

TO AUSTRIA ON **POLISH QUESTION**

Stand and Wins Out.

London, Aug. 17.—Germany has made concessions to Austria on the Polish stand taken by Emperor Charles and the Austro-Hungarian Government, according to information received by the correspondent of the Daily Mail at The Hague, to which the Mail gives much

It is possible there will be no personal union of the crowns of Poland and Austria, but the king of Poland is certain to be an Austrian archduke, says the correspondent, who adds that the discussion at German main headquarters had the following basis:

The Germans demanded that Austria sead to the western front from ten to fifteen divisions of picked troops, confining themselves to the defensive on the Italian front.

Emperor Charles' Demand.

New York, Aug. 17.—The Associated Press this morning issued the following:
Roye, the central bastion of the German defence line from Peronne to Noyon, which has withstood allied thrusts for nearly a week, is menaced by advancing French, British and Canadian troops, and its fall would appear to be a probability of the next few hours.

With the town in allied hands, the southern end of the German line at least undoubtedly would have to retire, although the northern end, through Chaulines to Peronne, would be affected. The Allies are now but a scant one and one-guarter miles west of the town, while they are pressing eastward in the north and in the south.

Along a front of nearly nine miles north and south of the Avre, which flows through Roye, the Allies have pushed back the enemy in stubborn fighting. The most notable advance was made on a front of three miles in the centre by French and Canadian troops, who now are fighting ing in a line through Goyencourt, St. Mard-les-Tricot and Laucourt. St. Mard-les-Tricot and Laucourt. Allied Successes.

French troops on the south have forced their way almost through the Loges Wood, which borders the Roye-Lassigny road on the west. The wood is five miles directly south of Roye, and it would appear that a further advance might enable the French to outflank both Roye and Lassigny and force the Germans to readjust their lines eastward toward Noyon and probably beyond. North of Goyencourt, British forces, after having repulsed an enemy attack on Dumery, in which 250 prisoners were captured, are pushing eastward with French units toward Fransart and Fresnoy-les-Roye.

Artillery activity continues on the remaining sectors of the main battlefront between the Ancre and the remaining sectors of the main bat-tlefront between the Ancre and the Olse. The British on the northern end and the French on the southern maintain their newly-gained

tions and the enemy has shown no disposition to attack. German Gas Again.

Berlin reports officially that alfled attacks on both sides of the Avre on Friday falled. The German war office has nothing further to say of the withdrawals in the Lys salient and along the Ancre. Admission of the loss of Attiche Farm, southwest of Noyon, to the French is made, but it is said that six French attacks against Lassigny on Thurstions and the enemy has shown no attacks against Lassigny on Thursday were repulsed.

American and French troops along the Vesle have undergone an attac

American and French troops along the Vesle have undergone an attack in which the Germans used gas, artillery and bombing aviators. This attack followed an incursion by American aviators, who heavily bombed German bridges over the Alsne and discovered enemy artillery and machine gun nests. The German airplanes were brought down by American airmen Thursday. British and French airmen on the same day put 32 enemy machines out of action, while Berlin reports the destruction of 24 allied airplanes.

Italians Repulse Attacks.

Italian troops in the Tonalee region, northwest of Lake Garda, and along the south Plave have withstood Austrian attacks against their new positions on these sectors. Otherwise the situation is unchanged in Northern Italy. Spain, which recently sent another note to Germany protesting against the destruction of Spanish merchantmen by submarines, is reported to have notified Berlin that hereafter the Spanish Government will make up

one or more submarines off the Atlantic coast. he old contentions are being advanced as to the ecessity of having a Canadian navy. The adance in shipbuilding methods has shown defiitely that Canada could have constructed a good zed navy since war began, and those who were dvocates of a Canadian navy are now confrontg the Government with its tardiness in naval ffairs since war began. Writing to the Toronto car, J. W. Wilkinson, late R. N. A. V., give his lews as a naval officer as follows:

With reference to the correspondence which has recently appeared in the press, with regard to naval matters, I would now like to add one or two remarks upon the same subject, which have been suggested by recent events.

In view of the fact that German submarines have for some time past and are still operating with a moderate degree of success on this side of the Atlantic, off the coast of the United States, it was only reasonable to expect that sooner or later we should be subject to the unpleasant experience discovering their presence in Canadian waters. This has been forcibly demonstrated in the Bay of Fundy, when our fishing fleets a few days ago became an easy prey to the German U-boat. Another Instance was as recent as August 5, when the Lux Blanca, after a three-hours' battle with a submarine, was torpedoed and sunk, about thirty miles east of Halifax, and two of her crew killed. Notwithstanding that we thus have the enemy in our own waters, performing deeds of piracy and destruction at his own free will, without let or hindrance, as far as Canada's ability to defend herself is concerned, we read in the newspapers that the naval department at Ottawa calmly makes the statement that "all steps possible are being taken meet the situation," and that a fleet of submarine chasers from the United States and British navies had put off after the enemy submarines. Are we to understand from this that Canada still refuses to assume any responsibility whatsoever as regards naval defence, but merely assumes the right when attacked by German U-boats to call for help to the United States and British navies? What greater proof is our present Union Government waiting for to make them realize that the great peed of Canada today is a navy of her own? When we remember the indifference displayed by Canada in the past with regard to her naval responsibility, any thoughtful person must surely look on with amazement that even after four years of war, and the enemy sinking our ships at his own free will in our own waters, that no action appears to be considered necessary for our Government to take in the way of providing a navy for our own protection. Had Great Britain supinely looked on and treated the matter with the same indifference that Canada has and is doing, I can only say that we should have lost the war, which would have meant the enslaving of practically the whole civilized world. [Journal of Commerce.] The recent wholesale conferring of titles in Great Britain, especially the voluminous list of "Members of the British Empire," has done much to weaken whatever respect there was for the system under which such honors are granted. The average Englishman does not adopt the radical hostility to all such honors. If used sparingly, and with something like intelligent discrimination, the system might still be approved by many who, while not enthusiastic in the matter, are disposed to regard it as a legitimate means of giving recognition where it is deserved. But there is a very general complaint that in many cases honors have been given to people who have done nothing particular to deserve them, while many men who have rendered great service have been ignored. The consequence is that the whole system is being discredited, and, as the London Chronicle remarked, the value of the honor to those who have really merited it is much diminished. Punch is not a radical journal, not one disposed to belittle any institution of the British people. When we find that famous weekly joining in pouring ridicule on the honors list, we may be sure that it is giving expression to widespread public opinion. In a recent issue, "O. 





IN FOOD PRICES BY U.S. PUTS UP THE BARS LABOR DEPARTMENT After September 15 Permits

Increases Chiefly in Dairy Products, Fresh and Canned Vegetables.

OTTAWA, Aug. 16.—Upward movements in wholesale and retail food prices were again recorded by the labor department during July. In wholesale prices the increases were chiefly in dairy products, fresh and canned vegetables, textiles and lumber. There were decreases in fodder, livestock and meats. In retail prices there were increases in meats, eggs and potatoes, with slight decreases in milk and dairy butter. Coal, wood and coal oil and rents showed slight increases.

The index number of wholesale prices for July reached 284, as compared with 280.6 for June, and 242.6 for July, 1917. The cost of a weekly supply of food at the middle of July averaged \$13 in some sixty cities, as compared with \$12.77 for June and \$11.87 for July 1816.

WILSON'S NEW ORDER.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16.—Freedom of departure from this country of allens, by means of which a number of dangerous enemy agents have been able to escape from the authorities since the United States entered the war, will not be permitted after September 15, under a proclamation signed by President Wilson, and an executive order, both of which were made public tonight by the state department. The proclamation and executive order puts into effect the allen control law passed by Congress last May.

Under the executive order, aliens after September 15 will be required to obtain permits before leaving the United States, and additional restrictions will be put upon the entry of allens into this country. onted States, and additional restrictions will be put upon the entry of allens into this country.

No passports or permits will be required of persons going to Canada, except in the case of male persons of draft age, who win be required to carry permits issued by their local boards.

WALL STREET REVIEW.

New York, Aug. 17.—Scarcity of money, latest tax proposals and further delay in the railroad contract settlement again imposed restrictions on the stock market this week, although the prices held steady on the further stimulating war news.

The monetary situation doubtless arose in large part from heavy payments to the final installment of the third Liberty Loan, but these were accentuated by additional admonitions of the need of credit conservation from the Federal Reserve Bank. In authoritative quarters the belief prevailed that money would remain firm for the balance of the year, account being taken of next month's preparations for the fourth Liberty Loan.

The one illuminating feature of the investment situation was furnished by the rise of Liberty 3½'s to their best quotation of the year at 100.14, indicating a continuance of buying of that issue by leading financial interests.

Foreign developments found their chief reflection in the greater strength of exchange to all the allied centres, but remittances to neutral points were irregular, Spanish exchange weakening.

indication of a continuance of recent stagnant conditions. Most leaders were unchanged from the previous day's final quotations, C. P. R. proving the only marked exception on its reaction of 1½ points. United States Steel and Marine preferred gained slight fractions, but equipments and coppers were irregular. 



OTTAWA, Aug. 16.—The following dispatch was received here by the director of public information from Sir Edward Kemp, minister of overseas

forces:

"The capture of prisoners by the Canadians in recent operations is now reported to be 10,000, with 150 guns and machine guns, which are now estimaed in the thousand.

"The territory retaken in the advance of the Canadian corps, representing an initial frontage of 7,500 yards and penetrating to a depth of 20,000 yards, includes 22 towns, some of which are of considerable size. The proportions of this success will be better understood when it is remembered that in the battle of the Ypres salient last year, commencing on July 21 and continuing over four months, the total advance did not exceed six miles. not exceed six miles.

Glorious Chapter

"The facts connected with the entire operation constituted one of the most glorious pages of the history of the Canadian army overseas. It reflects not only the gallantry and devotion of all ranks, but is a tribute as well to the efficient staff work and organization "The maximum secrecy marked the "The maximum secrecy marked the move of the corps to the attacking front. Many of our batteries were so close to the enemy trenches that not a single shot could be fired before the battle began. Despite this the infantry declare they never followed a more perfect barrage.

"The dash with which every division entered the attack and carried on day

entered the attack and carried on day after day is illustrated in this observa-tion from the Canadian corps com-mander, Lieutenant-General Sir Arthur Currie, who states:

"'Canada has been thrilled many times by the record of the deeds in the field of battle by her sons, but never before have our battles given so much cause for pride as in the fine section of our men. They were simply." fighting of our men. They were simply irresistible. One of the tanks, which accompanied us in the fight and was rechristened the 'A-1 Dominion,' went into action with a piper of an infantry battalion playing for all he was worth."


