What's in a Name?

London.-The reason why Michael Sadleir, the novelist, spells his name differently from his noted father, Sir lichael Sadler, the Vice-Chancellor of Leeds University, who was recent College, Oxford, and who visited Can-ada and gave a number of public ades early in April, is given by a writer in the Tearher's World following an interview with the novelist. The two Michaels spelled their names alike until the son published a novel, "The Anchor." Then confusion arose as to the author. Sir Michael being a selebrated person it seemed natural that the book should be attributed to him, particularly as the son was little known. The father wasn't enmoured of this attribution, however Here is the way Michael Junior, in the interview, tells why he changed the spelling of the family name, so far as he personally was concerned. "A Yorkshire newspaper came out with a full column review of 'The Anchor.' The paper headed the review, 'The Vice-Chancellor's Love Story.' The reviewer evidently had not a high opinion of the book. He expressed wonder that so busy an educationist as Sir Michael could find the time to do this sort of thing. Emergency exists no longer; there s no longer starvation in Russia; here may be under-fed people, but none will die. If the American administration






