THE TRANSCRIPT.

QUEBEC, WEDNESDAY, 21st AUG. 1839.

No Upper Canada nor United States mail this day.

The Telegraph reports a Frigate and 40 vessels coming up the river.

The latest New-York date received here are of Thursday last 4 P. M., up to which hour there was no appearance of the steamer *Liverpool*. She had been out fourteen days—if she sailed as advertised—and her arrival was hourly looked for. We shall, probably, receive the news here this day by steamer from Montreal. In the event of this occurring, and the intelligence being of importance, we shall issue an extra.

MONTREAL RACES.

By the steamer *St. George*, which arrived yesterday, we received the subjoined report of the first day's races in Montreal. It will be seen that Royalty has held the sway on St. Pierre Race Course, *Sovereign* having won the *Queen's Plate*, and *Queen* subsequently carrying off the Turf Club Purse. The weather, we are informed, was delightful, and every thing went "merry as a marriage bell."

Well contested, and won by a neck.

The *Lady Colborne* steamer arrived here on Monday night, between nine and ten o'clock; she left Montreal at about half past eight in the morning, and brought the Montreal papers of the same day. The *Courier* contains a very minute account of the upward trip of the *Lady Colborne*, from which we learn that she reached Montreal forty-three minutes before the *British America*, which, as we stated in our last, left Quebec at the same time. The actual time of running of the *Lady Colborne*, was 15 hours 29 minutes—time lost in stoppages &c., 4 1/2 hours.

Some excitement has prevailed in New-York lately, in consequence of alleged misconduct on the part of Mr. Trist, Consul of the United States at Havana, who is accused of arbitrary and illegal conduct, and with favouring the diabolical trade of human beings carried on from that port. Several meetings have been held in New-York on this subject, and at an adjourned one on Wednesday last, a

very energetic address to Martin Van Buren, praying for the recall of Mr. Trist, was adopted. Many spirited speeches were made, accompanied by pithy remarks from the speakers, who were entirely of the web-footed tribe. Capt. S. E. Glover remarked that N. P. Trist reminded him of the Indian judge, who, when questioned in what manner he would punish offenders, replied "I'll whip um plaintiff, w'ip um defendant, and whip um witnesses. No trouble me any more." And this seems to be the method of Mr. Trist towards shipmasters, mates and seamen.

During the half year ended 30th June last, there were coined in the United States:—13,783 half eagles, 24,433 quarter eagles, 800,000 half dimes, 731,600 dimes, 220,000 half dollars. Total value, \$353,157 50 c.

The *Canada* steamer arrived in port on Monday, buoyed up between two empty barges, and proceeded to the Cul-de-Sac, where preparations have commenced for placing her on blocks. This will be effected by Saturday or Monday, it is supposed, and we are happy to learn that the injuries which she has sustained, although of a very serious nature, will not keep her off the line as long as was originally expected.

THE QUEBEC LIBRARY.—The trustees of this institution have appealed to the liberality of the proprietors and the public in general, for their aid in freeing it from a debt of upwards of eighty pounds, which if not speedily liquidated will necessitate the closing of the Library or the disposal of a portion of the works of which it is composed. Either of these courses is much to be deplored, and we hope that there will be found sufficient liberality in the parties to whom the appeal is made, not only to avert a mutilation or entire closing of the Library, but to place it on a more prosperous footing than it has possessed for some time past. The proprietors, we imagine, must pay the amount of their shares or, in honour, give up all right and title to them; and the public in general would advance their own interest and those of the Library at the same time, by subscribing at once and paying in advance. A guinea may be, and is often spent to worse advantage than would be by procuring access to a very large and valuable collection of works, which are in sufficient variety to suit all tastes.

The trustees do not make the appeal without being prepared to adopt measures calculated to establish the affairs of this valuable institution on a satisfactory footing. Among other steps which they intend to take is the very necessary one of applying to the Special Council, at its next Session, for an act of Incorporation, vesting a power in them to dispose, for the benefit of the Library, of all shares the owners of which shall have neglected or refused, for the space of three years, to pay their proprietary subscription. We hope that the appeal of the trustees will be promptly responded to in a satisfactory manner.

MUSIC AND THE DRAMA.—Miss Davenport continues to attract large and admiring audiences to the Theatre Royal at Montreal, and judging from the unanimity of the conductors of the Montreal press in her praise, she is a most extraordinary child. On Monday, she was to appear in a new piece entitled *The Dumb Boy of Manchester*, in which it is said, the effect produced by her acting has hardly ever been equalled. The *Herald* says that this drama is full of new and beautiful music composed for Miss Davenport by C. R. It was not anticipated that Miss Davenport could have appeared in Montreal in this—her favourite—character; but the band of the 71st Regiment, at rehearsal, has set at rest all doubts as to the execution of the music, and the expectations of the "Montrealers," of a rich treat on Monday evening, have we dare say been realized. The exertions of Miss D. in the part of the Dumb Boy must be very severe, as we find in the advertisement, "Previous to which, (*The Dumb Boy of Manchester*) as Miss Davenport cannot appear after her exertions in the *Dumb Boy*, the laughable piece of the *Mowbrays*." We have not seen any notice of Miss Davenport coming to Quebec, but we hope that such is her intention; she may, we think, safely reckon on as much support here as she has obtained in Montreal.

Among the arrivals at Rasco's Hotel, Montreal, are the popular vocalists Mr. and Mrs. Seguin, and our old friend Mr. Latham, who was in Quebec last year, with Mr. Abbott's company, in which he held the situation of stage-manager, and became favourably known

for his vocal powers, and merits as a comic actor. The *Herald* states that these vocalists intend contributing towards the amusements of the race week, by giving a concert.—According to all accounts, Montreal is full of life, while Quebec is—but "comparisons are odious."

By an advertisement in this day's *Transcript*, it will be seen that the *Canadian Patriot* leaves for Montreal at 11 to-night. The accommodations on board this boat, with the attention shown to passengers, give satisfaction to all who travel in her. The fare in the cabin is only \$5.

We learn from the *Canadian*, that a pleasure trip to Kamouraska, on Sunday next, was contemplated by Captain Chénier, previous to the accident that occurred to the *Charlevoix*. Save further accidents, however, and weather permitting, the trip to Kamouraska will be made next Sunday week.

Among other appointments in the Militia, lately announced from Head Quarters, we observe the following:—
Captain Paul Lepper, of the *Queen's* Volunteers of Quebec, to be Captain attached in the Militia.

A RELIC OF THE OLDER TIME.—We copy the following, respecting the recovery of a ring belonging to the Hastings family, from the *New-York Commercial Advertiser*:—

"While at Lake George, awaiting the arrival of Mr. Clay, on the 8th instant, an interesting relic of the Hastings family was shewn to us, which some member of the family might like to reclaim. It is a mourning ring, containing perhaps two or three pennyweights of gold, and bearing the following inscription, in relief:—*Sarah Hastings, ob. 13, Feb. 1774, Æ 60.*" It was found about a few weeks since near the ruins of Fort George, and was almost as bright when picked up as though it had not been reposing there for more than sixty years. We do not at the moment recollect whether any member of the Hastings family served under General Burgoyne during his campaign of 1777. But the ring was probably lost there, as the British forces were not afterward in the occupation of that fort. Lord Rawdon, afterwards Marquis of Hastings, the father of Lady Flora, recently deceased, served in other parts of the Union, but we do not remember his having been at the North. The ring is at present in the possession of M. E. Ellis, at Glen's Falls."

STEAM NAVIGATION.—A large and highly respectable meeting of the merchants and others interested in the subject of the proposed steam communication between England and Boston, was held on the 9th inst., in the Old Supreme Court Room, agreeable to previous notice. His honor the mayor was called to the chair, and the meeting was addressed at length by him, and by Messrs. Reed, Derby, Rice, and several others. The utmost unanimity appeared to prevail as to the importance of the project, and the necessity of making such arrangements as shall be entirely satisfactory to Mr. Cunard, and properly accommodate his vessels.

A proposition made by Mr. Cunard to the committee of merchants appointed at the former meeting, was read. He states that he is willing to establish this port as a terminus for his vessels, on condition that, by a twenty years contract, a wharf and dock suitable for his accommodation should be provided by the gentlemen interested here, free of expense to him, he having the privilege, however, to charge the owners of goods for wharfage and storage. This offer, it appears, was made notwithstanding the most advantageous terms offered Mr. C. by merchants in New-York. It was stated that he was ready to leave the situation of the wharf to be decided by the convenience of the citizens. The boats are to run through to this port only stopping at Halifax. There will be four or five large as the Great Western, and two smaller ones for any emergency.

It was proposed that the requisite funds should be raised under the charter of the Ocean Navigation Company, granted by the Legislature at its last session. This company is not yet organized, and as all the necessary powers for the procuring a wharf and making arrangements with Mr. Cunard could be obtained by its charter, the most convenient way of making these arrangements seemed to be by taking advantage of this act of incorporation. The whole subject, however, was left to a committee of twenty.—*Boston Daily Advertiser*.
