Church Federation.

The Interchurch Conference on Federation at New York may prove to be a landmark in religious history. It is an expression of the tendency to break down the barriers between denominations, but it is designed to meet the objections to organic union, which are earnestly held by multitudes of Christian worshipers. The plan submitted to the conference provides for "federal council of the Church of Christ in America," embracing at first thirty denominations. The Council will come into official existence as soon as the principle is accepted by twothirds of the denominations.

The council is given no control over individual denominations, and no authority to interfere with the autonomy of any body. It may make recommendations, but modes of government and worship are expressly excluded from its jurisdiction.

Membership in the council is to be on a basis of four members to each denomination, with one additional member for every fifty thousand communicants. All questions are to be determined by a majority vote of the members voting and a majority of the denominations represented. There are to be a president and viceresident from each denomination, and an executive committee of seven members and seven laymen.

Simply this: It brings forcibly to the minds of all men Have made yourself solid clean of public spirit the fact that there is misery in the world not entirely the creation of the sufferer, that this misery is more than a private affair, that it concerns the state. Civic loyalty requires that each man use every effort to increase the welfare of the state, and this welfare, is endangered when desertion takes from the ranks men and women who have in them still a possibility of usefulness, or when removable conditions are allowed to render further service impossible. The state loses when the idea is allowed to go unchallenged that a man's life is his own, to do with as he pleases. So far as a civic board is able by public utterance or by action in the name of the state to bring to the mind of the despondent a realization of the wrong done the community by self-destruction and of the possibilities which life still has for even the most unhappy, so far the appointment of such a board is within the reasonable functions of a chief magistrate

The effect of this creation is still wider Certain men are in the public eye to such an extent that anything they say or do wakens echoes that roll into remote recesses of the public consciousness and produce a response beyond the contemplation of the speaker or actor. President Roosevelt's opinions on race suicide could result in no official action, but they have done much to put the rearing of children in the proper light as a solemn duty. Mayor Johnston's attitude towards individual suicide will set people thinking who have not realized the prevalence of this evil. Where ideas of responsibility to the state are so ill developed that they are no motive to action, a sense of religious duty or a warmth of feeling toward one's fellow man may well be stimulated to action by the figures just published. A single self-inflicted death attracts but little notice.
