Ginzburg, 57 Salem St., Boston, Mass.; one was collected through Fourth National Bank of New York City. No. 42,067 drew the Second Prize of \$50,000; it was also sold in fractional lots, one to L. Ginzburg, one to Herbert T. Neal, Newberia, La.; one to P. H. Cole, Portland, Me.; one to J. M. Gunter, Algona, Ia.; one to John D. Meeks, Fayetteville, Tenn.; one to Jas. W. Ridd, Westport, N. Y.; one to Henry Eckert, New York City, and the names of the rest are withheld by request. No. 58,480 drew the Third Prize of \$20,000, also sold in ten lots at \$2,000 each. One went to V. Teague, 213 Decatur St., New Orleans, La.; two to David Israel, Donaldsonville, La.; one by W. O. Van Dyke, care of Marshall Field & Co., Chicago; one by Frank Kabetz, 183 Duane St., New York; one by John F. Sullivan, 20 Fleet St., Boston, Mass.; one by F. A. General Notes and News. TO OBTAIN OUR RIGHTS IN THE PACIFIC. OTTAWA, Nov. 1.—Admiral Henage, R. N., left here yesterday for the Columbia to hoist his flag on board the Swiftsure, the new flagship of the Pacific squadron. In an interview to-day he said one of his official acts would be to visit Alaska and protect British interests there, which would be needed looking after. He would not allow a British vessel to be molested outside of the three mile limit, no matter who attempted it. He understood that the colonial secretary in Alaska would be part of the fisheries inquiry. He would make a special report to the British government on the Canadian Pacific railway as an imperial route to the east. The colonial secretary would be in command of the channel squadron.

WE WANT A NEW LIKEMAN. Chief Justice Waite at the age of 72 is the most energetic member of the United States Supreme Court. He is the only one of the justices who has not availed himself of the privilege of Congress giving him a private secretary at \$1800 a year. "I don't want one," says the chief justice; "he'd only be in the way." Waite is a hard-headed, practical man who reads nothing but law books, works twelve hours a day and has little or no imaginative power.

BLOW UP. A London special to the New York World says: An attempt was made Thursday afternoon to blow up the Carlton Club. An explosion in the basement blew out all the first floor windows and injured four persons. The Carlton club on Fall Mall is considered the most beautiful club house in London.
