

WHITNEY SNEERS; REBUKED BY ROSS

Makes Nasty Jibe, But Refuses to Apologize.

GOVT. TO CUT OUT BONUSES

Opposition Wants Money Proposed for Toronto Hospital Scattered Over Province.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Toronto, May 19.-Mr. Whitney's inability to forget that he is no longer in opposition brought him a stinging and well-merited rebuke from Hon. Mr. Ross, just before the House rose at 6 o'clock. During the discussion in committee Mr. Whitney had been lavish with his interjections and interruptions when opposition members were speaking, but tried to browbeat Mr. Ross when the latter rose to make a relevant explanation. Just as the discussion closed, one of Mr. Whitney's asides broke down Mr. Ross' patience. He called Mr. Whitney to task for his sneers and insolence, which he said were unbecoming from a leader of the House to an ex-leader, and gave him to understand that the Opposition sould not tolerate such tactics.

Mr. Whitney added to his offense by a frothy rejoinder, in which he asserted that he had been guilty of no udeness and had nothing to apologize

One of the features of the discussion on the university bill was the Sphinx-like silence of Hon. Dr. Pyne, Minister of Education. Although the matter is directly under his department, and he should be thoroughly conversant with it, Dr. Pyne has not once opened his lips to speak on the bill, that task being left to the Premier and some back-benchers.

The 'Varsity Bill.

The Premier, in answer to a question by Mr. Ross, informed the House that it was not the Government's intention to bring down legislation making grants to any railways. The Conservative party had for some time taken the position that the day had passed for giving large sums of money or areas of land to railways. This did not mean that the Government would refuse under all circumstances to aid railways "But how about the Mackenzie act?" where aid should be given, and Mr. "Oh, things are different now. When Mr. Whitney's bill respecting the university was taken up in committee of the whole. Mr. Whitney spoke of the policy pursued by the late Government in giving only what he called "dribblings" of aid. The former Government had persistently refused to adequate aid the university.

Mr. Ross took exception to Mr. Whitney's charge against the late Govern-ment. He said that practically all the projects aided by the bill had been inugurated and indorsed by Government. There was no difference of opinion between the parties on this

Mr. Ross objected to the Govern-ment's method of financing the grants to the university. He also criticised the propositioo to give \$300,000 to Toronto General Hospital. He thought a smaller sum might be given, and the balance divided among the smaller hospitals of the Province. The Government's generosity was too concentrated. If the Government gave \$300,000 the city of Toronto should give at least

Mr. Whitney said that every word Mr. Ross had uttered was designed to create trouble and dissension throughout the Province, by making other institutions think they were not being treated fairly. Mr. Whitney said he honored the deputy leader of the Opposition for his absence, for it was apparent that he could not have sat by and heard the Opposition leader put his knife into every proposition for helping the university. If he was informed correctly, Mr. Ross had also refused to aid medicine. Let him come forward with his insidious attacks on the university, and they would be exposed. THREE JAP ARMIES FIVE YEARS FOR MOVING TO BATTLE MURDEROUS ATTACK

Another Desperate and Decisive Judge Winchester Delivers Sen-Combat Imminent On the Plains of Manchuria.

New York, May 20. - A Tokio dispatch to the Times says: The news from Manchuria indicates the imminence of a battle. The Russians occupy at the conclusion of the sessions this a line 42 miles in length from Yen Ho morning. Tokio. May 20, 7 p.m.-It was announced this evening from the headquarters of the Japanese armies in the field that three Russian columns mixed forces advanced southward on May 18 to the vicinity of the railroad. The Japanese engaged them and drove the Russians northward, Simultaneously, 500 Russian cavalry attacked a Japanese field hospital at Kangpin, on the right bank of the Liao River, Japanese artiflery and infantry dispersed the attacking cavalrymen inflicting

heavy loss upon them. Hong Kong, May 20. - According to information received here today the 150 deeply-laden junks (presumably loaded with provisions for the Russian fleet), were sighted May 16 twenty miles off Cape St. John, by a correspondent, who proceded from here to Kwang Chau Bay (north of the Isthmus of Painam), have left the vicinity of Cape St, John, it is added, are probably seeking to effect a junction with Admiral Rojestvensky's fleet.

St. Petersburg, May 20, 5:32 p.m. The war office confirms the report from Gunshu Pass, Manchuria, that Field Marshal Oyama is on the eve of taking the general offensive, and no doubt is entertained here that General Linevitch will accept battle in his present positions. The general staff believes Oyama's advance was precipitated by the doubt regarding the issue of the coming naval battle between Admirals Rojestvensky and Togo. With an un-beaten army in front of him, Oyama's position might be critical if his communications with Japan were intersupted even temporarily.

Linevitch Will Fight It Out.

Gunshu Pass (108 miles north of Tie Pass), Manchuria, May 20.-A genera engagement is imminent. Field Marshal Oyama is deploying heavy forces against General Linevitch's left, and is contracting his troops along center, but his base is opposite the Russian right. It is not yet clear which wing is making a demonstration, and which will deliver the main blow. It is evident from Linevitch's preparations that he intends to accept a decisive







CHEESE CASE IN COURT

Appeal of Defendant in Dyer vs. Edgar Was Dismissed.

In divisional court, Toronto, before Chancellor Boyd and Justices Mac-Mahon and Teetzel, in the case of Dyer vs. Edgar, J. P. Mabee, K.C., for defendant, appealed from order of Meredith J., in weekly court, dated 27th March, 1905, dismissing without costs an appeal from interim report of local master at London, in a reference before

him of a partnership account.

The plaintiffs, who are the executors of deceased partner, Rundall, seek to recover from the defendant one-half the profit made upon 800 cheese, which were stored in a warehouse in London just previous to the death of Rundall. The defendant alleged that on the Sat urday before the death of his partner they entered into an agreement for the dissolution of the assets, by one of the terms of which the cheese stored at Ingersoll were to be shipped and the cheese at London to be taken over by the defendant at the price paid for them. Upon the death of Rundall the defendant proceeded to deal with the warehoused cheeses as his own, relieved the estates of deceased, and after holding them for some time sold

Two questions arose before the mas ter. Upon one of these he held that defendant had not produced sufficient corroboration of agreement with deceased to satisfy the statute. The plaintiffs also contended that there was not such a delivery by the estate to defendant as would satisfy statute of frauds. E. W. M. Flock (London) for plaintiff, opposed appeal. Dismissed with costs.

## DUKE 10 RETURN

Judge Macbeth Decides the Horse Belongs to London Man.



# PLANS TO CHECK THE ALIEN FLOOD

Exclude Undesirable Immigrants.

Washington, D. C., May 19 .- The regulation of immigration into the United States by means of an international agreement has been recommended to the Government as the most satisfactory way of excluding thousands of undesirable persons who are now allowed admission. The recommendation is made by Marcus Braun, the agent of the immigration bureau, who is involved in trouble with the Austrian authorities as the result of his activity

in Hungary. Ambassador Storer at Vienna cabled to the state department today that he had been notified by the Austrian Minister of Foreign Affairs that the dtparture of Mr. Braun is desired because he is by birth a Hungarian, though an American citizen by virtue of naturalization; because he has been guilty of disorderly behavior, and because generally it isn't considered advisable to the interests of the good re-lations of the two countries that he

It is in this drastic decision of the Austro-Hungarian Government in Mr. Braun's case that has raised the question with the administration, what shall be done in order that the immigration authorities here may obtain the information necessary to an intelligent supervision of immigration? This information will not be supplied by foreign governments. United States consular agents are not sufficiently expert in knowledge to report the details which are required. Mr. Braun himself proposed the solution in an official report to the department of commerce and labor.

Spraying with alum and water Will stop severe bleeding

HE lack of knowing just what to do in cases of sudden illness is often the cause of great anxiety and needless suffering.

This is probably more noticeable in the summer, when many people go off into the country, where the nearest physician is apt to be some distance away. The small children of the family having been cooped up in town are so delighted to get where they can romp out of doors that they nearly always overdo the matter by staying too long on the damp ground, or getting their feet wet in some fascinating stream or puddle, and unless great care is taken the first week in the country is apt to bring illness in its train. llness in its train.

A baby attacked by croup is a cause of the utmost alarm to an inexperienced mother. A doctor should be sent for, but meanwhile the mother may wring out flannels in very hot water and place them on the child's throat, changing them often, so as to keep them hot. A very small baby may be entirely wrapped up in a blanket wrung out of water as hot as it can be borne. If possible, get a kitchen kettle of boiling water, and place it so that the child may inhale the steam from it. The child's breathing will be greatly alleviated by this treatment.

Nothing is more painful that severe earache, and quick relief from this may be obtained by dropping a little warm salad oil in the ear from a spoon. Be absolutely certain that the oil is only of a milk heat, for, if it is too hot it will cause intense pain and be very bad for the ear. The way to drop it into the ear is to have the child rest its head on a pillow so that the afflicted ear is uppermost, and there it should stay until the oil has had time to penetrate the suffering part.

the suffering part. The very best treatment for a child with convulsions is to place it in a tub of warm water. A great deal of valuable time is frequently wasted in experimenting to find out whether the water is the right temperature. Testing with the hand is not accurate, as under the stress of excitement the hands are liable to be cold. The surest test is to roll upy your determined that the stress of the st your sleeves and dip your bare elbow into the water. If the water is too hot for your elbow, it is too hot

In most instances it may be stopped by bathing the face and neck in cold water and syringing the nostrils with water in which a little alum has been dissolved. Lemon juice may also be used in a similar manner. This simple treatment is one of the best known remedies, and is often efone of the best known remedies, and is often effectual when all other resources have failed.

Very often in cases of fainting the attendant people become so excited that they nearly strangle the patient by holding a bottle of strong smelling salts under her nose. The smelling salts have their uses, but they should not be so violently applied. The proper method is to slowly pass the open bottle several inches below the nose. The action of strong smelling salts is violent and even dangerous to a weak heart or even to a normally strong beart. weak heart, or even to a normally strong heart, weakened by the causes that have occasioned the swoon. The bands around the throat and waist and chest should be loosened, and at the same time every precaution taken to prevent the patient from becoming chilled.

Perhaps the lack of knowing how to stop the flow of blood in cases of severe cuts or wounds has occasioned more serious results than any other

ignorance. Everyone should acquaint themselves with the method of treatment in the case of accidents of this sort. It is very simple and easily carried out. Make a bandage of any piece of cloth that is convenient; a large handkerchief will sometimes answer the purpose.

The bandage should be wrapped as tightly as possible and the ends tied in a hard knot. A stick should then be run through the knot, as in the illustration, and by twisting the stick the necessary tightness can be gained. This sort of bandage is called a tourniquet. Knowing how to apply it may enable one to save not only his own life, but frequently that of a friend.

O SPEND a day in bed when one is not ill seems at first mention rather a waste of time, yet there is profit in it for a tired woman. The large majority of women, who must study economy very closely, cannot make a change of climate at will. For them the rest must be secured at home. Everyone knows that the sequence of a brief illness is often a great gain in strength. This is because the patient has had the rest afforded by staying for a short period in bed. Just one day every week or every fortnight thus passed by a tired woman, who is only tired, not really ill, will prove very profitable to her. Try it. Let yourself be waited on, and a little missed downstairs.

TO BE REMEMBERED

Don't curl or plait a child's hair tightly if you want it to grow long and thick. Many a scanty crop of tresses in later life is due to straining the hair while the child is growing. Small children should be allowed to drink as much water as they like. It helps to clear the system of effete matter quickly, and so keep the stomach and bowels in good condition.

Castor oil can be used instead of butter when cooking buttered eggs, and if flavored with pepper and salt will be undetected. This is an excellent way in which to give it to children who make a fuss over it.

Nervous children should never be scolded unless it is absolutely necessary, and should never under any circumstances be ridiculed. Such treatment is only likely to make them more nervous, and in these days such a tendency should be specially guarded

Time Between Meals-Four hours is the longest Time Between Meals—Four hours is the longest interval during which children should go without food in the daytime, and something, if it is only a drink of milk and a biscuit, should always be given them the last thing before going to bed.

An infectious disease is more liable to be taken when one has been long fasting than soon after a meal. Therefore, if you are going to see a friend suffering from anything of the kind, eat a substantial meal first. Neither should one go into an infected area when, in consequence of overheating, the pores of the body are all open.

If you need to drink hot water pour it from one jug to another a few times. This will aerate it, and remove the flat, insipid taste so objectionable to most persons.

Don't neglect the ten minutes' rest during the day, with the feet raised. It gives the whole body a great sense of repose, and works wonders in smoothing out the lines on the face.

Creosote should never be put into a hollow tooth for toothache. It relieves pain, but inevitably destroys the substance of the tooth itself, which breaks away soon after, leaving only the stump.

Don't eat when tired, and don't work when tired. It is a mistake to work when not in a fit condition— Don't eat when thred, and don't work when thred. It is a mistake to work when not in a fit condition—bad for the work and worse for you. Don't sit down to table as soon as you come in from work or a round of social duties. Lie down, or sit down, for ten minutes, waiting until you can partake of your dinner with the physical machinery rested and refreshed.

Many argue that flowers should be kept away from sick rooms, lest they exhaust the air, etc.; that is true with certain flowers, such as lilies and lilac, but a few roses, mingonette or violets will prove to be most refreshing and reviving to weary eyes and depressed spirits—which is the real ministry of governs.

Skin Red and Rough

Having read your advice to so many, I have also come to be helped. My skin is red and rough, more so after washing. I do not rub hard, as my skin is very tender, and it will stay red and itching, sometimes for hours, and as I do not use much soap and it is also good. I am also troubled with enlarged pores, mostly across my nose, which look as if there was a speck of dirt in each, and very oily. Lotion for Enlarged Pores. Boric acid, I dram; distilled witch hazel, 4 ounces. Apply with a piece of old linen or a bit of absorbent cotton. Cleanse the skin thoroughly before applying.

Lotion for Oily, Damp Hair. For greasy, moist hair the following is an excellent dry lotion. If used daily it tends to produce a crispy condition and an auburn

to produce a crispy condition and an auburn shade.

Powdered bicarbonate of soda, borate of soda (also powdered), % ounce of each; eau de cologne, 1 fluid ounce; alcohol, 2 fluid ounces; tincture of cochineal, % fluid ounce; distilled water, 16 ounces.

Mix and agitate until solution is complete for general usage.

Which Hair Stain?

I am a very interested reader of your department, and have made some valuable clippings therefrom. Among them I have the two hair stains—"the physician's prescription" and "pyrogallic acid"—but am in doubt which to use. My hair is dark brown, but a decided brown, and is slightly sprinkled with gray in front. As my skin is a pale olive, clear, with a little color, I hesitate to experiment with the pyrogallic acid dye, as I fear my hair might take on too dark a shade, which would kill my natural color and probably make me look ghastly. I am sure it would be very much appreciated by the readers if some one who had tried the pyrogallic receipt would let you know how much they had diluted it for brown hair. pyrogallic receipt would let you know how much they had diluted it for brown hair. In regard to henna. Do gray hairs take the stain, and does it give one the artificial appearance that bleached tresses effect? Would it harmonize with dark eyes and pale olive skin?

I think the pyrogallic dye would be the best for your hair. Weaken the solution about one half, and I think you will find that it will produce a decided brown stain. brown stain.

Henna is a vegetable stain, and pro duces an attractive auburn tint. If there are only a few gray hairs, this can be used successfully, but if a large proportion tion of the hair has turned gray it is better to use one of the other stains referred to.
