The Finance Minister would have to take a valuation of all the land in he Dominion. He could use the present customs staff, assisted by local officers. Having made the valuation the only thing to do would be to estimate the expenses for the current year and collect. The same valuation ought to do for local and Dominion matters, and a thoroughly competent court ought to arbitrate disputed valuations. Almost every cent of tax would go straight to the various exchequers. One-third of the present number engaged in customs work would be sufficient; land lies all in the open, so therewould be no possible evasion or lying about it.

to get the sanction of the Council for a byiaw to be voted upon by the people, indorsing the proposition to apply for legislation to effect certain changes in the management of corporation affairs. The chief points and the only intellectual quality brought recommended for adoption are the abolition of wards and the division of the city into four districts, the Board of Aldermen to number 24 with the mayor. Six of the aldermen to be elected in the manner presently provided by law; the three having the lowest number of votes shall retire at the end of one year, and the three having and Assessment; (2) Streets and Public Works; (3) Property and Waterworks. The mayor to appoint the chairmen of commit-tees. A Board of Control will be made up the mayor and the three chairmen committees. Except during July d August, the Council shall meet weekly and the Board of Control tri-weekly. During the interval between meet-ings the Board of Control may exercise all the powers of the Council not involving an diture over \$1,000, but a two-thirds vote of the Council shall overturn their decision. No appointments to office are to be made except from among persons nominated by the Board of Control, and no re-commendation of expenditure or reduction of revenue exceeding \$200 shall be sub-mitted to the Council until it shall have first been submitted to the Board of Control, and if not approved by the Board of Control it will require a two-thirds vote of the Council before it becomes law. Aldermen who are members of the Board of Control shall be paid an annual salary not exceeding \$2,000. 




