Tokio Government is Only One of Allied Powers That Has Falled To Signify Its Intention To Participate in Conference On Limitation of Armaments—The World's Most Prominent Statesmen To Attend Washington Gathering.

In government circles in this city it appears to be the consensus of opinion that the conference at Washington will be attended by some of the most prominent statesmen of the world. The announcement of Premier Briand of France that he would consider going to Washington followed indications that Prime Minister Lloyd George might also go, provided conditions in Great Britain are such to permit his extended absence from the country. It is probable, however, that some of the leading figures in British official life will be present.

Leading Statesmen To Go.

Among those mentioned as delegates are A. J. Balfour, lord president of the council; Lord Lee of Fareham, first lord of the admiralty; Sir Laming Worthington Evans, secretary of state for war;

London, Juiy 13.—Three of the principal allied nations, Great Britain, France and Italy, have officially signified their acceptance of President Harding's invitation to hold a conference on the limitation of armaments, while China has indicated a readiness to participate in a conference relating to Far Eastern questions. Japan is the only one of the Allies which has not placed herself on record as being ready to take part in the Washington conference, but it is expected in official circles here that her acceptance will be communicated to the United States Government soon.



WIRELESS USED TO DIRECT OPERATION UPON SAILOR

New York, July 13 .- A surgical operation 200 miles at sea, directed by wireless from Brooklyn, was described today by Dr. Raymond Barrett of the Brooklyn Hospital. The captain of the tanker Vesta performed it under Dr. Barrett's directions, transmitted by Arthur R. Haydon, radio operator at the Bush terminal.

Haydon heard the Vesta calling for aid for a man who had an infected hand. He telephoned Dr. Barrett, who feared from the description that the man's whole arm would be infected. Yukon's 'Wet' Vote Rendered Abortive by U.S. Embargo Placed on 'Booze' Shipments

Dawson, Y. T., July 13.-By Canadian Press.-Enforcement of the embargo which the United States has placed on liquor shipments through its territory, will render abortive the big vote cast in the Yukon Monday in favor of the importation of liquor for beverage purposes. The chief executive of the Yukon Territory, George P. McKenzie, is investigating the possibilities of the case, following the receipt of a message from the agent of the Canadian Pacific Railway at Skagway, Alaska, which

"The embargo on all liquors in transit through the United States has again been imposed. Only shipments which arrived on the steamer arriving here July 13 will be allowed to go forward. Future shipment of beverages containing more than one-half of one per cent alcohol will not be accepted, unless they are accompanied by a permit from the United States prohibition enforcement board."

Unless this permission can be obtained the Yukon will be cut off from its liquor supply because all transportation routes into the Yukon

The effect of the "wet" vote Monday will be the establishing of Government control in the agencies for liquor, but orders probably will be placed outside the territory as at present. The present law prohibits the sale of liquor within the Yukon, but permits importation by private citizens. Monday's vote does not technically alter the status quo, but it is understood that a majority of the members of the territorial legislature

UNITED KINGDOM OUTSTRIPPING AMERICANS IN SHIPBUILDING

New York, July 13.—By Canadian Press.—The United Kingdom has 2,813,000 tons more shipping under construction than the United States. Nearly 60 per cent of the world's shipbuilding is being executed by British yards.

According to Lloyd's register of shipping for the quarter ended June 30, world ship construction showed a decrease of approximately 900,000 tons from that of the first quarter, and the latter figures were less than 100,000 tons below those of the preceding three months.



Provincial Health Officer Announces Change in the Regulations.

PENALTY IS SET AT \$500

Marriages by Unqualified Persons Will Be Considered Illegal.

TORONTO, July 12.-After the firs of October or thereabouts, no clergyman who is not registered with the provincial authorities and holder of a certificate of registration, will be permitted to solemnize marriage in Ontario. Dr. W. J. S. McCullough, provincial officer of health announced today that the legislation to this effect passed last session, would be brought into force by proclamation and that in the meantime all religious bodies rec ognized by law as qualified under the marriage laws should have their minsters register. WIII Be Shut Out

The new regulations are likely to shut out a number of minor religious bodies. Under the old law "ministers and cler-Under the old law "ministers and clergymen of every church and denomination duly ordained or appointed according to the rites and ceremonies of the church" had the right to solemnize marriage. This was interpreted to mean the Roman Catholic, Anglican, Presbyterian. Congregational. Metho-BERRIES PLENTIFUL Presbyterian, Congregational, Methodist, Jewish Churches, and later the act was amended to take in the Salvation Army, the Disciples, the Farring ton Independents, the Brethren and the Society of Friends.

May Ask Recognition. The act does not recognize minister of such bodies as the Unitarians, Chris tian Scientists, Latter Day Saints and others, though these churches may now put up a fight for recognition. The ac provides a penalty of a \$500 fine or imprisonment for anyone performing the marriage ceremony without being fully qualified. Marriage by an unregistered person will, of course, be illegal.

ELIMINATING EYESORES.

One of the greatest causes of the disfigurement of our streets is undoubtedly the multitude of telegraph, telephone, trolley and other poles, together with the network of wires pertaining thereto, that mutilate the perspective of the buildings and obscure the skyline. It is the extreme ugliness of this conglomeration of wood and wire that at once attracts the attention of visitors from the old land, for there the nuisance is much less pronounced or is altogether absent, custom being to carry the wires by means of underground conduits or by standards erected on the roofs of high buildings where they will not obtrude themselves upon the vision.

Where it is absolutely necessary that poles should be set on the ground, they are, as far as possible, erected at points where they will not be conspicuous or interfere with the general traffic. The result is that not only is the architectural beauty of the public buildings and the more conspicuous residences left unmarred, but a serious obstruction to traffic and a rippling the sunlit waters into little soft curves of source of danger in case of fire is removed.

It is, therefore, gratifying that so far as London is concerned a serious effort is being made to eliminate these eyesores. The Bell Telephone Company have been leading the way by removing their poles from the downtown streets of the city, and substituting underground conduits, and it is understood that this process will be gradually carried out on the residential streets as well.

The vistas of stately shade trees which form such a beautiful feature of the city are also marred to a great extent by the rows of poles which obtrude themselves on every hand, completely spoiling the majestic effect and ruining the picture from every

AUSTRALIA HAS ITS RAINMAKER

J. G. Balsillie Says He Can-Do It-Some Scoff, Others Believe in His System.

MELBOURNE, July 12.—Is Australia being fooled, as the United States has been more than once, or has a process for rain-making actually been discove ered? Thousands think the latter-Other thousands think the former.

Australia, in certain parts, needs rain nore than any other section not straight desert, in America, ever did, and J. G. Balsille claims that he has filled the need. Being Taken Seriously

He is taken very seriously by the Australian Government, for all his re-cent experiments have been carried out under government contract. He is well known to official Australia, all of which refuses to accept the theory that he is either knave or idiot. Certainly of the experiments seem to have had nding results.

The chief instrument of his operations are box kites. He uses two of three at a time, attached to galvanized, flexible wire. The kites are sent up to the limit of the wire's length. On each kite is mounted a certain

kind of terminal—the point of a light-ning rod would be a terminal. This, it is said, insures "intrinsic" contact (whatever that may be) with the at-The terminal is electrically with the kite-wire, the lower end of which is attached to an especial type of windlass, electrically

Rain Has Fallen.

Mr. Balsillie says:
"On every occasion when the kites have gone to the required height, and when the wind has been sufficiently steady to maintain them at this altiude for a length of time as great as six hours, either clouds have been com-pelled to form or rain has been actually

"This has occurred on a number of occasions when the kites have been sent up on perfectly quiet days when there has not been the slightest indication of approaching rain and when the meterological tables indicated that rain was most improbable.

Much difference of opinion exists here as to the genuineness of the rain-maker's success. Many hold that he has proved his case beyond a doubt, other openly scoff at him as an impostor and darkly hint that presently postor and darkly hint that presently he will begin to try to make money out of the free advertising he has had, although all admit that nothing of the sort has yet occurred.

Not Sufficiently Confirmed.

So far as I can learn there has been no really scientific confirmation of the rainmaker's achievements, but there are to be found plenty of highly intellibut there gent agriculturists who declare having assisted at his experiments, they can have no doubt of the success which hot controversy consequently has arisen. 


