Arctic Birds below Quebec.

A letter from Rimouski informs the Cana dien that the Lower St. Lawrence has been visited lately by an extraordinary afflu. week, from the seat of war. The latest acence of birds,—ducks, wild geese and other counts report the Federal army as attemptstorms. They have been succeeded by an influx of Arctic birds, seldom if ever seen in the Province. These are white partridges and white owls. The former are now as informed circles that a terrible cloud is now abundant at Rimonski, Ste. Flaire, St. Fabien du Bic, &c., as pigeons are in spring. They keep together in large flocks, and are easily approached and killed. The white owls are the terror of the smaller birds, which eisely after the former fashion of Burnside have disappeared at their approach. The farmers have set traps for them, and destroyed a great number. The people think that this extraordinary arrival of Arctic birds to receive them.
