TWO MEN KILLED ON G. T. R.

# TRACK ELEVATION NEGOTIATIONS REOPENED GRAND TRUNK ARE NOW READY TO GO AHEAD Both Bodies Found Between Woodstock and Brantford-One Was

Mayor and Officials Had a Very Important Conference in Regard to the Matter Yesterday, When Everything Went Along Smoothly.

#### DO IT NOW OR WAIT TWENTY YEARS

Said Vice-President Fitzhugh to the Mayor -- Overhead Bridge at Egerton Street Is Included in What the Company Are Willing to Do for London-Question of

Compensation to Come Up,

Track elevation is not so remote as was thought some time ago, and as a result of a conference between Mayor Stevely, Mr. Fitzhugh, fourth vicepresident of the Grand Trunk, Mr. U. E. Gillen, superintendent, Chief Engineer Kelly of the Grand Trunk system, City Engineer Graydon and other officials, the matter will be taken up very soon, and it is quite probable that an agreement will be reached.

If satisfactory terms can be agreed upon, the work will be commenced this spring. If the matter is delayed any length of time until the company takes up its problems in Toronto and Montreal, it will be fifteen or twenty years before the question will again be opened.

His worship was highly pleased with the conference, and is hopeful that this vexed matter will be solved satisfactorily shortly.

#### THE MAYOR SPEAKS.

"We had a very interesting interview with Mr. Fitzhugh and Mr. Kelly, the chief engineer," said Mayor Stevely. "All seemed very anxious to settle the matter once and for all. Mr. Kelly is the successor to Mr. Hobson, who retired some time ago. He is not yet acquainted with local conditions, but will visit the city very shortly to inquire into the whole matter. His investigation will be thorough, and he will obtain all the information possible on the question. When that is done, the company and the city will get together. Mr. Kelly, in addition to doing Mr. Hobson's work, is also doing some of Mr. McGuigan's, and is at the present time going over the plans made by Mr. Mc-Guigan for the work.

"Mr. Fitzhugh informed us that if there was a delay in the negotiations, so that the company had to take up work in Toronto and Montreal, it would be fifteen or twenty years before London would be reached. As a result he is anxious to get this work completed at once, and then go to the work in Toronto and Montreal.

#### EGERTON STREET OVERHEAD BRIDGE.

"The officials agreed to erect an overhead bridge at Egerton street as soon as satisfactory terms are reached. That is something they would not agree to at the last conference. They then wanted five years in which to build that bridge.

"They will agree to remove the street railway tracks from Rectory to Egerton streets. They do not want the street railway tracks on Rectory, as with them it would be impossible to either bridge the street or build a subway under it. With the street railway tracks on Egerton street, Rectory street would not be dangerous, the risks being minimized. On Egerton street would be little or no danger.

#### CARRY OUT ORIGINAL PLANS.

"So far as I could learn, the original plans would be carried out. That would mean subways on all the streets downtown until William street was reached, where only a footpath subway would be built.

"Adelaide street would be level, although the tracks would be raised three

"Rectory street would not be very dangerous, with no street car tracks, while Egerton would be properly protected.

"Mr. Fitzhugh asked us what the city's attitude would be regarding the cost, and I told him that the city would expect at least as good terms as two years ago. Of course, the company can put the matter in the hands of the Dominion railway commission, and the city would have to submit to the terms set out by that board. I think, however, that we can agree, as the citizens generally are anxious to have this thing settled.

"They told me that if an agreement were reached, work would be commenced next spring, and would be rushed to completion as rapidly as possi-

"At all events," said the mayor, "Mr. Kelly, the engineer, will make a thorough investigation into the conditions prevailing here right away, and then we can get together. I think the interview was most satisfactory."

The discussion was the result of many weeks' correspondence between Mayor Stevely and Mr. Fitzhugh. The latter wired his worship to meet him yesterday and take the question up, as a result of this correspondence.

#### HISTORY OF THE NEGOTIATIONS. Negotiations for the elevation first commenced in 1904, when Hon. Adam

Beck was mayor. Nothing was done in that year, but in the next the question was discussed in earnest. Propositions were submitted without number, but they were all turned down by the city.

In ex-Mayor Judd's first year, Mr. F. H. McGuigan, who was then in charge of the work, made a proposition for the company, but after a stubborn fight in the council it was turned down.

Since that time, many efforts have been made by the council to have the matter reopened, but until the present time nothing has resulted. If satisfactory terms can be agreed upon, this vexed question will be

#### forever removed from the sphere of municipal politics. NEW DEPOT NEEDED.

The question of a new depot for London was also referred to during the discussion. Mr. Fitzhugh admitted that a new station was badly needed, and was as desirable for the company as well as for the city. He wanted the whole matter disposed of at once, track elevation and all. He thought that a new station was needed in Toronto, but it was needed infinitely worse here.

#### NO SPECIAL MEETING.

It is not thought probable that a special meeting of the council will be called at present to consider the matter.

"There will be nothing before the council until the Grand Trunk engineer makes his report," said Mayor Stevely. "When he does so there will probably be some correspondence between us and the company, and then we will call a meeting of the council to take the question up, but not until then. In all probability a special committee will be named if the negotiations progress that far. I expect they will, of course, and if nothing intervenes we should receive a favorable proposition from the company."

# EIGHTY YEARS

Mr. Robert Melvin, President of Mutual Life of Canada, Died Recently at Hamilton.

Our readers and the public in general will regret to learn of the death of Mr. Robert Melvin, which occurred at Hamilton, at midnight on Oct. 17, 1908, at the ripe age of 80 years. In company with Mr. Wegenast, managing director, and Mr. Clement, first vice-president of the Mutual Life Assurance Company of Canada, Waterloo, Ont., of which he was president, Mr. Melvin had been during the week on a trip to New York in the interests of the company, and on the way home, on the after-noon of Saturday, the 17th inst., he took suddenly ill on the train as it was nearing Hamilton, and was not able to continue his journey home. He was conveyed to the Waldorf Hotel, Hamilton, but notwithstanding the skill of the physician in attendance he gradubecame weaker and died at 11 o'clock the same evening from heart failure. Faithful to the last in the discharge of his duties, it may be truly said of him that "he died in harness," serving the company whose welfare and prosperity he had always so deeply at heart.

Previous to his retirement from business in 1871, Mr. Melvin was for 22 years a successful hardware merchant, GAY founder, and agricultural implement manufacturer in Guelph, to whose council board he was elected in 1859, He afterwards was its first reeve, elected by the people, and held that position for two years. #### HEARST AND HIS LETTERS.

William Randolph Hearst, prince of yellow journalists, and author of the Independent party in the United States, has introduced a new element into the presidential campaign. He is not himself a candidate, but has put up a puppet named Hisgen, and has undertaken to conduct his party's Bordens' lieutenants. campaign through his newspapers and on the platform.

Hearst's election methods have been of the characteristic. He opened by making sensational charges against leading men of both the Republican and Democratic parties, and followed this up by the production of letters which have temporarily made Hearst an object of greater interest than Taft or Bryan. These letters were written by and were purloined by two confidential United States firm while Canadian employees of the company, and it is presumed were bought by Hearst or his agents. Hearst did not make public the contents of all of these at once. but is giving them out in installments, few were imported, so as to inaugurate either party to the suit in considering the and keeping public curiosity on edge. The first of the letters showed Senator Foraker, of Ohlo, to have been in the pay and service of the Standard Oil Company. Hearst then opened fire upon Gover nor Haskell, of Oklahoma, the treasurer of the Democratic campaign fund. and carried consternation into the ranks of the Bryanites. Haskell protested his innocence of corrupt relations with the oil octopus, but he stepped down and out.

In two letters made public by Mr. Hearst on Saturday night last, Mr. Archbold urged Governor Stone, of Pennsylvania, to appoint certain men to vacant judgeships. While the appointments were not made precisely as recommended by Archbold, both of his nominees were subsequently appointed to the second appellate court of the state-one by Governor Stone and the other by his successor. # A NEW ACCOUNT

Man Who Ordered City's Destruction.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 26.-The granddaughter of the man who burned Moscow to save the city from Napoleon happens, the wicked make much more is in this city. Her mission is to make public the facts in the case that have long been hidden. Countess Lydie Rostopchine is the descendant of the distinguished Russian patriot who not only saved the ancient Russian capital but gave the hopes of Napoleon their death blow and changed the course of history in Europe.

The countess is a guest at the Arlington. She will deliver a lecture at the Russian embassy, or possibly at the Italian embassy, in the near future. The subject of her talk will be the burning of the Russian city, and the duty of relating the facts falls on her as the nearest descendant of the man who was governor-general of Moscow at the time of the French invasion.

The countess does not know yet when she will deliver her first address here. She says that so many members of the diplomatic corps are away from the city that she will wait a few weeks. She is an enthusiast on the subject of Gen. Rostopchine, and says, that in 1912 there will be a centenary celebration in Russia of the retreat of the grand army. At that time, more than ever before tribute will be paid to the memory of the man who sacrificed a city to save an empire.

Countess Rostopchine says that in the burning of Moscow her grandfather acted on his own initiative. It was in the days before the present railroad that covers the distance from Moscow to St. Petersburg in eleven hours. . A courier then required five days to make the trip each way.






Sailors Bring Story of Great Hardship From South Africa.

San Francisco, Oct. 28.-A story of hardships as castaways in the South Pacific as told by seven Chinese who arrived on the steamer Manchuria from Hong Kong. They formed the erew of the barkentine Ebster, which was wrecked on a reef 700 miles from Freemantle, Australia. For 75 days they labored to repair the little vessel so it might again put to sea, subsisting on a scant amount of ship's stores and fish and roots found on the almost barren island. The repairs were completed on May 26 last, and Captain Robison, of the barkentine, proposed to sail for South America. At this the crew mutinied, and for punishment they were left for seven days on the 1.793 island while the captain stood off with the vessel. Then they were taken aboard in irons, but later released and taken to Cocos Island, where fresh water and supplies were obtained and 131 from this place they eventually made 120 their way to Hong Kong.


