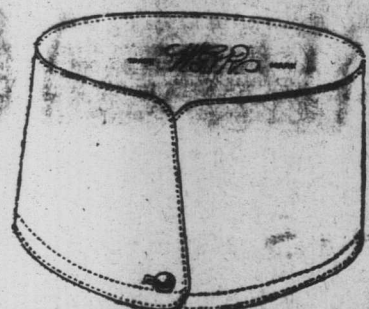

## HE JUMPS FROM A FAST TRAIN

Fire Chief On His Way To  
Penitentiary Makes  
His Escape

NORTH BAY, Wednesday—With one hand fettered handcuffs, fire chief Raymond, of Blind River, on his way to the penitentiary to serve seven years' sentence threw himself from the window of a rapidly moving train. It was reported he died from his injuries five hours after jumping, but later it was learned that he had been recaptured near the house of a farmer. He had asked the farmer to remove a handcuff from one hand. He was, in charge of Sheriff Stephenson and Jailor J. Hurston on the Toronto train from North Bay. At midnight he expressed a desire to go to the lavatory and one of his hands were released. The train at this time was between Nipissing Junction and Callendar. Immediately his absence was discovered the train was stopped and the officers went back after him. Raymond forged the names of reputable citizens to letters addressed to himself asking him to set fire to buildings.

## TIMES PRAISES ALL RED ROUTE

Says Only Impracticability  
of Scheme Would Justify  
Its Abandonment

(Special to the Morning Graphic.)  
CHATHAM, Wednesday—A special issue of the Times, published yesterday, has taken up the "Times" leader to-day says: "We cannot too strongly emphasize the fact that the government pledges the country to the principle of the all red route, and only the absolute impracticability of the latter would now justify its abandonment."

The "Times" special issue speaks of the Canadian government's action as restriction of immigration during the next few months and says that Bruce Walker, on behalf of the Interior Department, has instructed every booking agent that no immigrant landing in Canada between February 15 and April 25 will be admitted unless he has \$50. In addition they must have friends here. Walker has also advertised a demand for skilled labor in Canada.

MONTREAL, Wednesday—Hon. I. Israel Tarte, ex-minister of public works and one of the leading Liberal statesmen for the past fifteen years, died this afternoon at 2.45 p.m., at the residence of his son-in-law, Dr. Francis De Martinny. Nine days ago he fell suddenly unconscious at his residence at Boncherville. He continued very ill for several days, having frequent unconscious spells, and three days ago he was removed to his son-in-law's residence in an unconscious condition. He remained unconscious up to his death. Mr. Tarte was one of Canada's most prominent statesmen. He entered the cabinet of Sir Wilfrid Laurier in 1896 as minister of public works, and remained in that capacity until 1902, when he resigned.

## MATTER FOR PARLIAMENT.

KINGSTON, Wednesday—A member of parliament is likely to have an episode in the Royal Military College ventilated in parliament. His son was rusticated for four months for offences which he stoutly denies. A trial was held here on the father's demands, which he says was a farce. He now wants the retirement of the authorities concerned.

CHATHAM, Wednesday—Sandy McPherson, a farmer for McLennan and McNaught, who lives on the other side of the river had a narrow escape from drowning this morning while attempting to cross on the ice. He was only about one-third of the way over when the ice gave way under him. He was rescued by fishermen from this side of the river. People are crossing on the ice at different places near here, but the ice is still treacherous. A Scott Act case against Mrs. John A. McDaid was tried this morning.

REPORT NOT TRUE.

Fielding is Able to Find Subsidy For All-Red Route.

MONTREAL, Tuesday.—The Star's London cable says: The sensational statement that circumstances have suddenly arisen at Ottawa which led Hon. Mr. Fielding to decide it to be impossible to find a Canadian subsidy of \$2,500,000 for the All-Red project is not yet confirmed. NEW YORK, Tuesday—New York in the opinion of James J. Hill, head of the Great Northern, has reached the climax of her commercial supremacy.

In an interview he expressed this view, his reason being that this city cannot hope to maintain its commercial control when its chief claim is, as he states, that it is the dearest place in which to do business. "The cost of everything relative to trade and commerce," said Mr. Hill, "has increased here beyond the point of profit. Traffic will be forced to seek other outlets; business other locations."

"The tax imposed on business in New York is enormous. Your real estate, your dock, your means of communication, are all burdened with heavy charges. The price to live and do business in New York is growing beyond the ability of the people to stand it. They will be forced to go elsewhere, seeking places where the cost is more reasonable."

"Traffic cannot be dammed up. It will see an outlet somewhere, by going around the elbow making for itself entirely new channels."

"There are two outlets for the west possible of development besides New York and the adjacent ports. One is through Canada, down the St. Lawrence and the other down the Mississippi to New Orleans."

"The products of the west are bound to reach the markets of the east. If they are blocked and overtaxed on their way through New York, they will find new channels for themselves."

## ONTARIO MINES OUTPUT.

TORONTO, Monday—The output of the mines and mineral works of Ontario, according to the just issued report of the Bureau of Mines, for 1906, has a total value of \$22,388,323, an increase over 1905 of \$4,530,687, or about 25 per cent. The larger aggregate of value for 1906 is attributed in a large degree to the increase of prices which has been somewhat general throughout the list of products. During 1906 there was paid in wages in connection with mining enterprises, \$6,048,228, as compared with \$5,082,653. The principle element of value in output is in silver, which shows an advance of \$2,216,409.

OTTAWA, Monday—Hiram Donkin, deputy minister of mines, of Nova Scotia, has been appointed representative of the Cumberland Railway and Coal Company at the rights which will be held at the Cape Sable.

## MERCIER ELECTED BY GOOD MAJORITY

ORMESTOWN, P.Q., Monday—Ald. Honore Mercier, the government candidate of Montreal, was to-day elected to the Quebec Legislature for Chateauguay by 240 majority with two polls yet to report. The fight was a three cornered one, the candidates being Honore Mercier, government; Joseph Poinsett, of Montreal, Independent Liberal, and Jos. N. Laberge, of Chateauguay, Independent. The election was caused by the recent appointment of Mr. Dupuis, the Liberal member, to be joint recorder of Montreal.

## DIXON'S FREIGHT OFF THE TRACK

NEWCASTLE, Monday. Rev. H. A. Brown received word last week of the death of his father, Thomas Brown, at his home in Sunderland, England, at the age of sixty-two, leaving four children, Frederick, Jessie and Jean, at Sunderland, and Rev. Mr. Brown, here.

H. V. Leighton, of Beverly, Mass., will leave for home to-morrow with his three children, who have been visiting with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Isaac Leighton. Mr. Leighton came on Saturday.

Mrs. Isaac Leighton, who has been ill several months, is now convalescent. At 11.30 last night C. Dixon's west-bound freight went off the track at Bartibogue switch, blocking the track several hours. Auxiliary to the wrecking crew went up from Newcastle and cleared the track.

Nine carloads of immigrants, in charge of Conductor Sears, passed through here this morning. Alderman J. B. McDermid left today on a trip to Bathurst and Jacquet River.

BOSTON, Monday—In spite of the fact that the step means the giving up of her home and friends and isolation of the Bulgarian, Boris in Macedonia, was shot dead at the threshold of his house today by a Macedonian, who at the same time killed his wife and two children. The chief named Garvanoff, while the latter was in the act of bidding Sarafoff farewell.

Boris Sarafoff was appointed commander of the Macedonian revolutionaries, a force that made so much trouble in the summer of 1903. His name was prominent in all the uprisings in Macedonia against the Turks and he has been described as the most romantic figure in the Balkans. He was popularly believed to have been the real instigator of the abduction of Miss Eliza M. Stansfield, the American missionary, in September, 1901, in order to procure through her ransom, funds to enable the Macedonian revolutionary committee to organize the insurrection.

His hatred of the Turks was imbedded at an early age through seeing his father and grandfather tortured, dragged into a dungeon, and then exiled for fifteen years. At the age of 14 he attacked, single-handed, the prison in which his father and grandfather were confined, but he was floored by his pains. The boy swore to revenge himself on the Turks and studied to this end, becoming an officer in the Bulgarian army.

In 1896, Sarafoff formed a band of desperadoes to raid Turkish territory. Since then he had headed no less than 380 daring raids into Turkey. Sarafoff was familiar with hundreds of miles of tracks through forests and over mountains of Turkey. His aim was the organization of a vast rebellion, with the object of seizing Constantinople and overthrowing the dynasty and Turkish rule. The Turkish government set a price of \$20,000 on his head. He was about 37 years old.

Sarafoff was the organizer of the Macedonian committee. His prominence in Macedonian agitation and his dictatorial methods made him many enemies among his own followers. The murderer is believed to be a man named Panitzas a nephew of the notorious Mali Panitzas, who was executed by shooting in 1899 for conspiring to assassinate Prince Ferdinand and certain members of the Bulgarian cabinet.

The crime is attributed to dissensions over the disposal of money subscribed to the Macedonian cause. The police are searching for Panitzas, but have not yet found him.

## CRUISE OF WORLD WIDE FAME IS NOW BEGUN

OLD POINT COMFORT, Va., Monday—The backbone of the United States navy, sixteen first class battleships under command of Rear-Admiral Robley D. Evans, sailed to-day for the Pacific Ocean, a 14,000 mile cruise, which has set all the world talking. As a naval pageant, the review and departure of the fleet to-day was the most notable in American history. There have been several presidential reviews of the fleet, but during the past eighteen months, in these instances it was lying at anchor chains while the reviewing yacht passed up and down the lines. To-day the fleet was out on board on a cruise, which, as the President himself expressed it, "No fleet of such size has ever before undertaken."

With all due respects to professional optimists, if the present conditions keep right on up to Christmas the stereotyped query: "Where did you get it?" will be changed to "Where are you going to get?"

## LABOR CONDITIONS.

The last issue of the official "Labor Gazette" contains an interesting and valuable general summary of the industrial and labor conditions throughout the Dominion during the month of October. According to this account the labor market was less active during the month of October than it had been in the month of September, and the amount of general employment was somewhat less than for the corresponding month of last year. There was no report of the surplus of labor, and there is a probability that some information on this subject may be lacking. As a general thing favorable weather conditions prevailed for threshing in western Canada, and work in this connection was unusually prolonged. The report estimates that the agricultural yield will be less than for the year 1906, but states that the higher prices will equalize the monetary returns for the season. The continued stringency in the money market is credited as the principal cause of the falling off in building operations. Men who have been thrown out of work by the cessation of civic improvement work, and other outside callings, have found ready employment available in the railway construction camps, which were short of men, and which promise active operations throughout the winter. There is a marked scarcity of men for work in the winter lumber camps of Ontario and Quebec. From the report it appears that a number of important commodities were unusually high in price during the month of October. The wheat market, while subject to a number of fluctuations, was, on the whole, considerably higher than for the month previous, the price passing \$1.00 per bushel. Oats and other grains kept pace with wheat, and hay reached the highest price recorded for some years past. This was also true of the general run of farm produce, which was quoted at prices much higher than usual for this time of the year. Flour, as a matter of course, followed the upward trend of wheat, and increased considerably in price as shown by the fact that one grade, which sold for \$4.30 in May last, increased to \$5.75. Bread advanced in many places, and oatmeal and other cereal foods did the same. The manufacture of confectionery was disturbed by the advance of such raw materials as sugar, chocolate, glucose, nuts and vanilla beans. Many varieties of canned goods advanced to retailers. Canned fruits ranged from 2 cents to 45 cents higher per dozen; tomatoes 11-2 cents per dozen, and other canned vegetables in proportion. In the Maritime Provinces fuel prices advanced and a scarcity of coal is reported from several points in that section. Zinc, tin and spelter followed the downward course of copper, but iron and lead have been firm. Heavy marketing of live stock

has been induced by the scarcity of feed in the farmers' hands, with the result that meats at some points were lower in price. The increased cost of grain, labor and all kinds of material are given as among the reasons advanced by the Canadian distillers for the increase in the price of their products, which has been rather pronounced. Saw-mills continued very busy throughout the Maritime Provinces and Ontario and Quebec. The markets are somewhat easier, and shipments were active with stocks light. There was a decreased activity in British Columbia logging operations, and a number of the men thus thrown out of employment have been able to find work at railway construction camps, and about the mines and smelters until recently. The return to active mining and smelting operations in the interior will tend to absorb a portion of this class of labor. The reason advanced for the decline was a decrease in the demand from the Prairie Provinces, where the stringency in the money market has curtailed building operations. A revival was expected with the completion of the harvesting and threshing. There was a surplus of logs in the British Columbia market, though the demand continued for first class timber.

## IMPRACTICABLE IDEAS.

Mr. Upton Sinclair, of Jungle Book fame, it is doubtless well known, is a Socialist. He believes in, and preaches, the doctrine that the social salvation of the world can only be accomplished by the downfall of "capital." In the practice of this belief Mr. Sinclair has developed something which he considers a working principle. In pursuance of this belief he proposes that communities should strike a telling blow at the capital which has private property in houses and land by living upon public highways and commons. He himself has had a "caravan," or something corresponding to such a vehicle, constructed, in which with his family (if he is weighed with such an incumbrance) he perambulates the country at his own sweet will and permits no blighting capitalist to dictate the terms upon which he shall maintain a roof over his head. Of course Mr. Sinclair recommends that all who feel the tyranny of capital (with a large C) should follow his example. Mr. Sinclair's advice, on the last impulse, would appear good. But it is to be feared the distinguished author has not considered his proposition in all its multifarious ramifications. He cannot have given serious thought to what would happen if all men were to follow his example. In what con-

dition would the streets of great cities and the highways leading to great cities be if the majority of men (the vast majority not being bloated capitalists) were to take to his suggested manner of living? Another sceptical newspaper has undertaken to point out some other and more serious objections to Mr. Sinclair's plan. The New York Post says: "Mr. Upton Sinclair's latest venture, a co-operative colony that shall be perpetuated, exist in tents and wagons, has certain manifest advantages over all previous projects. The list of evils which it escapes, compiled from official sources, includes plumbers, carpenters, rent, steam heat, taxes, starched collars, landlords, and fires. With these eliminated, the remaining vexations and restrictions of civilized life must, of course, be infinitesimally small. The colony will be organized at Battle Creek, begin its progress in southern California, cross the ocean about its second year, going, as its founder explains 'anywhere and everywhere as our fancies dictate.' It is, as he truly says, 'Utopia on a trek.' But there is one difficulty that it does not evade. Reduce human wants to the very lowest terms, and they still cost something to satisfy. At an extremely low estimate, there are today in the United States forty million persons who would like nothing better than to spend their days skyranching about the face of this planet—if they could only pay the bills. The man, who, like the socialist-novelist, can do remunerative work in one spot as well as another, is such an exceptional being that his solutions of the problems of subsistence are about as valuable to the every-day working world as those of the Martians. No doubt, all other prophets of new and better 'lives' are hopeless stick-in-the-mud from the viewpoint of the new colony. Still, the crassest of them has more real practical counsel for the ordinary straphanging citizen."

## GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC RAILWAY INQUIRY FOR N. LAND IN SASKATOON.

Which is Being Sold by the North-western Land and Investment Co., Ltd. of this City.

(St. John Globe, Nov. 30th, 07.) Private advices have been received this week from parties in Saskatchewan mentioning that the agents for the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway have been securing a price on property that has been sold by the Northwestern Land and Investment Co., Ltd. No less than six routes have been stalked off, all on the eastern portion of Saskatchewan, during the past few days, presumably for an entrance into the city, and a location for their new passenger depot.

Should the negotiations going on be completed local holders of this property will no doubt realize some handsome profits on their original investments.
