Wild Cat Promoters.

Men have been known to remain in town without any visible means of support who were stoppeded of living on the sales of stolen silver. Wild-cat promoters have been known to pay as much as \$100 for an extra fine sample. Certain resorts in Cobalt have long been watched, and an occasional example has been made. Frequently samples are openly sold on the streets of Cobalt, and the purchasers must be well aware they were buying stolen samples.

Monday night, however, Detective Kirkwood and McDonald, disguising themselves as workmen, made the acquaintance and got the confidence of suspected parties, and as a result three men were arrested during the night, and eight in the morning. Two of the men taken had twenty-seven pounds of leaf silver, and the third one had about one hundred pounds of rock and ore.

Four houses were raided, including a boarding-house kept by one Phillips, where ore and rock were found to the extent of about four hundred pounds hidden in sacks and boxes under a stairway.

ELUDED SECRET POLICE

Uprisings Still Confront the Russian Government.

U. S. Colonel Wants Fugitive Arrest-ed and Captain Punished.

Washington, D. C., June 4.—Col. Henry A. Greene of the 10th United States Infantry, commanding at Fort William H. Seward, Alaska, has appealed to the War Department to cause the arrest and return of a deserter, and, incidentally, to punish the captain of a British ship, who perhaps has created an international issue.

perhaps has created an international issue.

According to Col. Greene, Sergeant Buell, a member of the post band, deserted from Fort Seward and made his way on board the British steamer Princess May. When the ship touched at Katchikan, Alaska, May 14, the city marshal, under instructions from the military authorities, sought to arrest Buell. The latter locked himself in his cabin, and the captain of the ship refused to allow him to be forcibly arrested, and sailed away to a Canadian port, where the deserter, landed and disappeared.

Col. Greene asks the Department to have the State Department make a demand on the British Government for the return of the deserter to Fort Seward and for the punishment of the captain.

The acting judge advocate general, however, has taken the ground that the military has no such authority, and if the effort is made to punish the British captain, it must be through the civil authorities, who were derelict in the first place, in not arresting both the deserter and the captain, if he resisted process within territorial waters.

Prince Albert, Sask., June 4.—The scene at the land office yesterday morning was disgraceful. A mounted constable of the Mounted Police rode up and down through the crowd in front of the steps endangering the lives and limbs of those who were only following out the Government instructions and seeking to be first at the counter when the doors were opened. When the doors were opened some of these who had sat on the steps since Saturday got in. About 8 o'clock a raid was made on the tired top-step sitters and they were ousted. Some were forced through the door into the building from which they were promptly fired.

At 9 o'clock two mounted police and two police constables raided the crowd at the doors and made a road in for Mr. Cook and Commissioner McDougall. The latter has charge of the distribution of the Doukhobor lands. A mounted policeman then rode his horse through the crowd, but as they dispersed before the horse they fell in behind again. Both Mr. Cook and Mr. McDougall appealed to the crowd to let in the five who were cousted from the top steps, but the crowd would not listen to it.

Just at this juncture a wagon was driven up close to the curb, and the spectators on the outside rushed in and tipped the wagon over on the crowd in from the steps. Fortunately nobody was hart.

Leader of Finnish Revolution Has Reached America.

Women Played Important Part-Proved to Be Best Soldiers In the Red Guards-Heavy Price on His Head -Capt. Kock Says More Terrible

sian Government.

New York, June 4.—Capt. J. Kock, leader of the famous Finnish Red Guard, the revolutionary militia of Finland, atthough searched for by the secret police of Russia over all Europe, has arrived safely and is staying with friends on the east side.

There is a price of many thousand rubles on his head, but Capt. Kock declares that he will continue his work for the liberation of Finland, and that uprissings greater and more terrible than those of the past will confront the Russian Government.

The Finnish Red Guard consists of 10,000 men and 5,000 women, all armed with the latest model Mauser rifles, well drilled and capable of being mobilized at a moment's notice. In an interview Capt. Kock said: "The best soldiers in my army were the women. I had a division of women, led by women officers, and they did splendid service and were sometimes braver than the men. I rejoice to think of my women troops. They were the best shots and runners.

"The women soldiers in the Red Guard were the working women, domestic servants and peasant girls."





PROTECTION OF INDIA ABSOLUTE

Britain and Japan Enter Into Important Agreement.

New and Secret Treaty Between Two Island Powers-Japan Will Lend Support of Navy In Event of Menace to India-Britain's Undertaking Not Divulged-May Assist Japan Financially.

pan Financially.

London, June 4.—(C.A.P.)—I am informed that very important negotiations have recently taken place in London between Prince Fushimi and Admiral Yamamoto, representing Japan, and Sir Edward Grey of the British Foreign Office. The purpose of the negotiations is to arrange an extension of the scope of the Anglo-Japanese agreement, so as to provide that Japan shall be bound to assist Great Britain in the event of British control of India being attacked by any other power.

Japan's Navy Will Act.

Japan, I am told, does not contemplate sending an army to India to support her ally in case the latter should be in trouble. Her undertaking would be to support Great Britain in India against any other power with the full strength of the Japanese navy. I am unable to state precisely to what stage the negotiations between Japan's representatives and the Foreign Office have been advanced, but my understanding is that a complete agreement has been drafted for submission to the Japanese Government.

What Japan would get in return for what she gave my informant was unable to state, but he suggested that for one thing it might be agreed that this country should do everything possible to help Japan to maintain her financial standing here and elsewhere.

Is Russia Aimed At?

Of course, the only power that is likely to interfere with British control of India is Russia, so the proposed agreement between Japan and Great Britain must be regarded as in the nature of an alliance against Russia. That being the case, it seems extraordinary that such an alliance is contemplated at a time when Japan is concluding a treaty with Russia in connection with the Portsmouth protocol and Great Britain to negotiating with Russia for an entente similar to that she has with France. When I suggested this to my informant his reply was that the intention of Japan and Great Britain was to keep the negotiations in which Prince Fushimi figured a secret treaty.

IRISH BILL WITHDRAWN.

Measure Dropped Owing to Opposition of Nationalist Convention.

Measure Dropped Owing to Opposition of Nationalist Convention.
London, June 4.—In the House of Commons yesterday Premier Campbell-Bannerman formally announced that the Government, in view of the action of the Irish Nationalist convention at Dublin in rejecting the Irish bill, had decided to drop the measure. The Premier said the Irish people would have done well to give the details of the measure more attention than appeared to have been the case at the recent convention at Dublin, but in view of the unanimous decision to reject the bill, the Government could not go any further. He added that the decision of the representatives of the Irish people was a source of sincere regret and disappointment to the Ministers.

Now that the Irish bill was dropped, the Government intended to introduce an "evicted tenants' restoration bill" with powers of compulsory purchase. The licensing bill would be dropped, as also would be the case with the measure designed to relieve the "passive registers" from paying education rates for religious instruction, but the Government was determined to introduce next session a comprehensive education bill, putting the whole 'educational system of the country in order.

In regard to the proposed restriction of the powers of the House of Lords, the Premier said it was proposed later in the session to introduce a resolution on the subject, when the Government would fully set forth its views.

OLD CHARGE EXPLODED.

Cobalt, June 4.—At the CBrien mine yesterday afternoon, at the 150 foot level, David Blair, a Scotchman, recently arrived in Cobalt, was instantly killed and Harry Weldy of Orillia fatally injured. Both his eyes were blown out, both legs broken and he suffered other injuries.

The accident was caused by the explosion of an old charge.
Blair was a married man. Weldy has been mining for 15 years, and came to Cobalt from Copper Cliff. Both were 30 years of age.

Woman Stabbed to Death.

New York, June 4.—Mrs. Katherine Killoran, wife of James Killoran, a foreman of laborers in the McAdoo tunnel, was found dead in their home in the Bronx yesterday, with half a dozen knife wounds in her body. Her husband, from whom she had been living apart, but who had called on her Sunday night, has been arrested.

Three Burn to Death.

Newark, N. J., June 4.—Three lives were lost and thousands of dollars' damage was done in a fire which started early yesterday morning in Newark Turn Verenin Hall, in William street. The dead are Joseph Hoenecke, janitor of Turn Hall, his wife and child.

Windsor, June 4.—Essex County farmers are greatly discouraged over the outlook for the corn crop. Usually at this time of the year the corn is almost ready for cultivation, but this spring, except in a few isolated cases, it has not yet appeared above ground.



SHORTHAND.

The Quality That Appears to Be Lack-

ing in All Systems.

The fatality of all systems of shorthand is that what seems easy to the eye of filial plety may be terribly difficult to the cold gaze of a stranger. Of the innumerable systems of short-hand that were the vogue a century ago how many survive today? asks a London writer. Fame and fortune still await the man or woman who can inwent a system that will appeal to the reader as effectively as to the original writer. Perhaps if we were to redis-cover the lost shorthand writing of the ancient Romans we might find ourselves on the road toward a solution

of the problem.

For the Romans were on affectionate For the Romans were on affectionate terms with shorthand. Did not Suc-tonius, speaking of Caligula, express surprise that an emperor of so many promising parts should nevertheless be an ignoramus in shorthand, and did not Titus Vespasianus pride himself on his facility in the use of stenography both for business and amusement? So fond was he of the sport that he delighted to gather his amanuenses around him in order that they should tilt against each other in the stenographic field. It may be that but for the rediscovery of the art in England toward the end of the sixteenth century the curious Pepys would not have been moved to write his diary.

VENEZUELA.

Beauty of the Country and the Impression It Leaves.

The beauty of the country is the first and the most lasting impression. To catch glimpses at every turn in the valleys of cloudy peaks, or when on the mountain side to see through the limpld air valley after valley between the protecting hills, to breathe this pure air, to know that summer is almost perpetual—he is only half a man who does not for a moment forget the needs of civilization in the intoxication of primitive nature. The loveliness of Venezuela is something different from that of the Andean ranges farther and south. It is more tropical, and the mountains do not rise to the height in which the senses are stilled by gran-deur, nor is there found so near the equator that ruggedness or gloom of solemnity which is one feature of the Rockies. It is a beauty of more human type, which can be enjoyed most when we know that man has his abode there. The Andes, the Alps or the Rockies are bold and austere. They need no life. Life is not meant for them. But such contrasts and changes as are con-stantly presented to the eye in these softened landscapes are more exquisite when man is pottering about on the surface trying to imagine that he is of some real importance on the earth.

MARVELS OF WORKMANSHIP. The Violins That Were Made by the

The old masters used such care in the selection of the woods for their instruments that, having found a piece of wood of proper fiber and vibrational powers, they treasured every fragment, no matter how small, and rather than waste even a particle of such a strip they frequently constructed the backs and belies of patches so delicately put together that "the seams are only discoverable by microscope, so perfect is the cabinetwork." It was ever the aim of the old masters to "marry" the back of hard sycamore, which produces the quick vibrations, and the belly of soft wood, producing the slower sound waves, in such a manner as to give the mellow but reedy timbre of the perfect instrument. Anatomically a wiracle of construction. It can be takon to pieces, patched, put together, re-paired indefinitely and is almost indestructible. Repairing has been the means of exposing many clever forger-ies.
