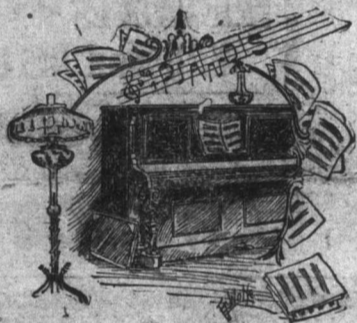

STRIKING EXPERIMENTS

at the request of the
Local Government Board for Ireland.

The body-building power of Bovril proved to be equal to from 10 to 20 times the weight of the Bovril taken.

"The results of the experiments conducted at the request of the Local Government Board for Ireland during the past year, in the School of Physiology, Trinity College, Dublin, as to the nutritive value of Bovril, and communicated to the British Association at Sheffield (The Times) report, September 8th, have created considerable interest amongst the Medical Profession."

"In order to secure a decisive result, the tests were carried out on dogs because, owing to the easier control of the diet and the absence of disturbing influences, mental and physical, much more exact results can be obtained on animals than on human beings. The dogs were first brought to a constant weight on dried dog biscuit mixed with known quantities of water. Bovril from 2 1/2 to 7 1/2 grammes was then added to the food, with the result

"that the weight of the animals went up as much as 50 to 100 grammes, or in round numbers, 10 to 20 times the weight of the Bovril given."

"Afterwards Bovril was discontinued, and the animals returned to the original weight. Consequently, the weight of the hard-boiled white bread which they had eaten from 8 to 10 times as much as that of the latter had to be given to obtain the same increase in weight, or, taking the average, 10 to 20 times as much food, as in the case of the dog which had to be given to obtain the Bovril effect."

"In several of the experiments there was a retention of reserve nitrogen, and in all an increased utilization of other foods."

"It was therefore concluded that Bovril had both a direct and an indirect nutritive value, the latter, by causing a more complete digestion and a less rapid excretion of the other food given."

his efforts fruitless, Thorndyke appeared to yield to the point, and upon this subject at least caused to harass his unfortunate victim.

Frequent private conferences were now held between Thorndyke, his two daughters, and Elizabeth Wareing—a woman approaching middle-age, whom, under specious pretence that Mrs. Thorndyke's increasing ailments rendered the services of an experienced matron indispensable he had lately installed at the farm. bed-curtain nearest the window. A Sewing Circle is a **socially** without gossip! Can you imagine it? No, it exists. Or did at the moment of writing. I won't vouch for any more than that. It is at **Colombia, Mississauga**. The by-laws of the society forbid its members to comment on their neighbours' dress, appearance or behaviour. There is a schedule of fines for violations of these laws. In our Church is a **Ladies' Aid Society** to which several of the prominent Church women do not belong. Why? Oh, just because some one in the society said something about them and someone else kindly repeated the kind words. Seems to me every woman's aid society in the land ought to adopt that sewing circle's by-laws.

Alice Freeman Palmer, the famous president of Wellesley College, was often troubled by being told when she attempted to trace strange reports and stories to their source that "some girl" had said this or that. One morning, therefore, she announced at prayers that she had turned "some girl" out of college and did not wish to hear of her again. Don't you think it would be fine if...

all "some girls" older sisters and brothers who infest the world at large could be similarly banished "far beyond the northern sea" or since the northern sea has become attainable, far beyond the southern sea. If you do, why don't you assist in the banishing? How? Why simply by never giving credence to or passing on any story that has for its authority "someone said," or the even more common, "they say." Everytime you do that you are bringing nearer the day when the death warrant of "some girl" and all her crowd shall be signed.

Visiting gardens is the very distinctive vocation of a Pennsylvania woman. She had been a teacher in the public schools when her health broke down and she was told by her doctor that she must live an outdoor life. She rented a farm in a suburban district, hired two laborers to help her and procured engagements to take care of the lawns and gardens of people who did not have hired men, at the rate of fifteen and later twenty cents an hour. On her own farm she raised the shrubs and young plants to supply her customers with. After seven years she is making about one hundred dollars a month. She says: there are a great many women earning small salaries in cities, who would be happier and healthier and make more money running farms.

Wash leather furniture very gently with warm water in which there is a little vinegar, wipe with a dry cloth and then restore the plish by mixing the white of two eggs and a little turpentine, which is applied with a sponge.

When working on velvet use only the finest pins or needles to pin, so as not to injure the pile, and when bastings are essential do not draw the thread tight. Clip each stitch with scissors before pulling out the bastings.

The measures for the ordinary French dressing are: Three tablespoonfuls of oil, one and a half tablespoonfuls of vinegar, a fourth of a teaspoonful of salt, an eighth of a teaspoonful of pepper. This is enough for a pint of salad.

Some of the best part of the apple is wasted when the fruit is pared for apple sauce. Core the fruit and then cut into quarters. Cook until tender and press through a colander. The skin will give to the sauce a bit of color and add to its flavor.

English Officers Placed on Trial.

Leipzig, December 10.—The trial of the two English officers, Capt. B. F. French of the Royal Marines, and Lieutenant V. H. Brandon, of the Royal Navy, who were arrested at Berlin as supposed spies, will take place here the coming week. It is expected to be one of the most interesting international trials that has taken place in a long time, but the newspaper statements that the trial is "raught with the gravest possibilities" or "the peace of Europe are not taken seriously here."

The charge against the two officers is that of trespassing for the purpose of espionage and attempting to convey military secrets to foreign power. The trial will not be conducted in secret and the accused will be given fair play in the fullest sense of the term. They will be defended by Dr. Von Gorn, a prominent international lawyer of Berlin, and Dr. Hans Otto of this city. Permission will be given by the British Government to be represented at the trial, which will take place under the civil law before seven judges. It is the general belief here that if the two officers are convicted the sentences will be light.

Wine Without Grapes.

Merchants, Still Squeeze Champagne From Apples. "Champagne and claret will doubtless be produced in large quantities this year, despite the general failure of the French vineyards," says the London Chronicle. "The art of making wine without grapes is an ancient one. As far back as 1427 one hundred pipes of wine were sold in London because no trace of grape juice could be found in them. The citizens flocked to see the public staving in of the pipes and the unusual watering of the streets which followed thereupon." "Stiele, in the Tatter, protested against the merchants who soured the bordsaux out of the stone and drey champagne from the apple. And from an old-time cookery book we learn that 'the fruit from the brandie, being rightly mixed with good pippin or pearmain cyder, doth make good claret.' "Nowadays, French wine merchants produce high-sounding vintage by mashing up in hot water and fermenting the liquor. And many other less innocent substitutes are employed."

Household Notes.

When giving sticky medicines to children, heat the spoon by dipping it for a moment in hot water; then pour in the medicine and it will slip easily from the spoon.
Put pockets on the underside of aprons near the right-hand edge and they will be found just as convenient for use, yet will not catch on door-knobs and get torn.
Cut off the bottom of an old water bottle and then cut the rubber into strips up to the curve at the top to make a whip or beater for couches, mattresses, pillows, etc.
If eggshells are to be used for clearing coffee the eggs should be well washed before they are broken and the shells should be kept in a covered receptacle until needed.
When a small clock is beyond repair, do not throw it away, but keep for clock-room use. Set the hands each time medicine is given to the hour when the next dose is to be given.
To keep white gloves clean in a muff have an adjustable lining of white silk or satin that may be fastened in over the dark lining of the muff with invisible hooks and loops.
If collar-stays scratch the neck a little white-sealing wax melted and applied to the ends of the stays where they have broken through the casings will easily relieve the trouble.
Cutting a heel-shaped piece out of an old overshoe and pasting it in the heel of new overshoes prevents the heel wearing out while the rest of the overshoe is comparatively new.
To keep curtains from blowing out the windows conceal thin iron washers in the hems and corners. It will make the curtains hang evenly and without constant stirring in a breeze.
Cotton gloves to wear in doing

housework are cooler and better in every way than old kid gloves. I bought for this purpose especially a size larger than usually worn.
Mashed potatoes left over, should be packed in a cup or bowl until needed for frying. Another way to use it is to put into a double boiler with some warm milk. It will be quite tasty.
Trying keys to doorknobs with a loop of narrow ribbon will save search for a missing key, particularly if there are in the house little children who are fond of taking keys away from their parents.
An excellent cleaner for painted surfaces is made as follows: Two quarts of hot water, two tablespoonfuls of turpentine, a pint of skimmed milk and enough soap to make a weak suds.
A sponge in a porcelain umbrella stand will keep the umbrellas from striking the bottom of the jar, which is often broken in this way, and will also absorb the rainwater from a wet umbrella.
When making a mayonnaise in which only the yolks of eggs are used the economical housekeeper will use the whites in a dessert, such as apple snow for frosting or for a meringue on a pie.
A bathing cap may be kept in good condition for another year by sprinkling it thickly inside and out with talc powder before putting it away. It will prevent it sticking together and rotting.
Using a warm iron when cutting out clothing will do away with pins and weights on tissue paper patterns. Lay the pattern on the material and press it lightly with a warm iron. It will adhere to the cloth.
To prepare a painted wall for papering, wash it first with a solution of half a pound of washing soda in a gallon of water and then apply a warm

A Curious Result.

The political complexion of only six seats out of the 670 seats in the House of Commons remain undecided. If they go as they went last January, the Unionists will be a member short of the number they had in the last parliament. The net result of the election would be to give the Coalition a majority of two more than in the last parliament. The result of the appeal to the electorate is an endorsement of the issue on which the Coalition appealed to the country. Curiously the Liberals are the chief sufferers in these minor diminutions. The only parties which show any increase are the Redmond Nationalists and the Laborites. If the Unionists, especially those of the House of Lords, live up to their political dogma, they will accept the decision at the polls. Their contention has always been that the chief object of a Second Chamber is to compel an appeal to the country on any important issue, on which they may consider, the country has given no mandate. The country has now given a mandate on the Lords' Veto. They have talked largely of referring to the country. This matter has been referred, and the issue is no longer in doubt. The wisest course now is to come to an amicable settlement and drop the partisan aspect of the dispute.

More Diphtheria.

Saturday afternoon two more cases of diphtheria developed at Flatrock when Eileen Allan aged 10, and Annie Stamp, aged 5, were stricken with the disease. The houses were each sealed and the patients are being nursed at home. A child in Mr. Gray's house had the disease over a week ago, and people visiting there it is thought brought the malady to these little ones.

Vessel Springs Leak.

The schr. Stella, Capt. Sol. Burroy, arrived here at 2 p.m. Saturday from Greenspond via Catalina with 1,140 qts. fish for Jas. Baird Ltd. She had a hard time of it coming up, with a gale of head wind and high sea, and lost some gear off the decks. Saturday night the vessel was found to be leaking and the pumps had to be used on her every hour. It is believed that she became strained in the heavy sea running and that some of the seams opened. There is a good deal of ballast in the hold on which the cargo rests so that it is hoped none of the fish has been damaged.

THE MINA HERE.—The cable boat Mina, Capt. DeCartaret, which was at Heart's Content and arrived there on Thursday last, arrived in port this morning. She was engaged since going over there in making necessary repairs to the Anglo cable out in the bay. She will leave here shortly to go to the neighbourhood of St. Pierre on similar work. Before coming this way she had been engaged repairing the cable off the Nova Scotia coast.

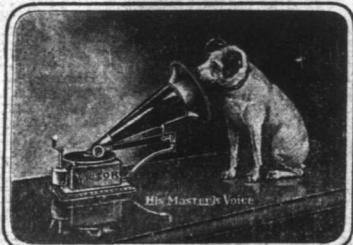

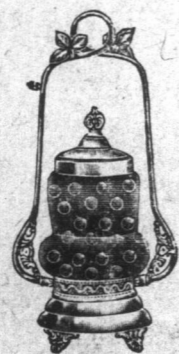

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.

With the exception of a few personal changes, the new House of Commons will be the same as the old. The results in six districts yet to be declared repeat the decision of last January, the old predominant parties, the Liberals and Unionists, will have four members and the member less, respectively, than they did in the last Parliament making them exactly equal. The speaker who is elected as Unionist is excluded. These seats have gone to the Government allies: Labor having added three to their numerical strength, while Redmond comes back with 2 followers more than he did earlier in the year. Both of the Unionist seats were won by the Unionists. The standing of the party tonight is:—Government Coalition Liberals, 29; Independent Nationalists, 12; Independent Nationalists, 10; Total, 393. Opposition Unionists, 371. The Independent Nationalists, headed by the adherents of O'Brien, but they are not so detached from Redmond as the Liberals and Unionists and are likely to rejoin. Included among the Liberals, Mr. Ward generally is considered a Laborite, while Mr. McKean and L. Ginnel are regarded as the adherents of O'Brien, but they are not so detached from Redmond as the Liberals and Unionists, including the Speaker, exactly equal at the end of the election, 272 each. There were five balloting in the day, but the results of only two are known to-night. The Unionists secured a gain in St. Andrews burg which the Liberals held by the narrow margin of 38. Lt.-Col. J. E. Bezzel, the former Parliamentary Secretary of the Colonial Office, has been appointed to succeed Mr. McKean. On the other side, the responsibility for the Government's policy is now placed on the shoulders of the Government. The Government has received a mandate to Parliament which would abolish the Veto power of the Lords. The general opinion is that the Unionist leaders in the end will accept the Bill sooner than drag the King into the party quarrels in the nature of the Lords' rejection of the measure, as then the Government would be compelled to ask the King for guarantees in the nature of an appointment of 500 Peers to outvote the Unionists in the Upper House.

Special to Evening Telegram.

ETAMPES, France, Dec. 17. Henry Farman, competing for the Michelin Cup, today made a remarkable flight of eight hours and thirty minutes. Owing to a fierce north east wind, however, his progress was slow and he covered only 287 miles against 465 kilometres made by Maurice Tabuteau, on October 28th, in a similar competition. Farman's flight was by the applause of the spectators believed that he had beaten the distance record and descended. He was greatly disappointed to find that he had not equalled the former record. Tabuteau occupied six hours in his flight, but the Michelin Cup, which is awarded annually to the aviator making the longest sustained flight with in the year, a premium of \$4,000 goes to the winner.

Special Evening Telegram.

WINTER is intensifying the famine in the Yangtze district. The authorities are endeavouring to suppress the competition which has been so extensive as to be estimated over a million. The majority of them are girls. The road ways are dotted with starving and dead. The relief committee is now making appeals abroad for aid.

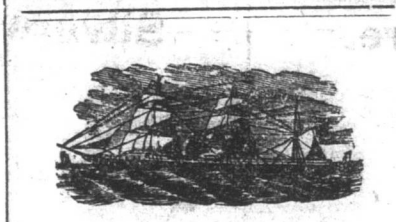

Record Channel Flight.

Special Evening Telegram.

DOVER, England, Dec. 17. Cleod Graham White, the English aviator, who recently won the International Aviation Cup at Belmont Park, had a narrow escape from serious injury to-day. As it was his machine was wrecked and he was badly cut about the face. A large number of aviators have been waiting for the past fortnight to compete for the prize of \$20,000 offered by Baron De Forest for the longest flight across the English channel in 1910. The flight to be made in an English built machine, Graham White this morning ascended for a trial flight in a strong wind. His machine soon began to rock and he was unable to regulate its equilibrium. It turned over and plunged to the ground and was completely wrecked. The aviator fortunately fell a little to one side, it was thought that he had suffered concussion of the brain but he soon recovered consciousness. It is expected that he will be about again within a week. He has ordered another biplane of the Wright type from Bristol and will make another attempt to win the prize. A second competitor for the prize, Sopwith, fared better than White. He left Eastchurch, Sheppey Island at 8 o'clock in the morning, crossed from Dover to Calais and descended at Beaumont, Belgium, a distance of 190 miles. In his trial for the flight Graham had descended within one hundred feet of the ground when his machine began to waver. His actual fall probably did not exceed 10 feet. Sopwith completed his flight of 174 miles just under three and one half hours. This is the first time that a British aeroplane has crossed the channel and in addition it is a record flight for distance under the conditions prevailing. No tugs or other craft followed the aviator on his flight from Dover to Calais and no other precautions were taken against accident.

The Passion Play.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Mr. Editor—While fully appreciating the article in the "Newfoundland Quarterly" on the subject of the Passion Play at Oberammergau, I beg leave to enter a protest against one statement contained in it.

The writer says:—

"The Cross has been laid on the ground and the Christ laid thereon. With brutal indifference the executioners, the four Roman Soldiers, fasten the hands and feet with nails; the strokes of the hammer are heard as they drive the nails through the quivering flesh; the blood pouring from the wounds, and the face from the pressure of the thorns, etc."

Now, not one vestige of this gruesome spectacle is either seen or heard in the performance; in fact everything of a crude, blood curdling, or repulsive character has been carefully eliminated, so that the play may be looked at by persons of the most refined and delicate psychical sense.

The scene of the scourging and crowning with thorns is more like a tableau than an acted scene. There is no blood; there are no wounds; no bruises; nothing to excite any other feeling than sympathy and compassion. At the crucifixion the curtain rises and discloses the two thieves already tied to their crosses and elevated on either side. The cross of the Saviour is lying in the centre of the stage. The body has already been fastened to it. The fastening is all done behind the curtain and invisibly to the audience. But it is not done by nailing nor by any pretence at nailing. The wrists and body are sustained by bands of brass encircling them. These are secured to the cross by screw-bolts which pass through the wood, and are secured by nuts at the back of the cross. The cross is raised in view of the audience, but it is done with a marvellous ease and grace. There is not a sign of straining or dragging; no confusion; no hitch. Indeed this is one of the most wonderful and astonishing feats of the whole play. The only sign of blood is at the piercing of the side with the lance and it is very mild and moderate indeed. It is done in the following manner: The body of the Christ is not naked, as many might think it was. It is covered with a tight-fitting flesh coloured garment, it bears, of course, the stereotyped marks, as used in all our representations of the Crucifixion. There is nothing whatever to shock the modesty even of the most fastidious under the tight garment on the left breast is placed a small cerecloth, water tight sack, containing a small quantity of a dark reddish liquor, to represent blood, and water, in accordance with the strict wording of the Scripture narrative. The lance held by the soldier (Longinus), has a very sharp point like a needle or a lancet. The soldier very carefully selects the exact spot where he knows the sack is situated and gently pricks it; a very small portion of the liquor spurts out and dyes the cloth of a reddish color. (Subrina), all in strict accordance with Scripture. This is not the heart's blood (as Christ was already dead), but a gathering of fluid mixed with serum. The Scripture does not say the heart was pierced, but only the side (lancea latus ejus aperuit).

I think it well to insist on these points as the principal objection offered by many who have not seen the play, is the thought that it would be leathsome on account of the effusion of blood; and the disgusting appearance of wounds and bruises.

At the conclusion of the address Mr. George Langmead rendered a solo which was well done. As next Sunday is Christmas Day there will be no service.

They are fully determined to hold out for the wages demanded by the Union. One of the strikers who had gone to Sydney and was at work there returned by the Bonaville and went back to work in a shop here.

Tim Shannahan On the Small Man in the Big Job.

"Did you ever notice," says Delaney to Tucker, "how awkwardly a small man fills a big job? It seems to take all the pleasure out of the small man's life when he strikes a big job."

"What do you mean by a small man and a big job?" asked Tucker.

"Well said Delaney; 'by a small man, I don't mean a man that weighs a light weight on a scales. He can be as heavy as a rhinoceros in weight and still be a small man.'"

"Why," says Tucker, "you'd require to be able to add up four lines of addition to understand you. How do you make out that a small man can be big, or a big man small?"

"By a small man," says Delaney, "I mean a man who is small in his ideas, small-minded, selfish, and yet cuts with all. This kind of a man is never intended by nature to fill any job outside of selling balm or two-cent balls of worsted; but yet we often find him occupying positions of importance. He is such a miserable ninny-hammer that he makes the lives of those who work under him miserable existences. You will see small men in big Government jobs, and 'twould freeze every drop of blood in your body to have any business to transact with them."

"The small man generally is a very pious individual, and he uses his religion on all occasions to put himself ahead. He is usually a 'nice man,' very polite, and never loses an opportunity to doff his hat to the upper ten ladies of the town; enquire about the health of the clergyman, and is foremost at picnics, but never parts with a cent without making sure he'll get two cents in return. In politics he works the two sides, but he never loses any sleep scouring the district for votes; he leaves that to the other fellow. How many small men can you count in this town who are holding big Government jobs who never worked on a committee or canvassed for a vote? When others are out in the wet trying to induce others to vote for their man, the 'little man' is sitting in a comfortable parlor, accompanied by the strains of a sickly organ and his daughter. 'Tis simply astonishing how they bring themselves before the footlights, and 'tis generally accomplished by forcing themselves ahead in getting the heavy man in church to use his influence."

"The small man lives in a big house; he is a believer in big houses

but that is the only thing big that appears to him, except, of course, a big salary.

"He is no good in the community and makes an overcoat do him eight years. He is always a sober man; that is, he is never seen entering a saloon or carrying any parcel resembling a bottle. Some people are of the opinion that the 'small man' can drink all he'll get for nothing, and go as far as to say he can bear a hit without your being able to notice him. The very thought of getting something for nothing braces him up and helps the 'small man' to get outside his drinks without being so extravagant as to stagger from side to side.

"The 'small man' is always sure to have a nice cute wife. He looked out for that when he was young. She is generally a fine, big rosy-cheeked woman, but is not extravagant like most big women. She serves as a great help to the 'small man,' as she comes in handy to tow him home in a snow squall from a charitable concert or some other cheap place of amusement.

"The big rosy-cheeked woman hates the 'small man,' but as divorce is not popular in this country, she hangs on to him. She'd give all the world for him to live up to his job, but he handles the cash and places her on an allowance.

"The 'small man' has a big opinion of himself and always owns a voice that is too big for him, which he uses to advantage when he sees a paying opportunity. He is always on the strong side, and makes up for any lost time by being on hand when there's anything to be gained.

"On a day when the Premier is arriving he is always sure to be on the wharf, and he is also present when clergymen are going away by train or steamer.

"The 'small man' cries over people who get arrested, gives them an odd lecture free; but that is about the only thing he gives for nothing. All this time, mind you, the 'small man' holds his nice big job, in fact he gets promoted into a bigger job. No amount of hints will make the 'small man' feel that he is a jader, and the big burly politician gives him all he looks for, simply because he makes people believe he is in touch with the important men of the country and can also sway the political feelings of all his friends who belong to the same religious denomination.

"Oh," says Delaney, "the 'small man' in a big job is an interesting piece of human mechanism and 'tis 'worth the money' to watch his antics going through life. I know one keen politician," says Delaney, "and he told me he gets just as much fun, as I do out of watching the cute 'small man' dodging his way in a 'nice slippery manner down through the 'meat of life.'"

"Watch him yourself from this time out and see if you don't smile, even when trade is dull and money scarce. You'll have to smile—you can help it—if you'll watch this man."

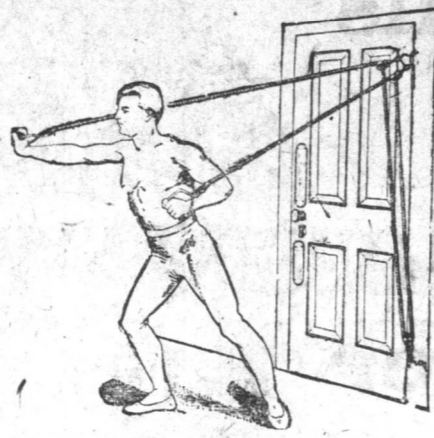

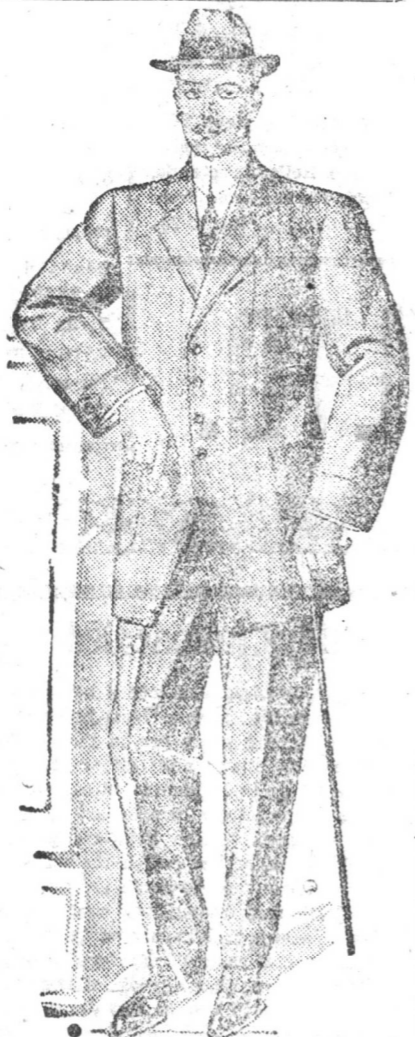

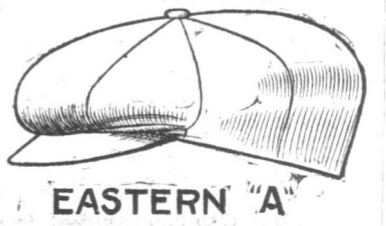
