PROMINENT C. P. R. OFFICIALS MADE INSPECTION OF THE LINE

A hurried visit which no doubt has considerable significance to this Province was made last week by Mr. Grant Hall, Vice-President and Mr. C. H. Temple, General Superintendent Motive Power, Western Lines of the C. P. R. These officials made a tour of inspection over the Dominion Atlantic Railway in company with General Manager, George E. Graham, General Freight Agent, F. G. J. Comeau and J. H. Yould, Mechanical Superintendent.

Mr. Hall in conversation with a Halifax reporter expressed the hope that before very long the present light rails on the D. A. R. will be replaced by heavier steel. War conditions had delayed this work, but it would now be undertaken.

Canada's Agricultural Position.

The Hon. S. F. In the matter of Expropriation of land for additional Water Reservoir construction or for other purposes in connection with the Water System of the Town of Wolfville

TO ALL WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

Notice is hereby given that the lands hereinafter particularly described are required by the Town of Wolfville for the purpose of additional water reservoir construction and other purposes in connection with the said town's Water System, and that the town proposes taking such lands for such purposes.

Further take notice that the owner or owners of said lands or of any portion thereof are hereby required to appoint an arbitrator to act for such owner or owners upon an arbitration to be held to determine the amount or amounts to be paid by the town for such lands; and that if such appointment be not made within ten days after the publication of this notice, the same may be made by the Town Solicitor on behalf of such owner or owners.

The lands required and proposed to be taken by the town as aforesaid are described as follows:—

1. Beginning at a point on the south side of the road and at the junction with existing fence situated at the north east corner of orchard now owned, or occupied, by J. D. Sherwood; thence easterly and following the said south boundary of road 925 feet more or less; thence N 80° W 187 feet; thence N 67° 18' W, 106 feet; thence N 57° 45' W, 108 feet; thence N 52° 30' W, 221 feet; thence N 56° 30' W, 163 feet; thence N 57° 45' W, 179 feet, more or less to the point of beginning, the whole containing an area of 1.12 acres, more or less.

2. Commencing at a spruce tree on the north side of the road and on the south boundary of land belonging to the Town of Wolfville; thence running S 85° 30' E and following the said south boundary a distance of 547 feet; thence S 14° 45' W a distance of 222 feet until it reaches the north boundary of road aforesaid; thence westerly and following the said north boundary of road a distance of 580 feet more or less to the point of beginning, the whole containing an area of 2.7 acres, more or less.

Notes and Comments

At a cost of approximately \$400,000 the Windsor (Ont.) Board of Education will build the largest and best-equipped public school in Canada.

The teachers of P. E. Island are on a strike, and unless their stipends are increased they certainly will quit work all over that Province in December.

The Methodist church at Colborne, Ont., has purchased the skating and curling rink in that town. The experiment holds numerous possibilities and will be watched with much interest.

A fleet of twelve boats, about 200 feet in length, built in Upper Canada for the French Government, will spend the winter in Halifax. They will not attempt the trip across the Atlantic until the spring.

Women voters as well as men will exercise their franchise in any plebiscite which any province may ask under the Prohibition Act which passed Parliament at Ottawa. It is for the provinces, through their Legislatures, to ask for the plebiscite on the question of banning of the import and the manufacture, save for export, of intoxicating beverages. The Dominion authorities will do the rest. All women will be able to vote. No option to distinguish between them and the men is conferred on the provinces, the plebiscite, like all votes under the Canadian Temperance Act, being a Federal affair.

Did you ever see a happy knocker? Do you suppose the man who is always knocking his home town, his home stores, his home newspaper is very happy? Just look at the faces of a few knockers we have here in town—for unfortunately we do have them. What do you think about them? Have you an idea if everybody and everything were just as they say at this minute they want them they would decide they wanted them some other way—or if they couldn't think of any other way to have them they would be actually unhappy. Knocking is just as unfortunate a habit as a drug habit, and the man in the clutches of such a habit is greatly to be pitied. He hurts himself even more than he hurts his town or his community.

The collecting and preserving of insects and the mounting of insect collections has become an important part of the work of the students in many of our schools. The teachers who have specialized in agriculture have learned something of the methods of collecting and preserving insects and are arousing the interest of their pupils in this fascinating subject. In order to assist those desirous of securing accurate information Entomological Circular No. 12 "Directions for Collecting and Preserving Insects" has been prepared by J. H. McDunnough, M. A., Ph. D. This circular may be obtained free upon application to the Publications Branch, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa. It indicates concisely some of the most essential features in connection with the collection of insects, and aims to arouse an interest for intelligent collecting of insects. Insects are very delicate creatures and unless the greatest of care is observed in both collecting and packing for shipment an otherwise valuable collection may be rendered practically worthless from both the aesthetic and the scientific standpoint.

ARMED CRUISER RECONDITIONED

The latest addition to the great fleet of C.P.O.S. Steamships which ply between Canada and practically all the important ports of call in the world is the "Empress of France," before the war popularly known as the SS. "Alsatian" and one of the ocean grey hounds between Canada and Liverpool. The vessel has been reconitioned since the war ceased and recently completed her maiden trip to Quebec under her new name. The photographs here reproduced give an adequate description of her interior arrangements and fittings, and will compare favorably with the great Leviathans in this respect. The "Empress of France" has a length of 600 ft.; beam 72 ft.; depth to D deck 54 ft. 6 in.; and a tonnage of 18,000 gross. A striking peculiarity is the cruiser's stern, which imparts a warlike appearance to the vessel. Her war record is one to be proud of.

The "Empress of France" as the SS. "Alsatian" was requisitioned for war purposes under Royal Proclamation immediately on her arrival at the port of Liverpool, midnight on the 6th August, 1914. After completion of discharge, the entire removal of all passenger accommodation and other woodwork, she was armed with 8-6 in. guns, commissioned and manned by a naval crew under the command of Captain V. Phillimore, D.S.O., and was attached to the 10th Cruiser Squadron on northern patrol duty, sailing from Liverpool on August 15th, at which port she has been based during the entire period of her commission.

From August to December, 1914, she remained as above stated, but in December she was made Flag Ship of the Squadron to which she was attached, and Vice-Admiral Sir Dudley R. S. De Chair, K.C.B., M.V.O., hoisted his flag, which flew up to March, 1918, when he was succeeded by Admiral Sir Reginald G. Tupper, K.C.B., C.V.O., who was succeeded in November, 1918, by Rear-Admiral C. W. Keighley Peach, under whose flag she terminated her commission as an Armed Cruiser.

The Squadron to which she was attached, and later became Flagship of, consisted of 24 vessels, the majority of which were Armed Mercantile Cruisers. The duties of the Squadron consisted of the stopping of vessels, boarding them and examining their papers, and should on examination they prove to be at all of a suspicious nature, a Naval Officer was placed in charge and they were taken into a United Kingdom port for closer examination. This similarly applied to any members of the passengers or crew, as each and everyone had to give a satisfactory explanation as to their nationality and business. Available records show that in all the Squadron intercepted some 15,000 vessels, but it is impossible to state how many of these proved to be engaged in work hostile to the Allies' interests.

Such capacity. While so engaged she escorted nine convoys of about 20 vessels each, carrying an estimated number of troops per convoy of 20,000, principally Americans.

While engaged on Convoy Escort duties the "Alsatian" also carried troops and cargo, the number of former per voyage being about 600, and the weight of cargo per voyage between 2,000 and 3,000 tons. She made her last voyage on Government Service in November, 1918, sailing from Liverpool on the 14th, and redocked at that port on December 11th, 1918, having steamed a total distance on Government Service of 288,741 miles and consumed 170,571 tons of coal.

On January 17th, 1919, she left for Glasgow, having been placed in the hands of her Builders—Messrs. Beardmore & Co.—by the Admiralty for reconitioning, being redelivered to the C.P.O.S. at the Port of Liverpool on Thursday, September 25th, and sailed for Quebec on Friday, September 26th.

Captain Outram, her captain when war broke out, was given the rank of Commander R.N.R., and acted in that capacity, which was of an advisory nature, under both Vice-Admiral Sir Dudley R. S. De Chair, K.C.B., M.V.O., and Admiral Sir Reginald G. Tupper, K.C.B., C.V.O., and was granted the D.S.O. for services rendered, being succeeded by Captain Cook at the same time as Admiral Tupper was succeeded by Rear-Admiral C. W. Keighley Peach. Captain Cook was appointed Flag Captain, and granted a commission as Captain R.N.R., and now commands the vessel.

Historical Review

A Woman's Temperance League was organized at Osborne by Mother Stewart in 1872—the first organization which merged into the W. C. T. U.

On the evening of Dec. 23, 1873, Dr. Dio Lewis lectured on temperance at Hillsboro, Ohio, and told of his mother's prayers against the liquor traffic. Seventy-five women banded themselves together and resolved with God's help to stand by each other and fight the liquor traffic. In describing that memorable meeting the next morning, Mother Thompson says: "Few comments were made at our house upon this new line of policy until after breakfast the next morning (the morning of the meeting,) when, just as we had gathered about the hearth-stone, my daughter Mary said very gently, 'Mother, will you go to the meeting this morning?' Hesitatingly I replied: 'I don't know yet, what I shall do.' My

husband fully appreciating the responsibility of the moment, said: 'Children, let us leave your mother alone, for you know where she goes with all vexed questions,' and pointing to the old family Bible, left the room. The awful responsibility of the step that I must needs take was wonderfully relieved by the thought of the 'cloudy pillar' and the 'parted waters' of the past; hence, with confidence, I was about turning my eye of faith 'to the hills' from whence had come my help, when, in response to a gentle tap at the door, I met my dear Mary, who with her Bible in her hand and a tearful eye, said: 'Mother, I oppose the 146th Psalm and I believe it is for you.' She withdrew and I sat down to read the wonderful message from God. As I read, what I had so often read before, the spirit so strangely took of the things of God and showed me new meaning. I no longer hesitated, but, in the strength thus imparted, started to the scene of action. Upon entering the church, I was startled to find myself chosen their leader. The old Bible was taken down from the desk and the 146th Psalm read: Mrs. General McDowell, by request, led in prayer, and although she had never before heard her voice in public prayer, on this occasion the tongue of fire sat upon her and all were deeply affected. Mrs. Cowden, our Methodist minister's wife, was then requested to sing to a familiar air: "Give to the winds thy fears, Hope and be undismayed; God hears thy sighs and counts thy tears; He will lift up thy head." "And while thus engaged, the women (seventy-five in number) fell in line, two and two, and proceeded first to the drug store and then to the hotels and saloons." Thus began the great prayer crusade where— "Long ago in the snow and the sleet, Womanhood knelt in the pitiless street; Out of that agony, out of defeat, Blossomed a glory for you and for me."

"Saloonkeepers hired brass bands to follow them and drown their voices." In some places they were arrested, other places liquors were poured into the gutters before thousands of people. They read God's Word and offered prayer in the saloons, where thousands of men signed the pledge, while a few cursed the women. The spirit of the crusade spread rapidly into other states, and through these praying bands in Illinois, the immortal Frances Willard first heard her call to the great work.

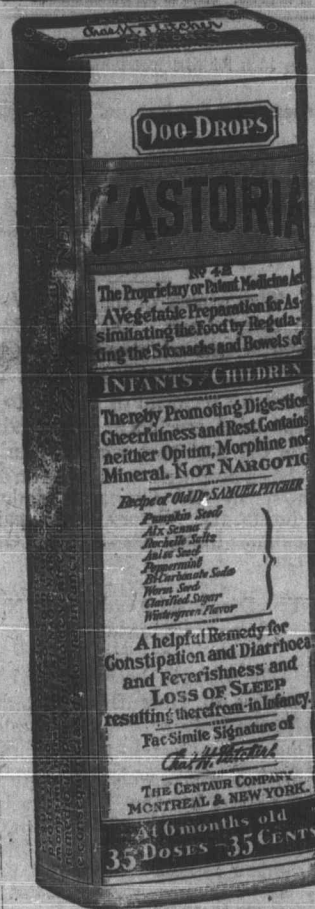
The women soon began to feel the need of a better organization. In August, 1874, at the first National Sunday School Assembly, held at Chautauqua, New York, plans for a national organization of women were discussed, and a convention was called to meet in Cleveland, Ohio, Nov. 18-20, 1874, when a society was organized to be known as the Women's Christian Temperance Union.

The following resolution shows the spirit of the convention;

"Resolved: That, recognizing that our cause is, and will be, combated by mighty, determined and relentless forces, we will, trusting in Him who is the Prince of Peace, meet argument with argument, misjudgment with patience, denunciation with kindness, and all our difficulties and dangers with prayer."

Mrs. Annie Wittenmeyer, of Philadelphia, was chosen president of this convention, and Miss Frances Willard, of Chicago, corresponding secretary.

Since then the Women's Christian Temperance Union has spread to every quarter of the globe, and is the largest society composed of and conducted by women, which has ever existed.

Editorial Jottings.

Total elimination of the foreign element from the Canadian national mercantile marine service was a point added to the aims and objects of the Naval Veteran's League at its meeting at Toronto.

Members of the mercantile committee of the chamber of commerce at Lawrence, Mass., went on record in favor of combining the celebration of Armistice day with that of Thanksgiving in the future.

Recently a pilot glided 35 miles with a "dead" motor. He stopped his engine at an altitude of 17,000 feet and could have gone 50 miles in any direction, had he not decided to land at Ithaca, N. Y., while he still had an altitude of about 5000 feet.

The New York Herald, Sunday, Nov. 16th, contains "The Gateways of Canada" by H. S. Philpot—an illustrated article, showing where are located the Great Gates through which pass in and out the enormous commerce of the prosperous Dominion.

English manufacturers are now making carpets which are claimed to be exact reproductions of rare Eastern carpets. The most remarkable feature about them is considered to be the true rendering of that Eastern lustre which has hitherto defied successful copying.

One of the most important measures next session will be a Federal elections Act. The war time elections Act has been repealed and the bye-elections are being held under a special Act. The new Act will provide for lists independent of those compiled by the provinces.

The number of returned soldiers settling on the land is not so large as it was hoped it would be. Yet, the number is large enough to do lasting good to the agricultural community if these new farmers persevere. We understand that about 40,500 have taken advantage of the government's plan and of these about 30,000 have obtained agricultural qualification certificates, certifying them to know enough about farming to be entitled to aid.

Acadia has replied to U. N. B. that such reference would be satisfactory to them.

Through an error in the office the date of Rev. Dr. MacDonald's lecture on "A Chaplain's Experience's Overseas" was announced for last Friday evening. The lecture will take place this (Friday) evening in College Hall at 8 o'clock and will no doubt be an interesting one. Special music will be provided.

Mr. Arthur Harris, who recently moved from Fitchburg, Mass., and purchased the Charles Borden property on Main street, is making alterations and improvements which will add very materially to the appearance of the property as well as to that part of Wolfville. We understand he intends removing the old carriage shop, and making other changes that will make the property and surroundings much more attractive.

He says in part "I am confident that this Dominion, through the development of her national resources, will in time wipe out her debt. Forests, fisheries, and mines all contribute their part of the revenue but by far the greatest returns will be derived from agriculture, which industry we must continue to establish in permanency and increase in magnitude. One of the greatest responsibilities that falls on either the federal or provincial departments of agriculture is the conservation of the great wealth that lies in the virgin soil. Innumerable considerations are involved in this problem, but the whole affair can be accomplished if we engage in mixed farming with live stock as a basis. This is the fundamental principle underlying success in agriculture."



Longer Life For Those Who Sing

That singing is a source of longevity is a fact that is becoming more and more apparent, with the result that insurance companies as well as physicians are urging the pursuit of vocal study. Albert B. Bach, the veteran teacher of Edinburgh, and one of the most eminent in Great Britain, used to be emphatic with his pupils over the fact that singing not only strengthens the lungs and voice, but develops the whole constitution.

The deaf and dumb are pointed out to us as having a defective development and a shortened life. Doctors have shown too that early deaths reach the highest ratio among those who have a small breathing capacity; one famous physician even going so far as to assert that the recent flu epidemic was hardest on those with a predisposition to weak lungs.

With such a deduction in view it might be well to start children with vocal exercises as early as the seventh year, their studies being confined for a time, to the compass of a sixth or an octave. It is reasonable to assume that the earlier in life that a child begins to sing, the more easily does he

Fertilizer on Pastures

Judging by the correspondence received at the agricultural College, quite a number of farmers will this Fall apply fertilizer to at least a few acres of pasture land. The results from this practice at the college farm have been so striking that the College authorities feel that the practice should be urged on many more farms.

The story told by the experiments at Truro, is briefly this. The total cost of gain in live weight, including interest on investment, fencing and all incidentals, as compared with 15 cents per pound in winter in the stable, with feeds at pre-war prices. The improvement in grazing capacity of pastures to which fertilizer was applied was equally striking.

From this date until the snow flies is the time to make this application of fertilizer. Good results have been obtained from the use of slag, acid phosphates and wood ashes, but almost any fertilizer will give results. It is not good practice, however, to apply material which is very rich in ammonia, since it leaches out of the ground in winter. The phosphoric acid, lime and potash, which are the main ingredients in the above mentioned varieties, will not leach out but will become the better incorporated with the soil during the winter months.

Testing Seeds For Farmers and Merchants

The Dominion Seed Branch with laboratories at Ottawa, Winnipeg and Calgary reported over 35,000 seed tests for the year ending June 30th. The growth of seed testing in Canada is indicated from the fact that only 5,775 samples were reported in 1909. The great bulk of the work in our seed laboratories is done between September and June when each laboratory may handle up to 200 samples per day. Only ten samples are tested free of charge for any farmer or seed merchant during the season. Over this number, the service is charged for at cost.

Official seed testing is the basis of Government seed control, which in older European countries is rated as a leading Government service to Agriculture. Any country without an efficient system of seed control soon becomes the dumping ground for inferior seeds from other countries, and low-grade homegrown seeds may be sold to unsuspecting farmers. Our system is frequently referred to in other countries as being the most practical and efficient. Its importance is now being better appreciated when it is required that imported seeds are not released from bond until they are approved at the seed laboratories, and when cereal grains, flax, corn, as well as clover and grass seeds, are marketed on the basis of fixed quality seed grade standards.

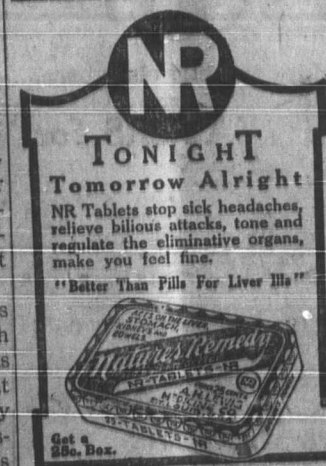
