I put a bath dish of water, with the chill reduced, into the cage every morning. Once a week I clean the cage thoroughly, scrubbing the perches, the bottom, and the wire bars. I give them fresh water to drink and restock the seed jar once a day. This is all the care I give my birds. I keep them where it is light, where the sun shines coccasionally, and where there is fresh air. Birds should not be hung too birds in the room eithere for here they

FATAL PANIC.

A Discharged Employe Raises a Cry of "Fire," and Sixteen People are Tram-pled to Death Trying to Escape.

Miss Annie Herbeson, of Clinton, is the guest of her cousin, Miss McMillan. GLASGOW, Nov. 1 .- A panic occurred this evening at the Star theatre by a cry of fire being raised. During the rush by the audience to escape from the building ten people were killed and twelve severely injured. The performance had proded without interruption until nine o'clock, when some person shouted fire. The wholeaudience rose and rushed to the door. The mass of people who occupied the pit*met the crowd descending the stairs from the galleries, and a fearful block ensured. block ensued. Loud cries of distress and shouts for help arose from the panicstricken and strugging people. The crowd was adjure by the officers of the theatre and policy to hold back, but their warnings and appeals were unheeded. The crowd frantically rushed towards the outlets, trampling and jumping over each other until they reached the street. When the theatre had been finally-cleared sixteen corpses were found on the stairs leading from the gallery, and twelve persons bad!y inj ared. The only evidence that life was not extinct was the giteous moaning. The whole fire bri-gade, with the police, did their utmost to allay the panic and rescue the crushed victims, but they were too late to be of offective service. The ambulance corps conveyed the victims living to the infirm-The wounded were so mixed with ary. The wounded were so much to re-the dead that it was only possible to recognize them after their arrival at the infirmary. It was subsequently learned that the author of the cry of fire was a
