KAISER'S RIGHTS ARE ABOVE ALL

His Claims to Reign Over Prussia Are Inroads by Chancellor of the Empire.

HE DENIES SOVEREIGNTY

Striking Debate in Reichstag Results in Virtual Victory for the Ruler Despite Sharp Criticisms of Socialists.

Berlin, Nov. 23.—Kaiser William's "divine right" was sharply attacked in the Reichstag today but it also was staunchly defended by the chancellor in a notable address.

The text for the debate was the speech made by Emperor William at a provincial dinner at Koenigsberg, Aug. 26, during his tour of Eastern Germany. The varied and conflicting sentiments aroused by his remarkable utterance, intimating a continued belief in the divine right of kings, was given full play.

Kaiser Wins a Victory. On the whole, the events of the day denote a victory for the Kaiser, and the failure of the Social Democrats to arouse the press or popular enthusiasm against the monarch on account of the speech.

victions of Emperor William I. and his own were identical and added: "Considering myself as the instrument of the Master, regardless of passing views and opinions, I go the way which is solely devoted to the prosperity and peaceful development of our fatherland."

In anticipation of a prolonged discussion the House met two hours earlier than usual. Few of the members were absent and the galleries were crowded. Many ministers and other high officials of the occupied seats or stood upon the platforms reserved for them at the right and left of the president.

Herr Ledebour, one of Socialist Leader Bebel's most gifted lieutenants, supported the socialist interpellation inquiring what the chancellor thought of the emperor having departed from his declarations made in November, 1908, through Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg concerning his majesty's position in the state.

It was, however, unfair, the speaker said, that those undertaking to reply to the emperor should be prosecuted on the charge of insulting his majesty. He demanded that the emperor should not interfere in the affairs of the state contrary to the provisions of the constitution.

Herr Ledebour discussed at length the constitutional position of the king of Prussia toward the German Reich, and spoke mockingly of the Hohenzollern family cult deriving its powers from the Most High.

In the course of his speech Ledebour declared that "the king-emperor cannot attempt to rule against the opinion of the people. If he does, his position becomes untenable. Either he must put aside his personal opinion or the monarchic system will be eliminated."

No Sovereign of People.

"This development," he continued, "was not on the theory that the people gave themselves to the monarchy, but throughout the unqualified labors of the great rulers, the House of Hohenzollern was assisted by a tenacious and efficient population. Thus arose the Prussian state which does not know the idea of a sovereignty of the people. The kings in their relations to the people are kings in their own right. It must not be wondered at that in our day when democratic tendency appears to treat the king as the official of the people, the king of Prussia strongly emphasizes his consciousness that he is not subject to popular sovereignty."

FOLLY SHOWN IN CHURCHES HERE

Great Waste of Men and Material, Says Rev. George Hanson.

SHOULD CO-OPERATE

"Tay Pay" Says That Every Public Man in Canada Is in Favor of Home Rule

London, Nov. 23.—At a meeting of the Evangelical Alliance, Archdeacon Madden and Rev. George Hanson gave vivid descriptions of their tour of Canada. Archdeacon Madden said the Dominion is determined to have a Canadian Evangelical Alliance and he believed the best thing to do was to fall in with the scheme put forward at Halifax and Toronto, for an alliance, with headquarters in Toronto, employing a travelling secretary.

Rev. Mr. Hanson said it seemed to him a perfect folly on the part of the churches in Canada to erect four or five churches in a single small area when one church with one pastor would suffice. They should form a joint committee and formulate a scheme of co-operative action which would enable them to avoid the overlapping that existed with consequent waste of men and material.

London, Nov. 24.—At a meeting of the United Irish League, T. P. O'Connor challenged the Tories to produce a single prime minister or cabinet minister in the Canadian provinces who does not believe that the honor and safety of the British Empire demand the concession of home rule.

London, Nov. 23.—Premier Murray and his colleagues in the cabinet retained Thomas Tait at a farewell parliamentary banquet. Several speeches were made disproving the rumors already repeatedly denied by the Premier that Mr. Tait's retirement was hastened by reason of friction with the cabinet.

HEROIC RESCUE

Girl Saves Mail Carrier Who Went Through the Ice.

Rainy River, Ont., Nov. 23.—J. A. Hyer, mail carrier on the United States side, went through the ice with half a ton of mail on a dog-sled, and when he tried to get out of the water the ice kept continually breaking. A 13-year-old girl, Lizzie Alloway, however, heard his cries and ran down the bank to his assistance. She lay full length on the thin ice and caught him by the collar, but this only kept him from going down. He could not get out and she hung on for about 20 minutes. The water came up around her over the ice, and he called to her to let him go, for they would both be drowned. She still held him, however, and three men came to the rescue and dragged the girl over the ice, pulling Hyer out, too. He was almost unconscious. The mail, including a sack of registered letters, went to the bottom.

MANY BUY OUT RIDEAU LINE.

Brookville, Nov. 23.—It is reported that the Canadian Northern Railway may buy out the Rideau Lakes Navigation Company's boats and operate them in connection with their train service. The C. N. R. is running through Smith's Falls and it would be handy for the company to have these boats to carry tourists between Kingston and the Falls.

BURIED IN A WELL.

Omenace, Nov. 23.—Mr. Hilton Beggs, of Pontypool, was clinging out his well when a considerable distance down the sides caved in. A party of workers was soon at hand and made an heroic effort to rescue Mr. Beggs, who at first was able to direct them so to dig. It was several hours, however, before he was rescued and removed. He leaves a wife and two children.

SEIZED GILL NETS.

Brookville, Nov. 23.—Fishery Inspector J. H. Clark seized 73 rods of gill nets in Wolfe Lake, which contained all kinds of fish. The seizure embraced eight different nets, which shows that extensive operations are being carried on by illegal means.

FORMER GLENGARRICH KILLED.

Cornwall, Nov. 23.—Duncan Kennedy, a former resident of Glengarry and a nephew of Mr. John T. MacDonaid, of Cornwall, was instantly killed at Holyoke, Mass., on Nov. 23. He was employed as teamster for M. F. Quigley, expressman, and with his employer was driving across the tracks in the yard of the New Haven road when their rig was struck by a car that was being shunted on to a siding. Kennedy fell on the tracks and the car wheels passed over his face. Quigley escaped uninjured.

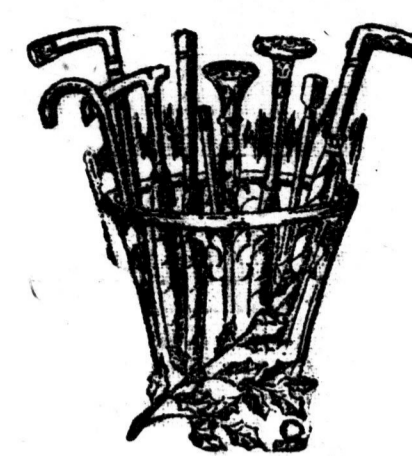

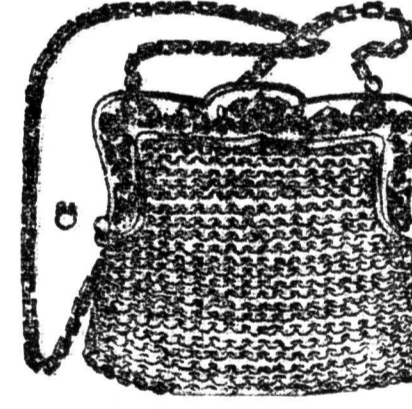

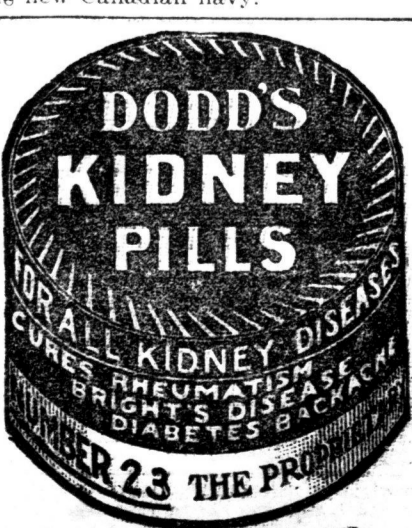

REV. DR. HERRIDGE ON CONDUCT OF LIFE

Eloquent Address by Noted Divine From the Capital.

"The common evil of today," declared Rev. Dr. Herridge, in lecturing on "The Conduct of Life," in the First Presbyterian Church last night, "is not that we indulge too much in pleasure, but that we are satisfied with cheap, tawdry pleasures. We are pleased and amused too easily."

"We never get too much of life; we get too little. Some people deary earthly things and analogize to themselves for enjoying them. When one depreciates the present world he loses the power of moral stimulus. We should have an intensive interest in things. The trouble is, we think too much of the future and far too little of the present."

"To attain a high standard we must not affect disregard for things around us. We must feel a comradeship with the busy world, with the tolling hands and selling brains. In this world of music, science, splendor and opportunity we must also hear the voice of wearied souls crying for release from ignorance and gloom and sin."

"Self-respect is necessary to the conduct of life. Self-respect means self-government, and virtue is an achievement in itself. Self-control is the true preparation for self-development. Struggle for purity is a proof of greatness, and the ceaseless challenge for the attainable develops character, but idleness is an immorality which is a menace to the state and individual."

No Cheers For Arthur Gilbert

Member From Drummond-Arthabaskaville.

SPEEDY PARTY'S FAILURE

Hon. William Paterson Showed Up the Different Attitudes of Conservatives on the Navy Question.

Ottawa, Nov. 28.—Something in the nature of an anti-climax to all the recent excitement over the Drummond-Arthabaska election occurred in the Commons today, when the victorious Nationalist, Arthur Gilbert, received the cut direct from the assembled House on his introduction. When the new member, accompanied by Messrs. Monk and Paquet, entered the chamber, he was received with frigid but eloquent silence, not the faintest semblance of a cheer being raised. Evidently fearing that anything in the shape of a greeting might be regarded as another indication of their sympathy with the Nationalist cause, the Conservative members who a few weeks ago were applauding the victory of Mr. Gilbert, fidgetted in their seats, and remained dumb, while the Liberal members gazed curiously, but also undemonstratively, upon the scene.

Amid a silence that was almost painful in its intensity, Mr. Monk, speaking in French, informed the speaker that Mr. Gilbert had taken the oath of allegiance and signed the roll, whereupon the speaker courteously invited the new member to take his seat and to proceed to the speaker's table, whose name was on everybody's lips a few weeks ago, stalked to his place in the Opposition back benches, with not a sign of recognition from his fellow-members of Parliament. It was a spectacle which old parliamentarians say is without a parallel in the history of the Dominion Parliament.
