

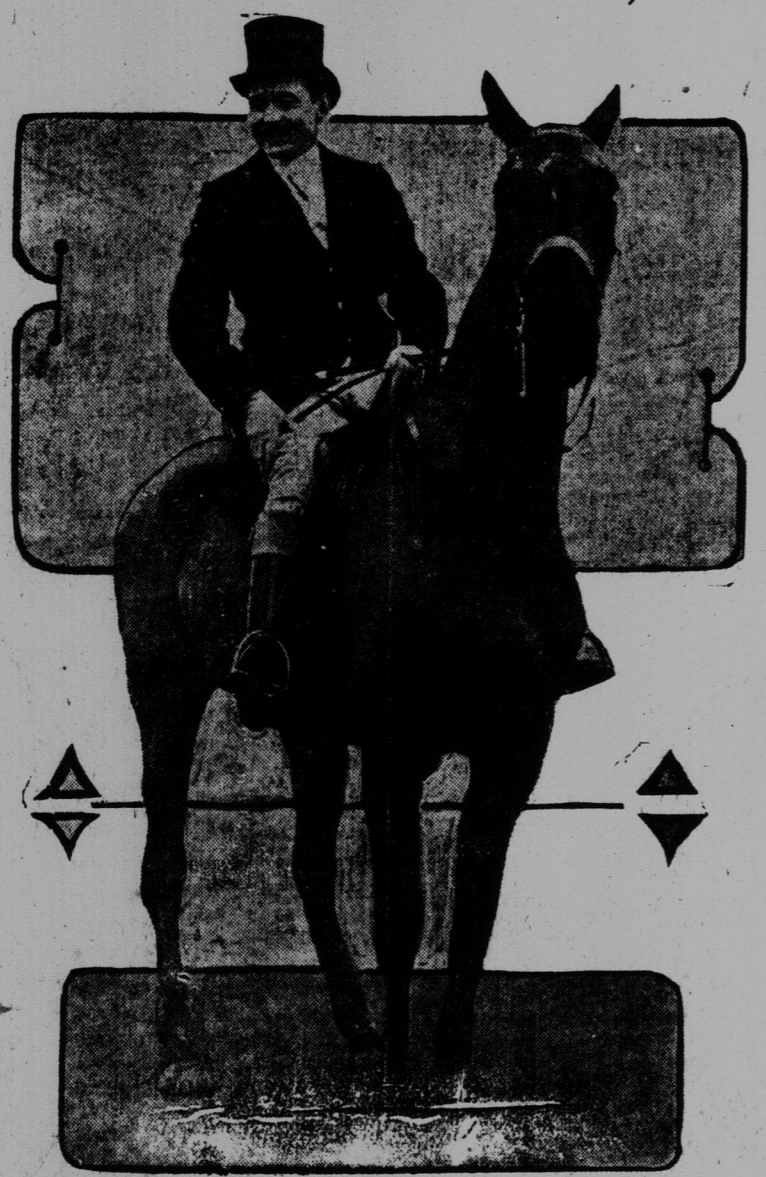

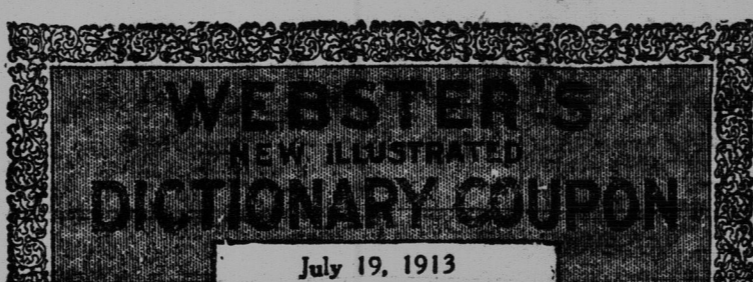

Daily Hints For the Cook

GRAHAM BREAD
Two cups graham, 2 cups buttermilk, 2-3 cup molasses, 1 teaspoon soda and pinch of salt. Bake in slow oven one hour and five minutes.

BREAKFAST RELISH
Fry two pieces of risen bread dough each an inch thick and large as a good-sized plate (pat it out with your hands, using no flour) in boiling fat like doughnuts; put them together with minced chicken, veal or cinnamon apple sauce between, to be eaten hot.

ICE CREAM
One quart milk, one-half pint heavy cream, two eggs, one scant teaspoon granulated gelatin, one cup sugar, a little salt and one tablespoon vanilla. Soak the gelatin in one-half cup cold milk, scald the remainder, and pour onto the eggs and sugar, which have been well beaten together. Return to double boiler and cook until it will coat the spoon. Pour over the softened gelatin, add salt and strain. Add vanilla when cold also the cream. Freeze with three parts ice to one of salt. A rich, smooth cream and not expensive.

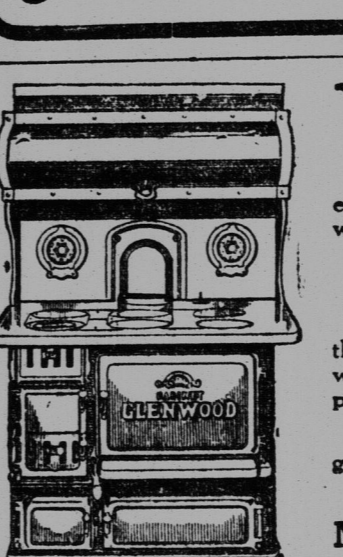

I. C. R. AND C. P. R. RATES

The Times prints on another page today an article from the Maritime Merchant on the subject of Nova Scotia and the I. C. R. In this article the Merchant, viewing the question from the government's standpoint, attempts to justify an increase in the freight rates of the government railway. One reason which it presents is that the I. C. R. is no longer a local road, and must be extended to the west, either by building its own line or acquiring one already built; and that whenever it does this its local freight rates will be placed on a par with those of company owned roads.

It will hardly be conceded that the Merchant makes out a strong case for an increase in the I. C. R. rates. Its argument appears to be somewhat in favor of company owned roads, which are much more eager to secure large dividends than to give the people a railway service at moderate rates. The people of New Brunswick have had experience with both the C. P. R. and the I. C. R., and they certainly would regret very much to see the government railway govern its rates entirely by reference to those of the C. P. R. The only possible justification for a government railway would be that it gave the public a more satisfactory service than they could get from a company-owned road. The I. C. R. is alleged to have had a surplus of \$800,000 last year. There is therefore no justification for a general increase of rates, and certainly not for making the rates the same as those which prevail on company roads.

A SUMMER INDUSTRY

The Bangor Commercial classes as one of the greatest industries of the state of Maine the entertainment of summer visitors. It says that from the time the inland waters are open to fishing in the spring until the close of the hunting season in the fall a large number of people visit the state, while during July and August its numerous resorts are crowded to overflowing. It is estimated that in 1912 no less than 1,400,000 people from other states spent their vacation period in New England, and the reports thus far received indicate a much larger number this year. The Commercial says it is estimated that the amount of money spent by these vacationists would total about \$100,000,000. The total value of the crops of New England in 1909 was estimated to be \$141,118,000. The amount of money spent by the tourists last year amounted to about twice the value of dairy products of the New England states for the year. It will thus be seen that the entertainment of summer guests is really a great industry.

MR. BORDEN'S TROUBLES

An Ottawa dispatch to Conservative newspapers says the impression prevailing in high political circles is that there will be no autumn session of parliament. It is alleged in the same despatch that the naval bill and the recognition of emergency conditions were responsible for the autumn session last year. Apparently there is no longer an emergency, and the Ottawa correspondent is now busy explaining why it will not be necessary to summon the house until January. It is alleged that several weeks are always occupied in the debate on the address, and discussions of a similar character, and that no real legislation is brought down or advanced to any degree until after the new year, and it is complicatedly added by this correspondent that under the new rules the government will be able to curtail such discussion, which means that if the Liberals attempted to secure a free discussion of matters of interest to the country, Mr. Borden would promptly apply closure to prevent them from exposing the short-comings of his government.

It is evident that the government has decided to hold on to office as long as possible. The emergency has been frankly abandoned, and Mr. Borden requires more time to develop something to take its place. He must adopt such a policy as will be satisfactory to his Nationalist allies, but he must also do something to satisfy the ultra-Imperialists of Ontario, and this makes his task rather difficult. Perhaps by the end of the year he may be able to patch up a policy of some sort, that will seem to

him and his colleagues to give promise of success in tiding them over another session. Sooner or later, however, the people must be consulted, and when that time arrives, Mr. Borden and his colleagues will be largely of his further anxiety concerning the administration of the affairs of Canada for some time to come.

The Times London cable today is very interesting, dealing with several topics of importance. The Tory party in the United Kingdom has seldom had weaker leadership than at the present time. Is Japan fomenting trouble in China? That appears to be the view of some London students of eastern affairs. The English Wesleyans are less disturbed over heresy charges than the Methodists of Canada. The latter will also gradually accept broader views.

What a blood-thirsty lot of people are those of the Balkan states. Evidently it will be a long time before they will become advocates of disarmament and world-peace. The summer is passing and there still appears to be no prospect of a street car service to East St. John. This is a matter which might fairly command the attention of the board of trade and city council.

The excavations for the renewal of some of the water pipes in the streets of St. John have shown that the system of distribution has many weak places, and that it will probably be necessary to purpose a good deal of money for renewal purposes each year for some years to come.

The board of trade does well to learn at once whether there is any foundation for the story that the government proposes to sell or lease the Long Wharf to the C. P. R. It would appear that the interests of St. John at the present time require much more vigilance on the part of the citizens than was the case when the city's interests were guarded at Ottawa by Hon. Wm. Pugsley as a member of the government.

Parties going up the river in motor boats on Saturday or Sunday should be careful not to over-crowd the boats. It is surprising that accidents have not occurred as a result of taking on board a small boat more persons than prudence would suggest. There is sometimes quite a heavy sea in Grand Bay, and the fact that the water is calm in the early part of the day is no guarantee that the white caps will not be tossing over that broad stretch of water when the boats are coming home late in the afternoon. It is not worth while to take a large risk for the sake of a day's outing, and therefore no citizen should consent to be the one too many or one of a dozen too many on a motor boat excursion.

THE GASOLINE PROBLEM "The demand for gasoline, caused by the rapidly increasing use of automobiles, motor boats, and gasoline engines on the farms and in factories, put too much of a burden on the one article until prices have reached a figure that is seriously felt by consumers, says the Oil City Derrick. The 220,000,000 barrels of oil obtained each year in the United States may be estimated to produce 1,870,000,000 gallons of gasoline, figuring the proportion at 17 per cent.

The most important experiments that have been made to increase motive power have been largely mechanical to permit the use of kerosene and crude. At Indianapolis recently an economy test was made on four different kinds of fuel—60 and 62 degrees gasoline, 48 degree kerosene and ordinary kerosene. The result was that the low grade kerosene made 22.2 miles to the gallon; the high grade kerosene, 21.6 miles; 60 gravity gasoline, 20.4 miles and 62 gravity gasoline, 20 miles. In speed tests also kerosene won out, producing greater speed to the amount consumed than any of the other grades. From such results it must inevitably follow that gasoline will soon lose its place as the one fuel product for motor, and other grades of petroleum will come into general use.

FOR LAZY HUSBANDS What is called the "lazy husband" law will come into effect in the State of Washington this month. Its object is to force a lazy husband to work for the support of his family, and it seeks to achieve that object in a direct and vigorous fashion. Instead of being sentenced to jail a man on being found guilty will be sentenced to a term of work, the state undertaking to find the work for him, and to give his wife and family \$1.50 a day as long as he remains idle. Most of the work will be done on the public roads, and the labor is hardly likely to be of a character to make a lazy husband anxious for a second term. The beauty of the law is that it does not punish the innocent, but strikes directly at the guilty, and may be reasonably expected to effect a cure.

SUNDAY, JULY 20 Jas. Crankshaw, one of the veterans of the bar in Montreal, is sixty-nine today. He was born in Manchester, England and came to Canada in 1878, since when he has practiced in Montreal. He is the author of a number of standard legal books.

W. D. Ross, general manager of the Metropolitan Bank of Canada, was born in New Glasgow, N. S. forty-four years ago today. He obtained his banking experience in the Bank of Nova Scotia and entered the service of the Metropolitan Bank as assistant general manager in 1902.

ARCHERY FLOURISHES IN OLD LAND; EXCELLENT MARKS London, July 18.—The record flight at the annual archery meeting at Le Touquet, France, 469 yards, has aroused much interest. It is not widely known that there is an excellent body of archers in London. At the Marylebone-archery societies in a modest way under the auspices of the Royal Toxophilite Society. Hitherto more than one member of the House of Commons may be seen wending his way. Here are arrows and arrows taken from the tombs of Egyptian kings, dating back to B. C. 2900. In a glass case is a small Turkish bow an arrow from which made a marvelous flight. The French flight of 469 yards 8 inches has been erroneously described as a record since 1794. The marvelous little Turkish bow of Regent's Park also has a record. During 1798 Mahmood Effendi, a member of the Turkish Legation, with this bow in Regent's Park shot an arrow 480 yards, as measured by three members of the R. T. S. Probably the longest distance flights of recent years were those set up at Le Touquet by Sir Ralph Payne Gallwey, Bart., in 1903. In private the distances covered were 420, 418 and 412 yards. At the meeting his distance was measured as 397 yards. Far from languishing, the sport of kings and outlaws is making satisfactory progress in this country, which possesses nearly eighty societies. Archery, like other patriotic sports, does not court publicity, and probably this accounts for the idea that the sport is dying out.

NEW LEADER OF THE BAR IN THE FRENCH CAPITAL

Henri Robert Succeeds the Noted Maitre Labori

Though Still Young He Has Figured in the Most Noted Cases of the Last Twenty Years

Paris, July 17.—Maitre Henri Robert, a celebrated criminal lawyer, has been elected head, or "batonnier," as the title is, of the Paris bar. His immediate predecessor was Maitre Labori, the famous defender of Dreyfus. To the distinguished order of "avocat" belong some of the principal politicians of the day. Indeed, it may be said that both chambers of the legislature are largely recruited from lawyers and doctors.

President Poincare would have been probably "batonnier" last year had he not been premier. Barthelemy, the actual head of the cabinet, already has occupied the position. Other lawyers of distinction in the present parliament are Maitre Millerand, late minister of war, and M. Aristide Briand, his colleague and superior in the cabinet.

The new "batonnier" is particularly "en vogue." The account of his career at the bar would be the record of the criminality of the last twenty years. Though he is still on the right side of fifty, and therefore to be accounted young in the great profession he adorns, he has been a prominent figure in "causes celebres" during two decades.

Of recent years his most famous client was Gallay, who embezzled a large sum of money from the Comptoir d'Escompte and then sailed the Southern Seas in a sumptuous yacht. He defended Wacive de Roo, who shot his mother, of whom he was very fond, because she was going to marry again; and recently he defended a woman who killed a rival to her husband's affections, and succeeded, thanks to Maitre Robert, in exciting the sympathy of the jury.

There is something irresistible in the eloquence of this famous pleader, who uses a latitude unknown in the foreign courts to secure the verdict. Every sort of appeal to sentiment and sensibility seems to be allowed by a French Judge, and "avocats" do not scruple to employ the arts of the stage to move the hearts of the good men and true who listen, in a judicial spirit, to their oratory.

It has the prodigious activity of great lawyers, of great workers who apply organization to enable them to accomplish more than the normal man. He seems to give more time to entertainment and to social life than the majority of his confreres who allow all their energies to be absorbed by the Palais de Justice.

At his table one meets a particularly interesting society, ministers of the republic, dukes of the old regime, princes of the empire. He removed the barriers which others set up.

Perhaps the greatest claim of Maitre Robert is to publicize his cases. He has delivered several lectures on this subject, and his oratory has attention to the part home influence plays in the development of the precocious lawyer.

In person Maitre Robert is tall and slim and he possesses the characteristic strong jaw of the successful legal wrestler.

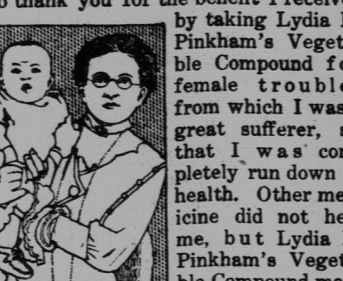

Take the factories from Sydney to Halifax and up to Amherst and consider how important it is for them that they should have a good connection with all the points in the near west and the far west, where their goods are consumed.

What we are coming at is this: The time is past when the I. C. R. can be purely a local road. If it wants to serve these provinces adequately, either by building its own line or acquiring one already built, it must extend to the west. Whenever it does this, it is not clear to everyone that it must put its local freight rates on a par with the company-owned roads, subject, of course, to such reductions as water competition may make necessary. We should not be at all surprised if this were one of the chief reasons why the present readjustment has been started.

Frequent experiments have shown that one single test of a cow's milk is as reliable as an indication of what percentage of fat her milk normally contains. A great many well known causes affect the test, also some causes that are unknown at present even to the closest students. This "variation in the test" is one of the puzzles of the cow's individuality and because of these puzzling variations it is advisable to take composite samples at intervals so as to ascertain the average test.

READY-MADE FARMS PROVE SUCCESSFUL

C. P. R. Industrial Agent's Report After Tour of Investigation

(Victoria Colonist)

"Ready-made farms are in great demand on the prairies," says D. C. Alexander, industrial agent of the C. P. R., who visited Victoria yesterday, and the probability is that the Natural Resources Department of the great railway corporation which is responsible for them, will greatly extend their operations next year.

"In Alberta and Saskatchewan, where I have been inspecting during the last few weeks, I find that they are a splendid success, not only in themselves, but in the type of immigration they are attracting from Great Britain and the United States. As a matter of fact, the demand for them has been greatly in excess of the supply and the coming year will doubtless see a far stronger demand than ever.

"Additional farms in these territories are now being prepared for next year by the C. P. R., and it is expected that within the next few years there will be a great string of these ready-made farms in operation. General farming is the basis of the work in the meantime, but the department is taking a very keen interest in the development of the cattle breeding industry in the west, and greater works along this line are to be looked for in the future."

An agent of a trans-Atlantic steamship line has written Mayor Gaynor of New York stating that 30,000 persons who were curious to see a new liner during its first stay in New York contributed at 50 cents each, the sum of \$15,000. A check for \$5,000 of this was enclosed with the request that the mayor distribute it among worthy charities, while the rest was distributed in Hoboken and among seamen's societies.

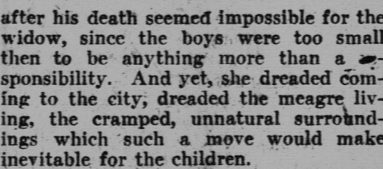

RAMSAY McDONALD, THE LABOR LEADER IN BRITISH COMMONWEALTH

Irish Politician's Place a Sinecure to His, Writes T. P. O'Connor--He is Fitted Intellectually For Place in the Cabinet

(By T. P. O'CONNOR, M. P.)

London, July 18--No man in British politics has so unenviable a position as Ramsay MacDonald, the leader of the Labor party. I have sometimes felt that an Irish politician--especially in the days when their ranks were divided--a task that was a greater strain on patience, courage and tenacity than any ordinary human being could be called upon to bear; but when I have glimpses into the inner life of the man in the labor movement, I have realized that the Irish politician lived, by comparison, in something approaching a political paradise.

Our people are, unless when they are rank or sham cranks, generous and loyal, and they give to their leaders an amount of confidence and of good will that few men in the hard world of politics are in the habit of receiving. In other political parties you often see the greatest and the most loyal service visited with capricious and unjust criticism. Take, for instance, the men who constitute a ministry. To the outside world they appear a number of great men trusted willingly, if not enthusiastically, with the command of a disciplined and loyal army, every man of which is ready to live, and almost die for them. An intimate knowledge of the inner life of the House of Commons would soon reveal to you that these leaders are being canvassed every hour of the day by their own supporters; that some of them are disliked, and nearly all of them are despised; that their motives are constantly being questioned; and that, in short, there is on the stage of politics as on the stage of the theatre house, an inner world of heart burning and of violent jealousy.

disinterested and more self-sacrificing than almost any other body of men. I am not pointing out that they are heroes after all; men with some of men's faults. The Labor Leader There is not the competition for office, which produces three-fourths of the jealousies of the other two great parties; but still labor men have offices of their own, and for each step they get they have to fight against every competitor. In 1909 a year, which has recently been given to members of parliament, offers something that is worth fighting for. And it is a fight where everybody has an equal right to go in and win if he can. I saw a good deal of the inner life of labor leaders during the great railway strike; and I then came to the conclusion that the ordinary outside idea that labor leaders were the violent men who led their men to extreme courses was altogether inaccurate. I realized that when a great strike with its suffering, especially among the women and children, takes place, every labor leader associated with it takes his official life in his hands; if the strike ends in a defeat, he is likely to go down with the defeat, and therefore, the labor leader appeared to me to be very cautious, sometimes almost timid before he entered into one of those terrific conflicts between capital and labor, and that capital, if it were wise and far-seeing would freely and amicably discuss matters with the labor leader rather than keep him at arm's length.

full meal. They are, therefore, always finding fault with their representatives in parliament who find themselves there to make any progress at all; for the British parliament even today is its antiquated rules and its still powerful and wealthy classes, to say nothing of the Irish complication--like a tempter trying to do the work of an angel. It is not surprising that there is a constant stream of vitriolic criticism being poured on the heads of Ramsay MacDonald and the other labor members of the House of Commons.

DEED OF GIFT OF NORTON GRIFFITH RACE TROPHY

This is the deed of gift of the Norton-Griffith trophy to encourage motor boat racing in St. John harbor.

I, Norton-Griffith, Esq., M. P., hereby offers a silver trophy or shield, suitably engraved, for an annual race to be held each year during the next five years, unless won three times by one individual. The first race to be held July 11th, 1912.

The St. John, N. B. Board of Trade or a committee of trustees appointed by them, to have full power to conduct such series of races, and to decide the winner thereof, also power is given them to change or add to the following conditions and rules when it is deemed best to do so in the interest of true sport and the furtherance of the objects for which this trophy is donated.

The aim of J. Norton-Griffith, Esq., in offering this trophy is to promote and encourage the building and racing of high speed motor boats, and to attract the attention of the world to the advantages afforded by the splendid facilities of the harbor, and the City of St. John, in handling the imports and exports of the country.

This series of races to be open to the world, for motor boats of 40 feet (L. W. L.) or under, no limit to be placed upon form, or motive power.

The trophy to be awarded to the boat owner securing the largest number of wins.

In the event of a tie in any one of the annual races, another race shall be run by the boats tied, within forty-eight hours after start of original race.

Should there be a tie in wins between boat owners after the five annual races have been run, the final possession of the trophy shall be decided by a race between boats owned by the said boat owners, within one week after date of last race.

The winner of each annual race shall be presented with a miniature replica of the shield, to have and to hold.

The races to take place on the waters of the harbor of St. John, the starting line and course to be decided upon by committee in charge.

All entries must be made in writing with the Secretary of the St. John Board of Trade, four days before day of race.

All boats must be measured by the committee in charge and owners must have their boats in readiness for measurement at least four days before day of race.

The usual measurement fee to be charged.

All racing boats to be weighed.

The board of trade, trustees or committee appointed by them shall advertise the date of race and conditions, and shall complete all arrangements for carrying on the races successfully.

All races to be run under the racing rules, regulations of measurements, and handicap rules of the American Power Boat Association, in force at the time of race, excepting where they may conflict with any of the conditions of this deed of gift. Reverse gears are not required.

No entrance fee to be charged.

There must be three entries, and starters, or no race.

Course not to be more than twenty-five knots or less than ten knots in length.

The trophy to remain in possession of the board of trade until completion of the series of races.

desired was reached—artisans who had left off school too soon and who wished to get an insight into the theory and fine points of their craft. Men as old as forty attended on each of the four nights a week and followed painstakingly the course in mechanical drawing in several classes. It is an interesting fact that in Vancouver, a city three times as large as St. John, there is a similar school in operation attended by more than 1,200 students, who are instructed by forty-four teachers. We have made a start here, but it is well to keep Vancouver's record in mind before we pride ourselves too highly on our own venture.

Music and Drawing
Music and drawing are two other subjects which are receiving a great deal of justified attention in other cities. Specialists are provided who give their whole time to the work. The importance of the subjects is recognized by those in charge of the schools here, but more prominence has not been given to advocating the employment of special instructors because such a step would require an outlay of money for which there is a more pressing need. Other cities, whose people are actuated by philanthropic motives, report very beneficial results from instruction in art, but as yet no educational act has been turned to suggest the adoption of such a course here.

Cost of Buildings Elsewhere
When the King Edward school was built last year at a cost of \$60,000, it was a great deal of adverse comment from different quarters on the so-called extravagance. It might be well to note that a great deal of the money was expended on the site and buildings in other cities before a final judgment was passed as to the degree of extravagance thus displayed. No fewer than four schools have been built in Vancouver during the last year at a cost ranging from \$65,000 to \$78,000; one building cost \$150,000; two sites \$185,000, while Victoria, a city very little larger than St. John, erected a high school last year which took \$400,000.

Amherst, N. S., spent as much as St. John on its latest school, while Campbellton's cost nearly as much. Such sums of money, spent willingly as the reports show, manifest very clearly that the rate-payers in these cities appreciate the value of the work upon which the money is being expended. Carlin, who had been in the west for some time, returned to Tweed recently because of ill health. He was in a very weak condition and yesterday he asked his wife to give him a sponge bath. He seemed to be as well as usual when the bath began, but the wife was suddenly struck with the extreme pallor of his face. She asked him to sit down and rest.

Carlin made no response and the woman looking at him closely, found that he was dead. He had died standing upright and remained in that position.
