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LAWS AND REGULATIONS
OF THE
British and Foreign Bible Society.

I. The designation of this Society shall be, **THE BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY**, of which the main object shall be to encourage a wider circulation of the Scriptures, without note or comment; the only copies in the language of the United Kingdom, to be circulated by the Society, shall be the Authorized Version.

II. This Society shall add its endeavors to those employed by other societies, for circulating the Scriptures through the British Dominions; and shall also, according to its ability extend its influence to other countries, whether Christian, Mahometan, or Pagan.

III. Each subscriber of One Guinea annually shall be a Member.

IV. Each subscriber of Ten Guineas at one time shall be a Member for Life.

V. Each subscriber of Five Guineas annually shall be a Governor.

VI. Each subscriber of Fifty Pounds at one time, or who shall by one additional payment, increase his original subscription to Fifty Pounds, shall be a Governor for Life.

VII. Governors shall be entitled to attend and vote at all Meetings of the Committee.

VIII. An Executor, paying a bequest of Fifty Pounds shall be a Member for Life; or of One Hundred Pounds, a Governor for Life.

IX. A Committee shall be appointed to conduct the business of the Society, consisting of Thirty-six Laymen, six of whom shall be foreigners, resident in London or its vicinity; half the remainder shall be members of the Church of England, and the other half members of other denominations of Christians. Twenty-seven of the above number, who shall have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.

The Committee shall appoint all Officers, except the Treasurer, and call special meetings, and shall be charged with procuring for the Society suitable patronage, both British and Foreign.

X. Each member of the Society shall be entitled, under the direction of the Committee, to purchase Bibles and Testaments at the Society's prices, which shall be as low as possible.

XI. The Annual Meeting of the Society shall be held on the first Wednesday in May, when the Treasurer and Committee shall be chosen, the accounts presented, and the proceedings of the foregoing year reported.

XII. The President, Vice Presidents, and Treasurer, shall be considered *ex officio*, members of the Committee.

XIII. Every Clergyman or Dissenting Minister, who is a member of the Society, shall be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.

XIV. The Secretaries for the time being shall be considered as members of the Committee; but no other person deriving any emolument from the Society shall have that privilege.

XV. At the General Meeting, and at Meetings of the Committee, the President, or in his absence the Vice-President first upon the list then present; and in the absence of the Vice-Presidents, the Treasurer; and in his absence, such member as may be voted for that purpose, shall preside at the meeting.

XVI. The Committee shall meet on the first Monday in every month, or oftener if necessary.

XVII. The Committee shall have the power of nominating such persons as have rendered essential services to the Society, either MEMBERS FOR LIFE, or GOVERNORS FOR LIFE.

XVIII. The Committee shall also have the power of nominating HONORARY MEMBERS from among Foreigners, who have promoted the objects of the Society.

XIX. The whole of the Minutes of every General Meeting shall be signed by the Chairman.

REGULATIONS.

ADOPTED AT THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF THE SOCIETY
IN 1826 AND 1827.

I. That the fundamental law of the Society, which limits its operations to the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, be fully and distinctly recognized as excluding the circulation of the Apocrypha.

II. That in conformity to the preceding resolution, no pecuniary aid be granted to any Society circulating the Apocrypha; nor, except for the purpose of being applied in conformity to the said resolution, to any individual whatever.

III. That in all cases in which grants, whether gratuitous or otherwise, of the Holy Scriptures, either in whole or in part, shall be made to any Society, the books issued be bound, and on the express condition that they shall be distributed without alteration or addition.

IV. That all grants of the Society which circulate the Apocrypha, be made under the express condition that they be sold or distributed without alteration or addition; and that the proceeds of the sale of any such copies of the Scriptures be held at the disposal of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

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LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

Nova Scotia Bible Society.

- I. This Society shall be called **THE BIBLE SOCIETY OF NOVA SCOTIA AND ITS DEPENDENCIES**; the objects of which shall be the same as that of the British and Foreign Bible Society, viz: to encourage the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, without note or comment, and to furnish copies of the Scriptures *gratis* to the indigent and at reduced prices to those requiring them.
- II. The business of the Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Secretary and Committee.
- III. In order to give effect to the designs of this Institution, benefactions and subscriptions shall be solicited, and books opened for receiving the names of benefactors and subscribers.
- IV. Every person contributing annually Ten Shillings at one time or a donation of Ten Pounds, shall be considered a Member of the Society.
- V. A General Meeting of the Members of this Society will be held every year, before which will be laid the accounts and proceedings of the preceeding year.
- VI. The whole of the subscriptions and donations, after deducting incidental expenses, shall be remitted annually in aid of the funds of the British and Foreign Bible Society.
- VII. Every Member of this Society shall be entitled to purchase, under the direction of the Committee, Bibles and Testaments at the reduced prices of the Society, which are as low as possible.
- VIII. The Committee shall be authorized to meet for the purpose of conducting the business of the Society as often as may be necessary, and shall have power to add to their numbers as occasion may require.

The Chair was taken by the Rev. R. F. UNIARCE, the President, at half-past seven o'clock.

The President called upon the Rev. MR. ELLIOTT to give a hymn and engage in prayer.

The President addressed the meeting.

The SECRETARY read the Forty-first report of the Committee.

It was, on motion of Rev. MR. CAMPBELL, seconded by P. C. HILL, Esq.

RESOLVED,—That the Report, an abstract of which has just been read, be received and adopted as the Forty-first Report of the Nova-Scotian Auxiliary Bible Society, and that the same be printed, with the usual appendages for circulation, under the direction of the Committee.

It was moved by the Rev. Mr. LATHERN, seconded by Mr. Alexander Russell, the Society's Agent,

RESOLVED,—That this meeting would contemplate with thankfulness the great work which God has accomplished by means of the British and Foreign Bible Society, during the past sixty-five years, and resolve in the exercise of faith, prayer and legitimate effort, to seek the full accomplishment of the work of the Society—that every child of the fallen family of

Adam may be able to read in his own tongue the wonderful works of God.

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REPORT.

The Committee of the Nova Scotia Auxiliary Bible Society beg leave again to appear before their friends and patrons with their usual Annual Report. They would again tender to the Giver of every good and perfect gift, their grateful and devout thanks for His preserving care during the past year. They appear before you with unbroken ranks, and feel it right first of all to refer to this, ere they make mention of their proceedings.

The work during the past year has been marked with the usual steady progress. Every effort has been made to stimulate the circulation of the Word of Life both in the Capital and throughout the Branch Societies, and the Agent, Mr. Russell, has been unwearied in his efforts to carry out the instructions of the Committee. The work of Bible circulation is well appreciated throughout the Province, and the friends of the Society esteem it an honor to be engaged in it. It is of course largely of a routine character, affording few instances worthy of special remark, but it is nevertheless effectual in the advancement of pure and undefiled religion, by placing in the hands of the people that book which can alone make them wise unto salvation. The work of your Committee in this

Province has never been objected to, as the Scriptures furnished are always those of the authorized version, published by the Society, and without note or comment. Only occasionally have other than English Bibles and Testaments been circulated, the exception being the sale of a few Gaelic or German Scriptures to some few of our population who might now and then require them. There has, therefore, never been an unfriendly feeling towards the operations of your Committee. But now and then objections have been raised to the proceedings of the Parent Society in their mode of supplying the spiritual wants of the peoples of the earth, and these objections have had to be met. Last year your agent, Mr. Russell, felt it necessary to reply to the strictures of some persons who individually disapproved of the course adopted by the Parent Society in the above particular, and it is hoped the subject may now be considered as finally disposed of.*

The one aim of the Parent Society is to save souls, the means they have used for this purpose have been blessed of God, and have advanced the kingdom of our Blessed Redeemer in the earth, and your Committee have such confidence in the Parent Committee and in the agents they employ, that they feel only the more determined in their humble way to aid them in their prosecution of so great a work as that in which they have been so long and successfully engaged.

Without further preface your Committee would now refer to a few details of this great work. They begin with France.

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Of this country they say, that it cannot be said that the Bible work in France has entered upon any new phase of its history, or assumed any complexion differing from that of recent years. The same course of action has been pursued as usual. No channel of circulation has been closed, nor is any reactionary influence to be observed, either in regard to the general indulgence extended to their operations by the authorities, or the disposition manifested by the people towards the reception of the Scriptures.

It cannot be doubted, they say, that as the results of efforts made at the Paris Exhibition in 1867, the Scriptures were widely diffused over France. The Bible has become more generally and intelligently known, and the gross notions many entertained, as to the principles of Protestantism, have been successfully dispelled. The agent, M. de Prossence, gives the circulation of the year in this country as amounting to 113,077 copies, and the total circulation of the Society in France at five millions and a half of copies.

The Committee proceed to say that there is a point of great importance in carrying out the work which requires to be calmly and dispassionately considered. The testimony of practical men, who have done the real work of Bible distribution, and who know better than foreigners can do the actual circumstances under which their labors have to be prosecuted, and the success which has attended them, is certainly deserving of respectful consideration. In referring to his unceasing efforts to fulfil the instructions of the Committee with regard to encouraging in every way

a preference for Ostervald's translation of the Scriptures, and showing how largely the issues of Ostervald's exceed those of DeSacy's version, M. de Presence proceeds to say :

"You will then understand that while fully entering into your views in regard to the employment of means, which have a tendency considerably to restrict the circulation of the Volgate version, it is necessary that I, as well as our Colporteurs, should act with an amount of reserve and prudence which does not exclude faithfulness, as I have on many occasions stated to your Committee, were they at once to determine that their agents in France, should not be allowed to circulate any copies of the Bible or Testament but those of the version of Ostervald or Martin, such a decision would not merely to a considerable extent diminish the number of the purchasers of the Scriptures, but we should thereby expose ourselves to the risk of having the whole work visited with an interdict from the Government Authorities. These Authorities, who hitherto have been so favourably disposed towards us, are, as you will have learned from my communications, very narrowly watched, under the extraordinary circumstances of our country at the present moment, by the more influential leaders of the ultra-papist party, who are just now in high favour in certain ranks of the more powerful members of the Government. If then, it were to be surmised, either by the Minister of the Interior, or by the Prefects of our Departments, that the exclusive aim of Bible Colportage was to place Protestant books only in the hands of all, this work would at once be regarded as one of mere Protestant propagandism, and most assuredly they would cease to tolerate it under any pretext. In support of this assertion, I would mention the unfortunate prohibition recently issued against the distribution of New

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Testaments at Toulon among the convicts about to be transported to the colonies, on the ground that the addition, by persons not connected with the Society, to the New Testaments distributed, of Protestant religious tracts, positively proved that it was a work of Protestant propagandism which it was sought to effect, and which could, on no account, be permitted. I might, in addition, advert to various difficulties of recent occurrence, which, happily, were at once surmounted in three, if not four, departments, where the Colporteurs were threatened with a withdrawal of their authorizations, for the assigned reason that certain of their acts clearly proved that their exclusive aim was to promote the cause of Protestantism. What must be thought of such a fact, or of such facts, for they are of very frequent occurrence, as the following, for the authenticity of which I can vouch.

“A Colporteur arrives in a parish where the Sacred Scriptures are utterly unknown. He is received with mistrust at the outset, and this mistrust is increased as the result of the measures taken by the curé, who goes from house to house, everywhere proclaiming that this vendor of books is none other than a dangerous Protestant, the sole aim of whose efforts is to overturn the Roman Catholic Church, which is the strength and the glory of the people of France. The Colporteur does not suffer himself to be discouraged. He assures his opponents that the only thing which he seeks is to make every one acquainted with the Gospel of the Saviour Jesus Christ, so that they may become as happy as he has been ever since he received this Gospel in his heart. To this, he adds, that he is able to offer this Gospel in a translation, which the curé can on no account be permitted to proscribe, since it was made by a member of his own Church. After such a declaration, the people are disposed to listen more favourably to the Colporteur,

and, in the end, he succeeds in inducing them to purchase of him a copy of the New Testament of De Sacy. But the real value of such a sale is this,—the Colporteur carefully abstains from everything in the shape of controversy. His appeals are grounded on the very words of the Saviour himself: in a word, on the fundamental truths of salvation. God is pleased to make use of so feeble an instrument to awaken a desire to know more of the matter, and for the attainment of this object, people set about reading the New Testament. The result of this has frequently been, that when the Colporteur re-visits the same parish, he has the joy to meet with several persons, who apply to him not for a New Testament only, but for a copy of the whole Bible. And what is very remarkable is this:—as when reading the New Testament, translated by De Sacy, the only one which, at the outset, they would accept, it has been found that in order to become a Christian, it was necessary to do something far otherwise than simply to attend to the directions of the curé, many persons have expressed the wish to possess the whole of the Word of God in as faithful a form as it might be possible to procure it. The result has been that, on the advice of the Colporteur, they have eagerly bought a copy of the Bible, according to the version of Ostervald or Martin. Since the question relating to the circulation of the version of De Sacy has so much occupied the attention of the Committee, I have endeavoured, as far as this was practicable, to collect information as to the number of Protestant Bibles which have been applied for by persons after reading the New Testament of De Sacy. While certainly keeping within the limits of what is really the case, I can state that, for the past quarter, for instance, the number has exceeded two hundred copies. And, judging from the declarations of all the persons who have arrived at such a decision, it is quite possible

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that these Bibles would not thus have been applied for, if the New Testament of De Sacy had not, in the first instance, been supplied. One other item of experience, which I regard as very decisive, is the following. During the period when I took an active part in the operations of the Evangelical Society of France, I was not the only one to discover that the extensive religious movements which were witnessed at that period, and which led to the establishment of Protestant Churches, which are in existence and prospering at the present moment, had their origin in the dissemination of copies of the New Testament of De Sacy, by the instrumentality of which alone it was practicable to do anything among those populations, who would at once have assumed a hostile position, if, in order to attract their attention, any action had been attempted among them having at all the semblance of a work of Protestant propagandism."

The Colportage in France, both in Paris and throughout the departments, continues to exhibit its usual great success. The Colporteurs engaged in Paris come into frequent contact with the abettors of Atheism, who abound among the working classes. M. de Pressencé states :

"Equally with his colleagues, one of our Colporteurs, more frequently than was formerly the case, now visits the small establishments, so numerous all over Paris, which are frequented by the workmen after their day's labour is over, to take their humble evening meal ; after which, while smoking their pipes and emptying some glasses of wine, they hold a species of meeting, at which, in turn, they touch upon every subject, whether political or social, which may form the current topic of the day. On evening, then, and the incident is of recent occurrence, our friend before referred to, having taken his seat for his own account

at one of these establishments, after waiting some time, during which he very carefully abstained from taking any part in the political discussion which was going on, took out an octavo Bible of Ostervald from his bag, and placed it, in a manner to attract attention, on the table at which he was sitting. On seeing the book, the persons present began inquiring what that large volume might be. "The Bible," he replied in a loud and intelligible voice. "The Bible! the Bible! take it away, or hide it as quickly as possible. Anything rather than see that book in which the Pope and his clique have inserted such absurd fables! It irritates us and makes us savage;" was heard from all quarters of the room. It was easy for our friend to reply to such an outburst, and he did it in a way which, certainly, gave no one cause for believing that he was a partisan of the Pope. And then availing himself of the less unfriendly manner in which they seemed disposed to listen to him, he began to give expression to his Christian views and convictions, which he did with as much seriousness as energy. Without making any irritating allusions to the expressions which had been uttered, he proceeded to show that those who wished to have nothing to do with God, or with His Word, could not possibly have any desire to be happy. Numerous replies, both violent and blasphemous, were addressed to him, but he did not allow himself to be either alarmed or shaken in his purpose. Up to the very close of the discussion he continued with much warmth of heart to entreat those who were listening to him to mistrust their own opinion, and to get rid of their prejudices against the Bible, about which they knew nothing; and at last, to his great delight, the one among the workmen who, owing to his readiness of speech, was evidently regarded as the great orator of the company, and who, consequently, had given utterance to the greatest amount of absurdity

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and blasphemy, came up to our friend, and holding out his hand, said to him, "I cannot believe that you are acting a part, as is generally the case with the members of the priestly body; there cannot be any doubt about the matter; you love your fellow-creatures, and are really desirous of making them happy. Being quite sure of this, I must buy one of your Bibles, as I want to become acquainted with it, and I now invite you to repeat your visit here, that we may again have some talk together." Three other workmen, led on by this example, provided themselves each with a copy of the New Testament. I would repeat what I have stated above, that with some slight variations, similar incidents are now of frequent occurrence in Paris, and very nearly one hundred copies, all of the Protestant version, have been recently purchased under like circumstances. Who can have any doubt, after hearing this, and at a time when the atheists have set on foot an actual and formidable campaign, of the urgent necessity there is of strengthening, rather than in any wise weakening, the work of Bible Colportage?"

The following extract may give some idea of the results of Colportage in the Departments:—

"Only a few days still remain during which I shall stay in the department of ——— and where, in my opinion, much still remains to be done for the dissemination of the Word of God; a work which can be done by the two colleagues, who are employed in the neighbouring departments. During the nineteen months in which I have been at work in the department, with intervals of suspension of longer or shorter duration, no one has ever insulted me, nor has any one even displayed any opposition calculated in any wise to hinder my work. While keeping below the actual reality, I can state that upwards of 800 souls have received impressions of so serious a nature, that

I am fully warranted in believing that they will not content themselves with a secession from the Romish Church, in which all these persons have been brought up, but that by continuing to read the Scriptures, as they are now in the habit of doing, they will before long enter as cordially and publicly the true Church of Jesus Christ. As far as it is permitted to a human creature to be absolutely positive in such a matter, among the number of persons more than well-disposed to whom I have just referred, I know eighty at the very least who have been enlightened to salvation. Upwards of 2,000 persons, on each occasion when I have passed their houses, have asked me to walk in and rest myself. The same number have frequently solicited me to take a seat at their tables in order to prolong my intercourse with the family. About 3000 persons have made me promise to call on them every time I might happen to be in their neighbourhood. The Authorities have always and immediately renewed my authorization, and always with much friendliness. Eleven medical men, to whom I have sold a Bible, have given me good and useful advice how to augment the number of my sales, and their patronage has positively contributed to produce such an augmentation. I have only been decidedly repulsed on a single occasion, whilst hundreds have told me in every form that it would gratify them were I to take up my permanent residence among them. Consequently, it would be very easy to establish churches in various localities in this field of labour were we in possession of religious liberty. Certainly I should be an unworthy egotist were I to imagine that all this could be attributable to my efforts. This happy change has been brought about, little by little, in the course of a long series of years, by the sole means of the dissemination of the Word of God. That I was well received in almost every house was frequently owing to the fact that a friendly Colporteur had been

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there, perhaps years ago, before me, and that his visit had never been forgotten. I will then conclude by repeating that if some amount of good has been accomplished, it is due to the work of various Colporteurs who have laboured here, and not to the efforts of one only."

In BELGIUM the work goes on with great success, the circulation of the year amounting to 12,781 copies. Referring to the translations circulated in this country, the Committee say that during the year remarkable testimony has been given to the importance of continuing to circulate, so long as the necessity exists, the translation of the Bible by DeSacy, if the work is to have any influence among Roman Catholics; nor is the testimony less clear and emphatic that the use of DeSacy's translation has been the powerful means of promoting Protestantism in Belgium. Facts are sounder logic than theories, and when God is pleased to put the seal of His approbation upon the course hitherto pursued by the Society, can there be any valid reason why you should retire from a sphere of labour in which such results have been obtained as are continually connected with the salvation of souls, and the extension of Christ's kingdom? A paragraph is quoted from the report of the Colporteur Debouille, in the following words:—

"Those who have not seen them can form no idea of the efforts made by the Roman Catholic clergy to persuade their parishioners that our Bibles are mutilated and falsified. In the pulpit and in private conversations they say the Colporteurs sell bad books to corrupt public morals. Often when travelling,

either on foot or by railway, I meet priests who tell me my Books are falsified. In such cases my first resource is to place before them De Sacy's Bible, and the conversation which has ensued has often led to the sale, not only of De Sacy's, but also of Martin's Bible. A great many Pastors, evangelists and others declare that De Sacy's Bible has been, in God's hand, the means of bringing souls to a knowledge of Christ. To mention my own case. A Testament of De Sacy was the principal means of my being called to the Gospel. I was brought up by an aunt, a *sœur noire*, who daily read the New Testament to my brother and myself, or made us read it by turns. This continued till the age of fourteen, when we lost our aunt, and ceased to read the Scriptures. But later the seed thus sown brought forth fruit, and by the grace of God I am now a Bible Colporteur, and my brother, who lives in a small town where there are only two Protestants, persists in his opposition to the errors of the Church of Rome, and in making profession of believing in the Word of God. If my memory did not fail I could mention numbers of cases which prove the importance of circulating the translation from the Vulgate. The time has not yet come to withdraw De Sacy's Bible without retarding the progress of the kingdom of God. De Sacy's Bible, circulated in the Borinage for the last thirty years, has not been fruitless. Throughout the environs of Charleroi, in the houses of many peasants, I find De Sacy's Bible or Testament. These people nearly all still belong to the Church of Rome, yet they tell me their cures have made incessant attempts to get their books from them. The approbations have been to them a solid argument to prove to the priests that the books must be good, and it is owing to the approbations, that many have refused to part with De Sacy's Bible, while innumerable copies of Martin's Bible have been burnt or torn up, and that in many cases for want of these

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very approbations. The intention of comparing Martin and De Sacy has often led to the purchase of the former. How many parishes in Belgium are there which have received with joy the preachers of the Gospel after having been prepared by the sole teaching of De Sacy's Bible !"

Mr. Kirkpatrick then observes in regard to the subject :—

"You will remark that in the course of Deboullé's report, he several times insists on the importance of our continuing to circulate De Sacy's version, not because it is more faithful as a translation, or because it is to be regarded as invested with any superior authority, which would make us prefer it to our Protestant versions, but merely because in a country where the population has been so long accustomed to listen with respect to all their priests tell them, and where the priests systematically forbid the reading of the Scriptures, a version that was, when originally published, approved of by the Church, and was consequently a good book then, cannot, whatever the priests may say, with fairness be held to be a bad book now. People in England can with difficulty place themselves in the position of a Roman Catholic population, brought up in ignorance of religious questions, accustomed from youth to submit blindly to their priests as to the only authority in all that concerns their highest interests, and naturally prejudiced against strangers, who, they are easily persuaded, want for some not very intelligible purpose to get them to change their religion. They cannot appreciate arguments about translations from the original. All they know is—if they know so much—that the Scriptures were confided to the safe keeping of the Church and through it have been handed down to us. Why should it not be true that the Church is the proper interpreter of the Oracles of God, and has the right to forbid the exercise of private judgment ?

The Colporteur comes with no authority to confirm his assertions ; he sells Protestant books, and is employed by an English Society, with apparently no other object than to make the people leave the Church in which they were bred, and which is to guide them to heaven. If the Colporteur only sells our Protestant version he will have no means of reaching a large body of seriously-inclined Catholics, who trust in the assertions of their priests, whom they know, and with whom they are in constant contact, rather than in those of the Colporteur, who makes his appearance periodically as a stranger. But when the Colporteur can produce a Vulgate version, and show that this version has been approved and authorised by the Doctors of the Church, and can challenge comparison with the Bible that the cure is allowed to read and to quote, the case changes its aspect, curiosity is excited, and it is thought worth while to hear both sides of the question, and thus often the Testament is bought, is kept and is read.

"All we want to know is whether certain versions taken as a whole, are fit to be circulated by the Society. In theory there may be a difference of opinion, in practice we have only to apply the test given us by the Lord himself: "By their fruits ye shall know them." When we see the great results that have followed the circulation of translations from the Vulgate—when we know that all the Protestant Pastors of Belgium are of opinion that the time has not yet come to lay them aside, and that the good Christian men we employ as colporteurs strongly advocate their being kept on sale—when we are told that most if not all, the Protestant Churches of Belgium owe their first beginnings to the De Sacy's translation—when we see that the Gospel, and the whole Gospel, is to be found, despite some few mistranslations, in the Vulgate—and when we know of no single case where an honest serious Catholic has been led to deny

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the saving truths of the Gospel through reading De Sacy's version, but, on the contrary, that a great many have read, and continued to read with fruit, and have refrained from destroying or parting with the Vulgate, when they would not have read or kept Protestant versions, and when our Committee are ready to suppress, and have suppressed, such versions wherever and whenever they have been found in practice to be unnecessary or no longer wanted. Then, so long as we are actuated by a sincere and single-minded desire for the advancement of Christ's kingdom and the salvation of souls, it seems to me that the justification of the course adopted by the Society is complete."

In HOLLAND the issues of the past year have been 24,741, that is 1,056 copies beyond the issue of the year preceding.

GERMANY is stated to be the largest sphere of continental operations occupied by the Society. The magnitude of that country, its enormous population, and the wants of the people, afford ample scope for the development of the Parent Society's work. A wonderful diffusion of the Scriptures has been effected, and for years past the annual circulation of copies has been numbered by hundreds of thousands. The circulation during the last year has amounted to considerably more than 300,000 copies. To show the varied population which has been benefitted by this work, it may be stated that the Scriptures have been distributed among people speaking the following languages, viz.: German, Bohemian, Danish, Dutch, French, Italian, Polish, and Russian; besides those which are spoken in Hungary.

An important event occurred last year in Germany. This was the inauguration of an imposing memorial at Worms in honor of Martin Luther, the celebration of which exhibited the fact that the heart of Germany beats with true loyalty to the great principles of the Reformation. As Luther fought the battle of the Reformation with the Sword of the Spirit, which is the Word of God, and as the ceremony of inaugurating the memorial was likely to bring multitudes to the scene, the Agent of the Society thought that a suitable and modest erection for the sale of the Scriptures on the spot, and under the very shadow of the monument would be a most appropriate mode of doing honor to the brave man, whose sanctified learning and indomitable energy gave to Germany her much prized and deeply venerated translation of the Bible.

The Bible stall was erected much to the joy of thousands. Blessings were profusely lavished upon the Society, which had made Luther's glorious version so acceptable to all classes; and during the three days that the exhibition lasted 859 copies were sold.

The description of the events is graphic and interesting, as given by Mr. Davis, from whose report the following extract is quoted:

"This monument being the monument of the Reformation, and of the Holy Scriptures as the book of the people, what could be more in harmony with the spirit of the festival than the exhibition and sale of Luther's greatest work—his German Bible? Yet to obtain permission to do this was a work of the greatest difficulty. It was only through the intervention of the highest civil functionaries that the difficulties

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were at last overcome, and the Bible-stall brought from Baden allowed to be set up. But the place then assigned to it was a place of honor, on the promenade right in front of the entrance into the great enclosure where the monument stands. Once there, everybody felt it ought to be there. To compare small things with great: the monument proclaimed in granite and bronze that the Bible was the great want of the sixteenth and preceding centuries; our little table proclaimed more modestly, but not less tellingly, that the Bible is the great want of the nineteenth century as well—a witness not unneeded; for thousands acknowledge the preaching of the monument who roundly deny the preaching of our modest table and its treasures of the written Word."

"But thousands understood the message of our table that day. The sale continued on the Thursday and Friday. On these days a perpetual stream set in towards it, and Senior Colporteur Weiser and Colporteur Martin Messer had their hands full. I have never in my experience of the sale of Scriptures seen two such days as these. On the Thursday the men had literally no time to eat or drink. Pastors, professors, merchants, mechanics, peasants, all were there rejoicing at our work, or supplying themselves with the Word of God. One peasant said to me, "After all, this is the genuine monument of Martin Luther." Others said, "I promised my family a memento of the festival; this is the best memento, a beautiful copy of Martin Luther's translation of the Holy Bible." It was singular to see how the enthusiasm became contagious, extending even to the Catholics and Jews. Two women, mother and daughter, approached the stall, and looked long at a copy of Luther's Bible, talking earnestly the while. Then they went away. Then they returned again, and again looked at the volume. Our Colporteurs were much too busy to heed them. I therefore advanced,

and they at once addressed me and said, "We are Catholics, but we think it a shame not to read Luther's Bible; for, after all, it is the Book of God, and it was Martin Luther who again gave it to the people." I encouraged them by all means to carry out their purpose, and they at once advanced to the table and paid for the book. One young man, a converted Jew, was especially zealous in going among the crowds, and directing their attention to the Bible-stall. Again and again did he return, bringing purchasers with him.

"The clergy, German and Foreign French, Dutch, Russian, Swiss, expressed their delight at finding the Society there. One, a celebrated Dutch Professor, whose acquaintance I made many years ago, said, "This is the right thing in the right place; and, what is more, it ought to be a permanent institution at the foot of this glorious monument."

"One interesting feature of our table was a large folio Bible of the year 1541, printed in Wittenberg. I had it placed on the table because I thought it would interest the theological public. It lay open, and on it a Pearl Bible, a pocket edition. The contrast in size showed in a striking light the difference between the sixteenth and the nineteenth centuries in respect to the printing of the Scriptures. In sending the Bible to Worms, I thought of nothing more. But for the peasantry it turned out to have almost a religious significance. One woman, for example, approached the table and asked what the Bible meant. She was told that Bible was printed in Wittenberg while Martin Luther was still alive, and was carried through the press by the great man himself. She left, and returned, bringing with her her two daughters. She asked to be allowed to put her hand on the venerable book. It was permitted her. She stretched out her hand and reverently put it on the Bible, and burst into tears. In like manner, her daughters imitated

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her, and all left, weeping from excitement. I once dined at the house of a Geneva banker with a very celebrated English preacher. The conversation turned on Luther. "I cannot," said the guest of the day, "reverence Luther as I ought; he had no heart." The remark elicited strong expressions of dissent, and I ventured to say that one of the most indisputable proofs that Luther had a great heart was to be found in the fact that he lives as no man before or after him in the heart of the German people. A more telling illustration of this truth could not be imagined than the tears of these three German women on seeing and touching this old folio Bible.

"Nor was enthusiasm all. The success was unexampled in the history of similar efforts in the whole district of the Frankfort Agency. In these two days Weiser and Messer sold at their tables 68 Bibles, 520 New Testaments, and 271 Gospels, Epistles, and Psalms; in all, 859 copies, while their receipts amounted to £16 13s. 4d. May this outward success be but the earnest of the inward blessing with which the work of this day may be accompanied by the Spirit of God!"

AUSTRIA still continues to be one of the most interesting fields of the Society's operation. There is a mighty work of Bible dissemination going on in that country, although the Agent still continues to be not a little impeded in his labors. The circulation during the year in this country amounted to 128,101 volumes.

The work progresses without any new feature in the
SCANDINAVIAN KINGDOMS.

In the prosecution of the Society's work in RUSSIA, there has been no abatement in the facilities which

are at the Society's command, neither has the desire for the Scripture in the slightest degree diminished. Perhaps there is scarcely a country on the Continent of Europe in which more ardent friends to the circulation of the Scriptures can be found, and certainly none among whose population the Bible is received with the same profound veneration and enthusiastic joy as are so frequently evinced by the humbler classes of Russia. Having been so long debarred the privilege of obtaining the Scriptures, the destitution is still very great, and the eager desire manifested in all directions to obtain the precious volume is some times deeply affecting, and reveals an inward longing for the knowledge of Divine Truth, which must surely be the effect of the Holy Spirit's influence on the heart.

There has been an increased circulation of the Scriptures by the Society in this country during the past year, the total being 64,830, an excess of more than 5,000 copies.

Light has at last dawned upon SPAIN: the barriers erected against the introduction of the Word of Life have at last been thrown down, and the Parent Society have been permitted to make use of the liberty accorded. An agent has been appointed for Spain, depots have been opened, and the work of circulation commenced. It was also considered advisable to engage in printing large editions of the Scripture. The door was open, it might be suddenly or violently closed, as on former occasions; it was thought there

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fore that every moment should be improved, The Society undertook and are now engaged in printing 310,000 copies of the version of Valera. There is every prospect, so far as present indications may be concerned, of wide scope for Bible circulation. The cry for the Gospel is louder and more importunate than had been anticipated, and it is to be hoped that in a few years millions will be able to read for themselves that wonderful volume which gave Spain her noble army of martyrs, and will give her now, it is fervently desired, a Church built upon the foundation of the prophets and apostles, Jesus Christ himself being the chief corner stone.

The work in PORTUGAL is going on amid many difficulties and much opposition. The total circulation of the year was 4,060 copies.

Bible circulation in ITALY is no longer a novelty, but the work proceeds, if not with all the speed and expansion required, yet with a measure of success which must have laid the foundation of a great and noble superstruction yet to arise. At first large purchases were made from motives of curiosity to possess the book from which the people had been debarred; now the circulation is among those whose aim is to profit by what they read, the dimensions of the Bible work being more in proportion to the actual state of religious growth and enquiry than formerly.

The agent reports for the year a circulation of 28,641 volumes.

There was great joy when the Bible was first sold

to the public streets of Naples. It was the sign of a mighty revolution; and although the feelings of astonishment and delight which were then aroused have naturally abated, the circulation of the Scriptures is still regarded by many with deep interest. The issues for the year comprised 4,356 copies, not all, indeed, circulated amongst the Neapolitans, but diffused over the southern parts of the Peninsula and the islands in the Bay, as well as in the city itself. The Evangelical Schools established are doing an admirable work, and parents gladly take advantage of them for the education of their children; and as Biblical teaching enters very largely into the system of instruction, the Scriptures become more known and talked about. The Colporteurs state that in many families the Bible is read with manifest results, when there is no avowed secession from the Church of Rome. May it not be hoped that there are in Italy not a few disciples of the Book, though secretly, for fear of the adversary? All who have received the Truth in the love of it may not have equal courage to avow their faith openly. Circumstances may be less favourable in one case than another; and He who "looketh at the heart" may find His hidden ones where they are altogether concealed from human observation. Several incidents connected with colportage are mentioned by Mr. Bruce:—

"The Colporteurs connected with the Neapolitan Depot have during the past year travelled over the various southern provinces, besides visiting the islands in the Bay of Naples. The following notes

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from their journals will give some idea of the state of things in that part of Italy. Donnorumma says:—In not a few families in Naples the Bible is read with advantage, even though for various reasons they do not attend a Protestant place of worship. A special instance of this came lately under my notice. The father, a barber, is rather opposed to our work, and yet he confessed to me that one of his sons, to whom three months ago I sold a New Testament, has since totally changed his conduct. He no longer gambles or associates with dissolute companions. He attends to his work, and is obedient to his parents. He complained that this son would not go to confession; but what annoyed him still more was that, though his other children went to confession, their conduct was not good. I often see the youth, and speak to him on spiritual matters, in which we take a common interest.

“This Colporteur, as I have before said, is an old soldier, and since he was engaged in a better service he has always devoted a good deal of his time to the military, among whom he has disposed of a good many New Testaments.”

Of the work in **TURKEY** the Committee say, that though sudden and imposing revolutions in religious faith and practice are not to be announced from year to year, yet marvellous changes have taken place in connection with the Missionary and Bible labors that have been conducted in this Empire within the last quarter of a century especially; and each year there are not wanting proofs of steady growth and progressive influence. Christian work can now be prosecuted free from the checks and hindrances which were formerly so vexatiously interposed by the ad-

versaries of the Truth ; and palpable as are many of the effects resulting from the zealous exertions made on behalf of the varied populations of this country, there is, it is believed, in thousands of minds an undercurrent of religious thought and inquiry which at present finds little or no outward expression, but which is preparing for more general and important changes than any hitherto witnessed.

The circulation of the Scriptures during the past year in Turkey, has been 19,609 copies.

The general intelligence received from Correspondents and Auxiliaries in INDIA possesses no marked features of novelty, but is pervaded by a tone of animating hope, and indicates increasing confidence as to the steady growth and expanding influence of Christianity. The circulation of the Scriptures is regarded as one of the great and most effectual means to be adopted for enlightening the mass of the people, and it appears that there is a more general disposition to read the records of Christianity, and ascertain what are the principles which lie at the root of that religion they are so earnestly persuaded to receive. It cannot be doubted that at least the theoretical knowledge of the Gospel, which extensively prevails, combined with the wonderful and unsettling influences of European civilization, is gradually undermining popular faith in the truth and permanence of those systems of idolatry which have been the source of India's pollution and degradation. It is by no means rare to hear the natives predict the speedy and ulti-

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mate extinction of their own superstitions, and at the same time give utterance to the general and vague expectations they entertain, that the religion of the Gospel will eventually prevail amongst their posterity. The Colporteurs frequently hear the expression of this sentiment; and frequently do they hear the avowal that the Christian Scriptures, for beauty, purity, and meeting the deep wants of the heart, are incomparably superior to the fantastic myths and demoralizing tales which pervade their sacred books.

Of CHINA the Committee say that this great Empire, with all its strange and traditional superstitions, must needs occupy a prominent place in the thoughts of the Christian Church. To extend the blessings of the Gospel to its population, diffused over so vast a territory, and composed of so many millions, is indeed a stupendous undertaking, but not one from which faith and zeal should recoil. Most important advantages have already been secured. Christianity has won a position and influence of acknowledged power; and each year witnesses considerable accessions to the circles of believers gathered from the natives, and bearing their practical testimony against the senseless and degrading idolatry that prevails.

Mr. Wylie, the agent, reports the circulation of 69,108 volumes. He has been making extensive tours in different parts of China connected with the dissemination of the Scriptures, and wherever he has gone, he has found that neither his personal safety, nor his freedom in disposing of the Word of God, have been

interfered with. There is, however, reason to fear that two valuable lives have been sacrificed in this country in the service of the Society. One of them, a young Englishman named Johnson, of great energy and zeal, left Shanghai in the year 1867, on an extensive tour into the interior, and has not been heard of for a long time, and it is probable has fallen a victim to his zeal in the cause of Christ.

Referring to the home proceedings of the Parent Society, the Committee report that the receipts for the last year amounted to the sum of £187,952 9s. 9d., including sums received for special purposes, and the amount expended has been £178,139 10s. 4d.

The issues for the year have amounted to 2,140,620 copies, and the total issues of the Society now amount to 57,210,485 copies.

The Committee speak gratefully of the liberality of their friends, by whose assistance they have been able to construct their new Bible-house in London, to be the centre and head quarters of their noble Institution.

Among the events of the year the Committee refer to the loss they sustain by the removal from their work of the Rev. Philip Kent, one of their District Secretaries. Mr. Kent was well known to the friends of the cause in this Province, having been sent out as a deputation from the Parent Society about sixteen years since to this and the other British North American Colonies. In the very midst of his useful career he was struck down by paralysis, and he now

Your Committee cannot close this report without adverting to the loss which they, in common with the public at large, have sustained by the death of the late Rev. Dr. Forrester. Though not officially connected with the Society of late years, he was always its firm friend, and sustained it to the utmost of his ability. He was a most laborious worker in the cause of education. May we, who are endeavoring, by the dissemination of the Word of Life, not only to enlighten and educate, but also to bring the means of salvation to those who are destitute of it, feel that no labor is too much which is given for the accomplishment of an object of such paramount importance.

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TWENTY-SECOND REPORT
 OF THE
 Halifax Ladies' Bible Association.

The Committee of the Halifax Ladies' Bible Association, entering on a new period of its existence, have the usual duty to perform of acquainting their patrons with its progress during the year. They have not been successful in finding a suitable person to supply Mrs. Rutherford's (Bible woman) place, whose services they were obliged to relinquish in August last, on account of continued illness, which terminated in her death in February. Some members of the Committee have endeavored in a degree to supply this loss by holding weekly readings where Bibles are given or sold at half cost, the Scriptures are read and explained, and an interest in and sympathy with the poor maintained. Mrs. Patterson, during this time, has been active and useful in her sphere, relieving distress, circulating Scripture, and doing all that lies in the power of an active and diligent Bible woman, her exertions only limited by her want of time. The Committee think it most desirable to employ a person who can give her whole time and energies to the work, as soon as such a person can

be obtained. It is with great regret they mention in addition to the death of their worthy Bible woman, that of two of their Committee, which has taken place during the past year. One, much regretted, had, from the commencement of the Association, been an active and zealous member of the Committee, and for some years filled the office of President. After her retirement, her interest in its affairs continued. She was always ready to counsel and direct the Bible women, and by her influence and prayers, doubtless added to its efficiency. The other, a younger and later member, also did much service as a Collector, while health and strength were hers, employing them in the cause of God and the Bible. Mr. Russell has been appointed to the arduous position of Agent to both the New Brunswick and Nova Scotia Societies, and has therefore no time for Colportage, and as he has spent much of the last year in the former Province, has furnished the Ladies Branch with no Report. Mrs. Patterson's is published as usual:—

“From the middle of April, 1868, until the 5th of March, 1869, I have paid 689 visits. Although this winter has been unusually mild, there has been a great deal of destitution in the upper streets; owing to the influx of fishermen, with large families, from the shore districts. These people, accustomed to fresh air and plenty of exercise, have suffered much from being confined in small attic rooms.

“On visiting one of these families, I found five of them ill; one of them died shortly after of typhus fever, brought on, I believe, by low diet and the want of pure air.

“Two of my school children died very happily some time ago, trusting in Jesus, and I hope they are now “among the white robed throng who surround the throne;” neither of them had the advantage of home training, being brought up in dens; they are another proof of the advantage of religious training in day schools and Sabbath schools.

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"I feel it very discouraging that the poor are so anxious after the 'loaves and fishes,' and so careless about the 'Bread of Life;' however, it was so, even in our blessed Saviour's time, and the servant must not expect to be greater than his master. I will endeavor, therefore, to sow beside all waters, trusting that the Lord will bring the increase in his own good time."

The Committee rely upon the usual kindness of their supporters, to enable them to continue what they confidently feel must be considered a good work.

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MR. RUSSELL'S REPORTS.

TO THE COMMITTEES OF THE HALIFAX LADIES' ASSOCIATION, AND THE NOVA SCOTIA AUXILIARY BIBLE SOCIETY.

About the middle of October I returned from New Brunswick. Came to Halifax the first week of November to attend the Annual Meeting, and prepare my reports, subscription lists, etc., for the printer. Remained a week in town; then went on to Saint Mary's and held meetings in Upper and Lower Caledonia, Glenelg, and East River. These meetings were on the whole encouraging, and considering the state of the weather, well attended. Aid was obtained from each place. From Caledonia, \$18.18; from Ladies' B. S., Glenelg, \$25; from East Branch, (the first contribution received) \$3.07½. I had intended going to Sherbrooke—from which place liberal contributions had formerly been received—and had written intimating my purpose, but I received letters stating that the people there had been, during the summer and fall, making several special efforts for other objects, and it was thought there could not be a collection made for the Bible Society this season. From East River went to Goshen. I regretted to learn that in this place, where some years ago I introduced the claims of the British and Foreign Society, formed a Branch, and obtained subscriptions, a Colporteur of the National Bible Society of Scotland had gone and induced some of the people to contribute to the Scottish Society. Several attempts like this have been made—some of them successful,—during these past years, though chiefly in connec-

tion with the Pictou Auxiliary Bible Society. It is much to be regretted that a new element of division should be introduced into the Bible work of this Province. The Scottish Society in their Reports repudiate anything approaching to it. From Goshen came to Country Harbour, where, though we have no Branch, I had intended delivering an address, but the only building which could be obtained for the purpose—the school-room—was then undergoing repairs, and no meeting could be held. Went on to Guysboro and Manchester. In the latter place a meeting had been appointed for the evening of November 28, but there was another disappointment. The previous Sunday had been so stormy, there had been no public service held. Hence no notice had been given. With regret I had to return to Guysboro,' unable to accomplish anything.

Went down to Cape Canso. On two evenings addressed small meetings in the Baptist Church. The weather was unfavorable, the audience small, but some subscriptions were obtained, and Collectors appointed to secure more. Returned to Guysboro' and took part in the Annual Meeting of the Branch. The Ladies' Bible Association of Guysboro', ever forward in the good work, had previously remitted its annual contribution. The other Branch in Guysboro' contemplate taking measures to promote the circulation of the Scriptures in parts of their County where there are no roads and where it is to be feared there is destitution of the Word of Life. And in the meantime they reserved their contributions for this object. One lady, however, handed me a dollar, in memory of a beloved son.

Went on to Antigonishe. Had an opportunity of addressing a large meeting, and received of subscriptions and collections well on to \$30. Having finished my work in Antigonishe, returned to Truro, and immediately proceeded (according to previous

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arrangement) to labor one-half month for the Pictou Auxiliary, they, as usual, paying me for the time spent and expenses incurred. Rested a week or two at home during the Christmas holidays.

On the evening of Thursday, 14th January, addressed a fair meeting in the Reformed Presbyterian Church, Amherst. Some monies were subscribed, and arrangements were made to have more obtained.

During the past two and one-half months I have, in prosecution of my work, rode 837 miles, walked 64, addressed 34 different meetings in 30 different places, obtained of subscriptions, collections, &c., \$203 99½. During the past twelve months, partly in New Brunswick, though chiefly in this Province, I have, in connection with the work of the Bible Society, travelled by rail, coach or private conveyance 3538 miles, walked 522, sailed 401, addressed 194 meetings in 172 different places.

Through another year, as in many past, without one single day's sickness, God has mercifully preserved and helped me to do this work. To Him be all the praise. May He mercifully pardon every failure,—all that His pure eyes have seen amiss; and as year after year admonishes that "the night cometh when no man can work," I would wish more and more to realize and feel the truth and applicability of the words in the book we seek to circulate—"Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do it with thy might, for there is no work nor knowledge nor device in the grave whither thou goest."

TO THE COMMITTEE OF THE HALIFAX LADIES' BIBLE ASSOCIATION, AND THE NOVA SCOTIA AUXILIARY BIBLE SOCIETY :

The present Report is from the 27th of March. On that day I left Truro for Upper Londonderry, where meetings—on the whole very encouraging—at Folly Village and DeBert River were held. Visited, as last year, Acadia Mines, where, in the school-house, I delivered an address, Mr. Foreman presiding, after which a collection of \$4 was taken and handed me. In connection with the Lower Londonderry, branch meetings were held in Great Village, Portanpique, and Bass River. Those in the former places were thinly attended. The one held in the latter place was very good. Proceeded next to Economy. There, and at Five Islands, addressed pretty large audiences, considering the weather and state of the roads. Next meeting was held in Parrsboro'. It was small, but I thought I could discover an increased interest in those present. From Parrsboro' crossed in the steamer to Windsor. Went on to Clifton, where I addressed a pretty good meeting, Rev. Mr. Ryan presiding. A subscription was opened. Then, and subsequently, received above \$23. Came on to Halifax to attend the Quarterly Meeting of Committee (Monday, April 12th). The remaining days of that week held meetings in Middle Stewiacke, Upper Stewiacke, and Springside. At the former meeting \$20.58 were subscribed and paid, and more will be forwarded. In Upper Stewiacke (Village) the usual remittance was handed to me. It having been discovered that the year before last there had been no remittance forwarded, it was resolved that another contribution should be taken and sent on. Next meeting was held in Truro. The Branch here has been called on to mourn the loss of its President, the late Dr. Forrester. Rev. Messrs. Wilkins, Smith,

and Derwick took part in the proceedings. J. F. Blanchard, Esq., was elected President. Collectors were appointed to go round and gather up subscriptions.

From Truro went to Maitland. In connection with this Branch, meetings were held at Five Mile River, Maitland Village, and at Lower Selmah. The roads, owing to recent rains, were very bad. Going from Maitland to Selmah the horse broke through the road, and with some difficulty, after unharnessing, he was got out of the mire. All things considered, the attendance at these meetings was good. Next appointment was in Noel. It was literally the "two or three" who assembled. From Noel walked to Tennecape, and from Tennecape to Walton. In both places held meetings—neither very large. But some subscriptions were obtained, and from the latter more will be received. Walked from Walton to Chiveriee, where, on the whole, a good meeting was obtained. Some old and some new subscriptions were received. Went next to Kennetcook—small audience and slight encouragement. The labors of the week were closed by a meeting in Avondale on Saturday night. It was well attended. Rev. Dr. Richey, who was present, lent his valuable aid. Collectors will, as usual, go round. At Brooklyn, Newport, a large audience assembled in the Presbyterian Church, Rev. John McLeod presiding. No falling off in the interest taken in the Bible Society here. Next day, kindly taken by Rev. Dr. Blackman to Woodville, addressed a small meeting there, and the day following, kindly sent on by Mr. Parker to Rawden. In Middle and in South Rawdon held meetings. In the former place the meeting was encouraging. In the latter it was the reverse. Walked on next morning to Mount Uniacke Station, and took the train for Lower Stewiacke, where in the evening I addressed a good meeting in the Presbyterian Church,

Rev. Mr. McLean and Hare taking part in the exercises of the evening. Returned to Truro, and resting a few days, set out on another tour through the western counties. At Windsor, where I proposed beginning, and to which place I had written ten days previously, through some mistake no announcement had been made, and I could get no meeting. Went on to Hantsport, where a small meeting was held in the Baptist Church, and a few subscriptions received. The following evening addressed a meeting in the Wesleyan Church, Lower Horton, where some old and some new subscriptions were received, and collectors appointed to gather up more. Next day went to Wolfville. Disappointed here about a meeting. The notice I had forwarded had not been circulated. Went to Cornwallis. In Canard, Canning, and at Centreville held meetings. In the first place the attendance was encouraging. In the two latter places it was small. Arrangements were made to have collectors go round. With the Kentville Branch next meeting was held. It was the largest I had ever held in that village. Next meetings were held in Berwick and Somerset (Cornwallis West). Both small; some subscriptions were received. In Aylesford meetings were held in Factorydale and in the Plains. At the former place the audience was large; at the latter place the attendance was small. At both places subscriptions were received. In Wilmot I had arranged for two meetings. The first was small, the second, owing to a Temperance gathering, was a failure. Still, some contributions were received, as well as at Nictaux Falls, where a small meeting was held on Thursday, June 10th. The labors of the week were closed by holding meetings in Lawrencetown and Bridgetown; from both places small subscriptions were received, and arrangements made to have these subscriptions increased.

On Monday, June 14th, went to Annapolis. That

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evening there, the following evening in Granville held meetings. Both evenings were stormy. This, in each place, caused a thin attendance. Went to Clements. Year after year I had held meetings here, but could awaken no interest. One quarter of a dollar was all I could obtain last year. Between three and four dollars were signed, but not one farthing had been collected. So I passed on to Hillsboro'. There a fair meeting was obtained in the Wesleyan Church. Some old and some new subscriptions were received. Next day went to Digby, where in the evening I addressed a meeting in the Church school-house, Rev. Mr. Yewens presiding. The audience was chiefly young people. The day following went to Weymouth, where a small meeting was held in the Wesleyan Church, and the labors of another week were concluded by a meeting in the Kirk, Yarmouth, on Saturday evening, June 19.

I spent three days, exclusive of Sabbath, in Yarmouth. Other meetings were held, and with my friend Mr. Lewis, I was enabled, notwithstanding the hard times, to gather up over \$100. More will be obtained and forwarded. When it is considered that a sum larger than this is annually collected by the Ladies' Bible Society in Yarmouth, and forwarded directly to London, it will be manifest that Yarmouth is not behind in this good work.

On Thursday, June 24th, went to Barrington. At the Passage and at the Head very good meetings were held. On my way to Shelburne called at Clyde River, but held no meeting. In Shelburne addressed the few who assembled in the Kirk, on the work of the Bible Society, and aided by Rev. T. Hart collected over \$23. Went from Shelburne to Mill Village. No notice had been given the previous Sunday of my meeting, so it was small. Next one was held in Temperance Hall, Liverpool, where, aided by four clergymen in the town, I endeavoured to press the

claims of our society. Went to Milton, where, aided by Rev. Mr. Black, gathered up in a few hours about \$30, and addressed a good meeting in the Congregationalist Church.

Went on to Caledonia (North Queens). Had an opportunity, before a large audience, of pleading the claims of the Bible Society. A collection and some subscriptions, amounting in all to \$7.73 were obtained. Went from Caledonia to Pleasant River, a part of the county I had never visited. In the Congregationalist Church there addressed a small meeting, Rev. Mr. Sykes presiding. A collection of \$1.29 was taken. Returned to Halifax July 8th.

I had learned that the quarterly meeting of committee had been put off a month, and knowing that this was the best season to travel through Cape Breton, I proceeded thither. I had arranged for a meeting with one branch in Port Hood, but it failed; only two or three assembled. A few subscriptions were received. At Mobou a good meeting was held. Collectors will soon go round. Next meeting was held in Margaree. On a stormy evening a goodly number gathered together in the Baptist Church, and listened attentively to an address on the work of the Bible Society. Returned to Mabou, and went to Whycocomagh. Addressed a small meeting there. Obtained a few subscriptions, and tried to arrange about collecting more. Proceeded in the steamer "Neptune" to Baddeck. There, owing to notice not having been given the previous Sabbath, as well as to the absence from home of some of the friends of the society, the gathering was small. Went on in steamer to Sydney. Held meetings in the Bethel, North Sydney, and in St. Andrew's Church, South Sydney, the former meeting the smallest I had ever held there; the latter meeting very good. Subscriptions were obtained from both places. Proceeded to Cow Bay, at which place, as well as at Mira Bay,

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held meetings. From Cow Bay \$15.50 were obtained. Only one or two subscriptions from Mira Bay were received, but more it is hoped will be secured

The days for the steamer sailing to West Bay and Whycocomagh had been suddenly changed. This disarranged some of my meetings. I sent a telegram to Hawkesbury, changing the meeting there. That telegram, owing to the carelessness of the operator at Sydney, was not forwarded, entailing on me the loss of two days and about \$5 of unnecessary additional expenses. A small meeting, however, was held in Hawkesbury, which on the whole was encouraging. Returned to Truro.

Since the 27th of March I have, in prosecution of my work, travelled, by rail, coach or private conveyance, 1504 miles, sailed 357, walked 290, addressed 88 different meetings in 76 different places, these places being in 14 different counties. Visited 55 different branches. Obtained of subscriptions and on purchase account \$827.81½.

This sum, more than I had ventured to anticipate, and larger than I had ever before received, in the same space of time, is the best evidence of the unabated interest taken in the work of the British and Foreign Bible Society. Especially is this the case when it is considered that the pressure of the hard times has been severely felt in every portion of the Province visited.

Although some of the meetings were small, yet on the whole I never saw more marked attention shewn to the statements made, or witnessed at times such (almost breathless) interest exhibited at the simple detail of the work of Bible circulation, especially in Spain, and in other countries of Europe which only a short time ago were closed against God's word. Often and often, at the end of our meetings, the exclamation

tion was made "What a work the British and Foreign Bible Society is engaged in!"

As on former visits, I have experienced much personal kindness. For "my work's sake" I have been often hospitably entertained without cost. Many a mile I have been carried, saving coach hire. The captain of the steamer "Neptune," in Cape Breton kindly took me free all the trips I required to go with him. I may mention that I procured a Bible from our Depot in Baddeck and presented it to the steamer as the gift of this auxiliary.

The way, too, in which contributions are sometimes given is very pleasing. A gentleman in one of the western counties, who is—and whose father was—a warm friend of the Bible Society, regularly contributes \$5. In the month of June each year he rolls a sovereign in a piece of paper, lays it apart, waiting my coming round. Should I not appear about the middle of June inquiries are made as to when I may be expected. This year I was a fortnight behind the usual time. When he saw me, taking from his pocket the paper, unrolling the sovereign and handing it, he pointed to the paper, chafed by the edge of the coin, as much as to say, "this has been long waiting you." One feels it good to receive—as it must be good to give—money in such a spirit.

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APPENDIX.

IN addition to the reference in the Report to the British and Foreign Bible Society circulating certain so-called Roman Catholic versions of the Scriptures, the Agent would add a few remarks:—

1. The British and Foreign Bible Society circulates the scriptures in more than two hundred versions. Of these two hundred and upwards, there are just three and one half made from the Latin Vulgate.
2. These three and a half versions are the following: De Sacy's in the French language; Scios' in the Spanish; Perireas in the Portuguese. The half version is the New Testament, (the Old is not circulated) in the Polish language. No exception in Nova Scotia, so far as known, has been taken to its circulation.
3. Of the French, Spanish, and Portuguese versions, to which exceptions *have been taken*—though never in Nova Scotia by those who understand any of these languages—it may be stated, that Mr. Chiniquay *uses and prefers* De Sacy's to any other French version; that Bagster in his "Collection of Pollyglotte Bibles" has selected Scios and Perireas, when other versions might have been taken. And Bagster speaks of them as, 'elegant and correct.'

4. The American Bible Society—second only to the B. & F.—has circulated *all* of these versions. The N. B. Society of Scotland circulates so-called Roman Catholic versions. Even some churches (the Irish Presbyterian for example) have circulated Roman Catholic versions. *And no Society which has altogether refrained from circulating such versions has ever done much in the way of Bible circulation among Roman Catholics.*

5. The B. & F. B. S. has circulated these versions more or less for more than fifty years. But only in cases where no other version would be taken. Their sale was always referred to in the "Annual Report." There was no concealment. "This thing was not done in a corner."

6. No case has been alledged of harm having been done by the circulation of these versions during the past fifty years. But there are numberless cases in connection with each—so-called—Roman Catholic version circulated of God's Spirit blessing the work. The Protestant Pastors—nearly to a man—in each County approve of the work.
