New York, Aug. 19.

A semi-official despatch from Washington says, in reference to the reports of the contemplated cession of Porto Rico to Germany, that Cable Cushing at Madrid, and Mr. Davis at Berlin, have the subject on their memoranda of instructions and will not fall off the proper time to report to the Governments of Spain and Germany, the position of the administration in the maintenance of the Monroe doctrine. The proposed cession of the island is said to be in return for Germany's recognition of the Spanish Republic.

Barque Mermat, from New London for New Orleans, is reported sunk by collision, and the captain and five of the crew drowned.

HONO KOLO, Aug. 18.

The Chinese Government has given Japan ninety days to withdraw its troops from the island of Formosa. Meanwhile China is making extensive preparations for war with Japan, which is generally believed will ensue.

New York, Aug. 20.

The report of the Secretary of State's recent reports of the intended cession by Spain of the island of Porto Rico to Germany without the shadow of foundation.

Yesterday afternoon the case of Graves vs. Sowers came before the Court. This is an action brought by Valentine Graves against F. K.
