



He Revolutionized Railroading with His Invention of the Air Brake.

New York, March 12.-George Westnghouse died suddenly here this afternoon. He had been suffering with a heart complaint for three months.

Mr. Westinghouse was 68 years old. nd was perhaps best known as the nventor of the Air Brake which bears his name, and which revolutionized railroading in this country. The air brake which he invented is used throughout the civilized world, and in almost every part of the globe there are great plants which he founded.

Mr. Westinghouse founded many manufacturing companies in this country, Canada and abroad, including plants at Hamilton, Ontario; Manchester and London, England. In the Westinghouse industries some fifty thousand persons are employed, and the many companies have a capitaliation aggregating \$200,000,000.
