out that the feeling between the United States and Japan at the present moment was "somewhat tense," and that Canada ought to take account of that circumstance.

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
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Holdes Gavel-Breaking Record

CAR IS RECOVERED

Automobile in Which Guy McKibbin Lost Life, Taken From Miramichi.

Newcastle, N. B., July 11—The car, which Guy McKibbin drove over the Miramichi bridge on Wednesday morning when he lost his life, was recovered about 8 o'clock this afternoon. The car was badly damaged. The windshield had been driven against the steering wheel and the front seat was pushed about a foot out of place, probably done when the car struck gates on bridge or the water in its drop of about 20 feet to the river. When recovered the emergency brake was fast on showing that the unfortunate man had made an effort to bring the car to a stop but without avail. Grappling is still being carried on for the body but it is unlikely that it will be recovered until it comes to the surface as the river is very deep at the point where the accident occurred and the tide very strong.

YANKEES AGAIN GET INTO LEAGUE LEAD

New York, July 12—The New York Americans are again in the lead with the Yankees, but the Huguenots, in an effort to even the score, today won the second, 7 to 6. Three Cleveland pitchers suffered a terrific lacing as Philadelphia hammered out a 10 to 1 triumph over the Indians.

Manager Speaker was banished from the game in the sixth inning from the bench in the seventh for disputing Umpire Dineen's decisions on balls and strikes.

It took the Giants ten innings to defeat the Yankees, by scoring five times in the extra session they chalked up a 10 to 6 victory.

GIANT FIRECRACKER KILLS TWO KIDDIES

New York, July 12—One boy was killed instantly and another suffered such injuries that he died on the way to the hospital when a giant firecracker, which they were playing in the backyard at the home of one of the boys on Staten Island exploded.

George Stecke, 23 years old, was playing with Walter Rokicki, 8, in the rear of the Stecke home. The day before the Fourth of July George's elder brother, William, brought some firecrackers from Perth Amboy, N. J., and these remained over from the holiday celebration and George and Walter found it in a shed. They took it out into the yard and in some manner it exploded.

Mrs. Stecke was in the house. She ran out and found her boy dead, lying in the yard. He was removed in an ambulance, but before the Richmond Memorial Hospital at Princess Bay was reached he was dead.

MOTHER PLEADED TO LAST FOR MUIR

Third Death in Connection With Valleyfield Shooting Occurs.

Montreal, July 11—Three corpses lie in the path of Walter Muir's bullet—his own, that of Henri Laviolette for whose murder, a 21 year old New York student, paid the supreme penalty of the law, at Valleyfield yesterday, and that of Bertha Reed Laviolette, a 17 year old girl, and niece of the victim of the murder, who succumbed to shock and heart break, due relatives declare, to pining over the death of her uncle. The girl was seized with a paralytic stroke at her home on Thursday morning, and died a few hours later.

The efforts of Mrs. Muir, extended up to the very last minute of her son's life, to obtain intercession for the youthful slayer, make up a story of despair.

The mother of the young man left nothing undone to obtain stay of execution, and not until the black flag was flying from the staff at Valleyfield Jail, did she cease her efforts, brought at last to the realization that her son had expired his crime.

According to Madame Henri Laviolette, widow of the murdered man, the mother of the dead youth called on her at Valleyfield prior to the execution with the intention of pleading for her intervention. Madame Laviolette was away from home at the time, and Mrs. Muir, according to the latter's relatives and sought their aid. This they refused.

Madame Laviolette's comment was "A husband is dearer than a son, that's what I will tell her if she asks me to intercede for her boy. All the money in the world cannot give me back the best man in many countries."

Several hours before the time fixed for execution, Muir's mother was in front of the prison, seated in a chair, with one of her nieces. It was said that young Muir himself had requested that his mother be not allowed to see him again, after the usual good-bye at 10 o'clock on Thursday night.

Besides a letter addressed to his mother, Muir wrote a poem. The subject or text of it are so far known by no living person except Father Aumais. The body of Muir was removed last night on the train to New York, to be taken to Mrs. Muir's home at 612 West 182nd street.

New York, July 12—Intense interest has been aroused here over the execution of Walter Muir at Valleyfield, Que., yesterday morning for the murder of Henri Laviolette. Most of the New York dailies featured the story of the execution on their front pages. The Bulletin, a new daily, issued a special issue, after the execution, carrying an editorial referring to the Muir case and deplored the carrying of deadly weapons.

"The real cause of such crimes," the Bulletin says, "is the practice of carrying weapons." The paper added: "The boy with the pistol imagined himself under compulsion to kill in a dispute over nothing more important than a dog. The weapon carried exaggerates trivial differences."

Mr. Tilley's position was that there were enough plants here now which were delivering to the consumer a quality of milk unexcelled in America and that Mr. Geldart's entering the field would mean a disruption of the business, resulting in a poorer quality of milk reaching the consumer and a financial loss to Mr. Geldart himself. Mr. Geldart so far had not decided to abandon the project."

I was in the milk business in St. John for 20 years, and am quite willing to let my reputation as a dealer in pure milk speak for itself. That the Canadian Mother May Have Quick and Ready Information On Feeding Her Child

IMPORTANT—In preparing feeding mixtures it is imperative that all utensils, bottles, nipples, etc., should be sterilised in boiling water before using. Use a dry spoon in removing contents from the can, and in measuring be careful to pour from can to spoon, allowing the milk to level itself. Repeat this procedure with every spoonful measured, using the same spoon every time. This will insure accurate measurement and produce the best results.

DIET FOR CHILD DURING THE SECOND YEAR

Usually after the twelfth month, the mother should select a diet schedule. Every new article of food should be carefully prepared, and given at first in very small quantities. All meals are to be given regularly, with nothing between meals. With many children this expansion of the diet list is attended with considerable difficulty. They are thoroughly satisfied with milk, and refuse all other form of nourishment. In such cases, withhold the milk until the more solid articles of food have been eaten. If both are given at the same time, the child will prefer the milk and when he has finished drinking it he will refuse the solid food. The following diet schedule will permit the mother to select a suitable meal from the foods listed. It is never advisable to make a change in diet during very hot weather.

NOTE: One teaspoonful of EAGLE BRAND CONDENSED MILK added to one ounce of boiled water results in a mixture equivalent in nutritive value to whole milk. Whenever the word milk appears in the following diet, EAGLE BRAND should be diluted accordingly.

- 12th to 15th MONTH—FIVE MEALS DAILY**
- 7 A.M.—Oatmeal, barley, or wheat jelly, one to two tablespoonfuls in 6 or 8 ounces of milk. Stale bread and butter, or rusk and butter.
 - 9 A.M.—The juice of one orange.
 - 11 A.M.—Scraped rare beef, one to three tablespoonfuls, mixed with equal quantity of bread and moistened with beef-juice. Or a soft-boiled egg mixed with stale bread-crumbs; a piece of rusk and 6 or 8 ounces of milk.
 - 3 P.M.—Beef, chicken, or mutton broth, with rice or stale bread broken into the broth. Six ounces of milk, if wanted. Stale bread and butter or rusk and butter. Many children at the above age will take and digest apple-sauce and prune pulp; when these are given, milk should be omitted.
 - 6 P.M.—Two tablespoonfuls of cereal jelly in 8 ounces of milk; a piece of rusk. Stale bread and butter.
 - 10 P.M.—A tablespoonful of cereal jelly in 8 ounces of milk.
- 15th to 18th MONTH—FOUR MEALS DAILY**
- 7 A.M.—Oatmeal, hominy, cornmeal, each cooked three hours the day before they are used. When the cooking is completed the cereal should be of the consistency of a thin paste. This is strained through a colander, which upon cooling will form a mass of jelly-like consistency. Of this give two or three tablespoonfuls, served with milk. 8 or 10 ounces of milk as a drink. Toast.
 - 9 A.M.—The juice of one orange.
 - 11 A.M.—A soft-boiled egg mixed with stale bread-crumbs, or one tablespoonful of scraped beef mixed with stale bread-crumbs and moistened with beef-juice. A drink of milk. Rusk or bran biscuit, or stale bread and butter.
 - 3 P.M.—Mutton, chicken, or beef broth, with rice or junket or with stale bread broken in the broth. Custard, corn-starch, plain rice pudding, junket, stewed prunes, baked apple or apple sauce.
 - 6 P.M.—Farina, cream of wheat, wheatena (cooked two hours). Give from one to three tablespoonfuls, served with milk. A drink of milk. Rusk or stale bread and butter.
- 18th to 24th MONTH—FOUR MEALS DAILY**
- 7 A.M.—Cornmeal, oatmeal, hominy (prepared as in the above schedule). Serve with milk, or with butter and salt. A soft-boiled egg every two or three days. Hashed chicken on toast occasionally. A drink of milk. Bran biscuit and butter, or stale bread and butter.
 - 9 A.M.—The juice of one orange.
 - 11 A.M.—Rare beef minced or scraped; the heart of a lamb chop, finely cut. Chicken. Spinach, asparagus tips, squash, strained stewed tomatoes, stewed carrots, mashed cauliflower. Baked apple or apple-sauce. Stale bread and butter. After the twenty-first month, baked potatoes and well-cooked strained beans.
 - 3 P.M.—Chicken, beef or mutton broth, with rice or with stale bread broken into the broth. Custard, corn-starch, or plain rice pudding, junket, stewed prunes. Bran biscuit and butter or stale bread and butter.
 - 6 P.M.—Farina, cream of wheat, wheatena (each cooked two hours). Give one to three tablespoonfuls, served with milk, or with butter and salt. A drink of milk. Rusk or stale bread and butter.

The following suggestions have proved to be helpful when properly used with bottle feedings, and they may be used in conjunction with Eagle Brand Condensed Milk.

- Always pour the milk from the can into the spoon—allowing it to level itself but not run over. You can readily understand that by dipping the spoon into the can you get more than a level spoonful, because of the milk that would adhere to the bottom of the spoon. This is important. When you have added the milk to the water stir thoroughly. After opening, it is safe to leave the milk in the original can.
- ORANGE JUICE**
When baby is four months old, give one teaspoonful of strained orange juice, diluted with equal quantity of boiled water, once daily before feeding time. Gradually increase the amount until you are giving the strained juice of a half of an orange undiluted, once daily before feeding time. Orange juice may be continued until child is old enough to eat other fruits as well as oranges.
- OATMEAL JELLY**
When baby is five months old, add one teaspoonful of oatmeal jelly to each feeding. Gradually increase the amount until you are adding three tablespoonfuls of oatmeal jelly to each feeding. To make oatmeal jelly add four ounces of oatmeal to one pint of water; boil for three hours in a double boiler, and add enough water so when cooking is completed a thin paste will be formed. This white hot is forced through a strainer to remove coarser particles. When cold a semi-mass will be formed. Oatmeal jelly may be continued until child is old enough to eat well cooked whole cereals.
- CONSTIPATION**
Oatmeal water very often relieves this condition. To make oatmeal water add one heaping tablespoonful of oatmeal to one pint of water, and boil for three hours in a double boiler. This will make a little more than half a pint of thick gruel to which add one pint of water that has been boiled. After straining mixture through fine strainer, you should have a little more than a pint of whitish liquid. This should be used with each feeding instead of the plain boiled water. If you find that this makes bowels too loose, dilute oatmeal water with plain boiled water. Barley or rice water may be used instead of oatmeal water. If necessary two to three drops of plain cod liver oil may be given twice daily added to the morning and night feedings.
- DIARRHEA**
Give nothing but plain boiled water for twenty-four hours. Then start feeding with barley water, or rice water, to which has been added a little salt to improve the taste. If these feedings are retained, and bowel movements lessened, small amounts of very weak regular feedings may be started and gradually increased according to baby's condition. If your baby does not improve after trying the above suggestions, consult your doctor at once.





WIRELESS TO MARS TO BE ATTEMPTED

Feat Will Be Tried on August 23 in United States and Europe.

London, July 12—Scientists the world over are preparing for the great experiment of wireless to our nearest planet neighbor, Mars. The day of the attempt will be August 23. Mars will be then 34,600,000 miles from the earth, or nearer than at any other period during the last 100 years.

Apparatus of great electric power is to be erected on the summit of the Jungfrau in Switzerland, and signals at a wave length of 15,000 metres will be transmitted into space at carefully gauged intervals.

Infinite possibilities are opened by such experiments. Several scientists who believe that Mars is inhabited declare that the earth may receive radio signals or even initiating messages by electrical transmission.

Much important and extremely interesting data will certainly be forthcoming—quite apart from the wireless signals—as a consequence of the wide-world observation of the planet, and the theory that there is life in Mars may be definitely proved.



REDISTRIBUTION BILL UP IN HOUSE

Nova Scotia Given 2 Members Less—West to Get Increased Number.

Ottawa, July 11—The Redistribution Bill, with its definition of constituencies, is now before the House.

Under the new Redistribution Bill, there will be 245 members in the House of Commons, and the unit of representation is 36,283.

Nova Scotia gets 14 members instead of 16 in the present House. The reduction is made by uniting two present ridings of Hants and Kings, and by dividing Queens-Sheburne between Lunenburg and Yarmouth.

The constituencies in New Brunswick remain substantially as at present, though the present title of St. John City and Counties of St. John and Albert, is reduced to the shorter form, St. John-Albert.

The number of New Brunswick members remains at 11.

There is no change in Prince Edward Island, which has four members.

Quebec, being the pivotal province of redistribution, is unchanged with its 65 members; but there are some alterations in the distribution.

Ontario retains 82 members.

Manitoba under redistribution will have 17 instead of 15 seats.

Saskatchewan gets 21 seats, instead of 16. There are six new seats, Long Lake, Melville, Melfort, Rosetown, Willow Branch, and Yorkton, while Salt Coats disappears.

Alberta's representation is increased from 12 to 16. The new seats are: Acadia, Athabasca, Camrose, Peace River, Vegreville, and Wetaskawin.

The ridings of Victoria and Strathcona do not appear in the new bill.

British Columbia is given an increase of one seat from 13 to 14. The additional goes to Vancouver, which is now to be divided into Centre, North and South.

The Yukon remains unchanged.



U. S. WANTS ISLAND Manila, July 12—The United States Government has entered into negotiations to bring, under the U. S. flag, Palmas Island, situated about 50 miles southeast of the province of Davao, Island of Mindanao.

Palmas Island was ceded to the U. S. by Spain in the treaty of Paris in 1898, but the Dutch flag which has flown over it for nearly a century, has never been taken down. Although the people of Palmas are virtually all Filipino origin and the island a part of the Philippine archipelago, the Dutch have assumed sovereignty over the 500 inhabitants.
