STANDING RULES

For the Constitution and Government of the

Diocesan Church Society of Nova-Scotia.

I. His Excellency the **LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR OF NOVA SCOTIA** for the time being, and the **SOCIETIES FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE GOSPEL**, and for **PROMOTING CHRISTIAN KNOWLEDGE**, shall be respectfully requested to be the **Patrons** of this Society.

II. The **Bishop of the Diocese** shall be the **President** of the Society, with a control over all their proceedings. His approval shall be necessary for the completion of all important acts of the Society, and especially for the revocation or alteration of any of the standing rules, and for making any addition to them.

III. There shall be two or more **Vice Presidents**, of whom the **Archdeacon of Nova-Scotia** shall be the first; a **Secretary**, an **Assistant Secretary** when necessary, and a **Treasurer**.

IV. There shall be a **Standing Committee**, consisting of the **Officers**, all the **Clergy**, and as many **Laymen** as it shall be thought convenient to choose at the **Annual Meeting** of the Society. The **Lay Members** shall continue in the Committee for a year, or until other **Lay Members** be chosen in their place; and any or all of them may be re-elected. **Seven** of the **Committee** shall be a **quorum**, provided four of them be **Laymen**.

V. The Society shall be open to all the **Members of the Church**, all of whom shall be invited to unite with it. **Ten pounds** paid at any one time shall qualify a person to be a **Member** during his life, and the payment in advance of any sum, *however small*, shall qualify a person to be a **Member** for a year.

VI. The members of the Church in every part of the Province shall be invited to co-operate with the **Diocesan Society**, by joining **Committees** of it which shall be formed, under the direction of their respective **Clergymen**, either in each mission or parish, or in more than one mission or parish

united, as shall be deemed most convenient, and in strict accordance with the design and rules of the Diocesan Society; and it is recommended to the Committees to forward their funds, as they may be collected, to the General Committee, who will faithfully apply them to the general objects of the Society; but when the Local Committees desire it, they shall receive books at cost and charges to the amount of one fourth of their remittances.

VII. There shall be one General Meeting of the whole Society, including any members of the Local Committees who can conveniently attend, on such day and at such place as the President may name, of which due notice will be given, with an invitation to every Committee to send at least one Clergyman and two Laymen to represent such Committee, and with a recommendation that each Committee shall meet at some convenient time immediately before the General Meeting of the Society, that any necessary suggestions may be offered to the representatives of the Committees for their guidance at the General Meeting. And a Special General Meeting may be called at any time and in any place, when the President, or, in his absence, two or more Vice-Presidents, shall consider it desirable to appoint such Special General Meeting.

VIII. The objects to which the attention of the Society shall be directed shall be, generally, those which have engaged the two great Church Societies in England for the Propagation of the Gospel, and for Promoting Christian Knowledge, and none other.

IX. The following objects shall more particularly engage the attention of the Society, as soon as their means may enable them to afford such attention:

1. Supplies of Books and Tracts from the stores of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, and none other, except in cases where other Books or Tracts, in strict conformity with the principles of the Established Church, and particularly adapted to local circumstances, shall first be carefully examined and approved by a Committee of revision, to be appointed by the General Committee, the approval of which General Committee shall be necessary in the next place, after which the books must likewise receive the written approbation of the Bishop.
2. Missionary visits to neglected and destitute places, under the direction of the Bishop.
3. Upholding by all possible and proper means, the Collegiate Establishments at Windsor.
4. Assistance to deserving young men desirous of being qualified for the Ministry of the Church, but requiring aid in pursuing their studies at the Collegiate Establishments at Windsor.
5. Aid to Sunday and other Schools, in which due attention is paid to instruction in the principles of the Established Church.
6. Encouragement to the instruction and training of respectable Teachers for Sunday and Daily Schools.
7. Assistance to the erection or enlargement of Churches and Chapels belonging to the Established Religion, in peculiar or extreme cases.

To these objects, generally, the general contributions will be applied; while contributors who desire it may have their individual contributions scrupulously confined to any one or more of these objects. And as some members of the Church, who are not unmindful of the great spiritual wants in their own neighbourhood, still feel constrained, in pious gratitude for the blessings they enjoy, to allot something, however small, from the means with which a gracious Providence has blessed them, towards the spread of the glorious Gospel among the nations which still sit in darkness:—

X. This Society will gladly receive and forward to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, whatever sums may be given for the conversion and instruction of the Heathen, to which object such sums will be strictly confined by the East India Committee of that Society.

XI. Books and Tracts will generally be on sale at cost and charges; and whenever in particular cases a deviation from this rule is desired, it must be considered by the Standing Committee, and only permitted when recommended by them and approved by the President, or, in his absence, by two or more of the Vice Presidents.

XII. All Meetings of the Society and of the Committees shall be opened and closed with the prayers used by the two Societies in England, adapted to our situation under the direction of the Bishop.

SIXTH REPORT

Of the GENERAL COMMITTEE of the Diocesan Church Society of Nova-Scotia.

The Annual Meeting of the DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY OF NOVA-SCOTIA took place in the Saloon of the Halifax Hotel, at Halifax, on Thursday, the 29th of February, A. D. 1844; at 7 o'clock in the evening.

The Right Revd. PRESIDENT took the Chair shortly after 7 o'clock, and invited those present to join in singing the 100th Psalm.

The Rev. Dr. STREVE read prayers.
 His Lordship the PRESIDENT then briefly stated the object of the meeting, read from the IX Standing Rule the objects of the Institution, and, after announcing the gratifying intelligence that His Excellency the Lieut. Governor had consented to become the Patron of the Society, called upon the Assistant Secretary to read the following

REPORT.

THE General Committee of the DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY OF NOVA-SCOTIA, in welcoming the members and friends of the Society to the celebration of its Sixth Anniversary, beg to present their Annual Report of the operations, the means, and the expenditure of the Society during the year now past.

It is with feelings of sincere gratification, and, they trust, of devout gratitude to God, that this Committee are enabled to assure their brethren from the various Local Committees, and those members and friends resident in the city, that, in its quiet and unostentatious course, the Society has been promoting the spread of the ministrations of the Gospel, furthering the Education of Candidates for the Sacred Ministry, aiding in the erection of buildings to be set apart for the worship and service of the Lord, assisting by grants of Books and otherwise the usefulness of Day and Sunday Schools, and, in such other ways as come within their sphere, contributing to the advancement of the cause of Christ and of His Church.

The Committee have received with much satisfaction from their brethren in various parts of the Province, and hope that each of their Clerical friends as are present this evening will be able to confirm, the assurance of the importance of this Society as a bond of union among the members of their flocks, and the testimony of the value of its aid in promoting various objects of present and permanent benefit to the interests of the Church and to the cause of Religion in the Diocese. Such testimonies,

though not regarded either as the motive or the reward of their exertions, for they desire no stronger motive than the constraining love of Christ and look for no higher reward than His approval, are yet encouragements to them to persevere in well doing, and cheering evidences that their past course has not been in vain in the Lord.

Among the encouragements of this kind which they are permitted to record, the Committee have received recent information of the formation of three new local Committees in Parishes where they had not previously existed, and of the renewal of one, which, though established some time since, had from local causes been inactive. At Windsor a meeting was lately held under favorable auspices, attended by some of the Clergy of adjoining Parishes, and a Committee formed, which has forwarded a handsome contribution to the general funds of the Society. At Amherst an equally favorable account is received of the interest which had been awakened in the members of the Church by a meeting for the same purpose, at which also a Committee was formed from which a contribution to the Society's funds may shortly be looked for. From Parrsboro', the Revd. R. Arnold announces the formation of a Local Committee, at a meeting of which he remarks, "Seldom have I seen so much unanimity and good feeling upon any similar occasion, or a more earnest desire to forward the good work for which we were assembled together." And from Annapolis the respected Rector communicates the information of the revival of that Local Committee, which, although among the first established, had, in consequence of heavy expenditure for local Church objects, been for a time overlooked.

Your Committee would now respectfully present a brief view of the Income and Expenditure of the past year.

INCOME.

Although no material increase has been made in the number of their Subscribers in the City, yet the Committee have not to record any falling off in the number of their friends. During the past year the sum of £90 13s. 10d. has been collected, which, including the sum £22 7s. 4d. collected at the last General Meeting, and the amount of a collection made at St. Paul's Church after a Sermon by the Rev. Alfred Gilpin on Sunday last, inclusive of a contribution of £5 from His Excellency the Lieut. Governor and Lady Falkland, makes up the sum of £154 11s. 2d.

From the Annapolis Local Committee, whose re-organization has just been noticed, the sum of £12 8s. 8d. has been paid in by Alfred Whittan, Esq. M. P. P., the delegate from that Committee to this Society.

From Amherst the sum of £8 12s. 6d. has been forwarded, and from Aylesford, where an increased interest in the affairs of the Society has been awakened, the Rev. H. L. Owen has forwarded the sum of £5 10s.

From Antigonish was handed in by the Rev. T. C. Leaver, before his removal from that Mission, the sum of £5 19s. in addition to their usual contribution of £3 0 0 in aid of Missions to the Heathen; and a further sum of £10 has just been forwarded by the same Revd. Gentleman.

From Chester the Revd. Dr. Shreve has forwarded with his usual punctuality the sum of £10 10s.

From Clements, the Revd. W. M. Godfrey has remitted the sum of £5 14s. 6d.

The Cornwallis and Horton Committee has forwarded in two remittances the sum of £13 16s. 9d. of which £3 were to be appropriated in aid of Missions to the Heathen, and £3 to be remitted to the Society for promoting Christianity among the Jews.

From Dartmouth, the Revd. Mr. Morris has paid in the sum of £8 16s. 11d., and a balance of last years collection amounting to £20, was paid during the past month.

The Digby Committee, under the vigilant superintendance of the Revd. Rector of the Parish, has gone on increasing in numbers and contributions; and has paid in the sum of £20 1s. 7d. to the funds of this Society, and the Rector has also forwarded the sum of £8 1s. 4d. which he requests the Treasurer to pay over to the Colonial Bishop's Fund, in aid of the erection of the See of New Brunswick.

From Liverpool, your Committee have received a Letter from the Revd. J. T. T. Moody, expressing the unabated interest of himself and his flock in the welfare of the Society, but regretting, that in consequence of heavy local expenses in repairing the Parish Church, &c., he is unable to forward the usual contribution. He expresses his assurance that when relieved from the present pressure of expense, the Liverpool Committee will be ready as ever to forward the objects of the Society. He has however forwarded for the present year the sum of £10.

From Lunenburg, where the Committee of this Society has been always regarded with interest, and where it has this year received an increase of 60 members, the usual handsome contribution of £22 ; and

From Mahone Bay, under the superintendance of the same zealous Missionary, the sum of £3 10s. has been received.

The Newport Committee, through the Rev. R. J. Uniacke, has remitted the amount of £11 17s.

The Parrsboro Committee, whose formation has been referred to, has remitted the sum of £8 6s. 3d.

The Sackville Committee, by the hands of the Revd. A. Gray, has forwarded the sum of £9 7s.

From Shelburne, the Revd. T. H. White has forwarded the sum of £12, and accompanied the remittance with a most gratifying account of the interest felt by his flock in the welfare of the Society, and their gratitude for some aid which had been afforded them in the erection of a new Church at Melford.

The St. Margaret's Bay Committee has forwarded with its usual punctuality, by the hands of the Revd. John Stannage, the sum of £4 7s. 3d., and a like sum which they have requested this Society to be the channel of contributing to the Fund now forming in aid of the erection of the See of New Brunswick.

The St. George's Committee of Sydney, C. B. has paid during the summer the sum of £20, referred to in the last Report.

The newly formed Committee at Windsor has remitted by the hands of Mr. W. Metzler, their Secretary, the sum of £17 14s. 10d.

The income of the Society for the past year appears therefore to have amounted to the sum £306 3s.

The Guysboro' Committee has remitted since the meeting, the sum of £12; of which £8 are for the general purposes of the Society; the remainder, half for the Heathen, and half for the Jews.

EXPENDITURE.

LAY READERS.—The Committee have continued the usual grants for the purpose of defraying the actual expenses of Lay Readers in different Parishes and Districts: and under this head have paid, since the last Annual Meeting,

making an amount distributed in this important department of usefulness of £50.

BOOKS.—The chief disbursement of Books from the Depository of this Society has been in the return of the fourth part of the remittances of the various Local Committees.

A grant of Books to the amount of £10 has been made for the supply of the children of the poor in St. Paul's Sunday School in this city; and similar grants of £5 in aid of the Sunday School at Truro, and of £5 in aid of the Day and Sunday School at Blue Rocks in the parish of Lunenburg, have recently been made.

These grants, together with the returns of the portions of remittances above mentioned, amount to the sum of £71 16s. 11d., whose value has been distributed in religious books during the past year.

There have been sent forth from the Depository in that period, 83 Bibles, 201 Testaments, 587 Prayer Books, 3004 Tracts, and 160 other publications.

Your Committee would announce to the friends of the Society and Members of the Church in general, that as the salary heretofore allowed to the Depository of the Society did not seem sufficient to give the Society a claim upon his constant attendance, the allowance to him has been increased to £25 per annum; and the Depository is now open daily from 9 A. M. to sunset, and a person continually in attendance. They would invite attention to the stock of publications, which is now on sale, comprising not only a large assortment of Bibles, Prayer Books, and Religious Tracts, but also popular treatises, travels, biographies, &c., well calculated to interest and inform the mind.

MISSIONARY VISITS.—The expenditure for Missionary visits, since the death of the aged and venerable Missionary the Revd. C. W. Weeks, has been chiefly confined to Cape Breton. During the past year the Revd. W. Y. Porter has travelled several thousand miles on Missionary Excursions, at a very trifling expense to the Society, and your Committee hope, with benefit to many souls, that must otherwise have been unsupplied with the Word of Life. For carrying out this object the Committee have made a further grant of £10.

CHURCHES.—An important part of this Society's expenditure has always been the aid afforded to the erection of new Churches through the Province. During the past year, upon application from the Revd. Gentlemen in whose districts the efforts are made, there have been granted, as follow:

In viewing the balance which appears in the Treasurer's account, your Committee beg their friends and subscribers to remember that a large part of it is appropriated, though not yet paid. The grants to New Churches for instance are made on the condition that half is to be paid when the outside is finished, and the remainder not until the Church is completed and ready for consecration. The second moiety therefore of all the grants which have been mentioned remains to be paid, and a certain balance must always be retained in the Treasurer's hands to meet these claims.

During the present year, several sums which had been forwarded from the Local Committees of Antigonish, Cornwallis and Horton, and Guysborough, amounting to the sum of £10 13s. 9d. currency, have been forwarded according to the Xth Rule of the Society, to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in aid of their Missions to the Heathen; and the sum of £3, from the Cornwallis and Horton Committee has been forwarded, in compliance with their wishes, to the London Society, for Promoting Christianity among the Jews.

Your Committee would remind the Society of a resolution passed at the General Meeting of 1842, in favor of sending deputations from the Society to aid in the formation of Local Committees in parishes where they had not yet been formed, and to assist the objects of the Society, in such way as might be within their power. During the present year, this resolution has been partially acted upon, to such an extent, however, as to encourage the hope of increased usefulness from its being more fully carried out. In accordance with the request of the President of this Society, the Revd. W. Bullock of Digby has made several visits to places in the vicinity of his Mission; and your Committee has reason to think with very good effect. They hope that during the present year, similar visits will be paid in various districts of the Province, and doubt not that, by the Lord's blessing, they will result in an increased interest in the concerns of this Society, and a more effectual promotion of its important designs.

Your Committee have also the pleasure of referring to the formation of Church Societies, similar in object and constitution to this Society, in the neighbouring dioceses of British America. In the Diocese of Toronto, and in that of Montreal, a Diocesan Society has been sometime in operation; and it is a gratification to your Committee to believe that they have in both cases been formed upon the model, and guided by the rules, which had previously been adopted by ourselves. The first General Report of

the Toronto Church Society, which has just come to hand, indicates however a number of members, an amount of subscriptions, and a feeling of interest in its welfare in which it must be confessed they have far outrun our older Society.

The mention of these Church Societies of recent date in the Colonies seems naturally to direct the thoughts of your Committee to those Venerable Societies in England, of which ours may be considered an offshoot, and with which it is our privilege to be fellow workers in their labour of love. It is with much regret that this Committee has heard the account of the depressed state of the funds of those two Societies; yet with joy and gratitude to God that we have been apprized of their noble resolution not in any measure to contract their bounties, or limit their operations, until they have tried every proper mode of Christian appeal to their fellow Churchmen in the parent-land, by which they can hope to bring up their funds to the amount necessary for the accomplishment of all that their benevolence prompts. Your Committee cannot but hope, that the mere mention of the circumstances of those Societies, and of the Christian purpose by which they are actuated, will animate the members of the Church in this Province and the Colonies at large, in the endeavour to do what lies in them to relieve those Societies of their burden, and to co-operate with them in their benevolent designs. The obligations of the members of the Church in these Provinces to those Societies cannot be easily estimated; the benefits, which they have conferred upon us, cannot be known till the day when the harvest shall be gathered into the garner of the Lord.

But in our own humbler sphere, whether your Committee look back upon the amount of aid they have been permitted of the Lord to give towards the promotion of objects having His glory and the welfare of His Church in view; or forward to the prospect of increasing, however quiet, usefulness which lies before them, they feel that they have cause to thank God, and press onward. While they rejoice, yea and will rejoice, whenever they can hear that the cause of God is prospering and the kingdom of the Redeemer furthered, in whatever quarter and by whatever means, they naturally, and not they believe unchristianly, regard with a peculiar interest the sphere of spiritual duty which is within their own immediate observation, and the honored instrumentality of their own beloved Church, with which they are privileged to be fellow-workers. And they have cause to rejoice, that as the facilities for the worship of God in the Church of England increase, and the labours of her Ministers are thus brought to bear more immediately upon the scattered populations of the Province, her ordinances are regarded with increasing interest, her members refreshed within her pale, and many who had been previously careless, led to seek communion with Him.

IV. *Resolved*.—That this Meeting is of opinion that no occasion of the assembling together of the members of the Church should be allowed to pass by, without an expression of their gratitude to the Venerable Societies for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts, and for Promoting Christian Knowledge, to whose bounty these Colonies are so much indebted; and without the prayer that the continued blessing of the Great Head of the Church may prosper their instrumentality for the good of souls and the increase of His Kingdom.

as they regard the example of the City as of great importance in its influence upon the Country.

C. B. OWEN, Esq. M. P. P. and a delegate from the Chester and Lunenburg Local Committees, proposed the seventh Resolution, as follows:—

VII. Resolved,—That the thanks of this Society be presented to the Right Reverend the President, the Vice Presidents, and other Officers of the Society, for their attention to the business of the Institution during the past year, and that they be requested to continue in the discharge of their various duties; and that the following gentlemen, together with all Clergymen of the Established Church, shall form the Committee for the ensuing year; viz:—see page 6.

APPENDIX.

As considerable inconvenience has been experienced by the General Committee from the want of attention to the following particulars, the notice of the Presidents and Officers of Local Committees is particularly requested to them, viz:—

The General Committee meets in Halifax on the third Thursday in February, May, August and November, and all applications for aid should be forwarded to the Secretary at least a week before either of those dates.

Every application for aid should contain the following information, in defect of which the application must be postponed for fuller particulars :

For aid in the erection of a Church—

1. The precise situation, specially with reference to the nearest place of worship, and to the amount of population within five miles of the Church.
2. The size of the building; the numbers it can accommodate; and probable amount of the congregation that will usually attend it.
3. The supposed cost of the building; the progress it has made towards completion; and the amount of contributions on the spot in money or labour.

For aid to Day and Sunday Schools :

1. The situation of the School as regards the nearest adjoining school.
2. The number of scholars in usual attendance, and the general circumstances of their parents.
3. Is the Church Catechism taught? and the School generally conducted with a due regard to the principles of the Established Church?
4. The nature of the aid required: whether books, assistance towards Master's salary, &c.?

The Annual General Meeting of the Society will for the future be held within the first ten days of Lent, or as near thereto as the General Committee shall decide upon: and it is desirable that Local Committees should hold their anniversary meetings, and make their annual collections some time in the month of January, in order that their proceedings and remittances may be acknowledged in the Annual Report presented at the General Meeting.

APPENDIX II.

For the information of Local Committees applying to the Depository of this Society for books and tracts, it is thought desirable to publish the following extract from the minutes of the General Committee, under date of May 7, 1841.

"The Chairman of the Sub-Committee, to whom the concerns of the Depository were entrusted, reported several resolutions which had been agreed to by the Sub-Committee, and are as follows:—

"I. *Resolved*,—That whereas the Diocesan Church Society can receive no books from the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge except to the amount of the sum remitted with the order, no books can be supplied from the Depository of the Diocesan Church Society, unless the orders be accompanied with a remittance to the full amount.

"II. That all outstanding debts due the Depository be immediately called for, and, until they be satisfactorily arranged, no further supply of books shall be issued to those who are in arrears.

"III. That Mr. Maxwell be requested to forward their accounts without delay, to the several persons indebted to the Depository, together with a copy of these resolutions.

"Whereupon it was resolved—

"That whereas the importation of books to the Depository must, by the present arrangement of the Book Fund, depend entirely upon the returns made for books supplied from the Depository, the Committee feel bound to approve of and adopt the resolutions of the Sub-Committee."

EXTRACTS FROM CORRESPONDENCE.

— — — — —

From the Revd. W. Bullock, dated Digby, January 6, 1844.

"It will be gratifying to the General Board to learn, that the Local Committee at Digby continues successfully to promote the objects of the Church Society, and that in proportion to the increase of Missionary spirit is the growth of truth and piety in the Mission: so that I am every day the more convinced, that, under present circumstances, the cultivation of these Committees is a thing of the first and last importance to the welfare of the Church in our Provinces. Nothing serves so thoroughly to subdue party feelings and promote love and harmony at home, as this striving together for the faith of the Gospel abroad, and nothing will so effectually bring out the beauty and symmetry of the Church, as the exercise of that Catholic spirit which is promoted by the Society. I am fully persuaded that if they were well sustained in every parish, all opposing force would eventually give way. With this conviction I have had great pleasure in attending meetings in various places as opportunity offered, and in attending the direction of the Bishop to carry out the Resolution passed at the General Meeting in 1842, with reference to such visits;—of the result you will no doubt be informed by the Secretaries of the several Committees."

— — — — —

From the Revd. R. Arnold, dated Parrsboro', Feb. 10, 1844.

"We have just held our meeting for the purpose of forming an auxiliary in this Parish to the Diocesan Church Society; and the result, though apparently insignificant, has greatly exceeded our expectations. Seldom have I seen so much unanimity and good feeling upon any similar occasion, or a more earnest desire to forward the good work for which we were assembled together."

— — — — —

From the Revd. T. H. White, dated Shelburne, Feb. 16, 1844.

"I have the pleasure of forwarding for the general fund of the Diocesan Society the sum of Twelve pounds; £4 4s. 7d. of which was contributed by the congregation so liberally aided by your Committee in erecting their little Church on the west side of this harbour. Many a fervent prayer has ascended from their thankful hearts to the Giver of all Good for a blessing upon your Society; and that they might not appear to express their gratitude in words only, they have forwarded these its first fruits, given not a little of it, I firmly believe, in the very spirit that actuated the poor widow in the Gospel. Our little building is not very far from completion, and is, I am happy to say, well filled on every occasion of divine worship with a goodly congregation, many of whom remember that the object of their adoration is a Spirit, and must therefore be worshipped in spirit and in truth.

On the fourth Sunday in Advent I administered, for the first time in that Church, the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper to eighteen persons, thirteen of whom had never before partaken of those holy mysteries; and I may add,

if a Church had not been erected among them, some of these, from their age and other causes, never would in all probability have had the opportunity of so great a privilege. Very many Bibles and Prayer Books and other works from your Depository have been spread abroad in this mission; among which I may mention dozens of family prayers which are eagerly sought after, and, I believe, in many cases, and those daily increasing, humbly used."

From the Revd. T. C. Leaver, dated Truro, Feb. 22, 1844.

"I beg to acquaint you that the Annual Meeting of the Antigonish Branch of the Diocesan Church Society was held on the inst., and the interest evinced in its proceedings by its members appeared to be undiminished. * * * The services of the Lay Reader at Tracadie have been exceedingly beneficial, in giving to the Inhabitants there the advantage of Divine Service on the Lord's Day, which otherwise, owing to the great distance of the place from the residence of the Clergyman, they could have had only once a month; and to their children the benefits of a Sunday School; and thus the grant of the Church Society for that purpose has, we trust, been instrumental in keeping alive in that remote settlement a sense of religion, and the love of God, and in preserving them from being ensnared by the errors of the Church of Rome, by whose adherents they are entirely surrounded."

From the Revd. R. Jamison, Missionary on the Eastern Shore, dated Halifax, Feb. 21, 1844.

"As the Annual Meeting of the Diocesan Church Society is shortly to take place, I beg leave to address the *General Committee*, at their Meeting previous to that occurrence, in behalf of the poor people on the Eastern Shore of Nova Scotia, who are making all the exertions possible in their own power towards the erection and enlargement of their humble buildings in the wilderness for the worship of Jehovah. For the advancement of the spiritual interests of this long neglected portion of Nova Scotia, your Committee have already manifested the kindest regards, in contributing liberally towards the erection of the Mission House at Ship Harbour, and in the payment, (since the formation of the Society,) of small salaries yearly to the three Lay Readers at Jeddore, Ship Harbour and Pope's Harbour. In return for such valuable assistance, I beg your Committee will accept, through this medium, the united thanks of the Missionary and congregations thus benefited by your pious bounty; and I sincerely trust, that your fostering care of pure and undefiled religion through the ministrations of the Church will be long and gratefully remembered, and that it may have the happy effect, through the Divine Agency, of nourishing and keeping alive that increasing attachment towards our Zion, which at present appears to be manifested by the greater number of the inhabitants of these poor but growing settlements.

In reviewing your past liberality towards the religious wants of your poorer brethren of the Eastern Shore, it is with some diffidence, that I would make a further appeal in behalf of the Congregations assembling at Pope's Harbour and Salmon River, for aid in the completion of Churches in those places. At Pope's Harbour, the people a few years ago had made

some advancement in erecting a place of worship, and had so far succeeded, with the aid of £25 procured by the Lord Bishop of the Diocese from the funds of the Society for Propagating the Gospel, that the building had been completed externally, and has been used in the unfinished and uncomfortable state of its interior, for holding Divine worship, since my appointment in 1840. Owing to the increase of population in that neighbourhood, and from the circumstance of the settlers, with few exceptions, being attached to the Church, it was thought desirable, and indeed found necessary, to enlarge the building previous to its being finished internally, in order to afford accomodation for what at present appears a thriving congregation. For this purpose, at the suggestion of the Missionary, an appeal was made to the people assembling at this place, to contribute as far as their limited means would permit, towards the enlargement and completion of their Church; and the sum of £30 was then subscribed, and has since been collected and applied for that purpose. This sum has enabled the congregation to add 12 feet to the length of the building, making its extreme length 44 feet, its original and present width being 25 feet; and to build and paint a pulpit, reading desk, and altar, which before were entirely wanting. The Church at present would contain a congregation of from 250 to 300 persons; and the probable amount of the congregation usually attending might be 200 individuals. The situation of the building is on the North East side of the water called Pope's Harbour; the nearest place of worship is about 12 miles; and the supposed amount of population within (I will not say 5 miles, but about) 7 miles, (which distance many persons regularly travel to the Church,) is 350, exclusive of other denominations. The probable cost of the building when completed might be £200, and the amount of contributions in money and labour already expended, I think, could not be less than £125.

It is the desire and hope of the poor people, whose attendance on the ordinances of the Church at Pope's Harbour is regular and exemplary, to have their building put in a comfortable state early in the ensuing summer; and, I have no doubt, it would be their highest ambition, to see their house of prayer in that decent order, which in some measure is befitting the spiritual presence of Him, who has promised, that "where two or three are gathered together in His name, there will He be in the midst of them to bless them and to do them good." For this desirable object, it will be needless for me to remind you, that your assistance, however small the sum, would be valuable and gratefully acknowledged; and with the exertions your benevolence would naturally stimulate the people still to make in their own behalf, I have no doubt, with the Divine blessing, that this Church in the wilderness, and which already serves as a beacon to the mariner in directing his course to the capital of Nova Scotia, would ere long be finished.

With regard to the new Church now in progress of erection at Salmon River, the circumstances are encouraging, and the people are truly deserving the sympathy of their richer brethren. Here in March last, the first movement towards the building of a place of worship was made by the Missionary, with the concurrence and agreeably to the desire of the greater number of families in the *three little Settlements* of Beaver Harbour, Salmon River and Necum Quoddy. At a meeting held at that time a subscription list was opened, and the people, without exception, I might say,

contributed to the utmost of their means in money. But here the good work did not stop; for, stimulated with a laudable zeal, in addition to what they had already promised to do, they united to a man in order to proceed into the forest for the frame of the building—and in four days after my departure from amongst them, the whole timber necessary for the frame work was cut down and hewed in the woods, and hauled to the spot on which the Church is built. In July last, when his Lordship the Bishop visited the Eastern Shore, the materials for the frame were still lying on the spot in their rough state, but since that period the work was renewed with redoubled vigour, and in a late visit to that neighbourhood, the Missionary was agreeably surprised to find, that the Church had been very nearly finished externally. And should these deserving people meet that encouragement, which I am sure would be received with gratitude, I have no doubt, the building would be entirely finished by the end of the ensuing summer.

This Church is beautifully situated on the Eastern side of the Harbour, or rather Bay, into which Salmon River empties itself, directly opposite the small settlement of Beaver Harbour on the same Bay. The nearest place of worship, which is a Presbyterian meeting house at Sheet Harbour, is not less than eight miles, and the nearest Church, which is that of Pope's Harbour, about eighteen miles. The probable amount of the population belonging to the Church 200 persons. The dimensions of the building are as follow, viz:—length 36 feet, width 28 feet, and it would probably accommodate 250 individuals; the number of persons at present attending might be 125. The cost of the building, when completed, would probably be £200. And the amount of contributions on the spot in money and labour nearly £100.

From the imperfect information I have now attempted to lay before the Committee, with regard to the two Churches already alluded to, and relying on the support of the Right Reverend President of the Society, who well knows the circumstances of these poor people, and can duly appreciate the exertions they are making for their own spiritual edification, I have no doubt, your Committee will take this application, in behalf of their poor brethren of the Eastern Shore, into their serious consideration, and grant such aid, as will assist and encourage them to proceed with their laudable works, which are already beginning to make the wilderness and solitary places glad, and which, I pray, in time, may make "the desert rejoice and blossom as the rose."

From the Revd. Dr. Shreve, dated Chester, Feb. 23, 1844.

• • • We held our Annual Meeting, on Wednesday the 14th, after Divine Service in the Church, upwards of thirty new subscribers were added to the list. A review of the past year is not without mingled feelings of joy and sorrow—the latter when our thoughts are turned upon those worthy members who within a few months past have been removed from among us by death,—the former when we contemplate the present prospect of our Church,—for notwithstanding a few northern blasts of opposition, which, while the ark of Christ's Church moves upon the waves of the troublesome sea of life, we are led to look for and expect, since it "must needs be that offences come," still the increased attachment evinced for the ordinances of the Church, and for the prosperity of the D. C. S. by those

who in reality are her members, while it calls for gratitude and thankfulness to a kind Providence, bids us also to *thank God and take courage.*"

Extracts from the Seventh Report of the St. George's, Cape Breton, Committee, dated Sydney, C. B. Jan'y 8, 1844.

"The Parish Church of St. George has only been once closed during the past year, viz: on the first Sunday in Lent, in order that the Clergy and Laity might assist in the solemn ceremony of opening the new Church at Sydney Mines. The usual number of stations have been visited, and the services attended by congregations somewhat increased in numbers, and certainly more earnest in their devotions, and more attached to and acquainted with the peculiar excellence of our ritual.

Early in the year, or, as above mentioned, on the first Sunday in Lent, the neat little Church at Sydney Mines was opened for divine service, and has continued so every Sunday, and on the principal festivals of the Church, for the worship of God, for the declaration of his will from the lips of an appointed minister, and for breaking the bread of life and pouring out the cup of salvation to those who hunger and thirst after righteousness. A bazaar was held at the Mines during the Summer, for completing the tower of their Church, which produced the handsome sum of £48. We have to rejoice at this success, and to acknowledge the liberality with which the call was responded to. The frame of the intended Church at Cow Bay has been raised and boarded: contributions are in hand, which together with a portion of the grant bestowed by that unwearied friend of the Colonial Church, viz: the Society for the Promotion of Christian Knowledge, are sufficient to finish its exterior during the ensuing summer. The funds of our Committee of the Church Society, it is anticipated, will reach the usual amount; but upon this subject an adjournment is requested to Ash Wednesday, when a more satisfactory account can be rendered.

Your President feels that in the foregoing details there is much to excite the interest and gratitude of every true Churchman; and yet there is another topic of importance to be mentioned, viz: the visit we were last summer privileged to receive from the Bishop of the Diocese. It is hoped the circumstances of this event are fresh in the memory of all here present; but we may briefly recall the leading points of interest that occurred during his stay among us. Two Churches (with their burial grounds) were consecrated; that at Sydney Mines by the name of the Holy Trinity, and that at the North West Arm by the name of St. John; five places were visited by his Lordship, at which 168 persons were confirmed; two adults were received into Christ's Church by baptism; and one candidate was solemnly admitted to the holy order of the Priesthood. Lest any, in the language of Scripture, should ask—what mean ye by these things? the Bishop clearly and forcibly explained the origin, nature and authority of the several ceremonies in a convincing manner. That this visit and the ministration of these Episcopal functions among us have received the seal and sanction of the Holy Ghost, according to the divine promise, is manifest in various ways; more especially in the large increase of communicants. Of these, many shew good evidence that they are Christians indeed; and all, we trust, are growing in grace, and in the knowledge and fear of God. We wish to record our gratitude for the Bishop's visit; and to ascribe all success to God alone, the author and giver of every good gift."
