## Fertilizer on Pastures

The results from this practice a the college farm have been so striking that the College authorities feel that the practice should be urged on many, more farms. The story told by the experiments at Truro, is briefly this. The total cost of gain in live weight, including interest on investment, fencing and all incidentals, as compared with 15 cents per pound in winter in the stable, with feeds at pre-war prices. The improvement in grazing capacity of pastures to which fertilizer w
