HOW TO VOTE SATURDAY

Follow Directions Closely to Avoid Spoiling Ballot—Vote for LeBlanc and Harrison

Polls open at 8 a.m. and close at 4 p.m.

Manner of voting is different from that in Dominion elections. Ballots are provided for candidates of each party. All names of each ticket are on each ballot. If one of them is scratched through and another candidate's name added that does not spoil the ballot provided black lead pencil or black ink is used. All ballots must be on plain (not ruled) white paper and written or printed with black ink.

Full name of candidate as on the ballot must be used or simply the surname, but if full name is used be sure and get the initials correct.

Party workers outside the poll can give any elector a ballot. The elector after giving his or her name to the returning officer is given an envelope to place his or her ballot in, but to do this elector must go behind a screen. After doing this the elector comes from behind the screen, gives the envelope to the returning officer and waits until he places it in the ballot box before leaving the polling booth.

When the votes are being counted one representative should stand behind the returning officer and watch each ballot to see, first, that it is read correctly, secondly, to see that the ballot is of white paper, with the names in black ink or black lead pencil. Partisan returning officers have been known to read ballots wrongly, calling out the names of their own ticket when the vote was for their own opponent. Watch for this.

The vote that is polled early is the winning vote.
Vote for LeBlanc and Harrison the only recognized government candidates.

BIG MEETING LAST EVENING

Hon. C. W. Robinson and Restigouche Government Candidates Address Meeting.

The Opera House was crowded last evening to greet Hon. C. W. Robinson, Minister of Lands and Mines of Moncton and the Restigouche county government candidates Messrs. A. T. LeBlanc and S. S. Harrison.

The chair was taken by Mr. W. H. Miller, who after a few remarks introduced Mr. LeBlanc. Mr. LeBlanc made a short address in French. He received very careful attention and was frequently applauded. His address in English was also very attentively listened to and he was frequently applauded. He spoke for over an hour.

Mr. S. S. Harrison was given a great reception when he stepped to the front to say a few words, and he was frequently interrupted with applause.

Hon. C. W. Robinson, Minister of Lands and Mines was the speaker of the evening. He was in fine form and made a deep impression upon the large audience.

Mr. Robinson said that he had not journeyed from Moncton to Restigouche to inflict his remarks upon the good people of Campbellton, he had come at the earnest request of his friend Mr. A. T. LeBlanc, and he assured all that it was a great pleasure for him to come up to again visit the North Shore town.

Back in 1917, and that was not so long ago, the people had risen in their might and turned the Murray government out. Of the actions of that government previous to 1917 the least said is soonest forgotten the better. You all have read that sordid record which so disgraced this province throughout the whole Dominion.

Hon. Mr. Foster was given charge of the affairs and he thought he was fair when he said that the record of the present administration was an honorable one. There had not been a shadow of charge against any department. The result of this was that the Opposition had not been able to put candidates in very many constituencies.

BUMPER MEETING AT JACQUET RIVER

Messrs. LeBlanc and Harrison Greeted by Crowded House Tuesday Evening.

The C. M. B. A. Hall at Jacquet River was crowded to the doors Tuesday evening to greet the government candidates, Messrs. A. T. LeBlanc and S. S. Harrison and it was the most orderly and enthusiastic meeting ever held by the government candidates in Durham.

Mr. LeBlanc gave a most eloquent address dealing fully with the lumber policy of the present administration, as well as other questions and he was frequently interrupted with applause. Mr. S. S. Harrison was also given a grand reception.

ELECTION RETURNS:

Complete returns by Direct Service for County and Province at the Opera House, Saturday Night.

But they have endeavored by other means to bring about the fall of the Foster government. In Kent county two former supporters of the Murray government are running under the guise of United Farmers, in other counties they have combined with the United Farmers or Labor candidates, and in Carleton Mr. Smith is running as an Independent.

There is not a doubt but that the Foster government would be returned to power and the Opposition will not have enough followers to keep themselves warm. He was sure that the progressive county of Restigouche would send two supporters of the Foster government. Mr. LeBlanc who so ably discussed the issues, has taken a foremost position among the government members at Fredericton. He wished to congratulate Restigouche on having such an able and clever representative, and he had no doubt but that Mr. LeBlanc and his colleagues would be returned by a handsome majority on the 9th of October.

In speaking of the work of his department Mr. Robinson said, "It is my ambition to carry on the department handed over to me in such a high state of efficiency by Mr. Smith not for the benefit of the lumbermen, or the party in power, but for the benefit of the whole people."

Mr. Robinson said that three years ago he expressed the opinion that the Government revenue from Stumpage ought to be doubled—that a rate of \$1.50 was too low. He had been conservative in his prediction then; today the rate was \$5 and the revenue from stumpage this year would be \$1,300,000.

The estimated territorial revenue from all sources for this year was \$1,490,000. Up to September 30, the sum of \$1,421,000 had been collected and there were accounts receivable amounting to \$109,000, making a total of territorial revenue of \$1,581,000.

"We hardly realize what an important asset we have in our Crown Lands. Our territorial revenues are equivalent to a tax of 1 1/2 per cent on property worth \$100,000,000. The Government has to have money to carry on the affairs of the province and if it were not for the Crown Lands a tax would have to be levied on private property."

The Opposition were not sincere in their crown land policy. In 1916 they passed an order in council placing the rate of stumpage for ten years from that date at \$1.50. Last year these very same men introduced a resolution to have it increased to \$7.50.

Mr. Robinson spoke at length of the measures which were being taken to conserve the great forest wealth, Fire Protection, Reforestation, etc.

He also dwelt upon the development of our water power and showed that when the development now planned was completed electric current could be sold at a profit for 1 cent, which was now costing about 10 cents.

He was glad to hear Mr. LeBlanc say that the Hon. Minister of Public Works had announced that the Dominion government had approved of a trunk highway between Campbellton and St. Leonard's. This was a very fine proposition and would mean much for Campbellton and the whole province.

Mr. Robinson in a very fluent manner discussed the road policy of the Foster government, as well as the Public Health, Workmen's Compensation Act. He said that in three and a half years the Foster government had placed more constructive legislation on the statute books than the Opposition did in the entire time they were in power.

He ended by making a prophecy and that was that the Foster government would be returned to power with a big majority on the 9th of October, and he hoped Restigouche would send the recognized Foster government candidates, Messrs. LeBlanc and Harrison to look after the county's interests.

BONAVENTURE COUNTY COUNCIL

Meeting—at New Carlisle in September—Much Business Done.

A General Meeting of the County Council of the County of Bonaventure, was held at the Town Hall, at New Carlisle, on Wednesday the eighth day of September, 1920, at ten of the clock in the forenoon of the said date:

Forming a quorum under the provisions of the Municipal Code of the Province of Quebec.

Mayor A. Dugas, of Musseyville, Pro-Warden of the County of Bonaventure, in the Chair, in the temporary absence of his Worship Peter Dache, Warden of the County, and Mayor of Port Daniel East.

The Minutes of the last meeting were read by the Secretary-Treasurer, and approved of and adopted upon the Motion of Mayor S. M. Adams, seconded by Mayor Peter Cyr.

After discussion by the Council, the Secretary-Treasurer was instructed to send copies of the Minutes of the deliberations of the Council, in the English and French languages, to the Mayors and Secretary-Treasurers of the Municipal Councils comprised within the County of Bonaventure.

The Secretary-Treasurer then laid before the Council all correspondence received by him since the last meeting, all of which was duly filed on record.

The report of the Special Committee of the Council appointed at its last meeting in March regarding the Vault of the First Registration Division of the County of Bonaventure at New Carlisle, was laid before the Council, and after discussion thereon, a vote of thanks was proposed to the said Committee for their services on the whole, by Mayor Busted, seconded by Mayor Adams, and further that the question be laid over for consideration.—Adopted.

It being the dinner hour, upon the motion of Mayor P. Cyr, seconded by Mayor Alexis Poirier, the meeting of the Council was adjourned until half past one of the afternoon.

At half past one of the afternoon the meeting resumed business under the presidency of His Worship the Warden of the County, Mr. Peter Dache, Mayor of Port Daniel East.

After deliberation by the Council, it was moved by Mayor Clapperton, seconded by Mayor Allard, that the Claim of Mr. Austin McKay, of Grand Caspédia, against the County Council, to the amount of \$12.75, for an accident to his automobile, on the Grand Caspédia River Bridge or approaches thereto, be laid over for further consideration.—Adopted.

Moved by Mayor Adams, seconded by Mayor Clapperton, that the claim of Mr. Belanger for an accident to his automobile on King's Highway between Glen Emma and Millstream, be placed in the hands of Mr. F. Bujead, Advocate, for settlement, and that the Secretary-Treasurer be authorized to pay Mr. Bujead any sum due, or to be paid in connection with this matter.—Adopted.

Moved by Mayor Blois, seconded by Mayor Adams, that a vote of thanks be tendered to Mr. F. Bujead, Advocate, for his courtesy in coming to the meeting, at the request of the Council with reference to the Matapédia Valley.—Adopted.

Moved by Mayor Busted, seconded by Mayor Allard, that a further application be sent to the Government Authorities at Ottawa for more War Trophies.—Adopted.

Moved by Mayor Peter Cyr, seconded by Mayor Allard, that the Secretary-Treasurer do put himself in communication with the Provincial explanation and information necessary with regard to Inane dues, where there is total inability to pay the same in instances such as the Smith case and others, before this Council, and that Mr. F. Bujead, Advocate, be consulted on the matter.—Adopted.

Moved by Mayor Clapperton, seconded by Mayor N. Cyr, that Mr. William LeBlanc, of Grand Caspédia, be appointed Road Inspector for the Grand Caspédia River Bridges and approaches thereto, to replace Mr.

To The Women of New Brunswick

For the first time in provincial affairs, the full and free right to the franchise is extended to women and all those registered have the privilege of voting on October 9. Many women will thus cast their ballots for the first time and it is fortunate that the issues in this election are so clean-cut and clearly defined. SERIOUS DAMAGE BY WATER

Heavy Rain Floods Streets and Basements All Over Town.

The extremely heavy rain of last Thursday night and Friday morning caused a general flooding of streets and basements, as the sewers were not large enough to carry off the flow of water.

At Minto Street the flood was worse than any former one, there being about four feet of water on the roadway in the hollow by Dr. Mann's residence. The water was so deep that a car coming down Minto Street was stalled and had to be pulled out with a long rope attached to another car.

The water flowed down Minto to Roseberry Street in a regular river, carrying gravel and refuse down through the Subway to Water Street.

Here the water entered basements and did much damage to stocks carried therein. It reached the highest level in the history of Campbellton. At W. H. Gray's the water was up to the basement windows and considerable was destroyed, as well as his ice cream plant seriously damaged.

On Union Street the water flowed to the low point in front of Mr. Wm. Savidant's residence, floating the sidewalk and wood about.

Reports from districts from all sections of the town say that basements were flooded and more or less damaged.

As these floods are very frequent it would seem that some system of surface storm sewers would have to be devised as the sewerage system is altogether inadequate to carry off such volumes of water as are in evidence after a heavy rain.

SOME SPEED.

French Woman Pleads Cross the Atlantic in Ten Hours.

Twenty-four hours from New York in ten hours is the latest and most audacious claim of French aviation. It will be done within the next few years by means of two new inventions. At a height of 40,000 feet, owing to the reduced air pressure, a speed of 250 kilometers (252 miles) an hour can be maintained.

Two difficulties which face the inventor are: first, to secure the fuel; second, to secure a life-supporting atmosphere for the aviator and passengers, says Science and Invention.

The first of these difficulties has been largely overcome by an invention which was recently used by Lieut. Henri Stenon, who flew from Paris to Lyons, a distance of nearly 250 miles, at a speed of 150 miles an hour. He kept the air at a height of 15,000 to 18,000 feet all the way and was able to maintain his speed in the rarefied atmosphere by means of an invention which compressed the air to the carburetor to normal atmosphere.

Since then a controlled trial has shown that a motor giving 178 horsepower at water level and ninety-five horsepower at 15,000 feet can be used to give 150 horsepower when the air is compressed by the new apparatus. To that extent the effect of rarefaction of the air has been overcome, and it seems certain that the principle having been established, further development will be rapid.

The second difficulty is to secure breathing air for the fliers. The example of the submarine is here invoked. There is no more difficulty, it is stated, in making an enclosed chamber provided with air at normal pressure, which will travel above the clouds than in making one which travels below the water.

Once these two problems are effectively solved full advantage can be taken of the non-resistance of the upper air. To go quicker one will have only to go higher, and incidentally to go cheaper, for the faster voyage less fuel will be burned. In those days, it will be a daily service of airplanes flying down across the Atlantic and dropping down in New York in time for breakfast.

Austria's Royal Palace.

The beautiful city palace of the ex-emperor of Austria, just off the Ringstrasse, in Vienna, known as Hofburg, was once the site of an old mill.

In 1850 Maximilian acquired the spot and had a small castle erected there, which he used as a summer box for wild deer in the surrounding forest. The Turks destroyed this castle in 1855. It was rebuilt in 1709 by Leopold I.

From then on it was used as a summer palace. But when the present beauty to Maria Theresa, who commissioned "Palladio," a renowned architect, to erect one of the most exquisite and elaborate palaces possible on the site.

Visitors to the interior of the palace ascend a massive white stoop to a section of the palace set apart for them. After entering the lobby, guards appear with carpet slippers, which visitors must put on over their shoes to protect the floors of the palace.

The splendor of this interior room is almost dazzling. It is lighted by a chandelier of rare value, which drops very low from the ceiling, suspended by bronze chains attached to protruding claws. The myriads of lights are held in place by bands of angles. The first of the guest rooms was once occupied by Maria Theresa, and the old imperial bed is always an object of scrutiny. It is very high, a foot-stool being necessary to get into it.

Makes Robes for Cardinals.

The peculiarity of the cardinal's hat is that it is not intended to be worn. On one occasion only is it to be seen on the head of a cardinal, and that is when the Pope himself places it there as a symbol of his own's elevation to the Sacred College. When the cardinal dies it is placed upon his coffin.

The hat is of a deeper red than that of the robe worn by a cardinal. It has long heavy silken cords, each with fifteen tassels at the end, hanging on either side. There are at present three "red hats" in Westminster Cathedral. They are those of Cardinals Wiseman, Manning, and Vaughan.

The crimson robes which, like the hat, denote the cardinal's office, are made of a cloth which at several generations past has been supplied by a firm of cloth merchants at Burtchfield, near Aix-la-Chapelle. The process by which the dye is dyed is a jealously-guarded secret. There is a touch of irony in the fact that the family responsible for the manufacture of cardinal's robes is of Huguenot extraction. For the past two hundred years they have been staunch adherents of the Lutheran Church, and the present head of the firm is himself a Protestant.




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

WHY SHERIFF REFUSED PAPERS

Nomination Papers Were Not Made Out According to Election Act.

At the declaration proceedings held Saturday Sheriff Thomas Craig stated that because of an irregularity in the nomination papers of Messrs. Charles H. LaBillicois and William D. Duncan he could not accept same. This has caused a great deal of discussion among all classes and so that our readers can judge for themselves we interviewed Sheriff Craig and he has given us the following particulars.

Saturday at 10 o'clock the Sheriff opened his court at the court house, Dalhousie. At about 11:45 Mr. H. A. Carr appeared and filed the nomination papers of Mr. D. A. Stewart and immediately J. A. LeBlanc filed the nomination papers of Henry Diotte.

The nomination papers of Messrs. Arthur T. LeBlanc and Stubbert S. Harrison had been filed with the Sheriff several days previously as provided by the act. Mr. Carr looked over these latter papers and stated that they were all right and he assured the Sheriff that Mr. Stewart's paper was entirely in order. Mr. A. J. LeBlanc gave the same assurance in reference to Mr. Diotte's paper.

At four minutes to 12 o'clock Messrs. Duncan and LaBillicois entered the court and Mr. Duncan handed their two nomination papers to the Sheriff and gave his word that they were in order.

Sheriff Craig had made arrangements with Mr. M. A. Kelly to examine all the papers and pass upon them as to their legality. Unfortunately the train upon which Mr. Kelly was proceeding to Dalhousie was delayed and he did not reach the court until it had been closed. But taking the word of the legal gentlemen who filed the papers the sheriff made the statement that there were six names in nomination and according to law Mr. Carr demanded a poll.

When Mr. Kelly arrived and examined the papers he found that those of Messrs. LaBillicois and Duncan were not made out according to law. These papers had been prepared by a legal gentleman in the proper form, and a note appended instructing the party, who procured the signatures of the necessary ratepayers to make oath as provided in the act. The nomination papers were signed by only twenty-three names of supposed ratepayers while the act says twenty or more bona fide ratepayers must sign such paper.

The sections of the act covering this is as follows:— 66. No nomination shall be validly acted upon by the returning officer unless it is accompanied by:— Here follow Sec. (a), (67), (68). But section 69 was entirely omitted. This is most important and reads as follows:—

69. The Sheriff shall require the person, or one or more of the persons producing or filing as aforesaid any such nomination paper, to make oath that he or they know that the several persons who have signed such nomination paper are electors duly registered on the voters' list in the electoral district, and that they have signed the same in his or their presence; and he shall also require the person, or one or more persons witnessing the consent of the candidates, to make oath that the consent of the candidate has been signed in his or their presence; or in case of the person named as candidate is absent from the province, that such person, according to his best information, knowledge and belief is absent from the Province. 
