Loyalty of India Shown—Speeches at Closing of Legislative Council Prove Willingness to Share the

London, March 27.—(Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.)—A special dispatch from Delhi reports the final meeting of the season of the legislative council of the season of the legislative council of India, at which stirring speeches were delivered by the viceroy and members of the council in reference to the new taxation measure and the participation of India in the war. The dispatch says:

At the legislative council's closing meeting today several members declared that the manner in which the new taxation proposals had been received was proof of the enthusiasm and patriotism of the people. Great satisfaction was expressed that no further burdens were placed on the poorer classes of the community, although some memof the community, although some members deplored the raising of railway rates and urged development of the general industries of the country The Cotton Duties

Many of the speazers expressed the grateful thanks of the country to Austen Chamberlain, secretary of state for India, for his "firm and just action" in the matter of cotton duties. They said ton manufacturers in opposing the In-dian tax on imported cottons showed a want of knowledge of Indian affairs. All the speeches contained expression of patriotism and loyalty, and voiced the willingness of the people to share the burdens of the empire. Sir William Mayer said he hoped the war loan would soon exceed £10,000,000. soon exceed £10,000,000.

Lord Chelmsford, in closing the session, said he was glad to find that the offer of £100,000,000 to the imperial government had met with practically the unanimous accord of the council. There would be sacrifices in the necessities of ordered government, namely, in education, sanitation, public works, etc., but these sacrifices were trifling compared with those of other countries. Thrown back upon herself, he said, India had already increased the output of her in-dustries a hundred-fold. In fact, he believed the war would prove the date that it was the duty of everyone to sub-

Alluding to the cotton duty, the vice-roy said that a grievance had been re-moved which had been a long-standing source of irritation, but the whole question of duties would be considered after the war. He added that the imperial government could not, in existing cir-cumstances, do more, but the history of this incident is highly encouraging to India, proving that she had staunch friends, and that he interests would be stoutly defended when the fiscal system came to be reviewed. Alluding to the gallantry and endurance of the troops in Mesopotamia, he said that the fall of Kut marked the said that the fall of Kut marked the nadir of India's fortunes.
