

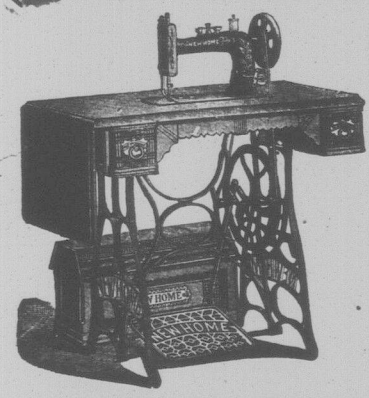

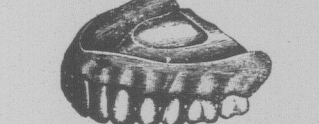

THE WELDON BILL.

At the last session of Parliament, Dr. Weldon, the representative of this county introduced a measure which after much carving became law, entitled "An Act to disfranchise voters who have taken bribes."

The act provides that five or more electors may, not less than 40, nor more than 60 days after an election, present a petition to the election court, stating that bribery has extensively prevailed at the election, to which petition an affidavit must be attached sworn to by all the petitioners to the effect that the allegations are true to the best of their knowledge and belief, upon which the court shall within 30 days assign one of its judges for the purpose of making an inquiry into the act, provided the court is satisfied by the affidavits produced that such extensive bribery had been practised.
