War News. Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M. BRITISH OFFICIAL FROM HEAD-QUARTERS.

FRENCH OFFICIAL. PARIS, March 11. The following official communication was issued by the War Office to-day: In Belgium destructive fires spread against trenches and underground works of the enemy in the region of Steenstraete and the environs of Bixschote; in Artois east of Arras we exploded a mine the results of which we occupied; north of the Aisne lively cannonading has been maintained. In the regions of the Bois de Bumes and of the Bois de Meuse activity of the two armies was less spirited during the course of the day. On the right bank of the Meuse bombardment is being maintained in the region west of Doumaont, but not so intense on the left bank, or in Woerwaer. Fruitless shells launched against the main defence works of Doumaont proved very disastrous to the enemy. The Germans attacked three times in columns of infantry, but they were mowed down by machine guns, and were obliged to leave the ground covered with dead bodies.

BATTLE OF VERDUN DWINDLING. PARIS, March 11. The battle of Verdun is fast dwindling in intensity. The Germans have to a way impaired the main defence of the fortress, notwithstanding the violence of their onslaughts. When they will make another big effort after the lull, or whether the battle will end, as did other great battles on the western front by a mere normal condition of trench warfare, cannot be discerned at present, but French military opinion is inclined to believe that the latter will be the case. There is still violent fighting for possession of Fort Vaux, according to announcement by the War Office this afternoon. The Germans have made progress, along the slope leading to this position, but they have not yet reached the barbican entanglements in front of the fort. The Germans hold some houses in the eastern part of the village of Vaux while the French are still in possession of the western part of the town.

The Call for Men and the Response. Measured by the undertaking given by the Newfoundland Government in August, 1914, when the King of England took up the gauntlet thrown down by the Kaiser in invading Belgium, Newfoundland has lived up to her pledge. The Government promised to bring the Naval Reserve up to a thousand men and keep it at that. Five hundred and eighteen (518) naval reserve men, who had been in training before the declaration of war, answered the call of the King, made by Royal Proclamation. Since that time 319 recruits have volunteered and been accepted up to Saturday last. Last week was a good week as eleven men joined. Excluding the number of men who have been discharged on completion of engagement, men invalided and lost in action, the strength of the Newfoundland Naval Reserve to date is 1,119. In regard to the Army, the Government first promised to furnish 500 men. The response of the young men of the country was so satisfactory that they were able to undertake the formation of a full battalion and afterwards to form a reinforcing battalion. This has already been done, and 2,017 men of the much larger number who offered themselves passed the regimental medical examination and had been added to the strength by the end of February. The Government has now undertaken the formation of another battalion and the reserves necessary to keep it at full strength. This work is proceeding satisfactorily, and there is every prospect of the battalion being organized within a reasonable time. Today, however, we are dealing with the response that has been made in the various districts. The figures we give for the Newfoundland Regiment are up to Feb. 29th, 1916, and for the Naval Reserve up to March 11th.

Obituary. MR. MANSFIELD PETIPAS. There passed away at 4 a.m. yesterday, at his home in Whitbourne, Mr. Mansfield Petipas, at the ripe age of 43 years. Mr. Petipas was one of the first settlers of that inland town. He was a native of Tracadie, Antigonish County, N.S., and came to this country 33 years ago. In his younger days he followed the sea, and for the first 20 years of his residence here he was employed by the old firm of Mohrre & Co., having commanded several of their vessels. He was actively employed in the construction of the Placentia branch and the cross-country railway, and for over a quarter of a century he was connected with the railway service. DANDELL HEARD FROM.—Mrs. Dandell has received letters from her husband, dated Feb. 8th and 9th, from Alexandrovsk, stating that he had arrived there after a passage of 18 days from Glasgow. The Adventure was also there and both ships expected to sail again in about a week from the date of the letter for Archangel.

WATER WON'T FREEZE.—The backwater above the Long Bridge near the railway premises has not frozen for some little distance from the shore. This is supposed to be due to the natural formation of acid from the heaps of copper ore piled there for the new smelter. The rain, and melted snow have probably formed weak sulphurous acid or saline solutions from the sulphur in the copper. SEALER DEAD.—A member of the crew of the s.s. Countless Thousands of Germans Threw Away Their Lives. Paris, March 2.—"If the French are victorious it will be the end of Germany." With that epigram ringing in their minds, countless thousands of German troops threw away their lives in the repeated assaults upon Verdun. From captives taken in the last week the French military authorities have learned the importance attached by the German officers to the battle. French wounded brought into Paris from the battlefield declare that their captive enemies look upon the drive upon Verdun as the probable turning point of the war. If successful, according to the German viewpoint nothing can keep the Crown Prince out of Paris. If defeated, then Germany's chances of forcing satisfactory peace are slight. Kaiser's Plan Completely Unsettled. Already, according to the captives, the German's hopes for success have dwindled and many admit that the Kaiser's plan for prostrating the French front has been completely upset. "What an ordeal," declared one youthful member of a German regiment that was cut to pieces in one of the numerous assaults upon the forts at the village of Douaumont. Then he added: "We Shall Never Be Able To Take Verdun." The depressed spirits of other captives reflects his attitude. Many of the German prisoners at Verdun are exceedingly young hardly past the military age, which indicates military critics declare, that Germany has relied upon every available soldier to aid in the assault upon Verdun. One of them, a youth of nineteen declared to-day: "School Boys Are Veterans Now." "Most of the fellows of my regiment are of the same age as my own. Many of us were in school together when the war began, but already we have seen sufficient service to class us as veterans." "For more than half a year I have been in the trenches. I was sent to Serbia when my enlistment began, and for six months my regiment was engaged there. Six weeks ago came the order for our transfer to the French front. We were told by our officers that we were on our way to take part in the great final victory of the war." "When the battle of Verdun began, we had the greatest confidence, and the belief among us that we would find no resistance worth speaking of. When the first assault was ready to be launched and our guns began covering our advance, we found that the French cannon were shelling us harder than ours were shelling the French lines. It was stupefying." "Under the most terrible cannonading that veterans of 1914 declared they had ever experienced, my regiment assaulted a hill a few miles south of Beaumont. Almost in an instant, it seemed, half our men were killed or wounded, and the other half fled, with the exception of sixty." "I was among the latter number. We had almost reached the French trenches when their mitrailleuses stopped us. Fortunately we were able to surrender or our stay on earth would not have lasted ten minutes longer."
