ANTI-DUMPING BILL.

LONDON, May 11. Early this morning the Governmen succeeded in putting through a second resolution, which provides for the protection of industries by the prohibition of dumping.

THIRTY PER CENT. CUT.

MANCHESTER, May 11. Cotton Spinners and Manufacturers Association has given notice of thirty per cent reduction in wages in the weaving section. Three hundred thousand operators will be affected. A similar notice has already given in the spinning section.

SURPLUS SUPPLIES.

OTTAWA, May 11. A cablegram, received to-day from the International Institute of Agriculture, states the Institute has estimated that the available world's supplies of wheat and rye will cover all requirements this year, and leave, on August first, stocks amounting t fifty-one million bushels.

PAPER MILLS CLOSED.

THREE RIVERS, Quebec, May 11 The mills of the St. Maurice Paper Company here were closed down this morning. Several hundred employees are affected. Difficulties over wa ges were given as a cause.

ONE RESULT OF THE COAL STRIKE LONDON, May 11.

The London Times says it under stands that the chartering of steamers to bring coal from United States has subsided in the past two or three days, the slump being probably due to the length of time occupied in crossing, and limited facilities for unloading steamers of the tonnage required. The amount of coal on the way from States, or expected to be on the way shortly, the Times estimates at more than a hundred thou sand tons.

PAPERMEN QUIT WORK. SUDBURY, Ont., May 11. Seven hundred men ceased work to-day at the Espanola Mill of the Spanish Pulp and Paper Company, pending a settlement of difficulties with that Company. An identical situation exists at the Sturgeon Falls Mills of same Company, where over five hundred men quit work this morning.

CARRYING ON.

GREEN BAY, Wis., May 11. Officers of the Northern Paper Mill. whose employees are on strike against the proposed twenty per cent. cut in pay, announced to-day that another paper making machine had been started, making three in operation. Reports from Rhinelander Mills to day were that Rhinelander Paper Co. is working with seventy five per cent.

Police Court.

A woman who has been before the magistrate several times, for vagrancy, appeared in court this morning on a similar charge and was sentenced to 10 days' imprisonment. Six boys who were charged with loose and disorderly conduct on the public streets, were fined \$2 or 5 days each.

Prices Lower.

A notice to the Trade from the local factories announces a reduction of 6½ cents per lb. in the price of creamery butter and 3 cents per lb. in that of butterine, to come into effect after May 30th. The wholesale price then will be 35 cents for creamery and 30 cents for butterine. The reduction ollows the decline in the Canadian ar-




