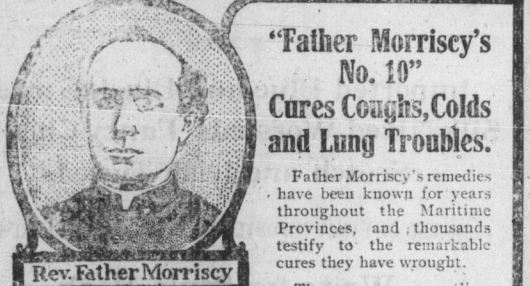

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homesteaded title) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.

CHEAP POWER

One of the problems facing the town of Campbellton today is that of power for small industries, and we are pleased to note that our progressive town council are already considering this matter.

Something over a year ago the Graphic published a large number of interviews from prominent business men in regard to supplying electricity for power during the daylight hours. In these interviews there was not a dissenting voice, all being of the opinion that to assure Campbellton's industrial advancement, and as the water supply was inadequate, electricity was the only force available. The element of cost was an important obstacle.

In looking into the matter we found that in order to give an up-to-date service and a permanent one, it would be necessary to install new generators at the power house, as the present plant, now in operation for many years, is obsolete, generators of this type being no longer manufactured, and motors to use current from these generators can only be procured by being made to order. It was felt that, as the plant was then nearly at its limit of generating capacity, and as new plant would be necessary very shortly, it would be better to allow the matter to rest for the present, and make a new start from the beginning.

At a committee meeting of the council held some months ago this matter was discussed and it was deemed advisable to ask the government for legislation to authorize the issuing of a further issue of \$50,000 of water and light bonds for electric light and power purposes, and procure necessary information as to available water power within reach of the town. If suitable source of power can be procured, it is planned to erect the necessary power plant at an early date. The necessary legislation has since been obtained on the request of the Council.

Within a comparatively short radius of Campbellton there are a number of water powers which by the expenditure of a reasonable amount of capital could be harnessed. Will these falling streams generate enough horse power for our growing needs. That is the important question and that is what the Council will endeavor to ascertain this summer.

How would the change affect light and power users?—At the present time the electric light plant uses annually about \$5,000 worth of coal and a day service is insured this would be nearly doubled. This \$5,000 which now goes up in smoke, would pay the interest on \$50,000 or on an expenditure of \$100,000 which will be amply sufficient for the proposed plant, would effect a saving of \$2,500 on a night service only, and approximately \$7,000 on a day and night service.

The employees necessary would be just the same as at present for the twenty-four hour service, a man at the power house day and night and a chief electrician. The revenue from the day service would grow rapidly and would thus increase the present revenue very perceptibly. With a large increase in the revenue, and such a large saving in the operating expenses, a reduction in rates could easily be made, without sacrificing profits. This would affect every citizen, besides encouraging many small industries to locate here.

In many Ontario towns the change from steam to water power was recently made with the result that where as the residents were paying 15 cents or thereabouts per thousand watts

for current, they are now paying only 5 cents and the plants are showing a larger surplus than when steam was used. The cost of power is made two cents per thousand watts, and a further cut is already being considered. Although the saving here might not be as great as in Ontario we have the advantage of cheaper coal, yet a large cut would be possible, especially to users of power.

We trust that the Council will take this matter up in earnest and that inside of a year and a half Campbellton will be enjoying cheaper light and power.

According to a daily press report a safe lock has been invented which is provided with phonographic mechanism so that it can be opened only by the voice of the owner. A moustache like that of a telephone takes the place of a knob on the door and this is provided with the usual style of needle which travels in a groove in the sound record of the phonograph cylinder. Before the safe can be unlocked the password must be spoken into the cylinder by the one who made the original record. The report does not state what would occur if the owner should come down to his office with a bad cold—Scientific American.

REPORT OF WATER AND SEWERAGE COMMITTEE FOR FISCAL YEAR ENDING MARCH 31st, 1909.

To His Worship the Mayor and Town Council: Gentlemen:

In reviewing the work of this department for the past year it falls to me, with your permission, to submit this report of the completion or part completion of some very necessary improvements and very extensive additions in our water and sewerage systems. The continual growth of our town, which is placing us to the front amongst the best cities and towns of the Maritime Provinces, and the desire of our inhabitants for modern house improvements, improved sanitation and better fire protection, shown by the many house services, entailing the installation of new water mains and sewers in our streets, and requests for more fire hydrants. I regret many such requests this year have been beyond the power of our Committee and Council to grant; still what have been granted have assisted to make this forward step in our water and sewerage systems. It may be the opinion of a few of our citizens that some expenditures are yet necessary in our water system, but the fact that Campbellton has outgrown its water system is only too apparent.

The carrying capacity of the present ten inch main, with frictional loss and defective hydraulic grade is only equal to 650,000 gallons per working day, which is barely sufficient for our domestic and trade supply, leaving no margin for fire protection. These facts are so often illustrated to this town, also the annual increasing of our fire insurance rates, combined with the serious losses some of our industries and property owners have sustained through fires, called this committee's attention to obtaining means whereby the extra storage at Smith's Lake could be utilized and conveyed to the town. This matter was first introduced to Council during the civic year of 1907-1908.

On entering upon office this year the first duty was to appoint an Engineer in place made vacant by the retirement of Mr. Williams. Out of 63 applicants, D. T. Black was appointed to fill the position.

Active steps were taken to accomplish the work required by the town. Estimates were received from nine firms in Canada and Great Britain for the new 16 inch water pipes. The lowest tender was accepted and contract awarded to the Canadian Iron & Foundry Co., London, Ontario. Plans, specifications and schedules were prepared in our Town Engineer's office and tenders advertised for the execution of the work. Three contractors offered and the lowest accepted. This contract was awarded to Louis Devenen, Halifax. The undertaking proceeded favorably considering the many difficulties the contractor met with in executing his work, the trench being through a water-logged soil throughout its entire length. Two and one-tenth miles have been completed, leaving only 130 lineal yards to complete this first section of the pipe line. Section B of the contract, which provides for a measuring and screening house has not yet been undertaken, but this is a small piece of work. The contractor was granted release from his work on 3rd December and will resume work in the early summer.

A deed was procured from Mr. R. L. Duncan for right of way for a scour from 16 inch main to Walker Brook at a point about 20 feet west of road to Rifle Range. The purchase of a strip of land 30 feet wide to reservoir from Parker Lake road was required for joining of new water main to town reservoir, also as an entrance to town reservoir property. It may be mentioned here that the land required is also out of the route of the present ten inch main and the town holds deed procured by Water Company who laid the main, which provides access to said land for inspection and repairs to existing mains but does not provide for new main being laid on roadway to reservoir. The property belongs to three proprietors, namely, A. F. Chamberlain, J. B. Christopher and R. L. Duncan. Deeds were procured from Mr. Chamberlain and Mr. Christopher. Mr. Duncan, in conversation, informed us that he would sell at the same price as others agreed upon. When the deed was prepared and submitted to him he refused to sign. This matter is now being settled by arbitration. The portion required from Mr. Duncan is very small, measuring 30 feet by 25 feet.

In the town six extensions were made on the distributing main, or a total of 1347 lineal feet. Extensive improvements and repairs were made on the street mains as per statement herewith submitted in detail. The overhauling of the system was a very necessary piece of work and the benefit has been fully exemplified during the past winter. The total length of water mains now is: Mains from reservoir to town 4.4 miles; distributing mains in town 7.3 miles; or a total of 117 miles.

The sewerage system also received an overhaul and many repairs and improvements made, notably a 15 inch diameter sewer on Water street, having connection direct to the river by means of an old box drain, which in time can be remodelled and this 15 inch carried out to the low tide level. This has relieved the pressure caused in the manhole where Andrew Street sewer joins the Water Street sewer. Eight new street sewers were laid during this civic year, making a total of 1764 lineal feet, or a grand total of 5.9 miles. The request from the Hospital and residents on McMillan Terrace for a sewer service required a right of way through Mr. John Cantley's property. This right of way was conveyed by deed from Mr. Cantley to the Town.

The total cost of water works plant to date is \$188,350.50, that of sewers \$51,354.58.

The extensions and additions in town capital and operating work were as follows:

ADAMS STREET—Extension from Dufferin St. of 170 ft. of 6in. water and 9in. sewer, at an average depth of 9ft.

CENTRAL STREET—70ft. of 6in. water and 9 in. sewer at an average depth of 8ft. 6in.

NEW UNNAMED STREET—100ft. of 6in. water and 9in. sewer at an average depth of 6ft. 6in.

CROMWELL STREET—300ft. of 6in. water and 9in. sewer at an average depth of 8ft. with connections to Gerrard St. 4in water main and 9in. sewer. Sluice and scour valves were connected to 6in. at this point.

DUNCAN STREET—300ft. of 8in. water and 12in. sewer. The 8in. water will ultimately be connected with 10in. on Sugar Loaf St. and act as a feed to 4in. on Gerrard St. West. The 12in. sewer will in after years have other large connections made to it from other streets.

WATER STREET SEWER—From manhole on Water Street where Andrew Street sewer joins the Water St. sewer, a relief outfall of 15in. diameter was constructed for a distance of 125 feet, terminating temporary into a large box drain. This relieves the Water St. sewer from the great flow from Andrew St.

BAY VIEW and McMILLAN—329ft. of 9in. sewer at an average depth of 8ft. on McMillan Terrace and 4ft. through Mr. Cantley's property.

Surveys and plans were prepared for the sewerage construction works.

The system received a periodic inspection and overhaul. The automatic flush tanks are of no use and won't do the duty expected of them.

In drawing this synoptical report to a close on behalf of the Committee, fully endorse the resolution recently taken by our Council and the House of Trade in forming deputations to visit other cities and towns with specific deputations to visit new towns, and give an insight into the civic administration, management and actual improvements accomplished in other towns, whereby we receive more knowledge and help in the better accomplishment of our duties as Councillors. At the same time it acts as an advertisement in bringing Campbellton into touch with Canada generally, laying the foundation of placing Campbellton in its proper and recognized position as a manufacturing centre; opening up the field to the manufacturing world and placing its name before those who are locating for the building of new industries.

REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE

To the Town Council of the Town of Campbellton.
Gentlemen: Your Committee to whom are referred all matters relating to the Finances of the Town and the regulation of its Corporate Investments, beg leave to submit the following brief report for the fiscal year ending March 31st, 1909.

We are pleased to be able to state that, notwithstanding the heavy obligations assumed by the Town during the past year, including the laying of the new 16 inch water main, and other extensive additions made to the Water and Sewerage systems, the finances of the Town are still in a healthy condition.

At the beginning of the year, the balance of an issue of \$25,000.00 of 5 per cent. Bonds, previously authorized, was disposed of at par, and the proceeds applied to the wiping out of an overdraft which had been carried by the Bank of Nova Scotia from year to year. This overdraft was incurred by the construction of the new concrete reservoir, and the extension of the water system throughout the newly settled portion of the Town, and at a time when, from a financial point of view, the issue of Bonds would be inadvisable.

During the summer, however, despite the continued stringency of the money market, we were able to dispose of another issue of \$50,000.00 of 5 per cent. Bonds at par, for the purpose of providing funds for the installation of our new water main, already referred to, and which the increased demands of the Town rendered absolutely necessary.

The greater part of this water main is already laid, and there is a sufficient amount of the proceeds of this Bond issue on deposit in the Bank of Nova Scotia, bearing interest, to complete the undertaking during the coming summer.

Considering the fact that other Towns and Cities, and even our Provincial Government, are paying as high as 6 per cent. for money with which to carry on their public works, we must congratulate ourselves on the high standing which our Town has maintained in the financial markets of the Country. We may add, also, that our Bonds have always found a ready market, not only in St. John, Montreal and Toronto, but even in our own County of Restigouche, where our people have, by their ready purchase of our securities, given ample proof of their unwavering faith in the steady growth and permanency of our Town.

Among the minor matters of improvement which have also been effected during the year, under the jurisdiction of the Finance Department, may be mentioned the following: Offices have been fitted up in the Town Hall for the Town Clerk and Treasurer, and a large size Goldie & McCulloch Safe and Filing Cabinets installed, for the better classification and preservation of the Town Books, Papers and Public Documents. A Smith Premier Typewriting Machine and a new Bond Identification Record Book have also been procured, as well as other appliances, which were required to facilitate the clerical work of the Corporation.

In conclusion, we have every reason to hope that with the early completion of the additions and extensions to our water works system, now in course of construction, and the projected extension of our Electric Light and Fire Protection services, our natural industries—present and prospective—will receive that encouragement which they deserve, and with our already increased shipping facilities, will result in the material development of our financial resources, and the consequent lessening of the burdens of our civic obligations.

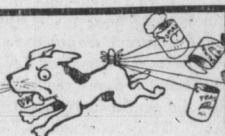
