

BROKE WORLD'S RECORD. Empire City Race Track, Yonkers, N. Y., June 1.-Of the 5,000 or more spectators this afternoon attracted to this track by the big automobile meet, fully a third of them reached here in their own vehicles.

The delay in starting the Oldfield-Ridgeway match was caused by a difficulty with Ridgeway's machine. Finally at 4:20 the machines were sent off from a standing start. The conditions called for a pursuit contest, Oldfield starting at the wire and Ridgeway from the half-mile mark on the back stretch. The Quebec Board of Trade requested that a resolution be passed by London indorsing the plan to make a condition of the charter for any transcontinental of the charter for any transcontinental railroad that the terminal points be in Canada only, at St. Lawrence ports in summer and at St. John or Halffax in winter. The board could not see in what way London would be interested and the document was ordered filed. 
