Montreal, Feb. 18.—A firm feeling prevails in the local flour situation in sympathy with the strength displayed in wheat and the good demand from local and foreign buyers for spring wheat grades. The volume of business doing is very satisfactory and the mar-ket is active for this season of the year.
