Preparations for the Electrocutions at Sing Sing.

A "Comfortable Looking" In strument of Death.

Capable of Killing Twenty-Five Mer in an Hour.

The Deadly "Figure Four"-The Code of

NEW YORK, July 6-8 a.m.-The execution has not taken place at Sing Sing. The warden is not at the prison.

The chair in which the condemned men

The chair in which the condemned men will suffer the death penalty is substantial as well as comfortable looking. It is conceeded with the dynamo and was designed by Captain Hilbert, the prison machinist. The seat is broad, and the back, on which a heavy head-rest is constructed, has a slight curve above the rest, and fastened so the back by a long strip is

A FIGURE FOUR,
which is intended to rest on the head of the occupant. It is through the wire in this that the current passes. Besides this there are a number of straps used to secure the prisoner in position after he has taken his seat in the chair. The chair faces the sast, and directly behind it is a low cabinet for the use of the man who turns on the intent, who is thus out of sight of everybody.

The following directions are posted up for the benefit of the operators: Five bells, get ready; one bell, turn on current; two bells, turn on more current; three bells, less current; one bell, shat off current; bells, less current; one bell, sant on current; six bells, all through. Underneath the directions is a little electric bell button, which is pressed to give the signal to the operator. Next the placard is the test switch. This switch turns on the current into a dozen or more meandescent lights at the top of the switch beard and also into the ammeter and voltage. neandescent lights at the top of the switch board and also into the ammeter and voltincter, which are in the side with the reistance box. All these are arranged to
test the strength of the current before it is
put in operation on the condemned man.
There is another switch by which the
current can be directed connected
with the wires leading to the chair.

The man at the switchboard, however, cannot turn the current through the occupant of the chair. This being entirely the province of the man who stands behind the cabinet and operates the switch located there, by which it is connected directly with the occupant of the chair.

PROUD OF BIS WORK.

Capt. Hilbert, the designer of the chair, is proud of its completeness, and especially if the code of signals. The failure of this in the Kemmler execution was one of the things that made that electrocution such a horrible affair. The captain, in speaking things that made that electrocution such a horrible affair. The captain, in speaking of his device, asserts that it is able to kiil 25 men an hour. He has made an improvement on the arrangement of the electrodes, which differ materially from that of the Kemmler case. In the latter the current was passed directly through the body and heart. The inventor of the Sing Sing chair has a new plan for applying the electricity to the wrists, or to one wrist and an ankle.

Smiler sho also killed his wife, or, more properly, his alleged wife, on the night of April 3, 1890; Joseph Wood (colored), who killed a fellow-workman, also colored, named Chas. Ruffin, on April 17, 1889; Charles McElwaine, who was indicted and found guitty of complicity in the murder of Grocer Luca in Brooklyn, and Nicolo Trezza, who killed a fellow Italian in Flatbush, Brooklyn, dur-

A Sarnia Town Councilor Said To Have Been Purchased.

For some time there has been a division in the council regarding the construction of a fire alarm system. Eight of the councilors have been in favor of contracting with the Boll Telephone Company, and have endeavored to pass a necessary bylaw to give them power to so contract. 

THE INVITATION TO "GET OUT

OF THE COUNTRY." A Dominion Day orator advised those of his hearers who were dissatisfied with the # Dominion to get out of the country as fast as possible. "Buy a ticket," he exclaimed, "or if you are not able to do that, walk

down to the frontier and cross the border as fast as you can." This is good advice for those who have no faith in their country, and who regard its inhabitants as poor, weak, puny specimens of humanity, requiring "protection" against their neighbors who

may wish to sell to them and as matter of course to purchase Canadian products in payment. The sooner Canada gets rid of that constantly lessening class of people the better.

But, judging from the context of his address, the Dominion Day speaker hardly had that portion of the community in his mind's eye. His advice rather applied to those Canadians who deem it their right and their duty to candidly criticise the management of public affairs. It has been said that it is "an Englishman's privilege to grumble" if he believes that the management of his country can be improved. And so in this fair Dominion of ours it is not only the privilege, but the duty of every loyal Canadian to combat the doctrine of "whatever is is right," if he conscientiously believes that wrong exists. If the British people who have from time to time combatted the advocacy of class laws and hereditary privilege had taken the advice of the optimists of the day, and walked out of their country at the solicita

tion of the enjoyers of sinecures, the great reforms in the trade, land, and electoral policies of the country would have been indefinitely postponed. In that case Britain to-day would be a third-rate power, instead of the leader in all movements for the promotion of liberty, free trade and the arts of peace that invariably follow untrammelled commerce. Indeed, no country could hope for greatness that would countenance the exilement of the men who honestly believe that the existing government and existing laws should be improved, and are candid enough to say so and to agitate for such changes as they believe would be for the common Where would Canada have been to-day if the opponents of the Family Compact had accepted the advice of the office-holding optimist of that day to clear out of the country if they were not satisfied? Premier Longley, of Nova Scotia, in speaking at the distribution of prizes and corferring of degrees at King's College, N. S., last week, uttered these patriotic senti-

"It should be the ambition of every man "It should be the ambition of every man to advance his country's interests. Speaking for himself he would say without hesitation that no promised remuneration or henors would induce him to leave his native country to make a home in another land. If the universities of the country would only inculcate a love of country into the hearts of their students Canada would in a short time be foremost among the nations."

Yet Mr. Longley is one of the most carnest advocates of the speedy change of the Dominion trade policy. In that advo-cacy we believe he and the other Liberal leaders in the Dominion have the suppor of at least one-half of the Canadian people. What an absurdity, then, to advise those who are dissatisfied with the present condition of affairs to leave things as they are, and walk out of the country! Patriots are made of sterner stuff.

Notes from Bradstreet's Review. New York, July 6.—Bradstreet's weekly review says: The available stocks of wheat in the United States and Canada on

wheat in the United States and Canada on July 1 were about 23,000,000 bushels, which with invisible stocks in the United States indicate a total reserve not exceeding 33,000,000 bushels, the smallest at a like date for nine years.

Wheat crop prospects in the Dominion of Canada continue very favorable and exert an influence on general trade, which has heretofore been slow and depressed.

The Queen's Grandson Accorded Hearty Welcome.

Hearty Welcome.

London, July 6.—Emperor William of Germany arrived at Port Victoria, near Sheerness, Saturday morning. He was enthusiastically received by the crowds assembled to witness the landing of the imperial party. Sheerness harbor was a grand and beautiful sight. Both the channel and the training squadrons were at anchor there as a guard of honor, probably finer than that which ever before saluted a monarch.

As the German ships neared the British warships all the latter thundered forth a royal salute and manned their yards with almost miraculous rapidity, while the bands played the German anthem. The roar of the guns, the distant music of the naval bands, the fine, brazing weather, the splendid array of war vessels and the refreshing breeze, all combined to make as attractive a picture of welcome as any emperor had or ever may expect to have.

Taken as a whole, the greeting extended to the Queen's warlike young grandson was without parallel in the history of England. When Emperor William stepped ashore, and was met by the Prince of Wales, he kissed the heir apparent of the throne of Great Britain and then cordially received the greetings of the other members of the royal family and bowed to the welcome of the diplomatic corps and others.

Upon the arrival of the train at Windser, the Princess of Wales stepped out of the waiting-room and greeted the Emperor and Empress. With her were the Princesses Victoria and Mand of Wales, Prince Christian, the Duke of Cambridge and Prince Henry of Battenberg.

After all-round handshaking and kissing, the procession, waich consisted of twelve carriages, was formed. Everywhere there was a lavish display of floral decorations, bunting and flags, with plentiful motto greetings, To the unceasing ovation accompanying their progress the German Emperor and Empress replied with salutes. Upon the procession halting at the Guild Hall the town clerk read an address of welcome to the most favored home of the rulers of Great Britain.


