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MINISTER AT STOCKHOLM TO WASHINGTON

Honorable Mr. Bryce Is To Devote Himself To Literature

SKETCH OF NEW MAN

Sir Cecil Arthur Spring-Rice Regarded as One of Best of England's Diplomats—Has Had Experience in Brussels, Tokio, Persia, Sweden and United States

(Canadian Press) London, Nov. 11.—The Washington correspondent of the Morning Post, says that Ambassador Bryce has informed President Taft that he will retire soon and devote himself to literature.

Sir Cecil was born in 1859 and was created K.C.M.G. in 1906. He has served at Stockholm as minister since September 1908. In 1906 he was acting third secretary at Washington and as Secretary to the British delegates to the International Maritime Conference, August 27, 1908. At Tokyo, he was transferred to Washington in 1909, and minister to Russia in 1908-9, and is considered one of the best of Great Britain's regular diplomats.

MINISTERS' MEETINGS

REPORT BY COMMISSIONER McLELLAN ON THE POLICE

The report of Commissioner McLellan upon conditions as he found them in the investigation which he conducted into the affairs of the police department was received by the common council this afternoon and the recommendations ordered be carried out. It dealt with the evidence submitted during the seven weeks, while the inquiry was in progress under oath, during which time all members of the police force, the chief included, with six ex-police officers were examined.

The recommendations concluded with an appeal to the council to reorganize the department if it was desired to maintain a standard of efficiency superior to that which prevailed at present, for it was said that the men were sadly lacking in the requirements of a knowledge of practical police work and had not been instructed sufficiently in the use of the powers given them under their appointment.

The chief of police, when he was first appointed, had in his possession copies of the manual regarding police regulations, but these had since been exhausted and never replaced, although requests were made by the chief for more copies, covering the same, but not identical with the old manual. Commissioner McLellan thought that the manual suggested by the chief was too bulky to be of use.

He said that from the evidence which he took he believed that practically all the men who were on the force were not physically fit, and that he was physically fit, and had a knowledge of reading and writing. DEAR IS GROWING

The Austro-Serbian crisis is now in the hands of the German secretary for foreign affairs, Herr Von Kiderles-Waechter, who is working on a formula designed to appease both Austria and Serbia.

The Daily Mail's Sofia correspondent says that preliminary conversations have been begun with Austria in the name of the Balkan League. The latter has made every possible concession, but maintains that a Serbian outlet to the Adriatic is absolutely essential. Press and public opinion in St. Petersburg, according to a dispatch to the Daily Mail from the Russian capital, expressed a conflict between Russia and Austria, which is also announced that Archduke Franz Ferdinand will soon visit the German Emperor

THE COAL SITUATION

The shortage of American hard coal has been seriously alleviated by the arrival of half a dozen schooner loads of coal, but soft coal is still hard to get. Nearly all that is being mined is being shipped to the St. Lawrence to stock up before the winter closes. The I. C. R. has found it impossible to secure enough coal in the ordinary manner, and have found it necessary to continue commandeering coal shipped over their lines as freight.

MORE THAN 50 HURT—FREIGHT HITS EXCURSION PASSENGER TRAIN BOUND FROM NEW ORLEANS

(Canadian Press) New Orleans, Nov. 11.—Thirty persons were killed and more than fifty were injured in a wreck on the Yazoo & Mississippi Valley Railroad early today when a freight train crashed into an excursion passenger train bound from New Orleans to Woodville, Miss.

The wreck occurred near Montz, La., about twenty-seven miles north of New Orleans. A train carrying many of the injured and some of the dead arrived in the city this morning at 8:15. The more seriously injured were placed in the charity hospital.

The ill-fated excursion train left New Orleans at eleven o'clock last night carrying several hundred people who had spent Sunday in New Orleans. It slowed down on approaching a sharp curve near Montz soon after midnight, and the freight train crashed into the rear coaches.

Many of the victims were so badly mangled as to make identification impossible. The bodies of the dead were buried in the city morgue.

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DEATH CLAIMS ONCE STRONGEST MAN IN WORLD

Louis Cyr Succumbs in Montreal at Early Age of 49

(Canadian Press) Montreal, Nov. 11.—Tragic circumstances accompanied the death of Louis Cyr, champion strong man of the world, and a child death may result today as a result. The former champion died at noon yesterday. His mother-in-law, Mrs. Evangeliste Comtois, who had been in attendance upon him during his illness, died early on Saturday morning, whilst ministering to the wants of her son-in-law. As she entered the sick room she fell to the floor, and when assistance reached her she was beyond human aid, as she had succumbed to heart trouble. Mrs. Cyr, suffering from the shock of her double bereavement, is confined to bed, and is in a serious condition today.

Louis Cyr succumbed to chronic nephritis, from which he had been suffering off and on for the last twelve years. He was forty-nine years and one month of age, having been born on October 10, 1863 in St. Cyrprien.

In 1888 at an exhibition in Berthelville, he made his first record, by a back lift of a platform containing 2,500 pounds on his back. In 1890 he made another record by lifting 500 pounds with one hand, straight lift from ground to shoulder. In 1892, he established a world record by holding a straight pull against four horses, each weighing 1,000 pounds. These horses were attached by traces to his arms and, though they did their utmost the champion held them in.

A REASSURING SPEECH The Canadian people will read with intense satisfaction the Guildhall speech of Premier Aquith. Foreign relations are always touched upon by the British prime minister at the Guildhall banquet, and Mr. Aquith on Saturday evening was able to say:— "It is a satisfaction to be able to assure you that so far as this country is concerned its relations with other powers without a single exception, were never more friendly and cordial."

These things which have been crying out for attention in the words of the British prime minister. Mr. Aquith dealt very frankly with the Balkan question, and said that the great powers were in close touch and "working together with a frankness and freedom of communication and discussion which were remarkable." They were not, he said, arrayed in opposite camps, but were agreed that the victors in this war "were not to rob of the fruits which went to them."

Mr. Aquith did not attempt to conceal the fact that in recasting the map of Southeastern Europe, as a result of the amazing success of the allies, there will be difficulties to overcome; but the map must be recast, even if former theories and policies go by the board. There is no serious note of anxiety in the speech of the British premier, but rather of confidence that matters will be adjusted without bringing any new elements into the conflict that is now being waged. His words will be received with satisfaction everywhere, except perhaps in Constantinople; but he plainly tells the Turks that they were given every opportunity and encouragement to introduce reforms before the Balkan nations resorted to force; and now they must abide by the result of the appeal to arms.

Whatever may develop, it is clear that the British premier at the present moment does not anticipate any serious breach in the friendly relations between the great powers.

HUMANITY'S GREAT TASK The recent International Eugenics Congress in London continues to provide a fruitful topic of discussion. What is "Eugenics"? A leading writer has described it as the science that deals with all the influences that deal with the betterment of the race. The most of the discussion, however, relates to the question of reproducing the fit and preventing as far as possible the reproduction of the unfit. It is admitted that "with the development of civilization the reproduction of the highest classes constantly decreases, and that of the inferior classes remains very high."

The proposition of defective in human society is increasing very rapidly, and if the criminals and defectives are permitted to reproduce themselves the burden on society will become constantly heavier. To prove the substance of defective characteristics, Dr. Raymond Pearl, biologist at the University of Malna, cites the history of one American family:—"At the time of the Revolution a young American captain was mated to a feeble-minded girl. Of the 420 descendants by this illegitimate union there have been but forty-six apparently normal, the others being defective in numerous ways. Eighty-two died in infancy. The same man, and here came the striking feature of the example, married a girl of good Quaker stock and of the some 426 offspring only two were defective and of the 424 have been many of the most prominent men of the country."

How shall society protect itself from the multiplication of defectives, and relieve later generations from the burden of caring for the unfit, and for the weaklings? Dr. Pearl says on this point:—"How can we cut off the hereditary transmission of defective traits? How can it be stopped? One scheme advanced is life segregation and another is sterilization which has more recently been advanced in the United States. Already eight states have passed sterilization laws, Indiana being the first in 1907 and New York in 1912, but the difficulty about these laws is their constitutionality. As originally passed, they were undoubtedly unconstitutional because the decision as to whether sterilization should take place was left with a commission, while the constitution of the United States calls for a trial before a jury in matters affecting life or punishment. The greatest that can be done with assured harmony is voluntary sterilization, by getting the consent of the person and relatives and in this way it is possible to do much. It is a thing to which the people must be educated and gotten away from old ideas. The defective are increasing everywhere and it is fair that no effective means be taken against it."

But there is a positive as well as a negative side to the science of Eugenics, and it deals with the encouragement of the multiplication of the fit in human society. Can mankind control his own evolution? We quote again from Dr. Pearl:—"All of us know and believe, I hope, in evolution. We know from matters of everyday observation that changes have taken place in man's characteristics, that the head form has changed from that of early man whose skull was low with no forehead. The average stature of Scandinavians, people of Danish and Norwegian descent, has increased over one inch in the last 100 years and is still growing taller. We also know that there is an evolution in mental capacity as well as physical."

"Time was in the evolution of the progress of society to man's brain experienced natural causes which led him to take care of the unfit and preserve the weaklings. People who have defects are taken care of by society and so those with diseases as well as criminals with defective attitude toward society as a whole are not eliminated but taken care of at society's expense. This brings us to a blind alley. What is going to happen in the future if we have this altruism and what will we put in the place of these natural causes? Are we content to rest quietly and admit the present development of man and let it continue no further? If we allow on the other hand, all criminals and defectives to reproduce themselves, the burden on society will become tremendous. The growth of the defective population is appalling. In the province of eugenics a question of vital importance is faced and the time is surely coming when the problem must be considered and solved. An active campaign is needed to educate the people and the children to an understanding of the laws of inheritance and sex problems."

It would be surprising if the increase in value in real estate should escape the notice of the assessors. The terrible tragedy in the northern woods suggests the need of some missionary effort in that direction, whether China gets its usual consideration or not. The Sunday riot in the Syrian quarter suggests the need of more than an extra policeman. It emphasizes the need of community work in some sections of the city.

The horrible story that a man near Kentville dug up potatoes in his brother's field and impregnated them with strychnine seems too horrible for belief, but the man has confessed his crime. An Ottawa despatch to the Standard intimates that Mr. Borden will propose an emergency contribution to the British admiralty and take further time to consider his policy with respect to a Canadian navy. He has had more than a year for consideration, and it is high time he arrived at some decision.

Correspondence of One Of Queen's Ladies-in-Waiting Is Volume of Interest

ROYAL HOUSEHOLD AMUSEMENTS Elevated Tone Introduced By Prince Consort at Dinner Table -The Duke of Cambridge at Prayers - Queen Victoria a "Womanly Woman"

(London Daily News.) Much interesting matter about the home life of Queen Victoria in the early years of her reign is contained in the "Correspondence of Sarah Spencer Lady Lytton, 1787-1870" (Murray, 10s. net), which has been edited by the Hon. Mrs. Hugh Wyndham, and is published today. Lady Lytton, the daughter of the late Earl Spencer, became lady-in-waiting to Queen Victoria in 1838, and four years later was appointed governess to the royal children, by whom she was affectionately known as "Liddle."

Card Losses "Honesty" Paid There are, of course, descriptions of the queen's progeny of parliament, of her wedding, and such great matters. But it is in its account of the familiar, the public, life of the queen that the book is most valuable. Here, for example, is a realistic note on the amusements of the royal household at Windsor in 1841: "Played at cards last night. It is now for money, and I won some, which the queen paid very honestly. A round game was played lately, after which Miss Page had to pay Prince Albert of Saxe-Coburg, which she did, first washing them with yellow soap for his royal hands."

SUICIDE FOLLOWS ON RESTIGOUCHE MURDER

Settler Kills Lumber Operator, Seriously Wounds Another, Ends Own Life

The woods in the vicinity of Anderson, a small settlement in the northwoods, along the International railway, and some miles from Campbellton, were the scene of a terrible tragedy on Saturday in which Peter Rinow, a settler, shot and killed Elvin Annett, a lumber foreman, seriously wounded John Glover, a lumber operator, and then killed himself with a shot from his rifle.

The reason given for the fearful happenings is that Rinow was under the impression that the men were cutting logs on his property. The murder was premeditated and done deliberately. Rinow followed Annett to the woods and shot at him from ambush, killing him on the second shot. He then went to where Glover was at work and fired at him, but did not make a clean shot, so that the man may possibly recover.

Rinow went further into the woods and when a posse under Chief of Police Hughes was taken to the house, while the dead body of Annett was taken care of by Undertaker Graham. A. E. McKenzie, a former St. John man, was the driver of the coroner's party to the scene of the crime.

Mrs. Rourke was 73 years of age and besides her husband is survived by two sons, Charles, of New York, and one son, W. of Kaledon (C. Y.), and a daughter, Mrs. F. W. MacLean. He was buried at his place tomorrow (Tuesday) at St. Martin's.

BREAKWATER LOCATION Report on Reasons for Present Site is Received at City Hall

The report of Engineer LaFleur of the Department of Public Works, Ottawa, on the reasons for locating the Courtenay Bay breakwater on its present site instead of farther towards the mouth of the bay has been received at City Hall with plans and diagrams further illustrating the report. The information was asked for by the common council in order that they might be informed definitely with respect to what changes there would be of advocating a change. If the change were at all feasible the council and the board of trade would be anxious to do what they could to bring it about, but they wished to have all available information on the subject before undertaking an agitation for a change in the plans. The report has not yet been dealt with by the commissioners.

In spite of many unfavorable conditions and some set-backs the work on the Courtenay Bay breakwater has progressed so favorably that they are now at least up to, if not beyond, the mark which they had expected to reach by this time. Everything is now in good order for a successful winter's work, and the contractors expect to be able to keep pace with their estimates through the severer weather of the winter months. There are now about 200 men employed on the works. G. F. Palmer, chief agent of the company, and E. R. MAKE THREE WHARF PROPERTIES INTO ONE

Extensive Improvements by Messrs. Bizard in South End

P. W. Bizard & Company are planning extensive improvements to their wharf properties in Lower Cove. They now own three adjoining wharves between Charlotte and Sydney streets, the Kerr, the Seely and the Landon wharves, and these three will be thrown into one. The Kerr wharf practically will be rebuilt, with a solid footing of piles and a strong foundation of stiles. The improvements, which will cost several thousand dollars, will be undertaken during the winter, and will be completed by spring time. All the three wharves will give 275 feet, 180 feet and 100 feet respectively to the three sides.
