TAKE 50 IN UNIFORM IN BIG RESORT RAID

Police Make Sunday Morning Descent Upon Cafes in Upper Broadway

Instigated in Washington — Army and Navy May Take Drastic Action Unless City is Cleaned up-Many Women Detained

Betyeen fifty and sixty soldiers and sailors, under the influence of liquor, were found in the company of women, most of whom had been arrested several times, according to District Attorney Swann, who supervised a raid by police detectives yesterday morning, between two and four o'clock, upon nearly a score of all night restaurants and clubs, between Forty-fourth and Fifty-fourth street and Sixth and Seventh Avenues.

While this raid was going on Army Intelligence officers were making a careful survey of the same territory, and some of the intoxicated men in uniform, found by the District Attorney's raiders, were turned over to them. The purpose of the investigation by the army officers, it was stated, was largely for the purpose of reporting to Washington on moral conditions in New York City, which had caused dissatisfaction in the Army and Navy Departments recently, according to dispatches from Washington.

District Attorney Swann said the raids carried out by members of his staff, in co-operation with the police, were undertaken largely at the instigation or army officers, who reported to him that they needed help in preventing the sale or presentation of liquor and drugs to soldiers and sailors. It was reported last night that unless drastic action is taken by the New York authorities to suppress vice and the sale of liquor to men in uniform the War and Navy Departments when interest themselves energetically in the situation. When asked last night if it had been intimated to him that drastic action would be taken by the government unless the New York authorities succeeded in bringing about satisfactory conditions promptly, Judge Swann refused to answer.

During two hours, in which raiding parties of detectives were sent into one restaurant and club after another, a total of more than 100 prisoners were gathered up and taken to police stations, where thirty-three were finally held as prisoners.

Smith, the murder of Harry Cohen, alias "Harry the Yot," who was killed last Monday morning, was planned, and an alibi for Morris Rothenberg, the alleged murderer, was composed and rehearsed by several witnesses who have appeared in favor of Rothenberg.







SELLING BITS OF FRANCE AT FIFTY GERMANS AN ACRE

French Quite Prepared To Sell Several Square Miles at Same Ghastly Price

Flood of Huns Dammed - Those Remarkable Tacticians Haig and Petain Will Take Terrible Vengeance Soon

Paris, April 10-"We have been selling bits of our ground at the price of fifty French officer in reply to a question when he was brought back to a hospital in the rear. He went on:

"We are perfectly prepared to sell them several square miles more at the same price, but they certainly will not

get through."

This statement voices the absolute confidence of the French army and people. The salient fact of the situation is that the German rush on Amiens has been stopped, and the flood has been dammed, as General Foch expressed it in his talk with the newspaper men.

Observers here are satisfied that the strategic direction of the battle, which has been given to Foch, is in the best possible hands, and that it was to enable "those remarkable tacticians, Petain and Haig" as Marcel Hutin calls them, even with their slightly, but only very slightly, smaller forces to take terrible vengeance on the closely packed masses, of

May Be New Verdun.

The German attack on Amiens promises to develop into a new Verdun, but with the difference that already much heavier losses have been inflicted on the Germans in a few days than during the several months before Verdun.

Gustave Herve points out that at Verdun two years ago the Germans succeeded almost at a bound on the fifth day of their attack in reaching and taking Douaumont, which was six miles from the Verdun bridges. It took them until the 24th of the following June, however, to reach the outer defenses of the Souville fort. Even then they were still two miles from the town.



London, April 10—In moving the second reading of the man power bill in the house of commons today, which was finally passed by a vote of 823 to 100, Sir George Cave, unionist member for Surrey, said it was the duty of the country to do everything it could do and that only they should it be entitled to that only then should it be entitled to use to the fullest extent the fielp given by its allies. Sir George declared that he had been advised that the appucation of the man power bill to Ireland would yield a large number of men, but if only five divisions could be got from Ireland it would be worth while. He did not believe the army would be needed to force the operation of the measure. The speaker added that even if there was an Irish parliament today the question of conscription in Ireland still would rest with the Imperial parliament. Sir George, being continually interrupted by Natioalist members, said he doubted whether the voice of Ireland had yet been heard in the matter. The speaker of the House appealed to the Irish members to give Sir George a fair hearing.

FRENCH READJUST RENTS.

New Law Aims to Require Those Who Can Pay to Do So.

Paris, March 6—(Correspondence of Associated Press)—Parliament has just settled the question of war rents in France, and landlords who have had the moratorium hanging over them since the beginning of the war know at last the beginning of the war know at last upon what they may count. The general principle of the law just passed is that he who can pay must pay. It is a complicated measure, since the object was to satisfy at the same time, so far as possible, the landlord who wants his money and the tenant who cannot pay.

Tenants who are mobilized, or who have been out of work and whose rent is the equivalent of no more than \$100 a year in Paris and from \$80 to \$70 a year in provincial towns are released from all obligation to pay rent from the beginning of the war to the end of the first half year succeeding the signing of peace. Soldiers or workmen who have earned in the army or out of it a fourth of their earnings before the war must pay rent. Tenants of other categories paying the same rentals are obliged to

pay rent. Tenants of other categories paying the same rentals are obliged to settle from the beginning of the war unless they can show that they have suffered from the conflict.

The law is a disappointment to two classes. The owners of the cheaper apartment houses and the men who expected that all war rents would be canceled and have spent the rent money for other things, consider that parliament has been partial. The general opinion is, that the arrangement is the best possible under the circumstances.

Some landlords will be hard hit, but those whose incomes from real estate did not exceed 10,000 francs before the war

not exceed 10,000 francs before the war in Paris and 5,000 francs in the prov-inces are accorded an indemnity of 50 per cent of the rentals they lose payable by the state in ten annuities. All landlords meeting losses through the measure are entitled to a reduction in the amount of their taxes proportionate to their losses and to an extension of time for the payment of interest on mort-

gages.
Other clauses of the law protect soldiers and their families from expulsion and seizure and provide automatic ex-tension of leases where the interests of
