

WOODROW WILSON IS REVEY PRESIDENT OF UNITED STATES

Democratic Land Slide Gives Him Majority Over Other Candidates--Swept East and South while Indications are that Roosevelt will Carry Western States--Taft Running a Poor Third.

New York, Nov. 5.—With the election of Woodrow Wilson to the presidency and Thomas B. Marshall to the vice-presidency assured by the earlier returns tonight, the reports up to midnight gave indications that the electoral vote of the Democratic candidates would pass the 300 mark.

The size of the popular majority given the Democratic national ticket, or the states outside of Illinois that might give electoral votes to either Taft or Roosevelt, were matters of conjecture at midnight. It was certain, however, that Illinois would return an overwhelming majority to Roosevelt, while the race in Pennsylvania was so close that either of three candidates within the range of success.

Victory over William J. Bryan four years ago. President Taft tonight read the bulletins that told the story of the election. Four years ago Mrs. Taft, Miss Della Torrey, of Milbury, Mass., his favorite aunt, and Mrs. Alice Roosevelt Longworth, were present to hear the news.

Mr. Taft has many times declared his intention of returning to Cincinnati and resuming the practice of law if defeated, and that intention was said tonight not to have been altered.

New York, N. Y., Nov. 5.—Early returns from New York and the seaboard states were the cause of much excitement at Democratic national headquarters. Chairman McCombs early after seven o'clock sent word to Gov. Wilson that his election was indicated by an overwhelming vote. Later in the evening he made the following statement:

"Victory is now complete, the returns are now coming in so fast that I cannot keep up with them. Gov. Wilson has carried, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Maine, New York, Maryland, New Jersey and all of the south. Committee W. R. King writes that Wilson will get 10,000 plurality in Oregon. I believe we will carry Pennsylvania for Wilson.

"I have reports which are sufficient to elect Governor Wilson overwhelmingly without official returns from the Western States, which are not in. With Chairman McCombs were Vice-chairman William J. Rickado, and United States Senator O'Gorman, who were plainly elated over the returns.

SUGAR REFINERY SURE; BIG PLANTS PROJECTED FOR EAST SAINT JOHN

Development for St. John greater than ever previously suggested even by the most optimistic is indicated from the results of yesterday.

The sugar refinery to cost \$1,000,000, and to be located on the Ballast wharf site is certain. The refinery will employ several hundred men, and will be operated to its capacity of 2,000 barrels of sugar per day.

The Mr. McGibbon and the Norton-Griffiths Company, was prepared to go ahead with development in East St. John on a scale not hitherto thought of.

The industries in prospect for East St. John are: A dry dock of 1,150 feet in length, believed to be the largest in the world. A steel shipbuilding plant. Iron and steel works to be established on sites to be reclaimed from Courtenay Bay.

Many subsidiary industries which may come in the train of these. The sugar refinery will be erected by the Atlantic Sugar Refining Company, of which D. Lorne McGibbon, the Montreal capitalist, a man who is concerned in very many of the most important industrial undertakings in Canada, is the leading spirit.

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ATTITUDE OF BRITAIN ON BALKAN WAR

London, Nov. 5.—The British attitude in the Balkan situation was explained today in the House of Commons by Sir Edward Grey, the Foreign Secretary, who was loudly cheered when in reply to a question he said:

"No one in view of the result of the war up to date will be disposed to dispute the rights of the Balkan States to formulate the terms on which they are prepared to conclude peace."

Bulgarians Call Upon Servians for Assistance in Investment of Constantinople --- Reported City's Water Supply is Cut Off---Powers Will Not Mediate Without Concurrence of Balkan States

Vienna, Nov. 5.—The correspondent at Sarajevo of the Belgrade telegraph that the Montenegrins again crossed the Drava river today, but that they met a superior force of Turks and were compelled to retire.

The Turkish military hospital was also hit by shells fired at a magazine close by.

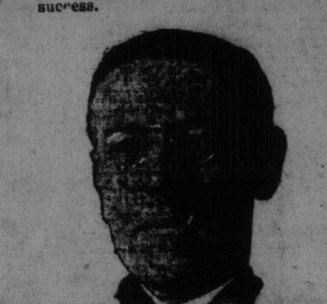

PROGRESS AND DEVELOPMENT.

Two announcements of far-reaching importance, indicating the further recognition of St. John as a commercial city and a shipping port were made public yesterday. Arrangements have been concluded for the erection of a wharf, an agreement having been reached satisfactory to the city, to the Dominion Government and to the Atlantic Sugar Refining Company, the parties concerned. Work on this great undertaking will commence before June 1st next year. A new steamship service to the West Indies from this port is also foreshadowed in connection with this industry.

It is also officially announced that the Imperial Dry Dock Company, whose charter has been acquired by Norton-Griffiths and Co., will apply to the Government for the contract to build the Courtenay Bay dry dock, increasing its length to 1,150 feet, and are including in their programme the establishment of a shipbuilding plant in this area. The company will also negotiate for the erection of iron and steel works on a site to be reclaimed adjoining the dry dock. It is already well known that the Canada Iron Company are desirous of locating their works at Courtenay Bay, and there is every indication that satisfactory arrangements will be made.

A detailed statement of the plans of the Imperial Dry Dock Company and of the agreement arrived at with the Atlantic Sugar Refining Company appear elsewhere in this issue. It would be difficult to over-estimate the importance of these announcements. Taken in conjunction with the programme of construction in Courtenay Bay under the Norton-Griffiths contract, the erection of the new grain elevator by the Canadian Pacific Railway and the extension of the wharf accommodation on the West Side, which the Dominion Government are undertaking, they provide conclusive evidence that the steady and continued development and progress of the city of St. John as one of the great national ports of Canada is assured.

MISREPRESENTATION.

An apt illustration is provided by the Telegraph of the straits to which Liberal organs are reduced in the effort to discredit the proposal that the Dominion should make an emergency contribution to Imperial Naval Defence. Taking a paragraph from the Montreal Star emphasizing the fact that "a cash gift" had not been proposed, Mr. Puzosky's organ professed to see a change in the situation and suggested that "it may be that Mr. Borden and his colleagues have decided to adopt the Laurier plan, in effect if not in detail." The paragraph from the Star is as follows:

"We do not propose a cash gift. We propose to build Canadian battleships and lend them to the British Government. We propose to take this course because it promises the most and swiftest efficiency. If our battleships could help the Empire most by lying in Halifax harbor, we would want them to lie there. We want to do the most we can at the earliest possible moment in a supremely effective manner. That is our policy."

Commenting on this statement the Telegraph said: "This is somewhat surprising, and also somewhat confusing, coming from the Montreal Star. Mr. Borden, according to intimations in the Government press, is about to propose a money gift of thirty millions—and here we have the Star frowning upon cash contributions. If the Star is going to insist upon the building of Canadian war vessels in this country, to be paid for by Canadians, to be built by Canadian workmen in Canadian shipyards, its policy is quite in line with the Laurier naval legislation, and is obviously the one sound line of procedure in the matter of Canadian contribution to Imperial Naval Defence."

Realizing that this was wilful misrepresentation, the Standard wired the Montreal Star quoted from the paragraph in question, and from the Telegraph's comment, and added: "We take it the Star is maintaining that an emergency contribution will provide ships built in England, owned by Canada and placed at the disposal of the British Government."

The reply from the Star was as follows: "The Star has never contended or believed that a cash contribution would meet the exigencies of the naval situation. Your interpretation is absolutely correct. By taking a paragraph of an editorial away from its context almost any meaning desired can be read into it."

The Telegraph deliberately misinterpreted the Montreal Star to suit its own purposes. The Star is not opposed to a cash contribution to Great Britain for the purpose for which it would be designed, to build Canadian ships which would aid the Mother Country, as the Star says, "at the earliest possible moment in a supremely effective manner." The permanent naval policy of the Dominion Government is an altogether different matter and one into which the question of cash contributions does not enter.

A PURE FOOD STANDARD.

A recent announcement that the Inland Revenue Department has issued regulations establishing the standards for a variety of articles of food, including fruit and fruit products, and canned fruits, vegetables, honey and lard, is a matter of general interest. The definitions call for a high degree of purity and will be welcomed as a safeguard by the consumer.

In referring to canned fruit the regulations state that "canned fruit is the sound product made by sterilizing clean, sound, properly matured and prepared fresh fruit, by heating with or without sugar, and keeping in suitable, clean, hermetically sealed containers; and conforms in name to the fruit used in its preparation."

The definitions of jam and marmalade require that they are the sound product made from clean, sound, properly matured and prepared fresh fruit, a fruit pulp and sugar with or without spices or vinegar, by boiling to a semi-solid consistency; and conform in name to the fruit used in their preparation.

Two important provisions governing the description on the labels are worth quoting. It is laid down that "when jam, marmalade, fruit butter, or jelly contains other fruit or fruit juice than that which gives its special

name to the article, the fact of the presence of such other fruit shall be stated upon the label, in lettering as large and as distinct as that used in naming the fruit principally present. This requirement does not, however, apply to the use of fruit juice, up to the amount of ten per cent, of the weight of the jam used instead of water in the manufacture of the jam." Another provision dealing with glucose requires that "when the sugar in preserve, jam, marmalade, fruit butter or jelly is wholly or partially replaced by glucose, or by any other substitute for sugar, the fact of such substitution shall be stated upon the label in plain lettering."

As regards canned peas the regulation defines that unless specially designated, canned peas "shall be prepared from the harvest of the year in which they are canned, and shall be the unripe peas of the crop of that year." Ripe peas may be canned, provided that the label shows quite clearly that they are such. This may be done either by boiling them as canned ripe peas, or by the use of the word "soaked." A mixture of ripe and unripe, (or green), peas, must be plainly labelled in such a way as to disclose this fact.

A former regulation in regard to lard is amended by adding a provision that "neither lard, leaf lard nor compound lard shall contain any added coloring matter." Honey, as defined, is entirely the product of the work of bees operating upon the nectar of flowers and other saccharine exudations of plants and contains not more than 25 per cent, of water, not more than 8 per cent, of sucrose (cane sugar), not more than a quarter of 1 per cent, of ash and not less than 60 per cent, of invert sugar.

The advantage to the general public of Canada is clearly shown by the scope and demands of these regulations which have been embodied in a series of regulations approved by the Governor General-in-Council.

THE MINISTER OF THE INTERIOR.

In the recent reconstruction of the Cabinet, made necessary by the resignation of Mr. Monk, Dr. Roche, the Secretary of State, became Minister of the Interior. He is one of the most popular men in the House, and his appointment is a fitting recognition of his ability both as an administrator and as a parliamentarian. The Interior is particularly a Western department, and the news of Dr. Roche's appointment has been especially well received in his home Province, Manitoba, and in Saskatchewan and Alberta.

By birth Dr. Roche is an Ontario man, although of Irish parentage. He was born at Clandeboye, near Lucan, Ontario, in 1859. He was educated at Lucan and London high schools and then studied for medicine. He is enrolled as the first graduate in medicine of Western University, London. Last fall his alma mater honored him by bestowing on him an honorary degree. He graduated in 1882, and in the same year removed to Manitoba, locating at Minnedosa, where he has been engaged in active practice. He is thus one of the pioneers of the West, and probably no man in Parliament has a more thorough knowledge of Western conditions and Western affairs.

His first essay into politics was in 1892, when he was an unsuccessful candidate for the Manitoba Legislature. Four years later he was the Conservative candidate for Marquette, and redeemed the riding, entering the House the same year as Mr. Borden. Despite continued efforts to defeat him Dr. Roche carried Marquette with increased majorities in 1900, 1904, 1908 and 1911. His popularity in his home riding has made him practically unseatable.

One of the most eloquent speakers in Parliament, and a close follower of legislation, Dr. Roche was early recognized as one of the Conservative party's ablest men in the House, and in 1901 he was appointed Conservative whip for the West, continuing in that position until 1910, when he was appointed assistant chief whip.

Through the long years of opposition, Dr. Roche bore the brunt of the fighting for the Conservatives on Western subjects. His thorough knowledge of the West, his eloquence as a speaker, and ability as a debater, brought him into prominence, and he took his place as a front benchman in the Conservative ranks and as one of Mr. Borden's right hand men.

When the Prime Minister formed his Cabinet Dr. Roche was appointed Secretary of State. During the past year he has shown splendid administrative ability. His elevation to the important portfolio of the Interior is an admirable choice.

Current Comment

The Late Senator Bell.
(Vancouver News-Advertiser.)
Senator Adam Bell, whose death is announced, was a man of unusual intellectual qualities. He began his public career in the Nova Scotia Legislature. As Provincial Secretary in Sir John Thompson's Administration and leader of the Conservative party in opposition he made a conspicuous and creditable record. Later he served two terms in the House of Commons as the colleague of Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper in the representation of Pictou County. Mr. Bell was for a time, when Mr. Power was out of Parliament, the leading financial critic of the Laurier Administration.

Moving the Crop.
(Calgary Herald.)
Receipts for grain at Winnipeg are very large. The crop was a little slow in starting to move, but the figures show that it is going forward now at a record rate, and without any serious complaints of blockades. The Government seems to have done all in its power to remove the serious blockades of previous years. The Marine Department has made all arrangements for icebreakers at Fort William and Port Arthur, to keep the harbors open to the latest possible date. The open weather in the West is also a considerable factor in the expeditious handling of the crop.

The White Man's Burden.
(Troy Record.)
There are five cities in the United States with a negro population exceeding \$5,000, and only one of these is within the domain of the old Confederate States. Evidently the race problem must be decided as a national, not a sectional question. As long as New York and Washington remain the negro centres of the North and South all parts of the country are interested in the destiny of the body of citizens whose condition almost split the United States into two governments fifty years ago.

A Wise Policy.
(Edmonton Journal.)
The importance of the change that the C. P. R. proposes to make in the handling of its land can hardly be overestimated. It is to be disposed of henceforth to settlers only. The company is fortunately beyond the stage where it has to worry about the revenue from this source and from its own viewpoint as well as from that of the country at large this move should more than justify itself. We have too much land altogether tied up by the speculator.

The High Cost of Living.
(New York Herald.)
"Drinkers and smokers are paying 'Uncle Sam' \$2,000,000 more a month this year than last, but they seem to think that phase of the high cost of living is all right.

AMHERST FINDS PLEA GOOD.
 Throughout the city of St. John there are few open schools, he added. "There is need of physical and moral training and recreation. As a result of the introduction of games, etc. in Amherst, the regular school work of the children has increased fully 60 per cent. The question of discipline was solved. The teacher was brought into a new relation with the pupil. One great trouble now was the gulf between the school and the home. In Amherst the children got their parents to the school buildings and entertained them there by games, songs, and exhibitions. In St. John, however, school teachers got an opportunity to meet the parents on a new footing. When the idea of entertainment for the parents was mooted, the people of Amherst said it was a good idea, but nobody would attend. The prophets of the future were not far from the mark. The hall was crowded and every meeting has been well attended. The work at the school is now being carried on in a new and better way. In reply to Trustee Bullock, Mr. Bradford said the educational class work in the evening was only open to children over the school age; the school buildings were open to parents and children.

ASK FOR CITY SCHOOL BUILDINGS TO USE AS SOCIAL WORK CENTRES
 Play Grounds Association Delegation Accompanied by John Bradford, of Amherst, Call on School Board with Request—Mr. Bradford Tells How Plan has Benefitted Amherst.

The idea of having the school buildings utilized as social centres was discussed at a joint meeting of the School Trustees and members of the Playgrounds Association yesterday afternoon, a meeting at which many of the school principals were present. The Trustees seemed favorable to the idea and at the conclusion of the discussion the chairman, R. B. Emerson, stated that they would make known their decision in a short time.

After the meeting was called to order Chairman R. B. Emerson said it had been called at the instance of the Playgrounds Association, and that he had asked the principals of the city schools to attend to hear Mr. Bradford.

A. M. Belding said it was the intention of the Playgrounds Association to ask for the use of one or more school buildings for social purposes. Mr. Bradford had been asked to explain how the school buildings were utilized in Amherst.

Mr. Bradford explained the plan. John Bradford explained that the idea of utilizing school buildings in cities originated with Dr. Ward, who had been brought up in a rural district where the little red schoolhouse formed the centre of the social activities of the communities. He said one of the first cities to take up the idea was Rochester, and went on to describe the various features of the social work which had been carried out there.

Mr. Bradford explained that the school buildings, he said, belonged to the taxpayers. There are in every city a large number of people of limited education. After a demonstration of the value of social centres work, the school boards have invariably taken up the work. In New York last winter, the school boards had arranged for lectures in the evening, which were attended by 2,000,000 persons.

Mr. Bradford said there were districts in St. John where the people were evidently poor and had few social pleasures, and he argued that reading clubs, lectures, games, and entertainments in the school buildings would prove an attraction to them.

Some discussion took place about the penny savings bank. One of the principals explained the operations imposed on him by the penny savings system here, and asked: "What would you ask for a private secretary?"

Supt. Bridges—The trouble is, a man from Toronto told us, it would only take about ten minutes a day to manage the bank. They must be smart people in Toronto.

Miss Mabel Peters spoke of the importance of the social centre work which she witnessed in Detroit last winter. The teachers told her of the department and study efficiency of the children had greatly increased.

Principal Parlee said St. John was 25 years behind the times in the matter of music. He thought something should be done for the musical education of the children.

Chairman Emerson expressed the interest of the board in the address of Mr. Bradford and said the representatives of the Playgrounds Association would receive serious consideration. The only question which would trouble the board was the financial question.

A. M. Belding expressed the thanks of the Playgrounds Association for the courtesy of the school board in calling the meeting and bearing the views of Mr. Bradford.

The gathering then adjourned.

COAL OUTPUT AT SPRINGHILL.
 At the Springhill collieries the output from the first of January to the end of October was 349,307 tons, and for the same ten months of 1911, 194,068 tons, an increase of 155,239 tons for 1912. The combined output of the Cape Breton and Springhill collieries for ten months of this year totals 4,192,000 tons. For the first ten months of 1911 the tonnage was 3,517,000, a gain for the present year of the large total of 675,000 tons.

The quarterly meeting of the Women's Council was held at the headquarters of the King's Daughters' Guild, on Chipman Hill, yesterday afternoon when besides the routine business several interesting papers were read.

Mrs. T. H. Bullock, the president of the council, presided, and after the routine business had been disposed of, Mrs. Bullock read a paper on the work done at the annual meeting of the Women's Council of Canada, which was held at Toronto, during the past summer. This paper proved of value, as it dealt with the work as carried on in other cities.

Mrs. Dennis, president of the Halifax council, read a paper which was listened to with great attention by all present, as it dealt with the advanced work of the council of the sister city, the civic and social branch being thoroughly described.

Two other papers of interest were read during the afternoon one by Miss Audrey Bullock on the "Care of Milk" and the other by Miss Jessie Lawson on "Sanitation."

She will then go to Glenwood, on the main river, where she will be remodelled and enlarged. It is the intention of her owners to have her raised two and 25 feet added to her. The object of doing this is to make the steamer more commodious both for passengers and freight.

A number of friends of Mr. and Mrs. Glendon H. Allan called on them Monday evening at the home, 235 Wagonway Road, and after congratulating them on the anniversary of their wedding, presented them with a beautiful mahogany parlor rocker. A pleasant evening was spent by all.

PROVINCIAL.

Chatham, Nov. 5.—The death took place last Monday night of Capt. Robert McLean, one of the best known captains of the J. B. Snowball and Co.'s tugboat service, aged 58 years. He is survived by his wife, one son, children, while his father, one sister and two brothers likewise outlive him. Capt. McLean was a son of John McLean of Exeter, and was born in that village. He comes of an old seafaring family and he took up the art of navigation at an early age. For many years he commanded one of the schooners of the W. S. Loggie Company engaged in the coastwise trade between Exeter and the position of commander of the St. Nicholas, a post he held with much ability and satisfaction to the company.

GENERAL.

Another Comet.
Cambridge, Mass., Nov. 5.—The discovery of a new comet by Astronomer Borely, of Marseilles, France, is announced in a telegram received today from the Harvard College Observatory from Professor Kobold of Kiel, Germany. The position of the comet is given on Nov. 2, 2044 G. M. T. at eight ascension 17 hours 47 minutes, declination plus 38 degrees 57 minutes. The comet is reported to have been visible in a small telescope, and to be moving southeast.

FINANCIAL ELECTION.
Montreal, Nov. 5.—H. S. Niblock, western manager of the Canadian Financials of Vancouver, has been arrested on charges of fraud in connection with the organization of the Canadian Financials, which was recently incorporated under Dominion charter with a capital of \$2,000,000. Niblock is one of the head men of the concern and cut a wide swath in financial circles in this province.

Madero in Trouble.
Mexico City, Nov. 3.—President Madero has broken with the leaders of the progressive party, which placed him in the presidency. A high official of the government has admitted that the president had severed his relations with the group of politicians whose leader is his own brother, Gustavo Madero, since he believed they had taken up to a large extent with the group of the old regime known as the Cientificos. The story of the break came as a result of comment following the non-appearance of Gustavo Madero or the members of his family at the president's birthday party. The break is regarded as perhaps the most important political development of the Madero administration. Its effect, it is calculated, will result in an alignment of the opposition members of Congress with the administration members.

Cuban Election.
New York, Nov. 2.—General Mario Menocal, who was elected to the presidency of Cuba yesterday, on the Conservative ticket, cabled the following statement to the people of the United States today, through the New York World: "My own success is nothing in comparison to Cuba's demonstration of her ability to hold law-abiding elections in which her disapproval of corrupt government was thoroughly established. We feel and will ever prove that we are worthy of that confidence which the people of the United States and the outside world once placed in us."

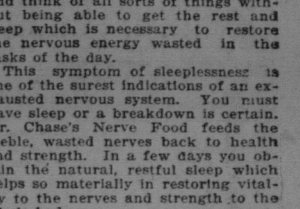

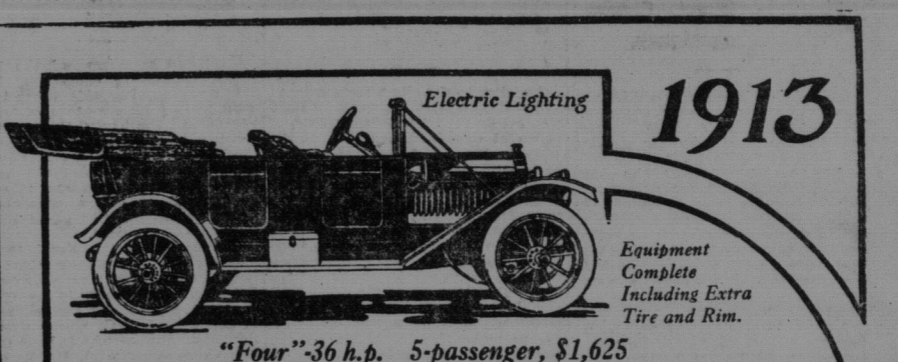
