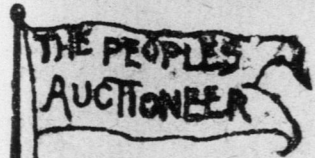

At the City Hall.

The weekly session of the Municipal Council was held yesterday afternoon. James and Newman Ebsary offered land for sale to the Council on the South Side for street widening purposes. Referred to Engineer.

A communication was read from Mr. W. W. Blackall, Supt. of Education, was taking over No. 9 Garrison Hill as a hostelry, and as it would be used for scholastic purposes only, thought it should be exempt from taxation.

Plans of annex to bakery on Col- onial and Bond Street by Mr. G. Mc- Guire were approved. He also ask- ed permission to install motor. Referred to Engineer.

Margaret Hayse wrote denouncing the attitude of the Council in refusing to allow her to build a porch at rear of her house on Conroy Street. Council will visit the place on Mon- day.

The Premier in replying to Coun- cillor's letter re the case of Reid Company near Job's Bridge, stated that the matter was being attended to by the Minister of Justice.

The Sanitary Committee reported on the suspension of two employees by the Supervisor and asked for their re- instatement. After a lively debate the matter was deferred on motion of Councillor Ryan.

Mr. A. O'Neil, Freshwater Road, ask- ed for water supply for domestic pur- poses; as he has no sewerage, request refused.

The Engineers report was read and adopted.

THE CONDON MATTER. When the Secretary had read the Solicitor's report on the Condon case, attached to which was a copy of Judge Conroy's judgment, Councillor Mullaly moved the following resolution:—

Whereas the attention of the Coun- cil has been called to the following ex- tract taken from an article publish- ed in the Daily News of 23rd Novem- ber last which purports to report the judgment of His Honor Judge Conroy in an action against Mr. John K. Condon against the Council for damages caused by the flooding of his cellar through the back flow from a sewer on Pennington street, namely:— "The Council, said the Judge, have not only the law against them in this case, but a sense of justice and fair play between man and man should have prompted the remedy Con- don's injuries. If this overflow had happened to a city magnate's kitchen, no doubt the Council would be on the move to prevent a recurrence of the nuisance as it was only poor Condon it did not matter much; but Condon although a poor mechanic, in their estimation, is entitled to as much con- sideration in this respect as the high- est in the land."

And Whereas the Council thereup- on requested its Solicitor to furnish an official report of the remarks of the learned Judge, which he did and re- ported as follows:—"I may say that in this action I give judgment for the Plaintiff. All the law and facts are in his favor, and the question of the amount of damages has to be consid- ered. We consider the man is entit- led to his comforts as a citizen; not because he is a poor mechanic, but if the Council had any regard for him they would have treated his as man to man. His rights are to be respect- ed as much as those of any magnate. A body of men such as the Municipal Council have no right to oppress him any more than they have to oppress me. We intend to give damages, and we have to vindicate the right of the individual against a body who are to treat him as if he were beneath their notice. If the plaintiff was a big merchant and suffered under like con- ditions, he would insist upon speedy reparation, but this man is entit- led in law to as much respect as any other citizen. Be he rich or poor every man has equal rights in this democratic age."

Whereas the Council had been ad- vised from time to time by its Solicitor in somewhat similar cases that the city was not responsible in such a case and this case was contested by the Council in order to have a judi- cial decision upon the principle of liability in the matter.

Be It Therefore Resolved that this Council respectfully but firmly pro- test against Judge Conroy's language as unfounded and unwarranted by the evidence or in fact at all and that Judge Conroy to say when and where the Council has shown any partiality towards any section in the community.

Be It Further Resolved that state- ments such as that of Judge Conroy making it appear that people of wealth and station in the community receive more favor from the Council than the working classes are called to prejudice the Council in the carry- ing on of its duties and render more difficult the tasks the members have to perform and regret that Judge Conroy should have permitted himself to use such unmerited language of a body that is trying to carry out a very difficult undertaking.

Be It Also Resolved that copies of this protest be forwarded to the Ex- ecutive Council and to His Excellency the Governor.

In moving the resolutions Councillor Mullaly regretted that Judge Conroy should publicly insinuate that the Council was dealing in class legisla- tion and that the poor man had not the chance of the magnate. He re- sented these insinuations and though not prepared to discuss the merits of the case, he would say, however, that if what the Judge said were true, then he (Councillor Mul- laly) believed the Council was false to the trust reposed in it and should resent the insult cast upon it or re- sign forthwith. The Council, he held, relied on the advice of its officials and was blameless in this course. The resolutions were seconded by Councillor Myrick who thought the Judge went out of his way, went out of his jurisdiction in offering such an insult, which he held the evidence in the case did not warrant. He held that the Council as a body were not cognizant of all the facts in the case, and he criticized the official key of their failure to remedy the matter when brought under their notice by Condon.

Councillor Ryan recorded his vote against the resolutions.

Councillor Coaker fully supported them and thought it an outrage to be branded as class legislators by one of His Majesty's Judges, especially when all were doing their best for the common good. He held that all should support the Resolutions.

Councillor Martin would not vote for the resolutions to which too much publicity had been given. He thought the Judge had a right to criticize.

Councillor Mullaly regretted the absence of unanimity in the matter, thought those who did not approve the resolutions accepted the stigma cast upon them.

Mayor Ellis held that it was as regrettable that the Council was not unanimous as to have the criticism go broadcast through the press. Councillor Ryan had said "the less said the better." He (the Mayor) did not understand him.

Councillor Ryan retorted that the man on the street knew that the resolutions were to be introduced at the meeting and Councillor Mullaly said that people had a perfect right to know.

Councillor Myrick said in his opin- ion it was the officials who were to blame. Councillor Martin said he always favoured the workman whose case was deserving, and also intimated that the whole particulars of Condon's case had been reported to the Council but had been overlooked.

The Mayor said he did not believe it and that he (Coun. Martin) was a supporter of Mullaly.

Another hot debate between the Mayor and Councillor Martin the former stated that the usefulness of the Board was at a finish.

The meeting closed at 6.15 p.m.

Rome, Dec. 2.—A consistory was held by the Pope to-day, at which the Red Hat was placed on the heads of Cardinal Francis X. Nagle, Archbis- hop of Vienna; Cardinal Giuseppe Maria Cos Y. Macho, Archbishop of Valladolid; Cardinal Antonio Vico, Cardinal Nuncio of Spain; Cardinal Francis S. Bauer, Archbishop of Olutz, and Cardinal Enrique de Almaraz Santos, Archbishop of Seville, all of which were created Cardinals at the consistory on Nov. 27, 1911. The Pope looked very well and his voice was quite strong.

The Pope also officially announced the appointments of the following pre- lates: Right Rev. Dennis J. O'Connell, Bishop of Richmond, Va.; Right Rev. Patrick A. McGovern, Bishop of Cheyenne; Right Rev. Austin Dowling, Bishop of Des Moines, and Rev. Edward J. Hanna, Auxiliary Bishop of San Francisco.

The Condon Case

Condon had solid ground for complaint against the Council. His trouble began in 1907, some five years ago. He got no redress from the late Council, and tardily the present Council put the sewerage right last spring. So much is to the credit of the present Council.

Some of the members of the Council put forward the position that the Council as a body were not cognisant of the facts. Councillor Martin contends otherwise. If it is so, then it is up to the Council to find out why the members were not cognizant of the facts.

After the overflow of Condon's premises from the street sewerage had been stopped by the Council last May, there still remained outstanding the question of the damage sustained by Condon from 1907 to 1912. The Council declares in one of the preambles to the Resolution passed yesterday that its legal officer advised that in this and similar cases the Council was not legally liable. Here is the preamble referred to:—

"Whereas the Council had been advised from time to time by its Solicitor in somewhat similar cases that the city was not responsible in such a case and this case was contested by the Council in order to have a judicial decision upon the principle of liability in the matter."

Mr. Condon brought a suit for damages against the Council, and the latter contends that the case was contested to obtain a judicial decision upon the principle of liability in such cases.

This statement, if well founded, and we know nothing to the contrary, seems to us to dispose completely of Judge Conroy's animadversions against the Council. It was acted upon in a spirit of class discrimination, and that justice was denied Condon because he was a poor man.

But whatever may have been the cause, or whoever may be to blame, and though justice was not denied, it seems to us that justice was delayed to Condon. Five years is far too long to wait for the adjustment of a legitimate grievance.

Supreme Court.

(Before the Full Bench.)
True Bill Against Duke.
The Grand Jury were present and after having answered to their names were addressed by the Chief Justice on the Bill of Indictment against John Duke for murdering John Sears on board the Lake Simcoe whist on the high seas, after the Chief Justice had addressed the Grand Jury briefly on the indictment they retired to hear the evidence and consider their presentment.

In the Estate of George Tapp, Deceased.
This was an application for Letters of Administration to the said estate of the said deceased to be granted to such person as to the Court shall seem fit.

Mr. Blackwood stated the facts of the case. George Tapp has not been heard of for over seven years and this application was made for the purpose of obtaining Letters of Administration on the presumption that the said George Tapp is dead. Kent, K. C., for plaintiff, opened his case. Whilst Mr. Kent was proceeding with his case the Grand Jury returned to the Court, and through their Foreman, Mr. Isaac Morris, announced that they had found a true Bill for murder against the prison, John Duke.

The Attorney General moved to have the prisoner arraigned at 2.30 this afternoon, and it was ordered. The further hearing of the case of Bond vs. Merchant was postponed till Monday.

The Registrar, D. M. Browning, read a presentment from the Grand Jury dealing with the Penitentiary. The presentment was a lengthy one dealing with all matters connected with the institution. The presentment also dealt with the Lunatic Asylum. The presentment also dealt with some length with other matters of public importance. After the reading of the presentment the Chief Justice thanked the Grand Jury for their attendance and for the way in which they had performed their duties, and the Court then rose 'till 2.30.

The Government very generously placed at their disposal sufficient cabs to enable them to be obscured from the public gaze whilst being removed from the King's Wharf to the Police Station. Contrast this treatment to that meted to the unfortunate man who was removed from the Lake Simcoe yesterday morning. Sir E. P. Morris might have at least looked out after the comfort of his constituent and spared him and the public generally from the heart-rending scenes which took place on lower Water St. yesterday. Sir Edward should remember that charity begins at home and that the comfort and welfare of his "people" should receive the same attention, if not better, than that given to foreigners. The treatment accorded to the seaman's wife was a disgrace to the authorities, which could easily have been avoided by the Government having had a cab stationed at the King's Wharf, for it was by a mere chance that one was met well up Water Street.

eyes, that the orderly plainly exuded astonishment at the possibility of such an everyday formality being capable of such reverent embellishment, although it is on the list of instructions in court oracles that the charge on all occasions must be pronounced in the most devotional tones possible."

Miss Isaacs, who is training for the law, is a student of considerable ability, and a brilliant career is prophesied for her.

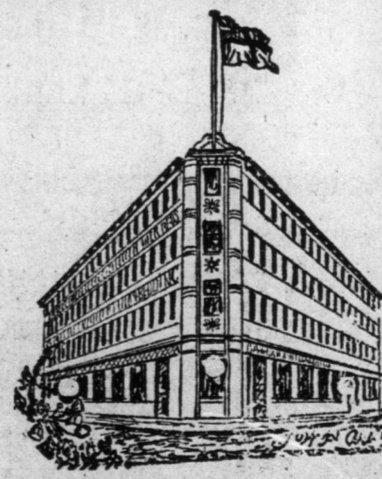

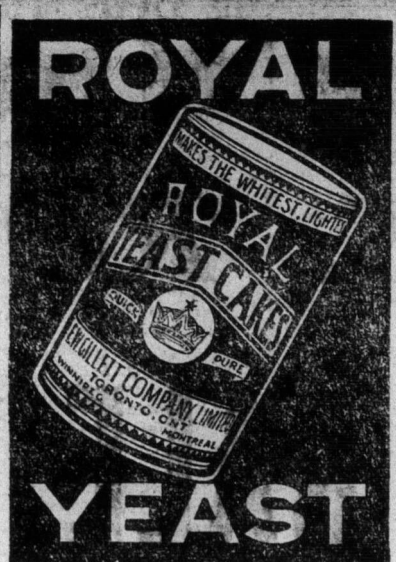
Special to the Evening Telegram. NEW YORK, Dec. 6. Major Hattery of the United States Army, retired, jumped from the tenth floor of the Manhattan Hotel, today and was instantly killed. He had been suffering from melancholia.

Special to the Evening Telegram. LONDON, Dec. 6. The Times, warmly welcoming Premier Borden's proposal, heartily approves the appointment of a Canadian Minister as a member of the Imperial Defence Committee. Similar appointments by other Dominions will be equally welcomed, for they mean more than the creation of navies or contributions.

Special to the Evening Telegram. LONDON, Dec. 6. Eighty-two fishermen lost their lives during the recent storm on the Portuguese coast four days ago. A fleet of a hundred fishing vessels whose crews totalled 182 men were caught in a gale. Up to the present only 100 have returned, and it is almost certain that the remainder went down with their craft. The survivors suffered severe privations. They were without food or water for three days, while seas and heavy cold winds prevailed. Four fishermen became insane. Jumped overboard and were drowned. Six bodies were washed ashore on the northern coast.

Special to the Evening Telegram. LONDON, Dec. 6. There was a remarkable development yesterday in the investigations into the robbery of ten thousand sovereigns contained in two cases in a consignment of £200,000, shipped by the Bank of England to the Credit Lyonnais at Alexandria, Egypt, about three weeks ago. The two cases were found on arrival at Alexandria, to contain lead instead of gold, and were sent back to England for expert examination. Extra precautions were taken to guard these two cases on the return journey, but they have either been lost or stolen, and no trace of them can be discovered. The continental police believe that they were intercepted by the same gang which carried out the original robbery.

Special to the Evening Telegram. LONDON, Dec. 6. It provides at one stroke a great augmentation to the power of organization of the Imperial defence, and naval authorities from the highest to the lowest unite in saying Canada's new policy has the right ring about it—a ring of earnestness. At last Canada has risen to an appreciation of her own danger, and responsibility. Even looked upon solely from the point of Canada's own interests as selfishly as one likes, the new naval policy is regarded here as a great stride. The right of recall harmonizes with Canada's desire for security of action. Placing a fighting line of ships that can give an account of themselves, shows that Canada is not going to take a back place or content herself with being an adjunct of even the Mother Country.

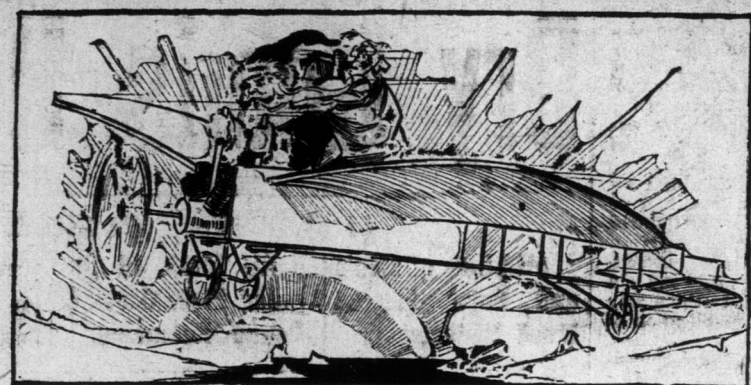

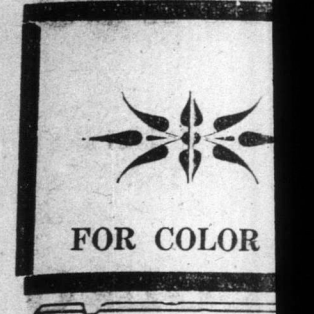
