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MYSTERY SURROUNDS THIS DISAPPEARANCE

Brother of Rev. A. E. Lavell, Pastor of Brant Ave. Church, Disappears Suddenly at Hamilton—Relatives Greatly Concerned Over Affair.

HAMILTON, Ont., Nov. 26.—A thorough search of the bay and the north shore has failed to reveal any trace of Cecil F. Lavell, professor of the State University of Columbus, Ohio, who rented a boat from Askew's on Monday afternoon, rowed across the bay to Carroll's Point and completely disappeared.

Lavell's relatives can offer no explanation of why he should have got off the train at Hamilton. He was on his way to Toronto to see his wife, who was called there on account of her mother's illness.

ROWELL MAKES A BREAK

Mr. Rowell, the present leader of the Opposition in the Ontario House, is one of those extreme men who seem incapable of seeing any good in the other cause or the other fellow.

Recently he charged in a public speech that the late Mr. Neely, member for East Middlesex, had received campaign funds from the liquor interests.

At Dorchester last evening he tried to explain that away as follows: "Whenever there has been a fight in which we have engaged, there the liquor interests have thrown their whole force in to defeat us and our policy. Where are they fighting to-night? Is it to elect Mr. Lauder? You know they are all united in fighting for the Government that is opposing us. I stated in the House that the liquor interests had put up money to help in East Middlesex. I repeat to-night that two collections or contributions were taken from the liquor interests in Toronto to help in the East Middlesex campaign."

"Cries of 'Prove it, prove it.' "I did not hold Mr. Neely responsible," continued Mr. Rowell.

Now these are the words which he previously actually used: "During the last bye-election in East Middlesex the liquor interests took up two collections in Toronto and the money was sent to the Government candidate here. I don't blame the Government candidate for taking the money."

That certainly was a most direct personal charge with reference to a man now in his grave.

And without entering into the merits, or otherwise, of Rowell's "abolish-the-bar" slogan, he must be an innocent if he imagines that man whom he proposes to put out of business will not attempt to hit back. That's simply human nature with regard to any calling it is sought to obliterate, bar or otherwise.

A RETURN FLOW

In commenting upon a news item from Niagara Falls, which made the statement: "Over two hundred carloads of cattle have passed through here since the new tariff law went into effect," the Brantford-Expositor says:

"News like the above is not very cheering for the Canadian consumer, however greatly it may tickle the Canadian stock-raiser. The immediate remedy for the situation is to throw down the Canadian bars, so that there may be a return flow of American cattle and other farm products from the United States."

There is a succinct subtlety about the above which, to say the least of it, is charming to a degree.

And right here two queries would seem to be in order.

1. Does our cotem think that our neighbors are buying Dominion cattle because they have too many of their own?

2. Does it actually believe that with the barriers down on this side they would take said cattle and send them back here at a lower price?

If not, what, in the name of common-sense, is the organ supposed to be driving at?

HONORING MR. BECK

The citizens of London honored themselves in honoring Hon. Adam Beck.

It has been the fortune of few men to render greater public service than he. The people of the whole Province are under an everlasting debt of gratitude to him in connection with Hydro-Electric. Against most opposition and seemingly almost insuperable difficulties, he carried that great scheme through to a successful completion, and what that means to industry, the urban homes and the farms it would be impossible to compute.

In addition to this great work he has placed the residents of the Forest City under two great local obligations to him. First in the matter of his activity on behalf of helping to fight the white plague, and, secondly, because, at his own personal risk and without profit, he established a water-works system there when the need arose, and then handed the same over to the municipality at cost.

His petition in reply to the grand tribute accorded him was like the man himself, terse and earnest. He said in part:

"I feel and realize your presence this evening, and the words that have been uttered fill me with deep embarrassment and gratitude untold, and with profound humility, that far exceeds the merit my services have earned. What have I done that you should do me such honor? I am the servant of the people. My greatest joy is to make the lot of every one within the range of my work and influence brighter and better. I only seek to help make the burdens of man lighter, and if I have succeeded in some degree, I have but done my duty. I fully realize that I could

never have surmounted the obstacles that one meets in public life, had not my fellow-citizens given me their generous support.

"If I have helped to make the goods of the merchant and the home of the poor safer from fire, I am glad. If I have helped to lessen the household cares of the housewife by making electricity her servant, I have my reward. If I have helped the farmer to make life on the farm more attractive to help the boys and girls on the farm, then I have not labored, nor have you co-operated with me, in vain. If I have helped to save the life of any afflicted child or lengthened the days of any afflicted sufferer, I am happy."

"This expression of confidence on the part of you, my fellow-citizens, is an incentive to further effort on my part, to serve my fellow-countrymen. There is much work yet to be done, there are victories of the people, by the people, for the people, yet to be won. The day of the people is come. In the winning of these great victories I am but one, but you are many; without you, without the people, all is futile."

"Let us set our faces towards the attainment of even greater things to unite on the common ground of good citizenship, the ground that knows no class, no creed, to vie with one another in doing right and doing it well, and in building up and developing a Canadian citizenship which will stand for service, progress and righteousness."

Lofty sentiments, these, well expressed. Not only London, but all Canada, is proud of the Minister of Power.

LAWRENCE STREET. The Editor of the Courier, Sir,—I was considerably misrepresented at the Council meeting re the widening of Lawrence Street. First Mr. Lang did not purchase his lot from myself or the Lyons Estate, as he will see if he reads his deed; further, I have no knowledge whatever of the business affairs of the party who gave him that deed as seemed to be the impression among the Aldermen.

Alderman Sutch is also in error, as a petition signed by four hundred residents of the vicinity was presented to the City Council the night that body decided to close St. Paul's Avenue. I was present and I fought the closing but to no avail. As a sop it was agreed to widen Lawrence street to fifty-seven feet five inches, as closing St. Paul's Avenue would divert a lot of traffic for it east and west.

The City officials were several times furnished with the addresses of the owners of the property involved in the widening and I expected the same would be proceeded with, but as year after year has gone by and nothing been done, I think it is time we knew if it is the intention of the Council to break faith and repudiate the only redeeming feature connected with closing St. Paul's Avenue.

Two years ago I expected St. Lawrence street would surely be widened in the near future as agreed. I erected a building on the lot, and never knowing that this street was the main and only approach west, and if it is now left narrow, all the streets west of it will feel it in the future even more than we now notice the narrowness of Queen street. Property values will suffer in proportion.

If the City officials were too busy to attend to the widening of Lawrence street and further issued a permit for a building to be put on the ground involved, that is no affair of mine. I contend it is up to the city to keep faith even if it involves the purchase and removal of Mr. Lang's cottage, otherwise the public will be justified in looking with suspicion on any agreement of a similar nature which the city council may make.

I simply want the terms of the agreement on the tracks as I am under further delay and my solicitor is under instructions to take whatever proceedings are necessary to this end.

As to St. Paul's Avenue Subway, few realize that fire protection on the other side of the tracks is a joke and if the public interested actually knew what a tinder box the present hospital was, with its oiled floors and varnished wood work, they would insist on a subway being constructed at once. Should a fire break out there, it would be impossible for our Fire Department to reach the premises before the entire place was a mass of flames and it is very doubtful that half the inmates could be removed in time. I am surprised at the indifference of the City Council, the Hospital Board and the public generally to the construction of this subway.

### James Taylor's Education

Salvation Army Men Are Visiting Him Daily

Because of the ignorance of the prisoner, the spiritual education of James Taylor, the murderer of Charlie Dawson, is proving a most difficult task. This work is being done by Adjutant Hargrove and Sergt. Major Osborne, both of the Salvation Army. Daily visits are paid to the prisoner by either worker.

The prisoner has had no education and coupled with this handicap there is the still greater one, the task of the requisite amount of brain power. Of course, the prisoner has a good deal of brain power, and it is believed fully realizes his position.

Although he has seldom touched upon it, by kindly treatment and simple illustrations, both in print and verbal, he is being taught the proper spirit in which to meet his maker. The form of teaching a man of Taylor's character, is quite remote from the form of teaching the average prisoner and for that matter the average murderer. Tact and a whole heap of common sense must be used. This plan is being carried out with some success. By January 23rd, it is the hope of the workers, that he will have been led into the light, and will be ready to meet his fate.

Prison life seems to agree with the man, as he sleeps and eats well. He gives his keepers no trouble and speaks highly of the kindness shown him by the jail officials.

### CITY IS WITHOUT SMALLPOX HOSPITAL

Dr. Pearson Points Out Today That Action is Necessary!

"We have no smallpox hospital at present," said Medical Health Officer Pearson this morning, "and it would be a disgrace to repair that old shack up in Mount Hope Cemetery."

Recently a fire did some damage to the place. "Who will have to build the hospital?" "Why, the city, because nearly all the patients come from here, but I do think joint action should be taken by the township and city together. It is sure, however, that action will have to be taken soon."

### SCARLET FEVER CASES REPORTED

Grand View School Rooms Are Fumigated To-day.

The isolation hospital at present is filled with scarlet fever patients, but said Medical Health Officer Pearson this morning: "There is no occasion for worry, because there is only room for six or seven patients." However, there are a number of scarlet fever cases in the city, which are quarantined at home.

Two assessors reported from Grandview and a number of pupils were dismissed this morning. The trustees are taking prompt action in having the rooms fumigated.

### Horse Refused To Be Injured

Kerby House Outfit in Front of G. T. R. Train.

John Dawson and John Dawson's horse jointly engaged in removing trunks, baggage, etc., to and from the Kerby House and the depot, had, what one might call, a miraculous escape on the Grand Trunk Railway, south Market street crossing this morning. 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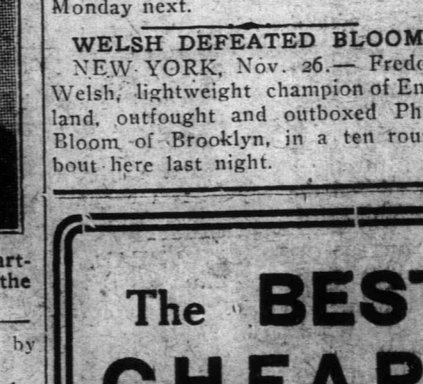

## OVER \$50,000 IN STOCK TAKEN UP

### Federal League Apparently Due to Stick in Baltimore.

BALTIMORE, Nov. 26—Directors of the Baltimore Federal League Club have decided to reduce the par value of the preferred stock being distributed from \$100 to \$10 a share. According to the officials, it was not because subscriptions were coming in too slowly that the reduction was made, but to give those who feel that they can't lay out \$100 for a share to purchase the stock and thereby stimulate interest in the plan to give this city major league baseball.

Those behind the project have intended all along to reduce the par value of the stock, but it was felt a substantial sum was first needed to guarantee Baltimore a franchise in the league at the meeting held in Indianapolis several weeks ago, and \$25,000 had to be raised immediately. Announcement is made that considerably over \$25,000 worth of the club's stock had been disposed of, and the officials are satisfied with the financial standing of the club, and will push matters in order to get things straightened out for next season.

The reduction of the stock's value was the culmination of a suggestion made a couple of weeks ago by Edward Hanlon, whose wide experience in baseball is well known to all close followers of the city. Mr. Hanlon is of the opinion that the reduction will cause the remainder of the stock to be disposed of inside the next week, and will give all true Baltimoreans a chance to take a hand in the fight which is being fought to put this city back in the conspicuous place it should occupy in baseball.

"The only opportunity Baltimore has of again having real big league ball has presented itself," says Mr. Hanlon, "and the time is now ripe for all business men who have the welfare of the city at heart to get in the band wagon. Think of a city of the size of Detroit overshadowing Baltimore in baseball. They can come along and grab up any player they might want as the present conditions exist, and we cannot do a thing."

"What we want is a baseball team with real stars, and when we develop them we want to keep them here. Of course, we will have a hard road to travel to get real baseball players here, but with the support of the local fans, we guarantee that this will be done. Every citizen of Baltimore has the opportunity to purchase some of the stock, and, of course, this will create interest in the team. Say, for instance, we sell 5,000 shares, we will have everyone of the holders of these at the game almost every day."

"The organization of a big league ball club takes time and money, but we will attend to this. All we want is the hearty support of all those who claim they are desirous of seeing Baltimore once more back on the baseball map where it rightfully belongs. There has always been a howl about this city was not a town, but this untrue. Think of Baltimore has grown since we had major league ball here.

"In St. Louis a city that should not be classed any higher than Baltimore there are at present two inter-league teams, and both are making money. If they can support two major league clubs there, why can't we support one here? We can do it, and this will be proven before many more seasons float by."

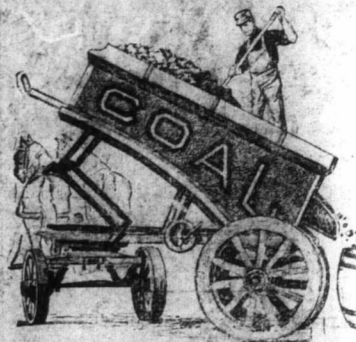

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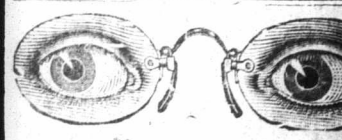

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## MORE MONEY FOR THE NAVY

Millions Voted for Current Year Nearly All Spent—Great Activity

Owing to the unexpected rapidity with which shipbuilding in the naval yards has been carried on the Admiralty will probably have to present Supplementary Estimates immediately after the re-assembly of Parliament, a fresh supply of money being required to meet the needs of the present financial year.

It is understood, however, that the Estimates for 1914-15 will be for an amount less than the sum which will be actually expended in the current year.

When the Canadian Senate threw out Mr. Borden's Naval Aid Bill, which proposed to provide £7,000,000 for the construction of three battleships for the Royal Navy, the Admiralty determined to fill temporarily the gap thus caused by accelerating three of the five vessels of the ordinary British programme, which had not been intended to begin until late in the coming spring. On these three ships—the Resolution, Ramilies, and Revenge—a large sum will be spent before the end of March, and this money must

be provided by supplementary votes.

The First Lord announced in his speech in March last that, in order to avoid taking money which might not be spent, and which would automatically go back to the Treasury, the Estimates had been framed on the assumption that work would proceed at a moderate pace in the great private establishments.

There was then a probability of a general strike, but as it happens the cloud has blown over, and naval construction has proceeded at a rapid rate, and arrears which had accumulated will be partially—though only partially—overtaken. The result is that the contractors will earn much larger sums than was thought to be possible when the First Lord spoke.

**Naval Air Squadron**

Another development which will help to swell the supplementary votes is the development of the naval air service. In this work the First Lord has taken a keen interest, as his recent tour of inspection has indicated. Not only has the equipment of the Naval Wing of the Royal Flying Corps been strengthened, beyond the limits which were at one time considered to be immediately attainable, but orders have been given for nearly a dozen airships of various types.

New stations on the coast have been established, work has been undertaken in connection with the great "dock" near Chatham Dockyard, and the Navy is taking over the small airships of the Army, together with the factory at Farn-

orough and the personnel—officers and men of the Army who have already shown marked ability in this branch of warfare.

Thus for the first time for a long period the estimated sum to be spent on the Navy will be the actual sum disbursed, and there will be no balance to go to the Sinking Fund. Taking the ordinary and Supplementary Estimates of the current year together, one finds that 1913-14 represents the high water mark in naval expenditure. According to present plans the next year will actually show a reduction, though not a large one.

It has apparently been the aim of the Board, in estimating their needs for the new financial year, again to ask only for such a sum as there is good reason to believe can be disbursed as to avoid any repetition of the recent experiences, when money intended for the Navy was returned to the Treasury and went to reduce the National Debt.

## PICTURESQUE SHOW

Procession of Three Hundred Years Ago Reproduced

Sir T. Vansittart Bowater was formally installed in the proud office of Lord Mayor of London on Monday.

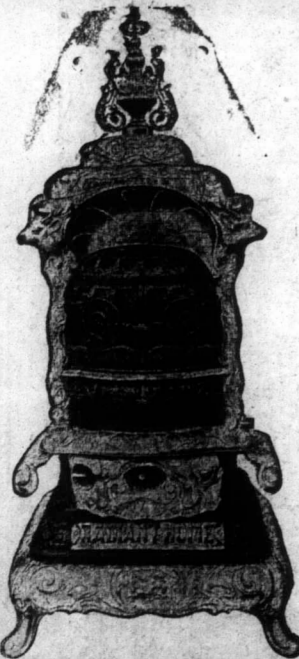
