Silk Came From Persia.  
Wrought silk was brought from Persia to Greece in 325 B.C. It was known in Rome at the time of Tiberius, when the senate prohibited the use of plate of massive gold, and forbade men to debase themselves by wearing silk, fit only for women. Hellogabalus first wore a garment of silk in 220 A.D. Silk was at first of the same value with gold, weight for weight, and was believed to grow on trees. Silkworms were brought from India to Europe in the sixth century.

Charlemagne sent Offa, king of Mercia, a gift of two silk vests. The manufacture was encouraged by Roger, king of Sicily, at Palermo, when the Sicilians not only bred the silkworms, but spun and wove the silk. The manufacture spread into Italy and Spain, and also into the south of France a little before the reign of Francis I., about 1510; and Henry propagated mulberry trees and silkworms throughout the kingdom about 1600. In England silk mantles were worn by some women of the nobility at a ball at Kealworth Castle, in 1286.

### Compulsory Fish Eating

Fish-eating, which has found such a strong advocate in Sir James Critchton-Brown, was at one time compulsory by law on at least two days in every week. In 1583 Queen Elizabeth's Privy Council issued a notable ordinance that it should "not be lawful for any person within that realm to eat any flesh upon any days observed as fish-days, upon pain of forfeiture of 15 (equal to about \$150 at the present day), for every time he offend," and, further, that "no innholder, alhouse-keeper, or common ale-keeper, shall offer or put on sale upon any day of forfeiture of victuals upon pain of forfeiture of 25s." This Act was prompted by the fact that the fishing industry which provided the nucleus of Her Majesty's Navy, both in the matter of men and vessels was suffering severely by the growing indulgence of the people in beef and mutton that many fishermen were abandoning the trade. This the Privy Council rightly judged to be a danger to the realm.—Exchange.

### Household Notes.

Nowadays physicians advise a good bedtime meal for people who are nervous and emaciated.  
To make fudge smooth and creamy add to it (while making) a level tablespoonful of cornstarch.  
Each child should possess a laundry bag and put its soiled clothes in it as soon as they are taken off.  
Rub paraffin on the thread of a mountain pen before screwing on the lead and it will prevent leaking.  
A good kitchen table should be strong and large, with drawers for a large quantity of toast at once.  
A galvanized tub should be cleaned with gasoline or kerosene and then scrubbed with hot water and soap.  
To remove coffee stains, stretch the napkin or the tablecloth over a basin and pour hot water through the cloth.  
Stained floorboards can be cleaned by scrubbing with chloride of lime, using a tablespoonful to a pail of water.  
If chocolate is to be served with sandwiches, it should be made an hour beforehand and allowed to stand in the double boiler.  
Crumpled and moistened newspapers are better for cleaning windows than tinfoil. Polish with clean tissue paper.  
Fiber grass rups are excellent for a living room floor. They can be scrubbed with soap and water as readily as a bare floor.  
Rub potato juice on a water pitcher which has become corroded from letting water stand in it, and the stains will disappear.  
A woollen scarf can be dry-cleaned by rubbing dry cornstarch thoroughly into it and shaking it out. Go through this process several times.  
If you get inkspots on polished wood, paint the wood lightly with sweet spirit of nitre, then polish with clean flannel in a waxy oil.  
Give the children a sip of warm liquid—soup or milk—if they come in

from school hungry. It is nourishing and doesn't spoil their dinners.  
With a fireless cooker you can cook five vegetables and a ham shoulder, and all in the same dishes in which they will be set on the table.  
Bookcases should never be forgotten in furnishing the living room; or, rather, book shelves. Any carpenter can make them very satisfactorily.  
Window curtains were never so inexpensive and never so decorative as now. House mistresses are learning the value of simplicity in such details.  
Never stand when you can sit to do a bit of housework. Even the ironing of small pieces can be done sitting, if the kitchen stool be high enough.  
To set growing house plants in the bathtub and spray them with a bath spray is one of the best methods of giving their leaves the necessary moisture.  
Overalls and such heavy articles should be dipped in the tub of water, then laid on the washboard, thoroughly soaped and scrubbed with a scrubbing brush.  
To make a cat stay in a new home, rub its forepaws with butter, a proceeding that is said to destroy the scent of the old home. This is an old English custom.  
Bulbs which have bloomed in the house in February or March should have their leaves cut off and be laid away in the dark, cool cellar or iced. Do not water them.  
Cleanliness is as necessary to growing plants in winter as it is to successful housekeeping. Pots and leaves both should be frequently washed and sprayed.  
If you keep your clothespins in small grape baskets with a wire hook, and then place the hook over the clothesline, pushing it before you as you pin, it will save a lot of stooping.

### Ponderous Personages.

OLIVER CROMWELL.  
By GEORGE FITCH.  
Author of "At Good Old Sitwash."  
Oliver Cromwell, a plain man with no awe of royalty in his soul, was born in England in 1599, no particular notice being taken of the event at the time outside of the family. He grew up into a raw-boned, double-fisted college student at Cambridge, who played football and regarded the midnight oil as too valuable to waste in study.  
When Cromwell was twenty-nine he went to parliament as an instrument of insurgency was his hobby. He was also a common citizen to such an extent that he submitted to a fine rather than be knighted. He served in parliament until King Charles I. jumped

this venerable institution and began to run England by himself and then spent some years in various degrees of patriotic rage. At one time he was on the point of emigrating to America. Had he done so the American Revolution would probably have come along a century sooner and we would now be regarded by Europe as a middle aged country.  
All this time the Puritans of England were denouncing the government wherever it could be done with any safety at all and when parliament went back into business, in 1640, Cromwell was the Victor Alford of the House. He opposed the King with such vigor that he was soon doing it in a coat of mail in front of a company of troops and when the Civil War began, in 1642, Cromwell was in the front rank where he made things very unhealthy for the enemy.  
The Puritans were much jeered at by the King's troops for their short hair, plain clothes and general lack of clear-stretched manners. But they had a very deft and persuasive manner with the sword and the blunderbuss. When the war was over the supply of cavaliers was very short, while the King was in jail and the Puritan leaders roamed through his palaces without scraping the mud from their shoes.  
When the war was over it was soon seen that Cromwell was the only man who was stiff enough in the neck and had the courage to stand up to the King, and he accordingly became Protector of England. He was a bluff, short-spoken man with a red face and no manners according to those times and he was elected through prerogatives and ceremonies in a manner which made the nobility of England shriek with anguish. Charles was beheaded and Cromwell ran the country with the aid of parliament and an army which wore no lace wristlets nor long curls and which wanted no better diversion than to kick a Duke up a tree or kick a Baron out of his castle and set him to work sawing wood.  
Cromwell introduced many novel customs into England such as observing the Sabbath, religious toleration and decency of general morals. But he worked harder than a captain of industry and wore himself out at the age of fifty-eight after a rule of only a few years. Many years afterward when he had been dead so long as to be practically harmless the government of England, once more run by a King, dug him up and beheaded him. This plucky job was completed triumphantly without the loss of a single cavalier.



**Colonial Investments.**

In view of the fact that the Premier, Sir Edward Morris, is on his way to London with authority to float a loan by means of three and a half per cent. debentures, it may not be out of the way to place before our readers the conditions of the markets for colonial investments, as seen by one who is in no way connected especially with Newfoundland. We refer now to "Trustee," who contributes a monthly article to the Empire Review on "Indian and Colonial Investments." We have before us the article in the March issue, which deals mainly with financial conditions in February. Here are some extracts:—

"In every section of the securities tabulated here prices show an unusually substantial advance on those of a month ago. The general rise to which reference was then made, attained the proportions of an investment boom during the following week or two, and the subsequent relapse has only partially effaced the big advance that occurred in quotations. The successive reduction in the Bank rate to 4 and then to 3 per cent., and the general and emphatic cheapening of money of which it was the token, formed, of course, the basis of the revival.

"The solid character of the improvement in market conditions may be deduced from the fact that the substantial rise occurred in face of a fresh flood of competitive new issues, naturally induced by the easing of money market. The demand on the part of investors was sufficient not only to raise the market values of existing securities, but also largely to absorb the numerous new loans that were offered for subscription."

"The improved condition of affairs may be seen from the following facts. Our Three and a half per cent. inscribed stock, floated in 1910, were in December, 1912, quoted at from 90 to 92; in December, 1913, from 87 to 89; early this month they were quoted at 89 to 91.

"It will be seen then that Newfoundland stock recovered partially just as other colonial stock has done.

"It should, however, be remembered that Colonial Governments are not putting on the markets new issues of 3½ per cent. For a considerable time, they have been issuing four per cent., and even these have not been very favorably received in spite of the recovery which has been made to some extent.

"New South Wales and Victoria issues of four per cent. at 96 and 97 respectively went up to par in the early part of the month; while the

South African issue of four per cent. at 98½ dropped ½.

"The Dominion of Canada issue of four per cent. at 99 at the beginning of the month was not well received. The London Times of 6th inst., states that only 22 per cent. of the issue was subscribed by the public.

**Citizens' Committee.**

A meeting of the Executive of the Citizens' Committee was held last evening at the Board of Trade Rooms. The Chairman (Mr. Gosling) stated on opening the meeting that it had been called for the purpose of deciding upon the programme of the Committee in the future.

He pointed out that the Committee of 12 to be appointed would not take office until July, and would have barely six months in which to conduct the work of investigation, re-organization and preparation of a new charter. He thought it was the bounden duty of the Citizens' Committee to do all that was possible to prepare the way for the Commissioners by stimulating public sentiment in civic matters, by collection of data, by investigation of such matters as Taxation, Water Supply, Sewerage and Lighting. He also suggested that an endeavour should be made to promote a company necessarily semi-philanthropic, to build a tenement house as planned by Mr. Jonas Barber.

After some discussion it was unanimously agreed that the work of the Citizens' Committee should be continued, meeting every Thursday evening. That the Municipal Council should be requested to furnish the Citizens' Committee with a copy of all Bye-Laws now in force, and should permit the heads of the various Municipal Departments, Messrs. Slattery, Ryan and Dwyer to appear before the Citizens' Committee for the purpose of giving such explanation in regard to these departments as may be required.

Information was given to the Citizens' Committee that the Committee of Twelve would be appointed on the return of the Prime Minister in May. A letter from Mayor Hoeken, of Toronto, dated March 12th, in reply to a letter from the Citizens' Committee of March 4th, was submitted giving information re Report on the Hydro Electric Works of Canadian cities.

Inspector O'Brien submitted report giving the total number of dilapidated houses in the city as 369; number of tenements, 678.

"Grey Islands close by, 10 a.m., making good progress; saw one whitecoat and good many old harps; Stephano, Bellaventure and Nascopie in company; no other ships in sight; O.K."

In view of the first whitecoat being sighted news of the main patch being struck is hourly expected.

Last night Mr. Gerald Harvey received this message from Capt. Rangel, of the Bellaventure:—

"Ten miles north of Cape Bauld; seals not plentiful; done nothing yet; Stephano, Nascopie and Beothic in company."

To Marine and Fisheries Department to-day:—

**FROM LA SCIE.**  
"A sealer believed to be S-gona or Fogota with three other ships passed here yesterday going north, but failed to get around Partridge Point, ships were laying in wake of the Western Horse Island at dark; ice in a solid jam; no sign of seals."

**FROM BONAVISTA.**  
"Full of ice, apparently loose."

**FROM FOGO.**  
"Bloodhound, Ranger and Kite in sight this morning, other ships

got clear of their Twillingate position yesterday morning and were making good progress north on inside of ice."

To-day the following wireless messages were received and which puts a more encouraging aspect on the voyage:—

**FROM BEOTHIC.**  
"Struck small patch of whitecoats, estimated patch to contain 1,000; killed and panned 200; Nascopie 8 miles north struck small patch also; position 15 miles E. by S. White Islands."

**FROM NASCOPIE.**  
"Struck small patch of whitecoats at 6 p.m. yesterday 15 miles south Belle Isle; whitecoats averaging 45 lbs.; following ships in patch and appear to be working; Beothic, Stephano, Bellaventure; no other steel ships in sight."

**FROM STEPHANO.**  
"Took first whitecoat at 6 p.m. yesterday; on board and stowed down 600; unable to estimate the patch, darkness; 15 miles S. E. by E. Cape Bauld."

**FROM FLORIZEL.**  
"In open, making good headway by St. Julien's, Bonaventure and Bloodhound in company; everything working well; good prospects."

**60,000 Seals Taken From Shore**

News has been received in town that along the French Shore from Cape Norman round to Conche, and down to White Bay, some 60,000 seals have been taken by men from the shore in the earlier part of the month. It is expected that the steamer which is in the main patch which are supposed to be off the Straits. The messages received from the Stephano, Nascopie, Be-

othic and Bellaventure who struck a few seals, were sent last night. The steamer would burn down last night, as the ice is very heavy, and during the night they would not be able to see the leads of water. To-day they will be hunting for the main patch. The few seals taken last night are supposed to be an indication that the main patch are in the neighborhood.

**The Technical School.**

The opportunity of securing a practical course in mathematics, mechanics, hydrostatics, and mechanical drawing is now open to the intelligent young men of the city. The classes are not exclusively for the Reid Co's. apprentices, though Mr. Reid is the principal promoter of the project, but any intelligent young men who have a taste for engineering and the studies pertaining thereto, and who display earnestness in their desire to acquire a practical knowledge of the subject, are eligible. The room in which the classes are to be held can accommodate about one hundred, and those desirous of entering the classes should register early. The progress made by the young lads who have been attending the course of lectures, given by Capt. Saunders, is a sufficient guarantee of the success of the technical school. In a short time the lads have by diligence and perseverance, made remarkable progress in mechanical drawing, which must indeed be grat-





### LONDON GOSSIP.

#### PROGRAMME OF THE PARIS ROYAL VISIT.

LONDON, March 3rd, 1914. Although the programme of festivities which will be given in honor of the King and Queen when they visit Paris in April has not yet been definitely arranged in all its details, it has been agreed that it will include a visit to Versailles, on which occasion a State lunch will be given in the Galerie des Batailles. King George and Queen Mary retain happy recollections of a day passed at the Palace several years ago when they visited France as Prince and Princess of Wales. They had then for their guide M. Pierre de Nolhac, the historian of Versailles, whose intimate description of the place and its historical associations deeply interested their Majesties. King George and Queen Mary have just expressed a desire to revisit the Palace, and fortunately they will be able to renew acquaintance with the erudite guide of their former visit.

#### FUTURE ROYAL VISITS TO THE CONTINENT.

There is some expectation that their Majesties may undertake a tour of the Northern capitals of Europe in the early autumn of next year. Doubtless, the King and Queen of Denmark, in the course of their visit to London, will press upon their Royal host and hostess a cordial invitation to become the guests of the Danish people at Copenhagen at the earliest convenient date. Such a visit would be acclaimed throughout Denmark. The situation in Stockholm on the other hand, is at present not very favorable for hostilities of this kind, but it may be hoped that a twelve month hence it would be convenient from every point of view for King Gustavus to welcome King George to his Swedish capital.

#### THE NEW ALBANIAN KINGDOM.

The Prince of Wied arrives in his new kingdom fully equipped with designs for all royal and state insignia. The designs have been executed by his command, by Professor Emil Doepler, of the Berlin Museum of Applied Arts, and present an ingenious combination of the arms and colors of the House of Wied and of Albania. The crown is an entirely new creation, as Albania never had any, and the Wieds lost it long ago at the time of the mediation under Napoleon I. It is to have ten points and a white edging, and to exhibit at the crown the five ray star of Albania placed on a hemisphere. The same

star recurs on the new State and mercantile flags as well as on the Albanian eagle. The great arms of State are to represent a purple ermine-lined royal mantle adorned with the crown as described above, with a blue ribbon fluttering over the upper edge and inscribed in letters of gold with the motto of the Wied House: "Fidelitate et veritate." "By faithfulness and truth."

#### BRITISH VS. AMERICAN RAILWAY TALENT.

When Lord Claud Hamilton, Chairman of the Great Eastern Railway of England, was complaining recently that the lack of talent among railway employees in his railway had com-

pelled the directors to go to America for a suitable man to run the line, a good many doubts were expressed as to the justification of his lament. It happened one day on a big railway contractor, who had served as engineer on the Great Eastern Railway 15 years ago, and he gave me what was in his opinion the reason for the lack of talent. "The Great Eastern," he said, "have had as good talent in their shops as any other line, but they never gave young men a chance of a career. I myself left the company for South Africa, having convinced myself that there was no prospect in their service. And I know personally three Englishmen who started life on the Great Eastern who are now in control of three great American railways, yet they have to go to America for talent when they themselves forced talent to go to America. That part alone proves that it was the system, not the man, that was at fault. The Argentine, Egyptian, Soufan, Indian, and East African lines are all run by Britons, and if we are good enough for these and the big trunk lines in England, we are good enough probably to run a line like the Great Eastern."

#### A FAMOUS CARTOONIST.

"Punch," Great Britain's only political satirical journal, never had a more consistently brilliant member of its staff than its celebrated cartoonist, Sir John Tenniel, who has passed away at the age of ninety-four. Everything he did was well done, and every now and then he soared to magnificent heights, as in the cartoon of "Dropping the Pilot" which Lord Rosebery purchased and presented to Bismarck himself. The famous German statesman was of course the dropped pilot of the cartoon. Another famous cartoon was Disraeli as "Mose in Egitto" at the time of the acquisition of the Suez Canal bonds, and yet another was "The Political Mrs. Gummidge" (Gladstone and Disraeli). It seems, however, invidious to fish for plums in a rich cake of nearly 2,000 drawings all of which were of great merit. As an artist Sir John Tenniel was chiefly self-taught but he had genius, which was the main thing. He joined "Punch" when Thackeray was still a contributor, and his connection with the great journal lasted for about fifty years. Apart from "Punch" he achieved fame as the illustrator of "Alice in Wonderland" and a fresco of his St. Cecilia in the palace of Westminster has also won admiration. He was knighted in 1893, and retired in 1901.

#### THE FASHIONABLE MAID.

Domestic servants are becoming scarcer and scarcer in England every year. A London mistress writes to say that it is really the increased luxuriosity in the life of servants who travel with their employers, that has penetrated the whole class with discontent, which brings about the chief trouble in the management of big houses. The fact that first-class hotels on the Continent provide late dinners for the maids and valets of visitors with coffee to follow every evening and liquors twice a week that they have excellent servants' rooms and that a high rate is charged

for them—all this fails to propitiate Therese or Josephine or Leon when on their travels. As an instance of the importance of a first-rate lady's maid, my correspondent says that a rich woman on leaving a large hotel at Venice recently, found that the omnibus driver did not know which was the mistress and which was the maid, the latter having been presented with three or four bouquets by the management, while she herself had only been offered one. Moreover, the maid's jewel case was as if anything larger than her own. Many employers, she adds, are victims to the extreme elegance of their attendants, and it is no uncommon thing to hear a lady declare that she could not afford such an hotel, but had to go there, "as Therese would never have stood the cheaper one." Naturally the hotel management do their best to propitiate the smart lady's maid to-day. This state of subjection of the fashionable woman is brought about by her dependence on an equally fashionable maid, who knows that her mistress will be "lost without her." A young woman about to marry the son of an impetuous grandee amused her friends by informing them that they were going to economize by eating no vegetables but that, of course, her maid would always have her burgundy—she was used to it.

#### Practically Nothing Saved From City of Sydney

No further word has been received as to the condition of the S.S. City of Sydney which is stranded near Halifax, except the public message received early this morning saying that practically nothing was saved, and that a heavy rain storm was raging and the ship would probably go to pieces to-night. It has not yet been ascertained whether or not the ill-fated vessel had a pilot on board when she struck the Sombra ledges.

#### Device Beats Time For Congregation.

Unique Electrical Contrivance Flash- es Rhythmically With Organ's Beats.

An unique contrivance designed to beat time for congregational singing has been installed in a Wineland, N.J., church. It consists of a circuit attached to the lighting system, the switch being operated from the foot-board of the pipe organ. When the organist's foot presses the bass pedals the cross-bar is pulled by rawhide thongs, and opens and closes the circuit in perfect time with the music. A light is placed in front of the choir loft connected with the switch, and flashes rhythmically in plain sight of the congregation.

### Income Tax is Working Well

Washington, Mar. 7.—The income tax law bids fair to live up to the expectations of the Administration by producing about \$50,000,000 annually in revenue paid by close to 425,000 individuals.  
 Although treasury officials decided last night not to make public for the present the reports of internal revenue collectors on the income tax, it became known that more than 400,000 individuals had made returns in the sixty-three collection districts, up to Monday midnight, when the time limit expired. From these individuals it was understood the Government would collect more than \$40,000,000. It has been the opinion among officials that thousands of individuals would take advantage of the thirty days extension of time granted in case of absence and sickness, and they expect the final figures to show at least 25,000 more reporting. Including the corporation tax as amended in the present law, it was estimated that the annual revenue from this source would amount to about \$85,000,000.



Mr. Beck will not be able to revive "The Mirror" as the Herald and Telegraph lay claim to this designation. Tomorrow the Herald and Telegraph will add "and Mirror" to its name. Mr. Beck is now in New York in conference with the Burns detectives. Mr. D. Lorne McGibbon is also there. Mr. Beck's new paper will be called "Beck's Weekly."



### The Tolls Debate

Senator Jones Assails President Wilson.  
 Special to the Evening Telegram.  
 WASHINGTON, To-day.  
 The returning skirmishing on the Panama Canal tolls controversy will occupy the Senate to-day, as a result of the effort made yesterday by Senator Jones, of Washington, to have passed his resolution calling upon the President for information as to what foreign Governments have protested against the toll exemption of American coastwise ships and for correspondence between United States and foreign Powers relating thereto. In urging the resolution, Jones charged that the exemption repeal was the price to be paid by the States for non-interference in Mexico by foreign Powers and that President Wilson's plea to Congress for repeal followed negotiations with Great Britain whereby that action had agreed to support the principles of the Monroe Doctrine. The Senator assailed the views of the President in the matter, declaring that to reverse the policy of the Government would be humiliating, cowardly and craven action. Jones argued that repeal would be a great economic blunder, that it would benefit Canadian interests and trans-continental roads and no others, and injure more or less every other interest in this country.

### Father and Son Die Of Pneumonia

Friday last, Mr. E. Collishaw received a message stating his nephew W. A. Brine had died Thursday, of pneumonia, and yesterday received another message that the deceased's father had died Monday night of the same disease. The young Mr. Brine was a bright lad of twenty years of age, having graduated from Dalhousie Technical School last fall and entered into partnership with his father, as A. A. Brine & Son, Crown Land Surveyors for the Province of Nova Scotia, with offices at Seabright. Both had been away with a survey party and returned home with colds which developed into pneumonia and both died within four days of each other. Mr. Brine, sr., was a son of the late Hon. William Brine, for many years Provincial Cashier for Nova Scotia. He is survived by a wife and four children, also one brother, the Rev. Charles Brine, of Holyoke, Mass., and two sisters, Mrs. (Rev.) Brown and Mrs. (Rev.) Lowary.

EL PASO, Texas, March 18. Mexican refugees, belonging to President Huerta's political following, last night claimed that General Villa had been decisively defeated at Escaton.

COLOGNE, March 18. For calling a woman school Principal, a suffragette, the wife of a physician in a neighbouring village was to-day convicted and fined on a charge of slander, according to the Cologne Gazette.

LONDON, March 18. It is estimated that Lipton's Shamrock IV. will be launched at the end of April. She will draw 13 feet 9 inches. Her centre board will drop 10 feet, giving a total draught of nearly 24 feet. Her mast will be of wood, and will be hollow.

BERLIN, March 18. Emperor William to-day ordered a general school holiday in Berlin, in celebration of the birth of his sixth grandson at Brunswick, this morning. The young Duchess of Brunswick is his only daughter. Mother and son are reported as doing well.

HALIFAX, March 19. Two stevedores, named Burns and Snow, of this place, were drowned last evening by the upsetting of a dory, while engaged salving cargo from the wrecked City of Sydney. Outside of deck fittings, practically nothing has been saved from the ship. She will likely go to pieces to-night, as a heavy storm with rain is raging.

PARIS, March 18. Mme. Caillaux's act in killing Calmette, appears to have been dictated by other motives than her desire to shield her husband's political reputation. Besides being one of the ablest financiers in Europe, Caillaux enjoys the reputation in Paris drawing rooms of irresistible gallantry. A great beauty is said to have stood between Caillaux and Calmette, and this is said to have accounted for the relentless attacks of the Figaro on the Finance Minister. Calmette's avowed purpose, it is said, was to stop at nothing in his campaign against his rival. This is given as the secret of the most startling political tragedy in France since Charlotte Corday killed Marat.

Gas, it may be said, vitiates the atmosphere. True. But it also helps to purify it. Its purifying power is greater than its vitiating power. Electricity does not viliate, nor does it purify. Hear what three eminent men have said:—  
"Much evidence has lately been adduced to show that gas is more useful than the electric light in promoting efficient ventilation of air. It is for this amongst other reasons that gas is being frequently substituted for the electric light. The latest example is, perhaps, the Society of Medical Officers of Health, which has recently installed gas on its premises, after experience with the electric light.—Dr. Jamieson B. Hurry.

He would merely add that no member who had experience of their meeting room under the old conditions could deny the improvement that had taken place since gas had been substituted for the electric light and the new system of heating and ventilation had been installed.—Dr. Reginald Duffield, before the Society of Medical Officers of Health.

I have in my mind's eye, at the moment, a hall which, in the old days was lighted by gas, and in which a large audience could, with comfort, sit through an hour's lecture, or with pleasure through a three hours' dinner, but which, with the march of civilization, had its illumination changed from gas to electricity, the latter being applied with all the latest refinements to effect the lighting under the best conditions, with the result that any large gathering within its walls leads to a state little short of asphyxiation.—Vivian B. Lewis, Professor of Chemistry at the Royal Naval College, Greenwich.—Nov. 8, 11

**Fishery Hampered**  
BY ICE CONDITIONS.

"The total catch of codfish is 6,530 qts. and for last week, 25. Seventy-two dories and skiffs with nine boats and forty-six bankers are fishing. Prospects are poor this week. Frozen herring forms the bait supply. E. N. E. winds prevail with fine weather, and up to Wednesday the coast was packed with drift ice. The boats were out on Thursday and Friday and found the fishing grounds practically clean. Several of them did not get one fish, and others got only from 19 to 20. The cod evidently took a sheer off on account of the ice going over the grounds, but how the ice has come out of sight. All the men are hopeful of the return of the fish in a few days' time."

The salt of Torreveiga is particularly noted for its purity, and is said to contain over 99 per cent of chloride of sodium and is entirely free from all noxious matters.

**Rebel Officer Charged With Benton Murder.**

Juarez, Mexico, March 13.—The reported arrest at Chihuahua yesterday of Major Rodolfo Fierro, Pancho Villa's chief lieutenant, constitutionalist here is the first step towards giving Great Britain satisfaction for the death of Benton.  
Evidence has been given to the Carranza Commission, appointed to investigate Benton's death, that Benton was killed in Villa's office by Fierro and the commission has insisted that he at least be kept under surveillance until their inquiry be completed.  
The United States Government will be informed of these facts by its agents here and also that Villa was so angry at Fierro's action that for two days after the killing, he kept the officer in a prison cell.

# The Premier's Valedictory.

Dear Sir—The editor of the Herald, last week in commenting upon the Premier's recent appointments to the Messrs. Squires and Blandford to Executive Offices, stated that what- ever objections might be urged by the Opposition against the Govern- ment's conduct, the public would re- member that Sir Edward Morris, as com- mander of the "purely constitu- tional" course, had pursued a "purely constitu- tional" course. If that was the reason for the Government's action, the pub- lic would have been much better served had the Premier remained silent altogether on the subject, if placing in the channel of the Executive Office two gentlemen who were defeated candidates for the House of Assembly only six months ago; if making up his Executive Council of nine by packing the Leg- islative Council with four of that number, and if putting his Attorney General in the Upper House, because he was afraid to open a single con- sideration in the House of Assembly; if such a course of conduct can be regarded as constitutional, then Sir Ed- ward has certainly followed that course, but we venture to think that the public will be slow to take even the Herald's dictum on the Premier's constitutional law in this instance. In our opinion, a more flagrant viola- tion of political decency it would be hard to conceive, and if it came from any other Government but the one at present in power, the constituencies throughout the Island would be up in arms, but with our present rulers we have become apathetic, and we must now only wait the opportunity of re- moving from office such a gang of desperadoes. We do not wonder that the Premier left these appointments in abeyance until the close of the Legislature, and until the eve of his departure from the Colony as a kind of valedictory to the electorate, and it is some satisfaction to the public to feel that even he with all his politi- cal sins, appears yet to have some little sense of decency left in him.

The closing down of a dreary and barren session of the Legislature, as far as the Government were concern- ed, was marked by quite a series of sensations. In one, a Minister has taken a libel suit to vindicate himself. We had the Keegan-Hospital episode in which the General Superintendent of that Institution occupied a central but by no means enviable position, and then followed the Ministerial appointments, of which the Government have shown themselves heartily ashamed, for they waited until the doors of the House of Assembly were closed before they made public the last two interesting items.

Let us, however, hope that the next item on the programme may be the dismissal from office of the most cor- rupt Government that has ever ruled our destinies, and when that much to be desired event takes place, a poem of gratitude and thankfulness will resound from one end of the Island to the other.
