A general retirement of the Germans east of Paris continues, according to a statement this afternoon, by the war information bureau in London. It is stated that British troops yesterday captured 1,500 prisoners and several guns.

The French embassy at Washigton has received reports from Bordeaux of marked advances against the German right wing. This appears to be based on statements by the French minister of war, made public last night. . Today it is announced in Paris that the Germans have retired in some places forty or fifty miles.

AUSTRIANS "HOPELESSLY BEATEN"

London, Sept. 11-A despatch to the Times from Petrograd says: "Although some of the Austrian army corps in the province of Lublin will probably make good their retreat, official despatches describe the rout of Generals Dankl, and Von Auffenburg in Shaway, as to warrant the inference that the enemy is hopelessly beaten. 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

Failure Inconceivable, He Says-Would Mean Extinction Of Freedom's Lights

"It is not conceivable that we should fail," he said, "If we do fail the lights of freedom go out over the whole world."



ENGLISH CARE OF PRISONERS

Six Thousand of Them Ir Eight Camps

TREATED EXCELLENTLY

Men Divided Into Squads With Captain Over Them-Furnished Rooms For Officers Who Are Captured

London, Sept. 11—There are at the cresent time about 6000 German suspects and prisoners of war in the conpects and prisoners of war in the concentration camps of Great Britain.

These camps are at Aldershot, Newbury, Dorchester, Queensferry, Lancaster, Dyfrim Hall, which is near Chester, Edinburg, and Templemore, Ire. The Aldershot camp is at Frith Hill. At Dorchester the men are in barracks. The Newbury camp is on the famous race course, and two idle factories being used at Queensferry, and similar accommodations have been secured at Lancaster.

The Irish station at Templemore is using the military barracks for housing using the military barracks for housing these prisoners and Edinburg has a large camp in the open. Dyfrim Hall is a large country mansion, and has been given over to the use of officers. If another camp is needed it probably will be at Salisbury Plain.

The Aldershot camp, like others in the open, is surrounded by a barbed wire fence 10 feet high, around which and at a distance of about 20 feet there is a ring of wire entanglements five feet broad. The prisoners here are all men who would be serving in the German Army if they could get out of the country, together with men suspected of spying. They are all housed in tents with board floors.

keep their tents in order. They are di-vided into squads of twenty each, and each squad elects its own captain, who is responsible for the good behaviour of his men and the tidiness of their section of the camp. All needed clothing is supplied by the commandant, who has orders to buy what is necessary from local shops.

The men sleep on straw mattresses and are supplied with blankets. This is better treatment in the matter of sleeping facilities, than the British soldier receives; he has to sleep on bare boards. The English troops on guard at the camp have no floor to their tents, as

Camp Lighted at Night

They get candles, soap and towels and must answer a daily rollcall. The camps are brightly lighted with electricity at night to prevent escape, and are at all times surrounded by armed guards. If the prisoners do special work they are paid for it.

Every camp is supplied with a resident medical officer and an interpreter.

The London station is in the great Olympia Amphitheatre.

The prisoners in this station able to afford it have, promptly at 9 o'clock every night, a dinner consisting of four courses. They insist on singing "Deutschland eber Alles." greatly to the annoyance of English householders in the vicinity.

The Cub Leaders Slated for Dismissal at End of Season, President Thomas and Manager Hank O'Day.

The man who told me of this is in a position to know exactly what is going on. He further told me who is to succeed Thomas—which will be a surprise to baseball people, and who is to be to baseball people, and who is to be O'Day's successor as manager. He asked me to refrain from mentioning them for

president is uncertain. He undertook a difficult job, with the prejudices of the people all against the team. He has managed to smooth out some difficult passages, and he has maintained silence, which was a great relief after the constant brolling under Murphy. He has stant broiling under Murphy. He has patched up differences between manager and player and between players themselves. He has not strengthened the club at all. It is doubtful whether any one could have done it.

ning game against Boston, late in the game Bresnahan had to play in the out-field. Boston had a runner within scoring distance—on third, and Cather was coming to bat.

Louis, and Bresnahan knew his dangerous hitting power, so he ran toward the infield and called to Sweeney: 'Ask Hank if he doesn't want to pass this fellow and get the pitcher up."


