PLENTY OF COAL NEXT WINTER SAYS U. S TRADE COMMISSION: TELLS CONSUMERS TO BUY SMALL

Washington, May 5 .- Prevailing retail and promises to "expose any prices of anthractic coal ar. unwarrant unous wholesaier, jobber of the period and the supply for next season is adequate, the federal trade commission who seeks to mislead the public into prices adequate, the federal trade commission a belief that exorbitant prices are forded adequate, the federal trade commission stated today in a preliminary report based on a partially completed investigation ordered by Congress last winter. The commission warns consumers against buying larger quantities of coal than usual this summer, saying there are symptoms now of such a buying panic as that which enabled speculators last winter to force prices above normal. No good reason exists, says the report, why May prices should not be subject to the usual summer discount, but "if the public is again so deceived as to indulge in a scramble for coal, the favorable situation may be nullified."

Immediate action might help to a certain extent and, in any case, if there hasn't been the necessary general organization to assure a harvest, furion to assure a forded.
"Today on the market, it was practically impossible to get hold of vegetables. A Caradoc farmer told me he was entirely out of them and that others in his district didn't have them for their own tables. I don't know what they are going to do about planting.

So far as regulation of the number of courses served in public eating places is concerned, it is altogether likely we will have to come to it, just as they have in England, and it seems to me the better way is to begin now before there is necessity. 

U. S. NAVAL CONSULTING BOARD; PLANS ARE SENT TO WASHINGTON

New York, May 5.- W. L. Saunders, chairman of the naval consulting board, announced here today that the board had forwarded to Washington plans for dealing with the submarine problem which, it was believed, had solved the problem successfully.

Mr. Saunders, who has been chairman of the fraval consulting one disbout two months, supplemented his announcement by saying that while the submarine problem cannot be considered in reality to have been solved until the U-boats have been destroyed, nevertheless numerous experiments had been made with highly encouraging results, and which led the board to feel confident that a successful solution had been reached. "It looks as though the submarine problem has been solved," Mr.

Saunders said, "not only in theory, but on the strength of practical tests on the Atlantic coast." MANY INVENTIONS.

Mr. Saunders added that 500 inventions for U-boat suppression had een submitted for consideration of the board, and experiments with many of them justified, he believed, the assertion that a plan had been nd by which the submarine peril could be eliminated.

Mr. Saunders was unwilling to go into further details of the board's experiments, all data on the subject having been forwarded to Washington, but he said the public had a right to be informed of the progress made toward nullifying the depredations of the German undersea craft.

Jew York, May 5 .- A special dispatch to the World from Washington says:

British and American naval experts are understood to have discussed at their conferences yesterday three specific measures designed to put an end to German submarine warfare. One is the bottling up of the narrow strait between Sweden and Denmark; the second, the mining of the entire North Sea, which wor,'d shut off entirely the trade of Holland, Denmark and Sweden, and the third, storming the German naval base at Kiel and destroying Heligoland, Germany's Gibraltar.

The third proposition has been discussed only as a last resort, naval experts being agreed that it would be a most hazardous undertaking. If the British fleet were brought out of its protected harbors it doubtless would be assisted by American and French naval craft. Many naval officers believe Kiel could be taken, but at frightful

The Advertiser's Hint for City Gardeners.

Information As to Preparation, Planting and Care of Plants That May Be Grown in Backyards.

GOOSEBERRIES.

The plants for new plantations of gooseberries are obtained from cuttings or by what is technically known as layering. This latter method is most generally followed. Prune the old bushes very closely in the autumn, thereby causing an abundant growth of young wood during the next summer. Early in July, heap the earth through and around the bushes until only the tips of the young shoots are above ground. Pack this earth closely about the young shoots, leaving a mulch of loose soil on top to preserve the moisture. By autumn these shoots, if of American variety, will have rooted well, and the next spring they may be transplanted until the following autumn or the second spring. If the plants are obtained from cuttings, they are treated in the same way as the currant cuttings.

The actual setting out of the plantation is usually done in the fall, sometimes as early as September. Set the plants four feet apart, pruning the roots before doing so. Spread them well, so that they will be a strong support for the plantabove ground, and then pack the soil firmly about them, at the same time leaving loose soil on top to act as a mulch.

General Hughes, from a public platform, had charged: "That the Government, and particularly the premier, Sir Robert Borden, had interfered to stop Canadian recruiting; that the Government, and particularly Sir George Perley and Sir Thomas White, had interfered with the organization and dispatch of Canadian overseas forces; that as a result, that had been useless and wasteful outlay of public money and delay in military organization; that Sir George Perley and Sir Thomas White had tried to create an agitation against their colleague, the them minister of militia, in England; that Sir George Perley and Sir Thomas White had bribed, or attempted to bribe, the press in Canada and in England; that a venomous and poisonous conspiracy had been entered into by members of the Government to depose and assa. sinate, politically, the premier, Sir Robert Borden; that attempts had been made to sweeten ahe press, and influence bankers and brokers by the minister of finance in this connection."

Frank Lalor, Conservative of Haldimand, declared his willingness to support a measure for conscription if the Opposition would introduce a resolution.

SIXTY MILLIONS IN **GREAT PERIL OWING** TO ABNORMAL WHEAT

Gravest Crisis in Dominion's History at Winnipeg Now.





The chief Socialist centres in Germany are Berlin, Munich, Essen, Leipsic and Stuttgart. The Berlin Socialists are not as radical as those in Bavaria and in the Rhine industrial section. For instance, last fall when food became so very scarce that many people began to fear there would not be enough for the country to hold out, the Munich Socialists wrote to the chancellor suggesting that all food in Germany, even that in possession of private families, be confiscated. The poor know that people with money have been able to buy food in large quantities both inside and outside of Germany and store it for the "siege." The people know, also, that those who live on big estates and farms keep back all the food they need for themselves and only sell what they have to. So the Munich Socialists recommended to the Government that food be taken away from all persons in Germany. A further proposal was that the Government organize soup kitchens and restaurants throughout Germany and compel every one, high and low, rich and poor, to eat the same kind of food in Government cafes. This was bitterly opposed, of course, by everyone in Germany wno had food or who could live at hote's. The chancelor paid no heed to this proposal from Munich, but if this year's harvest should be as bad as that of last year the Government may be

During the last year there have been elections held in Germany for seats in the Reichstag to fill those vacated by death, illness or the retirement of members because of age. When the election was held in Potsdam, the kaiser's home, a Socialist was elected to take the place of Dr. Karl Liebknecht, who was sentenced to two years' imprisonment. Socialists also carried elections in Cologne and in Essen, where the great Krurr munition factories are located. on factories are located.





The result is that no German firm today busy food in neutral countries. Everything available in Holland, Denmark Norway, Sweden, Switzerland or Hungary is purchased by an agent of the "Z. E. G.," and shipped into Germany in freight cars owned by this organization. Travellers in neutral European countries will see on the railway sidings white freight cars with the following sign in big black letters:

"Zentral Einkaufgesellschaft, Deutschland"—the so-called "Z. E. G."

Before this bureau was organized German merchants had been going to these countries, and bidding against each other for the available food. The result was that prices became almost prohibitive, Now the Government sends one man to buy the supplies and offers a certain fixed price.

This is one of the way by which state socialism has been established in Germany during hostilities. Because the government was successful in the food department, similar bureaus were organized to care for other common needs. A government department to buy, seil and conserve all edible fats was organized. Another bureau to control the oil market and another to purchase old clothes and still another to have charge of wool and cotton were founded.

have charge of wool and cotton were founded.

On the whole these socialistic schemes have been so successful that many Socialists and officials are looking forward to the period after the war when these ideas can be extended. It has been suggested already that the government take over what remains of the German steamship comparies and establish a government monopoly in merchant ships. It has been suggested that the government import all raw materials and export all manufactured articles. It has been suggested that the government bring the soldiers back from the front in companies and in regiments and run the factories like the army has been run. But while the government may desire to do this, the voters will probably have something else to say.

else to say.

The Socialists are the reformers of Germany, and inasmuch as they have been able to make such progress during the war, when they have been prevented from doing so many things, they planned, it is almost certain when peace comes the Socialists will play the leading role in reorganization. The growth of the Socialists has by no means been in vain. If they succeed in accomplishing the reforms which they expect, there will be a universal peace party in Germany in the future to take the place of the universal war party of the past. The Socialists on principle are against war, and the people are so weary of this war that they will not look forward to future wars with any degree of hopefulness. During the past two years the radical Socialists have been fighting hard for recognition, but because the government has been against them and because the army has hated them they have been unable to carry out many of their plans. They can be sided, however, by the United States of America and her allies if the present military leaders are defeated and discredited. As long as the army can say to the people: "We defended the country; we fought a successful war," a great many Germans will be misled and the reform movement in Germany after the war will not be as successful as it otherwise will be. else to say.
