They Are Boiled and Injected Into Humans Shortly After Birth.

of Bouboix, has sent to this Government a report of the discovery made by Drs. Calmette and Guerin of the Pasteur Institute at Lille. "Many experiments have demon-

strated that tuberculosis bacilli destroyed by heat or other agents pass through the walls of the intestines as readily as living bacilli and are found in the mesenteric ganglions and lungs,' says Dr. Calmette. "We experimente young animals, such as calves and kids, that had been made to swallow two doses, the second 45 days after the first, of from 5 to 25 grams of dead bacilli or bacilli whose virulence had been modified, could endure with impunity the injection of a meal of five centigrams of fresh tuberculous matter taken from a cow, matter which would be surely infectious under ordinary conditions. 
