Speeches were also made by Messrs. Harry Ervine and C. L. Scott. Mr. R. T. Rabbit proposed the toast to the Empire to which we belong.

The dinner broke up by the singing of "Auld Lang Syne." The affair was, in every particular, pronounced a grand success, everyone leaving for home feeling that they had enjoyed the evening to the utmost.

On Tuesday Mr. Vail, accompanied by Mr. Harry Ervine, left on Strm. Olivette for St. John, where Mr. Vail will be tendered a dinner by his St. John friends. Few, if any men, who have followed boat racing have had as successful a career as Harry Vail.

Vail has an interesting record. He was born in Gagetown, N. B., 38 years ago. He rowed his first race in 1881, as an amateur against Russell, at Fredericton, being defeated on account of his boat swamping. In 1882 he rowed with dingy fishing boats against Lamont and Bussy. Vail and his mate were victorious. Vail went south in the fall of 1882 and returned in the spring and took part in the regatta at St. John. He rowed No. 3 position in the winning crew. His crew was challenged by the four that finished second for another race to be rowed two weeks later, and the challenging crew was defeated. During the same year Vail defeated Edward Willis of St. John, in a single shell race. In 1884 he beat McCormack in a race for \$900 a side, and
